State Troopers exams to begin May 3

The Texas Department of Public Safety announced that October 18, 1988 has been selected as the beginning date for a recruit training school for the position of State Trooper according to Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander for the Department of Public Safety.

Entrance exams and agility tests will be given at the Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls Department of Public Safety offices every Tuesday and Thursday beginning on May 3, 1988. The final day for testing out-of-state applicants will be June 30, 1988 and for Texas residents, the final testing date will be July 14, 1988. The testing will begin at 8:30 a.m. on each above mentioned days and will take most of the day to complete.

Selected applicants will attend an 18 week police training school at the Texas Department of Public Safety Academy in Austin. Recruit trainees will be paid a monthly salary of \$1,545.00 while they are attending school.

Major Cawthon advised, "Interested persons should contact the recruiting coordinator in either Lubbock, Amarillo or Wichita Falls for employment qualifications and application forms. All necessary paperwork must be completed prior to taking the entrance exams. Em-

ployment qualifications and application forms may also be obtained by contacting your local Department of Public Safety Trooper."

Ag Business seminars focus on women landowners

WANTED - Women landowners who are interested in learning about writing leases and saving taxes.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System will hold a series of four seminars over the state during May which are especially designed to meet the needs of landowners who are women.

The seminar schedule is as follows: May 2-4, Holiday Inn - Centre, Odessa; May 10-12, Sheraton Hotel, Wichita Falls; May 17-19, Holiday Inn - Airport, San Antonio; and May 24-26, County Extension Office, #2 Abercrombie Drive, Houston.

Many Texas women find themselves thrust into land-owning situations for which they have very little training or background, according to Dr. Wayne A. Hayenga, seminar leader, who is an economist and attorney with the Extension Service.

Frequently a woman 'in charge' of property upon the death of her husband or after inheriting land. The entire three-day workshop will be an opportunity for women to explore income-generating and tax-saving opportunities for their farms and ranches.

First day of the seminar will be concerned with the outlook for agricultural land investments and how they compare to other investment, Hayenga points out.

Also, since most women who inherit land don't want to operate it themselves, a special session will deal with farm and ranch leases. Items to include in a lease, both of an economic and legal nature, will be addressed. Many folks are concerned about the 'fairness' of a lease. A method to develop a 'fair' and 'stress-free' lease will be explored as well as suggested guidelines and standards for women landowners to use to evaluate tenants.

The second day will include such topics as types of business organizations of each. Many farms can have income tax and estate planning considerations of each. Many farms can have income taxed at 15-18 percent if the owners want the farm to expand, says Hayenga.

Estate planning is a special need for single people who own farm or ranch land, since one person can give away or pass on an estate of \$500,000 in 1986 without gift or estate taxes. This amount goes to \$600,000 in 1987, so most women won't have a serious tax problem unless they own a farm or ranch or other investments. Estate tax rates on the amount over the exemption range from 37 to 55 percent, so many women need to look at special tools to change farm valuation in an estate, the economist points out.

The last day will include a discussion of planning ideas to save on estate taxes and to make estate administration easier.

For instance, planning to sell part of the property on an installment is a consideration for many. It can be good, or bad, depending on the individual situation. Oil and gas interests can be managed for large

tax savings, and this is usually done in conjunction with estate planning.

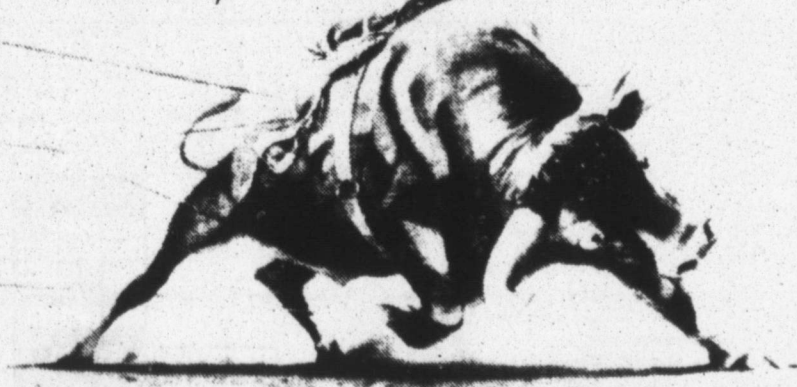

Ex-Student reunion report

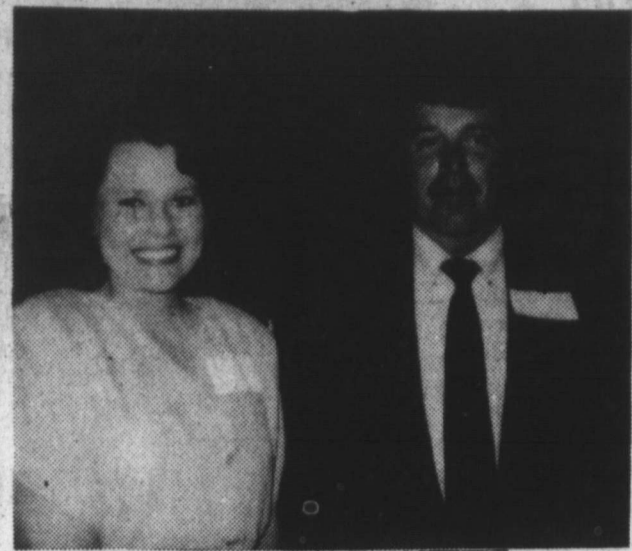

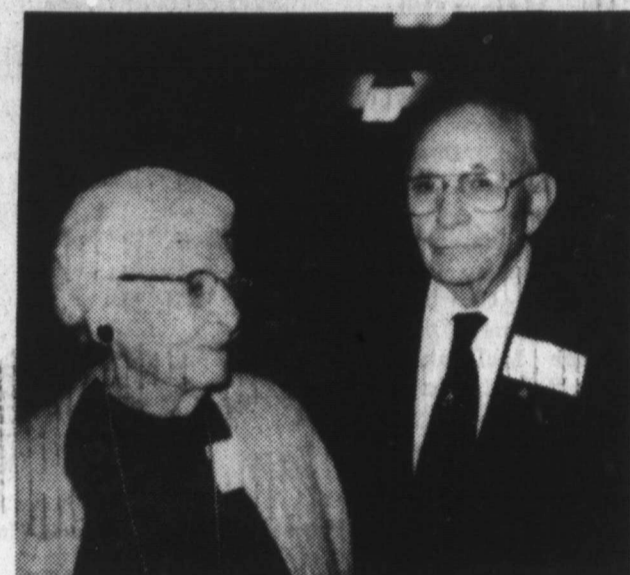

Intramural Rodeo huge success

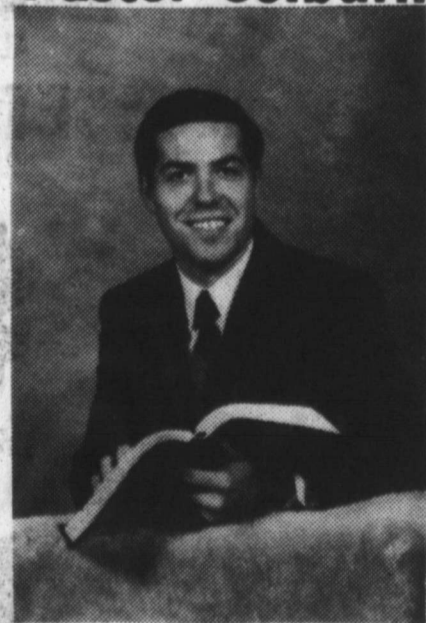

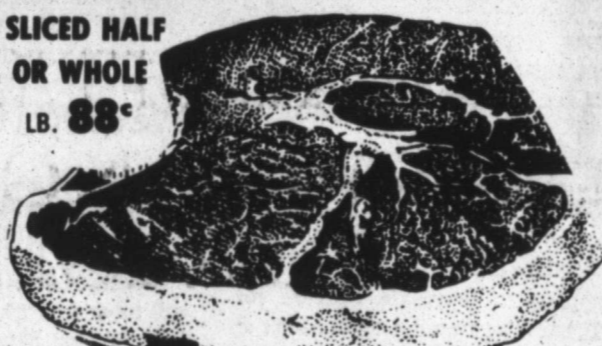

"O Taste and See..."

BY JON LEGGITT

The Bible is filled, in both Old and New Testaments, with God's gracious invitation to needy and underserving man. Hear the Lord as He repeatedly calls, waiting anxiously, longingly, for His prodigal but beloved children to come home:

"Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28)

Lo, everyone that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy, and eat; yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price." (Isaiah 55:1)

"And the Spirit and the bride say, Come. And let him that heareth say, Come. And let whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely." (Revelation 22:17)

Each of these, and the many other invitations in the Word, is so special in its own way--filled with the Father's love and care.

But one special invitation in the Psalms says so very much about the abundant life the Lord has for us--that the total Christian life really is: "O taste and see that the Lord is good..." (Psalm 34:8)

So many people come to church a few times, drop out for any number of reasons, then say, "I tried church and didn't like it." But this is not an invitation to try religion. It is not an invitation to "play church". It is an invitation to try the Lord. When one tastes something, even a very small amount, it is internalized, digested, becomes an inseparable part of him. Only then does one really know for sure that the food not only provides a pleasant sensation in the mouth, but is beneficial to him. God is asking us not to be superficial in our encounter with Him, but to make His Word an integral, vital part of our very beings.

"The Word was made flesh..." we are told in John 1:14. This verse refers, of course, to the incarnation. One needs to be very, very careful about taking any Bible verse out of context. But we suggest that when we "taste and see that the Lord is good," when we make His way our way, the Word is made flesh, becomes alive--becomes incarnated--in us. The Bible says as much in several other verses: "...ye are the temple of the living God..." (II Corinthians 6:16), and "...Christ in you, the hope of glory..." (Colossians 1:27), and "...you are Christ's letter, ...written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone, but on human tablets of the heart." (II Corinthians 3:3, The Revised Berkeley Version in Modern English)

Have we really tasted the Lord at His word, and tasted His way, tested His promises? When we do, we can claim the promise that concludes that same Psalm: "The Lord redeemeth the soul of his servants: and none of them that trust in him shall be desolate..." (Psalm 34:22)

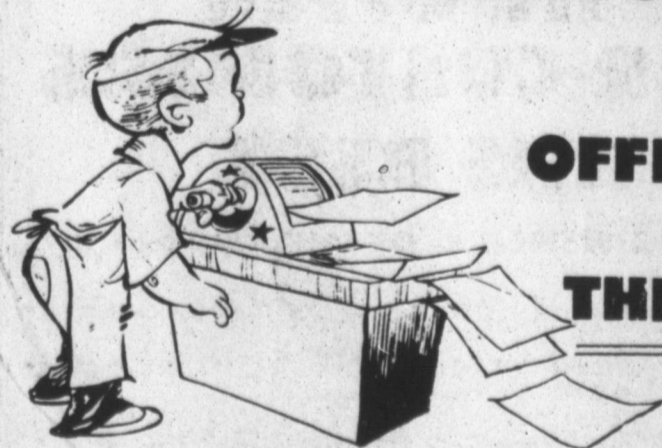
