Weather - too hot, too cold, too dry, too rainy

The weather has been on most of our minds these past few weeks, as always it is too hot, too windy, too much rain, not enough rain, or hail, and this past week I think we have had just about all of them.

Sunday night the tornado alert whistle blew in all three Donley County cities. High winds up to 75 miles an hour was reported in almost all of the county. Spotters thought they saw a tornado about 2 miles from Clarendon, but the weather bureau said they did not see any tornado clouds, but they advised residents to take cover because of high winds and dangerous lightning.

There was not much property damage reported around the county, but a lot of limbs were broken off trees, a large cottonwood tree was blown over at the H. A. Green home in Ashtola, leaving their back door blocked. One resident reported some pea size hail, but as far as it is known, there has been very little crop damage.

It is reported that one man broke his leg, due to the storm. He had been in the cellar and had gone out to look the situation over and fell going back into the cellar.

Storms are something that Donley County citizens don't take lightly. . . when the siren goes off, they take cover.

Sales tax for county cities still down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has sent checks totaling \$52.6 million in local sales tax to 1,039 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said 1987 payments were down 6 percent as compared to payments to date made in June last year. checks represent taxes collected on sales made in April and reported to the Comptroller by May 20.

Donley County cities have received \$41,283.20 total 1987 payment. Total payment for 1986 same period was \$46,378.81 this is a 10.99% decrease in 1987 sales for the county. Clarendon received \$3,893.52 for this period and \$3,872.30 for the same period in 1986. Clarendon sales were up just a few dollars but the total for the year made them down 12.45%.

Hedley reported nothing for this period, but for the year they have received \$2,248.90 this makes them a 11.33% decrease.

Howardwick received \$727.08 this period and 1986 they received \$608.95 which gave them a 6.025% increase.

Armstrong had a 0.56% decrease; Collingsworth a 6.38% decrease; Hall a 23.19% decrease; Carson a

13.72% decrease; Porter 5.36% decrease. Randall was up 6.37% while Hutchinson had a 9.67% decrease.

While quickly checking other counties we noticed that Sadler in Grayson County was up 5134.62% having reported only \$9.88 in 1986.

There were far more counties reporting sales down then there were counties reporting increases statewide.

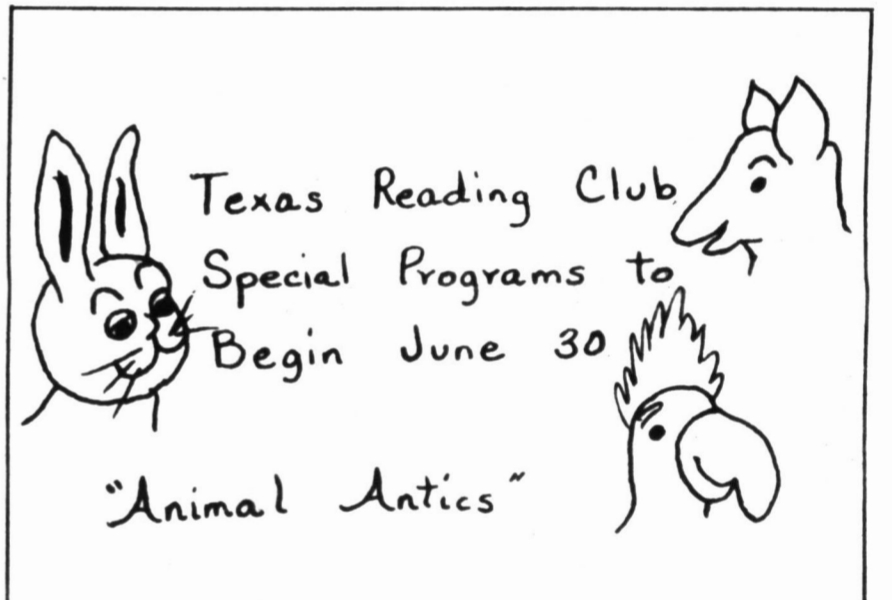
Firebelles to sell ice cream on July 4th

Children with special needs

Infants and small children who cannot use regular safety seats, may find help with adaptations of child safety seats.

For children with spica casts used to correct hip dislocation, the Century 100 and the Strolee 612 can be modified by cutting away the lower sides of the shell to allow the legs to stick out sideways. A pamphlet describing how this can be done can be obtained from the American Academy of Pediatrics, P.O. Box 927, Elk Grove Village, IL 60007.

For premature infants placed in a reclining position in child safety seats, breathing problems may be encountered. Premies with a history of apnea (children who stop breathing for a short period of time), as well as premies without known apnea, were found to have significant decreases in oxygen saturation (did not get enough oxygen) while seated in the child safety seat for about 30 minutes. Also, infants with a history of apnea have more bradycardia events (less than 80 beats per minute for 7-9 seconds). It is recommended that premies be monitored while traveling in a semi-reclining safety seat. Also, parents should be advised of the risks of auto travel, and to travel as little as possible until the baby is at least one or two months old. (Safe Ride News, American Academy of Pediatrics, Winter 1987, page 3.)

Hiccups Treatment

Hiccups are bursts of activity in the diaphragm muscle and other muscles that control inspiration and expiration. Causes of hiccups are numerous and almost everyone experiences them from time to time.

The list of home remedies for hiccups is almost endless. Three favorites involve holding one's breath for as long as possible, taking several small sips of water without taking a

breath, and breathing into a paper bag. Some people believe that "scaring" the hiccup victim relieves hiccups. Research has not proven any of these methods to be superior to another.

In the early 1970s, a researcher determined that 19 out of 20 hiccup sufferers obtained relief by swallowing one teaspoonful of dry, granulated sugar.

Several prescription medicines have been used to end hiccups. A recent report in the *New England Journal of Medicine* describes the treatment of a 17-year-old boy who had experienced hiccups for approximately one year. Although a variety of techniques and medicines had been used, hiccups continued. Giving the boy the antidepressant medicine amitriptyline produced almost instant relief.

Lives saved with safety belts

The first full year of mandatory safety belt use has shown a 7% reduction in front-seat fatalities and a 12% reduction in visible front-seat injuries, according to a final report from the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Although the number of miles driven on Texas roads increased by 6%, and the increase in vehicles on the roads increased the risk of accidents, the reduction can be attributed to four major factors:

- *The Safety Belt Law
- *Enforcement of the Law
- *Increased DWI enforcement and arrests
- *A greater public awareness of the dangers of drinking and driving.

Odometer fraud results in stiffest sentence ever

One of the largest wholesale used car dealerships in the nation and its president received the stiffest federal sentence ever for odometer fraud. The president of McDonald Chevrolet-Oldsmobile in Cornelia, Georgia was sentenced to 11 years in prison and fined \$193,000. The corporation was fined \$158,000 and two other employees were also convicted.

Odometer tampering was made a felony last year by the Truth in Mileage Act of 1986. The Act requires that effective April 20, 1989, odometer readings be disclosed on the titles of cars when they are sold. Car shoppers should try to protect themselves against Odometer fraud by having a reliable mechanic attempt to verify the accuracy of the odometer readings and by contacting previous owners to inquire about the vehicle history.

Consumers wishing to report odometer fraud should call the federal hot-line number, 1-800-424-9393. (NHTSA Newsletter 11-87.)

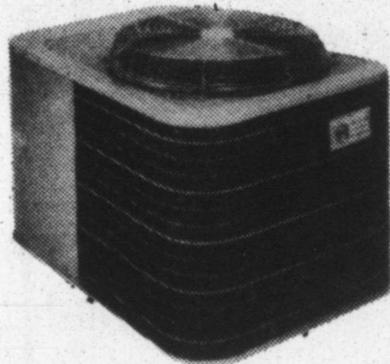

DPS Report

Capt. Bob Russell, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties said, "For the month of May, our troopers investigated 4 fatal accidents, 74 personal injury accidents, and 96 property damage accidents. There were 5 persons killed and 118 persons injured in these accidents."

Sgt. Brad Parker of Tulla stated, "In Donley county, our troopers investigated 0 fatal accidents, 7 personal injury accidents, and 11 property damage accidents in the month of May. 0 persons was killed and 9 persons were injured in these accidents."

21 drinking age has direct effect on reducing alcohol-related accidents

Laws raising the minimum alcohol purchase age to 21 have had "a direct effect on reducing alcohol-related traffic accidents among youths affected by the laws, on average, across the states," says the General Accounting Office (GAO). The Insurance Institute of Highway Safety filed a "friend of the court" brief with the U.S. Supreme Court in support of the national 21 drinking age law. The Institute's brief showed a 13 to 16% decrease in fatal alcohol-related crashes among 18-20 year-olds in states with a 21 purchase age.

Best kind of law

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the Texas Department of Public Safety, have completed production of a new video tape for law enforcement officers. The video production "THE BEST KIND OF LAW" is a nine minute presentation that may be used by police departments at roll call to show police officers the need to have motorists comply with the state's Child Safety Seat law.

The video tape has been approved by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officers Standards and Education (TCLEOSE) for use in law enforcement training academies. It is available on free loan in 1/2" VSH or 3/4" videotapes.

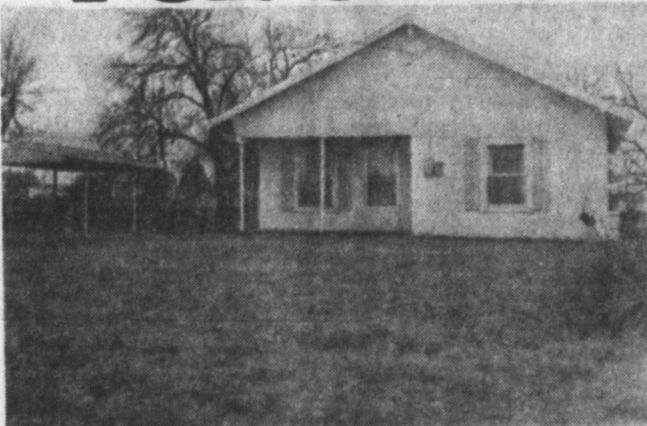

ORDINANCE #269
An Ordinance amending the "taxation" chapter of the code of ordinances of the City of Clarendon, Texas relating to taxation of Telecommunications services; making this ordinance cumulative; providing a severability clause; providing for publication and naming of an effective date.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: THAT the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by the addition of Section 1 thereto which shall read in its entirety as follows:

"Section 1 TAXATION OF TELECOMMUNICATION SERVICES
[a] A tax is hereby authorized on all telecommunications services sold within the City of Clarendon, Texas. For purposes of this section, the sale of telecommunications services is consummated at the location of the telephone or other telecommunications device from which the call or other communication originates. If the point of origin cannot be determined, the sale is consummated at the address to which the call or other communication is billed.

[b] The rate of the tax imposed by this section shall be the same as the rate imposed by the City of Clarendon, Texas, for all other local Sales and Use Taxes as authorized by the legislature of the State of Texas.

[c] The City Secretary shall forward to the Comptroller of the State of Texas by United States Registered Mail a copy of this ordinance along with a copy of the minutes of the City Council's vote and discussion on this ordinance.

[d] This section shall become effective as of October 1, 1987.

SECTION 2: This ordinance shall be and is hereby declared to be cumulative of all other ordinances of the City of Clarendon, Texas, and this ordinance shall not operate to repeal or affect any of such other ordinances except insofar as the provisions thereof might be inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance, in which event such conflicting provisions, if any, in such other ordinance or ordinances are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3: If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held unconstitutional, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance.

SECTION 4: This ordinance is to be liberally construed to achieve its remedial purposes.

SECTION 5: This ordinance shall become effective from and after its

passage as provided by law.

ASCS news

The President has signed the Farm Disaster Assistance Act of 1987. The 1987 Act amended Pub. L. 99-500 which authorized the 1986 Disaster Payments Program. The 1986 Disaster Payments Program, as amended, provides for the following if Congress appropriates the funding and the President approves such authorization.

Farm Disaster Assistance Act of 1987
A. Increase for disaster payments on previously approved disaster applications from 73.9 percent to 100 percent. This payment will be automatic and will require no action by producers.

B. Disaster payments for losses of 1986 upland cotton production because of quality. Producers must submit 1986 cotton production records showing quality, staple length, and micronaire. This production evidence must be submitted on or before June 26, 1987. For below grade cotton, your marketing receipts must be furnished so that the average market price can be

established by this office.
Implementing 0/92 Provision

Because the President has signed the Farm Disaster Assistance Act, deficiency payments will be made for producers of winter wheat on an acreage up to 92 percent of the farm's permitted wheat acreage with no planting requirement.

In other words, if you have less than 50 percent of your maximum permitted planted for wheat (enrolled in the 1987 program or not) and additional conserving uses (CU) is designated and the ACR requirement is met, you may earn deficiency payments on an acreage up to 92 percent of the farm's permitted wheat acreage.

If your farm is not enrolled in the 1987 Wheat Program and have less than 50 percent of the permitted wheat acreage devoted to wheat, you must sign a CCC-477 to participate in the 1987 Wheat Program no later than July 15, 1987.

CU acreage greater than 50 percent of the permitted acreage may be hayed or grazed according to 5-PA, paragraph 22. (at any time).

Please note that CU acreages less than 50 percent of the permitted acreage may not be hayed or grazed after July 15, 1987. Haying or grazing of CU acres before July 15, 1987, does not make the acreage ineligible for designation as CU for deficiency payments.

Members absent were Aldermen James Thomas and Steve Smith.

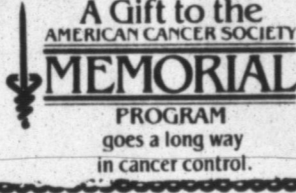
Others present were City Secretary Donna Edwards, and Mr. Chuck Rogers. Minutes of the May 26, 1987 were read and approved.
