Chamberlain elected VP of Panhandle County Judges and Commissioners Assn.

William Chamberlain, Donley County Commissioner was elected vice-president of the Panhandle County Judges and Commissioners Association at their fall meeting, held October 9 at the Hilton Inn in Amarillo.

The Association is composed of the 27 counties in the "Top of Texas" area and has approximately 150 members. Quail Unlimited, a nationwide organization of upland game bird hunters devoted exclusively to improving the species' habitat and population, will hold the first meeting of its Clarendon Texas Chapter on Tuesday, November 3, 1987, starting at 7:30 p.m. in the First Bank and Trust of Clarendon Hospitality Room, Clarendon, TX.

The meeting will include a slide presentation showing what other Quail Unlimited chapters are doing in this area to improve quail habitat through planting and management of game food plots, nesting and brood rearing cover and winter cover. There is no admission charge and all sportsmen and wildlife enthusiasts are encouraged to attend.

Now in its sixth year, Quail Unlimited works with state fish and game agencies, private landowners, and university wildlife research departments to fund projects that benefit quail, pheasant and grouse. In 1986 it invested over \$1.25 million in habitat projects through local chapters such as this one.

Annual membership in the organization is \$15, and brings with it a year-long subscription to "Quail Unlimited Magazine", a bi-monthly publication featuring articles on improving upland game habitat, bird dog care and training, chapter activities, and hunting articles.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, suggest a few safety precautions for motorists and parents that could keep this a safe evening for everyone. Economy still down in County

Donley County economy is still down in comparison with last years. However, this past quarter sales were up from \$5,278.34 last to \$6,231.61 this year. These figures were reported by State Comptroller Bob Bullock who sent checks in October and these checks represent taxes collected on sales made in August and reported to the Comptroller by September 20.

Payments for 1986 to all three cities in the county were \$74,258.51 and in 1987 \$70,341.41. This represents a 5.27 percent decrease in sales for the county.

Armstrong County reports a 4.27 percent increase, while Collingsworth County shows a 5.99 percent decrease and Hall County reports show a 15.04 percent decrease with Memphis showing a 14.85 percent decrease.

Ear Infections in Children

Physicians continue to see an increasing number of children who have ear infections. In fact, it has been reported that one in three children who visit a doctor will be diagnosed as having an ear infection. And most children will have had at least one ear infection by their third birthday.

These infections of the middle ear are termed *otitis media* and, in two out of three cases, are probably due to bacteria that find their way from the throat to the ear or ears via the eustachian tubes. A thick, yellow or white fluid may fill the middle ear and produce pain, fever, and hearing loss. It is not uncommon for the ear drum to rupture. Fluid may be noticed on the child's pillow upon awakening.

A variety of antibacterial agents and antibiotics are prescribed by physicians for ear infections. These include ampicillin, amoxicillin, sulfonamides, and several of the cephalosporin-type antibiotics. Antihistamines and decongestants are sometimes also prescribed for use with bacteria-fighting agents, although some physicians find these to be of limited value. Pain relievers and fever reducers such as acetaminophen are usually recommended.

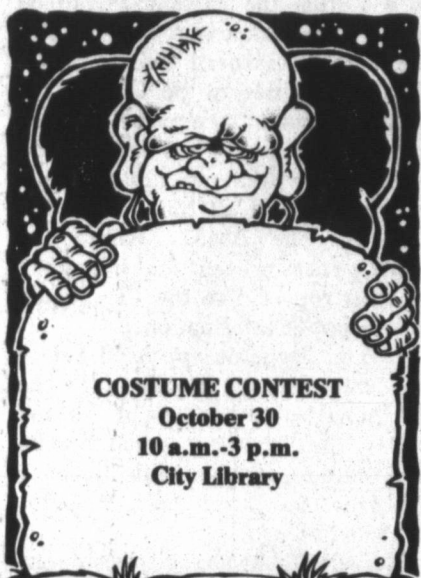

Cancer research project

The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center announced the initiation of a cancer research project in collaboration with Amarillo Cell Culture Company, Inc. Amarillo Cell Culture is funding the \$50,000 project as part of its overall research program on immune stimulation. The company is interested in enhancing the quality of life of cancer patients through use of its patented technology.

Funding by Amarillo Cell Culture will support the data management of clinical trials at the Harrington

Cancer Center. The study uses commercially available recombinant alpha interferon to stimulate appetites and promote weight gain among cancer patients. The research project is directed by Brian Pruitt, M.D., medical oncologist at the Cancer Center and associate professor of internal medicine at the Texas Tech School of Medicine in Amarillo. A total of 56 patients have volunteered to participate in the research study. Preliminary results are expected within one year.

He also asked to be assured that the total receipts reported to the City by the individual motel owners be handled with confidentiality and not become public information other than reporting the total of all Motel Bed Tax receipts. The Board assured the motel owners present that individual receipts reported to the City would not be public information.

Neoma Rippetoe appeared before the Board about a mobile home she has moved onto her lots at 7th and Johns. The City will research the City ordinance regarding mobile homes in this area, and advise Mrs. Rippetoe of their findings.

Delbert Robertson discussed ambulance personnel. He advised that the two people would like to start full-time and asked the City to increase its support to Associated Ambulance by \$400 per month. After further discussion, would be willing to pay the additional amount if they could, but that they did not have the additional funds in the budget, so therefore regretfully could not pay the additional amount.

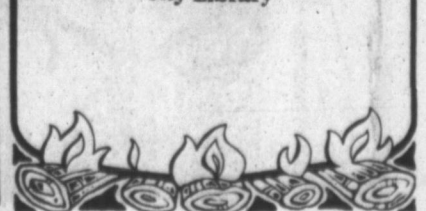



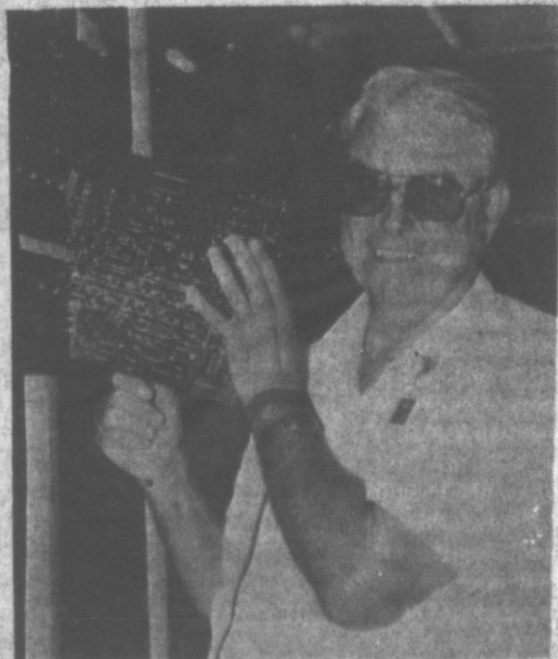
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HAVE IT YOUR WAY

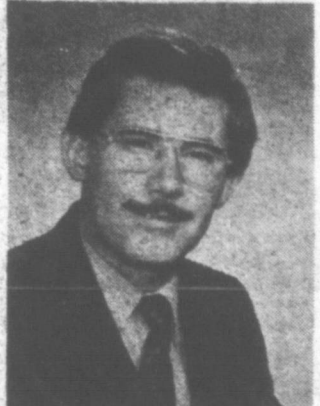

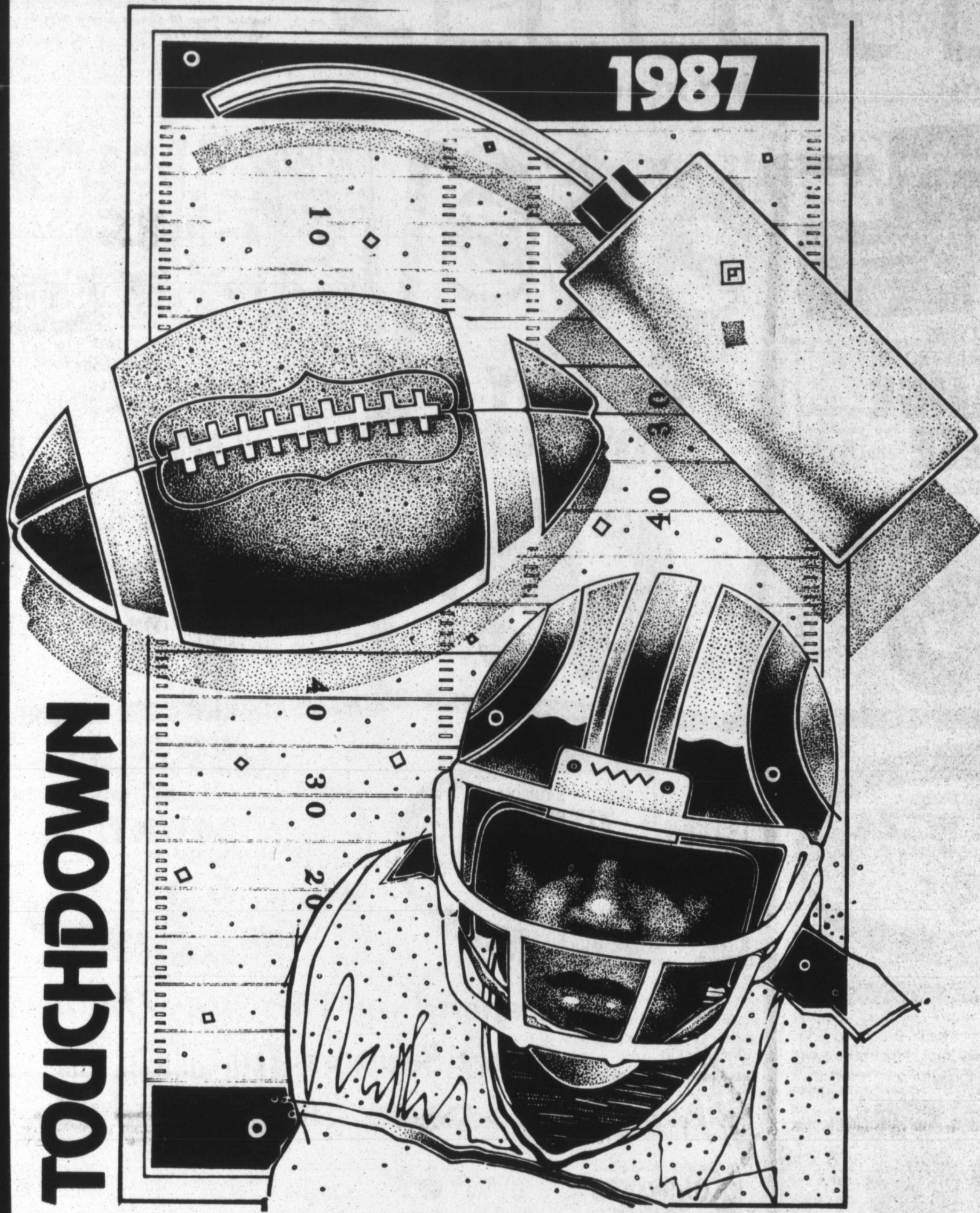

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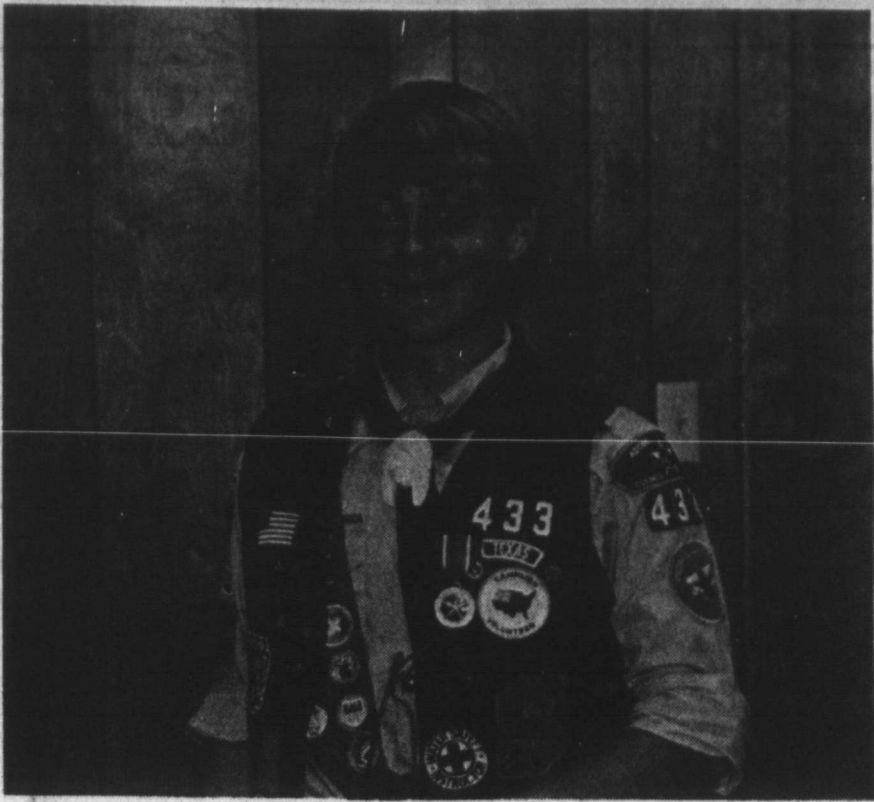

Modest Economy will show modest growth in 1988-89

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday issued a state revenue estimate that reaffirms previous reports from his office that the Texas economy will show modest growth in 1988-89.

The report, provided in accordance with a provision in this year's appropriations bill, also shows that the state could have a 1989 ending balance of nearly \$200 million in the General Revenue Fund.

According to the estimate, most of the gain in the ending balance is the result of \$133 million in vetoes by the Governor.

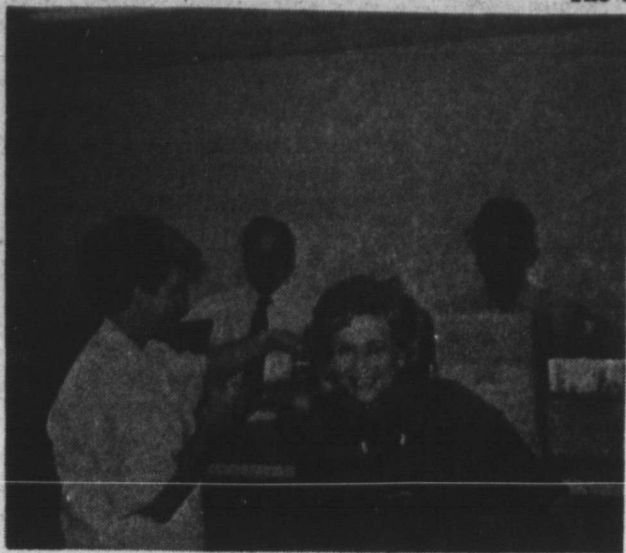
The estimate also notes that the state closed its books for the 1987 fiscal year \$745 million in the red, which is about \$267 million smaller than anticipated last July.

The estimate pointed out that the \$267 was an "artificial improvement" in what was projected to be a billion-dollar deficit because spending was simply postponed until the 1988 fiscal year.

Bullock's estimate showed that he now forecasts the price of a taxable barrel of oil at \$17.40 for 1988 and \$18.00 for 1989, up about \$1.00 a barrel each year.

Bullock attributed the oil price increase to "continued stability" in world oil markets, but cautioned that declining Texas oil production would actually result in 22 percent less tax income from oil.

Improving conditions in the oil business are being offset by a worse than expected slump in real estate and construction, Bullock said.

October is Range Management Month in Texas

October 1987 is designated as Range Management Month by Texas Governor Bill Clements.

Governor Clements signed a proclamation on October 13 noting that "properly managed rangelands protect watersheds, recharge aquifers and reduce sediment, ensuring water quality for both rural and urban users..."

Ron Sosebee, president of the Texas Section of the Society for Range Management, said SRM is extremely pleased with the designation of October as Range Management Month.

"October is the month most range plants produce seed and turn to their beautiful fall colors," Sosebee said. "Rangelands occupy about 100 million acres which is more than half of the state's land area; the wildlife,

recreation, and livestock produced on rangeland is an important part of our economy."

He said proper management of the range resource provides forage and habitat by converting energy from the sun and combining it with water and nutrients from the soil to produce food and fiber.

"Properly managed rangelands will enhance, for future generations, a stable environment," Sosebee said. "It will also yield a stable economic base."

A range management professor with Texas Tech University, Lubbock, Sosebee said the Texas Section of SRM helped promote the ideas of range management month to increase public and producer awareness of the importance of rangelands.

Dondra Holland from Clarendon was selected as a Resident Assistant at West Texas State University for the academic year 1987-88. Dondra will be working in Stafford Hall.

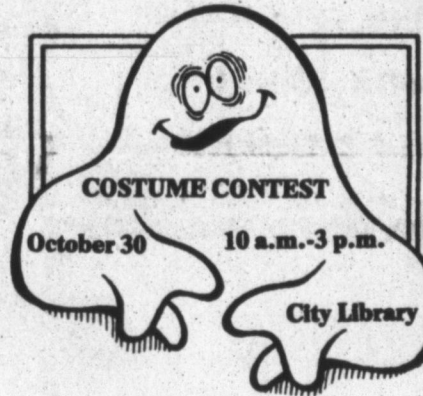
RA applicants undergo a pre-training process and are interviewed and selected by a panel of current hall staff, hall residents, and the director of the hall.

The Resident Assistant accomplishes this objective by providing academic, cultural, and social programs for the residents. They also

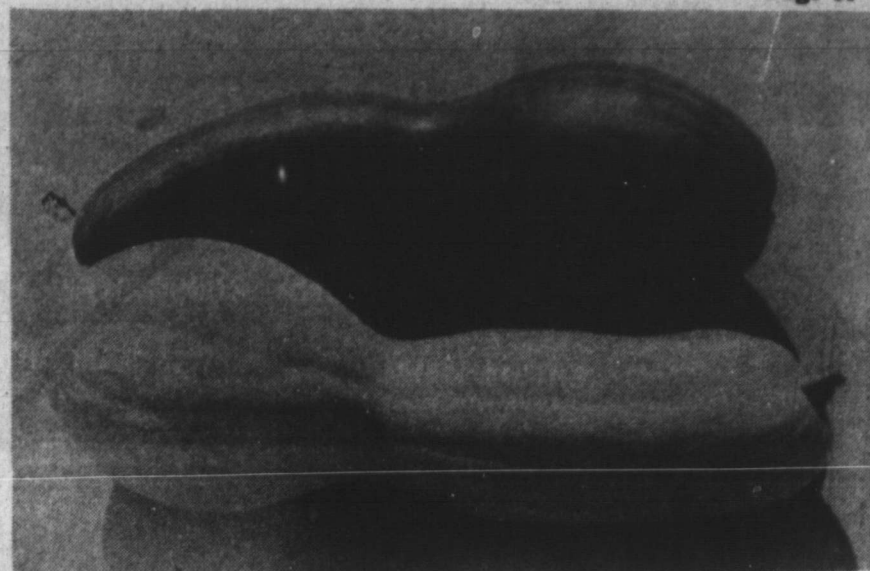
perform various other duties essential to keeping the residence halls running smoothly.

The Tax Practitioner educational program has been highly successful. Last year about 4,900 people participated in this state-wide series.
