Primary election to be held Tuesday

There will be a Republican and Democratic Primary held in Donley County on March 8. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. You may vote in the Republican Primary at two places, in Clarendon at the Golden Acorn and at Hill's Petroleum office in Hedley. There are nine places you may vote in Donley County in the Democratic Primary.

The Democrats will vote Box 1, Precinct 1 Howardwick City Hall; Box 2 Precinct 2 Old Courthouse; Box 3 Precinct 3 Lelia Lake Community Center; Box 4 Precinct 4 Patching Club House; Box 5 Precinct 5 Hedley Lions Club Building; Box 6 Precinct 6 Martin Ashtola Community Building; Box 7 Precinct 7 First Bank and Trust; Box 8 Precinct 8 Jericho Elevator and Box 9 Precinct 9 Skillett-Whitefish at the McClellan Home.

Republican voters will be voting for Presidential nominees as well as United States Senator, United States Representative, District 13, Railroad Commissioner, Railroad Commissioner, Unexpired Term, Chief Justice, Supreme Court, Unexpired Term, Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1, Place 2, Place 3 and Place 4, Unexpired Term, Presiding Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2, State Board of Education Member, District 15, State Representative, District 84, State Senator District 31.

In the local races, the only Republicans running for office will be the County Chairman and two Precinct Chairmen. These are Bill Hill, County Chairman, and Sharon Wheatly, Precinct Chairman, Precinct No. 3 and Patsy Leffew, Precinct No. 1.

There also is a referendum proposition to be voted on, that is "English should be established as the Official Language of the State of Texas and the United States of America."

Volunteer Fire Department controlled burning

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department reports an increasing number of "controlled" burns during the past several days and would like to make Donley County residents aware of some information regarding this practice.

First of all, the fire department cannot and will not give anyone permission to burn within Donley County. Also, they cannot, by law, stand by at any controlled burn and when an alarm is called in, they are required by law to extinguish the blaze and cannot let it burn off.

If local residents decide to have a controlled burn through, they should call in to the sheriff's department dispatcher the location, the proposed time of the burn start, the approximate time it will end, and the name of the person or persons who will report the fire if it gets out of control.

Fire department personnel report the county's fuel load at an all time high. What this means is that there is much more grassland this season and because of the wet summer and fall months, it is much taller than usual and will burn much more easily and quickly and can get out of control much easier. It is also dryer than it has been in a long time.

Before you decide to burn, consider these things. Burning inside the city is illegal. If you set a fire and it gets out of control, you may be legally responsible for property damage to others, injuries to others, and damage to firefighting equipment and injuries encountered by firefighters. Also, your insurance may not cover this loss of others property caused by your burning.

When you burn without reporting it, law enforcement personnel are kept busy checking out reports of smoke which prohibits them from doing their regular jobs. If someone sees smoke and reports it, firefighters are called from their jobs and/or away from their families, they have an increased chance of being involved in an accident responding to the station or the fire, and are often called to the extreme limits of the county on a false alarm when their services might be needed all the way across the county on another legitimate fire where property or lives are really in danger. Also, every time they are called out, they increase the chance of damaging a fire truck due to increased wear and tear thereby eliminating the availability of that truck on a legitimate fire if needed.

Think of it, do you want to be responsible for the loss of lives or property due to your carelessness or for failing to call in a controlled burn?

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department wants to be of assistance when they are legitimately needed. They just do not want to see lives or property lost because of carelessness or to jeopardize these things by responding to false alarms.

To report a fire in Donley County, call the sheriff's department at 874-3533 and the nearest county fire department units will be sent.

Water is the most common substance occurring in the body. It is there to provide a number of important functions which are necessary to our survival. 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Who's your hero?

Every generation as it ages and becomes the "grandparent generation," seems to feel that experience has made it a qualified critic of the present world--of its younger generation, the morals, the values, the activities that the "now" generation lives by. As a grandparent and a senior citizen who was a teenager in the dark ages and who has spent forty years (two generations) in a classroom with teenagers, I feel that the school of life has qualified me to speak my piece.

Some sixty years ago my mother told me repeatedly the story of George Washington, the father of our country, who cut down the cherry tree, but could not tell a lie and so confessed his guilt. When I went to school my teachers told the same story, and furthermore the story was "in the book". Come February the classroom was decorated with red cherries on green branches alternated with hatchets of every color. We knew George Washington was the father of our country and could not tell a lie. When my children went to school they were taught that not only was the cherry tree story a figment of someone's imagination, George himself was a somewhat lurid character who beat his wife--not exactly an ideal example. Of course a couple of centuries ago there was no TV screen to advertise divorces for \$58 that could be charged to Visa, or Martha might have got one.

Abraham Lincoln, even though he was a "yankee" was a paragon of honesty. After working a twelve hour day in the grocery store he walked for miles to return a few cents that he

had over-charged on a box of tea. I believe the epithet "Honest Abe" is still acceptable. He split rails for a living, had no formal education, and yet pulled himself up by his bootstraps to become President. He walked miles to school, to borrow books of law, to do his courting. Now teenagers sometimes miss class because they have misplaced the control for the garage door opener. And it just isn't "in" to walk three blocks to school on a spring day. Now Lincoln did oppose Robert E. Lee, a distinguished southern gentleman, who bravely fought for a lost cause. I don't know of any slanderous tales about these two figures and I hope no one disillusioned me. I really wonder how many teenagers could write three sentences about either of them.

And then there were Florence Nightingale, Jane Adams, Clara Barton, Susan B. Anthony. (There was also Alice Roosevelt Longworth who advocated birth-control--which of course was only whispered and that not in "mixed company". Certainly she was not to be lauded for her stand.)

In my generation families did not move from place to place as the present generation does. We lived in one place; we had roots. We were extended families. My great-grandmother, my four grandparents, my mother and father and my brother are all buried in the same little country cemetery. All four of my grandparents lived in the same community that we lived in. Grandparents lived in the same community that we lived in. Grandparents were to be respected and catered to. Parents were respected too. None of

them were to be talked back to or "sassed". (I wore out six oak dining chairs sitting in them as punishment for having an unbridled tongue.)

I feel the deepest concern for my grandchildren as they grow up in such a troubled chaotic world that is beset with so many anxieties from pot to the threat of nuclear holocaust. I realize that my generation has not produced the role models that my grandchildren and yours need and deserve. Our youngest son aspired to get to be as big as Uncle Trav--(short for Travis because my mother thought Colonel Travis was such an exemplary person that she gave his name to her only son.) Well, he has realized the ambition physically, and I hope at seventy, he will have become as strong morally and spiritually.

As I think of the young people today, I see a great need to role models for them. The media does not encourage greatness. There seems to be no desire to publicize the basic attributes that should belong to

public figures. There are too few dedicated statesmen, and those who at first seem to be dedicated salt-of-the-earth individuals are soon revealed as having condemning flaws of character. Maybe the best and most easily located examples are right here in our own area. I plan in the future from time to time to give a story of local people who have worked to make the world a better place because of their having lived in it.

Nearly 20 million men, age 18 through 25 have registered with Selective Service since registration was reinstated in 1980. These men comprise over 98 percent of those required to register.

Men who have not yet registered should do so at any post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000 up to 5 years in jail or both.

Men, turning 26 in 1988

reach an important milestone

The Selective Service System has announced that men who will reach their 26th birthday in 1988 and who have not registered with Selective Service may forfeit their eligibility for some federal programs.

Men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1981 will be turning 26 this year. The law requires that young men register with Selective Service within 30 days of the day they turn 18. Although tardy registrations are usually accepted, Selective Service does not have the authority to accept registrations after a man reaches age 26. By failing to register before turning 26, a young man may permanently forfeit his eligibility for federal student aid, job training and most federal employment. Likewise, some states require registration for state student aid, entrance to a state supported college or university, state employment and permission to practice law.

Acid-washed Jeans less durable

If you bought this season's fashionable "acid-washed" or "frosted" denim clothing, don't expect it to last as long as the other denim clothes in your wardrobe.

According to Dr. Ann Beard, a clothing and textiles specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service, white or acid-washed jeans are washed with volcanic rock that may have been pickled in hydrochloric acid.

This harsh treatment bleaches the dye to make the surface fibers white, however, it also may reduce the strength and durability of the denim fabric by as much as 25 to 30 percent, she explains.

If the acid treatment comes after the garment is sewn, it may also have the effect of weakening the seams so they split open easily, said Beard.

The specialist notes that acid-washed denim clothing is typically higher priced than regular denim, but consumers should understand they're paying extra for the fashion look and not durability.

City Minutes

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met on February 23, 1988 in the Board Room City Hall at 7:00 p.m.

Members present were Mayor David Davidson, Aldermen James Thomas, Steve Smith, Bubba Newhouse, Benny Osburn and Gene White. No members were absent. Others present were City Secretary Donna Edwards, Sue Howard, Gordon Maddox, Everett Anglin, Duane Garman, Clifford Alexander, and Roger Finch.

Minutes of the February 9, 1988 meeting were read and approved.

Clifford Alexander appeared before the Board to discuss the automobile impound he is establishing at Parks and Browning Streets. He explained that he would have a few cars on hand at a time that he would impound for the County and that he would be putting a fence around the site. As this would not be a wrecking yard, the impound yard providing that the necessary building permit and electrical inspection permit are obtained was permitted.

A discussion followed regarding the petition calling for a City Manager election started by Mayor Davidson. Board members White, Osburn, and Thomas expressed displeasure that the Board had not been informed of the petition. Gordon Maddox, CPA, explained the budget process connected to incurring an unbudgeted expense and its potential City liability. Mayor Davidson expressed his views on why he thought a City Manager would be beneficial to the City. It was decided that if enough signatures were secured to call for an election, the public would need to be informed of the pros and cons of the issue prior to the election.

Gordon Maddox, CPA, explained that the City audit has been completed, but was not typed up yet; therefore, he will review the audit with the Board at the March 8, 1988, meeting.

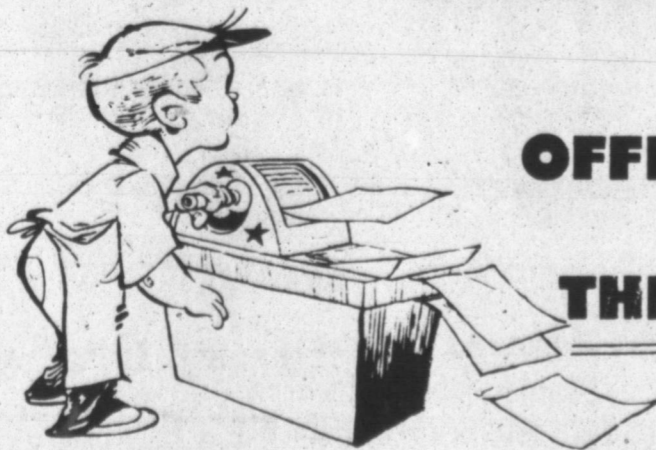

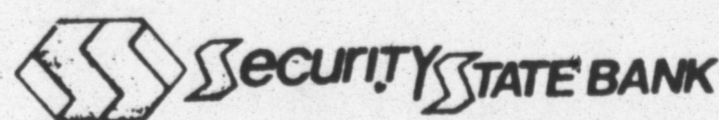
