Candidates file for local elections

Names of candidates filing for positions on the Clarendon, Hedley and Howardwick City Councils, the Hedley and Clarendon ISD, Clarendon College and Donley County Hospital elections to be held May 7th were announced after deadlines for filing passed at 5 p.m. Wednesday, March 22.

Eight men have filed for the three places open on the Clarendon Board of Aldermen: Bubba Newhouse, B.B. "Rabbit" Osburn, Paul Bivens, Lynn Floyd, Gene White, Bobbie K. Kidd, Larry Taylor and James Kuhn.

On the City of Howardwick, three places will be vied for by C.I. Pettit, Charles Boren, Huell Bingham, Clayton Srygley and Robert Hall.

The City of Hedley has the incumbent Jon Leggitt running for mayor and three places on the council. Filing were Merrell Whitaker, Jim Roberts and Henry Stephens.

On the hospital board places 4, 5, and 6 and 7 will be up for election. Running for these places are: Place 4 - Johnny Leathers; Place 5 - Charles E. Rogers and Wanda Dromgoole; Place 6 - Connie Pitts, B.B. "Rabbit" Osburn and C.C. Ayers; Place 7 - there are Hazel Phillips, Eureka Mays, John Murphy and Jimmie D. Cockerham.

For the two places on the Clarendon ISD board there will be six candidates they are: Susie Shields, Jim Shadle, Stanley Altman, Jim Lampier, Jerry Gage and Ted Shaller.

There are three places on the Hedley ISD Board of Trustees and only three people signed up - they were Cary Don Neeley, G.L. Wilkinson and Randy Shaw.

EMS women honored during Womens History Month

During March females in all walks of life were honored as part of Women's History Month. Emergency medical services is one field where women have played a key role in the early development of the profession-as field medics, as trainers, and as administrators.

Gene Weatherall, Chief of Texas Department of Health's Bureau of Emergency Management, remembers the early years of EMS: "Twenty years ago when EMS was just becoming a profession on its own by breaking away from funeral homes, women were a very important part of its development because so many organizations depended on volunteers and because it is a medical field. Women are a vital part of the modern EMS profession." Today nearly half of the 38,000 certified emergency care personnel in Texas are women.

There are remarkable women involved in Texas EMS. Faye Rainey-Thomas ran a volunteer organization in the Hill Country's Utopia for years before she took over the paid service in Corsicana in east Texas. Today she is also chair of the statewide Texas EMS Advisory Council. Babe Aycock and Emergency Medical Technician with Special Skills and the Mayor of Mart, a rural community in north central Texas, leads that community's cadre of 30 some volunteers. In recent high-angle rescue training, all five of the Mart participants were women. Lubbock's Bonnie Jackson has trained hundreds of West Texas EMT's and paramedics in the years she has been teaching health professions for Texas Tech University. Jackson was honored by the Texas Department of Health this year during EMS Week as Texas' Outstanding EMS Educator. A typical female crew is the city of Austin EMS crew of Emergency Medical Technicians Patrice O'Neal and Marjorie Leichsenring. O'Neal and Leichsenring are remarkable not because

they are known in state EMS circles, but because what they do as women in EMS is what every other woman and man in Texas EMS does - save lives every time they go to work.

Clarendon EMS has 3 employees and 15 volunteers and two of the employees and two of the volunteers are women. Hedley also has 3 women volunteers who work closely with the Clarendon EMS system. These women do the same jobs as the men within the EMS system. These women are, Becky Lane, Paramedic, JoDee Mincey, Paramedic, both of whom are full time employees with Clarendon EMS. Connie McAnear, EMT and Tammy Taylor, ECA are the Clarendon EMS volunteers. In Hedley, the volunteers are Tangelia Harbin, EMT, Nina Riddlepurger, EMT, and LaMoss Springer, EMT-Special Skills.

All of the women EMS personnel are to be commended on the fine job they do and for the lives they save and the patients whose needs they serve.

A certified private applicator can use or supervise the use of any pesticide that is classified for restricted use for producing any agricultural commodity on property owned or rented by him or his employer.

This may be a producers last opportunity to obtain this certification free of charge as the Texas Department of Agriculture announced recently that they anticipated a fee would be charged in the future.

Postage goes up

Today Postmaster McCombs announced that a decision has been reached by the Board of Governors concerning the proposed increase in postage rates.

Effective April 3, 1988, the new rate for first class postage will be 25 cents. This is the first increase in postage in three years. Although no one welcomes an increase in postage, it should be placed in perspective. For example, in 1932 a first class postage stamp cost 3 cents. With adjustments for inflation, that same stamp would cost 25.5 cents.

The new "E" stamp, which will cost 25 cents, will go on sale March 23. The Post Office will also have an ample supply of 3 cent stamps and other postage to meet your mailing needs.

Cough Suppressants

The so-called "cough reflex" is a protective mechanism that the body uses to eliminate mucus and other secretion from the lungs. If this reflex did not exist, it would be possible literally to drown in one's own lung secretions.

Coughing is considered, by many, to be useful in certain lung conditions such as cystic fibrosis, chronic bronchitis, and asthma. Coughing can, however, be dangerous following certain surgical procedures or in situations where blood vessels would be damaged if the coughing persisted.

Mild coughing may be controlled by increasing one's fluid intake and by humidifying indoor air. Cough drops or hard candy may suppress the cough by coating and soothing the irritated throat. Warm salt solution gargles may be helpful also.

If coughing persists, nonprescription medicines containing dextromethorphan or diphenhydramine may be helpful. More severe coughs may require a visit to a physician and a prescription for one of the narcotic-type cough suppressants.

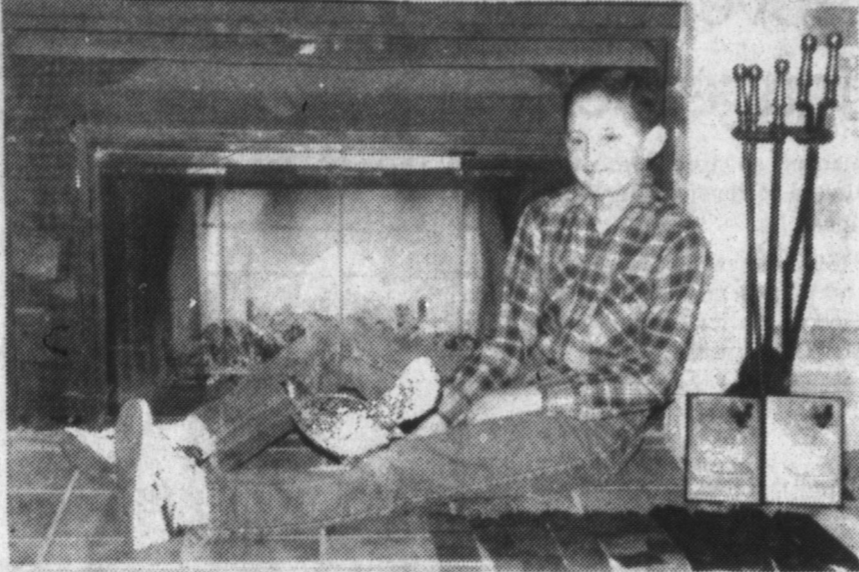

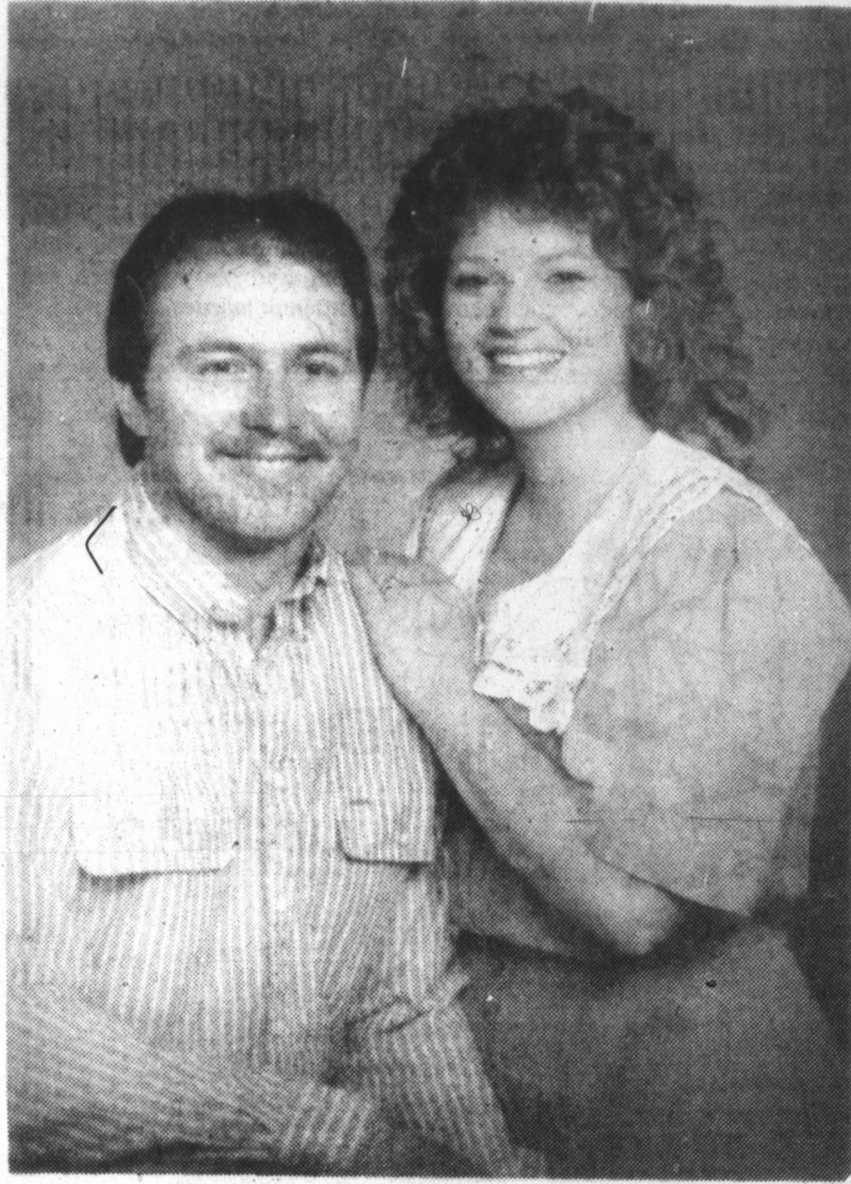

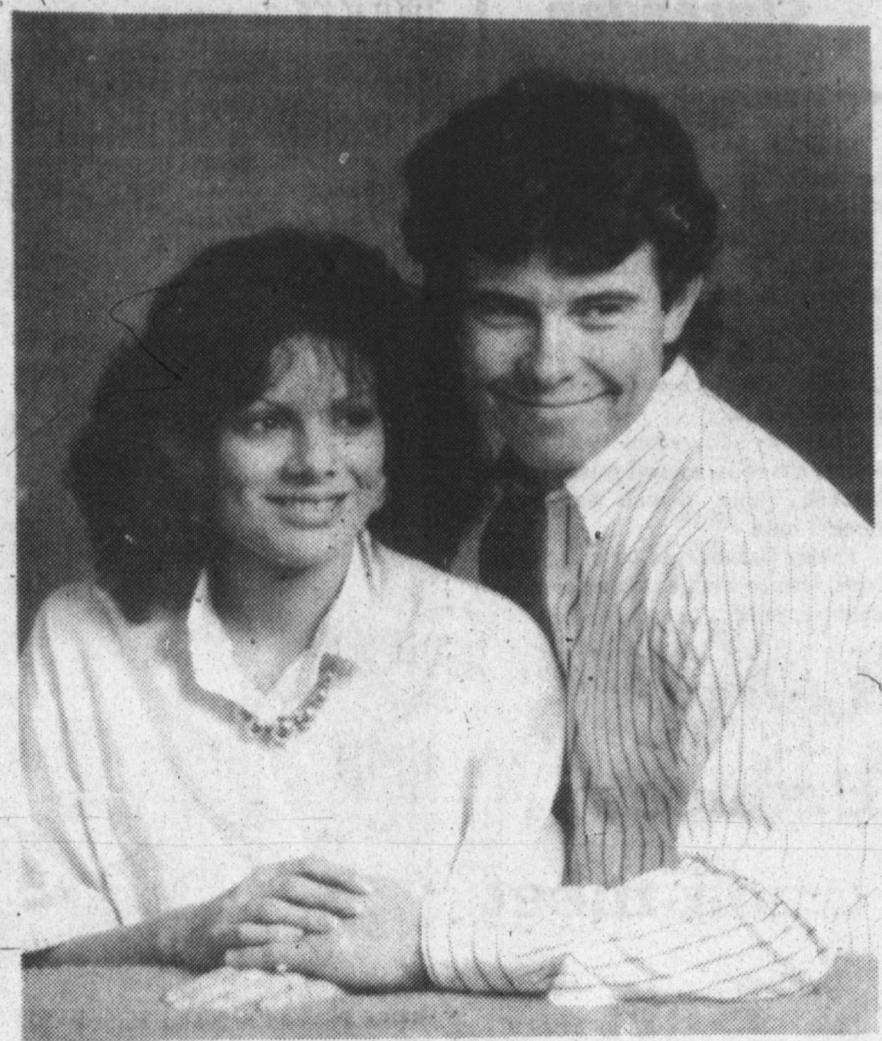

Sexual assault awareness

Q: What can be done to reduce the chances of being sexually assaulted?

A: These simple precautions can significantly reduce the risk of being assaulted:

- *Keep your doors and windows locked both while you are home or away. Over 50% of assaults occur in the victim's home and most could have been avoided by simply locking their doors and windows.

- *Always keep your car doors locked and check your back seats before entering your car. It is also advisable to keep your car doors locked while driving. Twenty percent of all rapes occur in autos.

- *Screen all service and sales workers. This is a common ploy to gain access into your home. Rapists will even wear uniforms to gain their victim's confidence.

- *Be prepared when in transition from your car to public buildings, especially at night. Parking lots are particularly hazardous. If possible walk with someone. If not, have your keys in your hand, walk briskly and with a purpose, and remain alert to your surroundings. Christmas shoppers are often targets due to later shopping hours, more activity, and less attention to surroundings.

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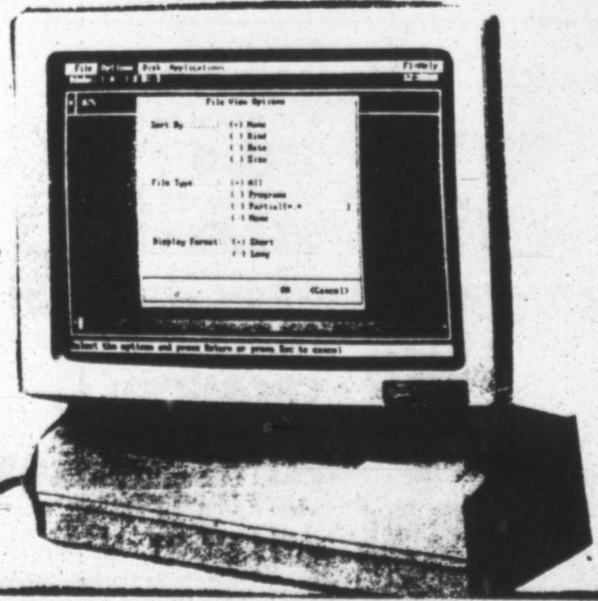

Among the Amarillo College Theater students who traveled to Lubbock, February 23-28 for the Regional American College Theater Festival was Carl Cox. Cox a former resident of Hedley competed in the Irene Ryan Scholarship Auditions and performed in AC's student written on act play. Students from Ark., La., Okla., N.M. and Tex. were selected to compete for the scholarship. Carl was one of 12 finalists out of 130. Cox is the first AC student to continue to finals in Irene Ryan Competition. If he had been selected Cox would have traveled to Washing-

Clarendon Independent School Board meets the second Thursday of each month at the High School Administration Building.

Clarendon College Board of Regents meets the second Tuesday of each month at the College Administration Office.

The Board of Alderman for the City of Clarendon meets the second and fourth Tuesday of each month at the City Hall.

The Donley County Commissioners Court meets every second Monday in the Commissioners Court room in the new courthouse annex.

The Donley County Hospital Board meets the second Tuesday of each month.

Howardwick City Council meets on the second Saturday of each month at the Howardwick City Hall.

Hedley City Council meets on the first Thursday of each month at the Hedley City hall.

Hedley Independent School Board meets the third Monday of each month at the Hedley School.

The times of these meetings vary from summer to winter months. If you are interested in attending any of these meetings, you should call and verify the time. These meetings are open meetings, anyone can attend to listen. If you want to speak at any of these board meetings you should call at least a week before they meet, so you may be placed on the agenda.

There are times however when a board goes into an executive session and you may be asked to leave.

Most information collected, assembled or maintained by these boards is public information and available to the public during normal business hours. However there are several exceptions where information is not public information.

Sec. 2 (a) of the Open Meetings Act, as amended by Acts 1987, 70th Texas Legislature reads: Except as otherwise provided in this Act or specifically permitted in the Constitution, every regular, special, or called meeting or session of every governmental body shall be open to

the public; and no closed or executive meetings or session of any governmental body for any of the purposes for which closed or executive meetings or sessions are hereinafter authorized shall be held unless a quorum of the governmental body has first been convened in open meeting or session for which notice has been given as hereinafter provided and during which open meeting or session will be held and identified the section or sections under this Act authorizing the holding of such closed or executive session.

Sec. 2 (g) reads: Nothing in this Act shall be construed to require governmental bodies to hold meetings open to the public in cases involving the appointment, employment, evaluation, reassignment, duties, discipline or dismissal of a public officer or employee or to hear complaints or charges against such officer or employee, unless such officer or employee requests a public hearing.

Sec. 2 (i) reads: All or any part of the proceedings in any public meeting or any governmental body as defined hereinabove may be recorded by any person in attendance by means of a tape recorder, video

camera, or any other means of sonic or visual reproduction. The governmental body may adopt reasonable rules to maintain order at the meeting place. These rules may include, but shall not be limited to, a determination of the location of such equipment and the manner in which the recording is conducted; provided, however, that the rules do not have

the effect of preventing or unreasonably impairing camera coverage or tape recording.
