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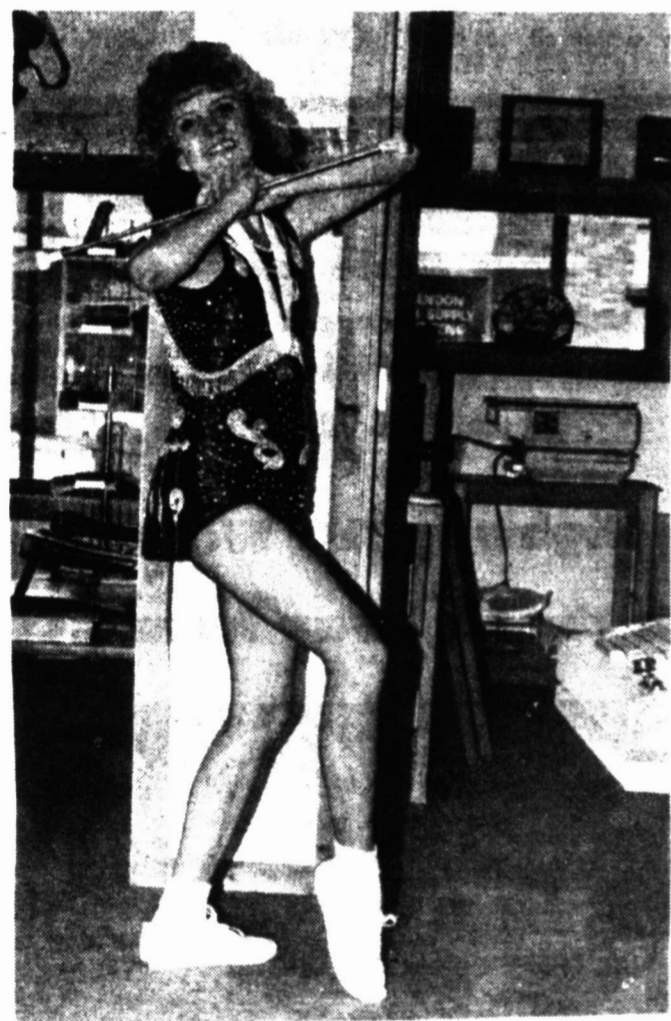

TWANNA GARLAND received first place gold medal at UIL state competition in Austin on May 31.

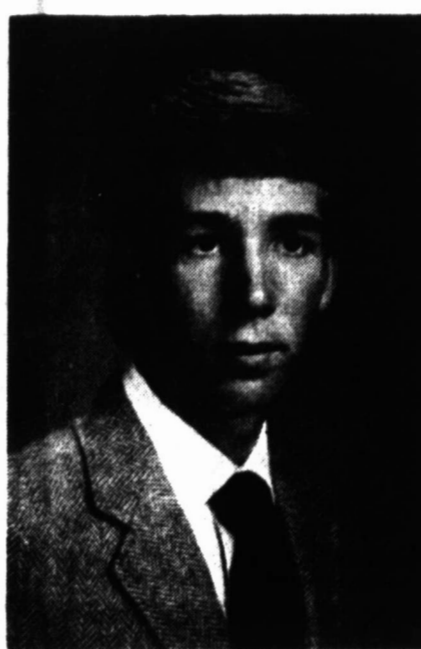

## Todd Roberson killed in car-train accident

Donley County recorded its first fatality of 1986 when 19-year-old Stacy Todd Roberson, died of injuries he received after the grain truck he was driving was hit by an oncoming train as he was crossing the railroad tracks west of town. Roberson was hauling wheat and was on his way to the elevator in Clarendon with his third load of the day. Highway Patrolman Jerry Morris stated, "Todd was apparently blinded as he turned into the sun causing him not to see the Burlington Northern train. There is no evidence of any alcohol involved." This is the first accident fatality since mid-April 1985.

Todd was a life long resident of Donley County. He graduated from Clarendon High School in 1985 and attended Clarendon College.

He is survived by his parents Mr. and Mrs. Pat Roberson; sister Lori Roberson, paternal grandmother, Mrs. Joy Roberson of Clarendon and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Ruby Hill of Throckmorton. Funeral services were held Tuesday in the First Baptist Church. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery.

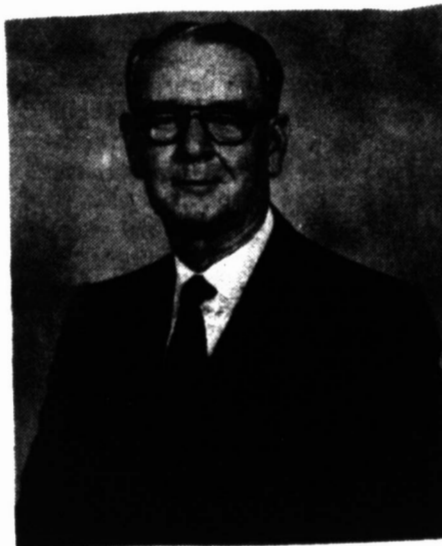
Refreshments will be natural goodies, stressing good nutrition and God's gifts to us.

## Funeral services for Todd Roberson held Tuesday

Funeral services for Stacy Todd Roberson, age 19, were held at 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 10, 1986 in the First Baptist Church of Clarendon with Rev. Paul Heil, Pastor, officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with arrangements under the direction of Roberson Funeral Directors.

Todd died at 9:48 p.m. on Saturday, June 7, 1986 at Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center from injuries suffered in an accident which occurred at 8:00 p.m. He was the lone occupant of a bobtail truck loaded with wheat and was southbound on a county road approximately 5 miles west of Clarendon when the truck was struck by an eastbound train at the crossing. He was rushed to Amarillo by Clarendon EMS Paramedics and Emergency Medical Technicians where he died 22 minutes after arrival. He was born June 15, 1966 in Groom, Texas and had been a lifetime resident of

Clarendon. He attended Clarendon Schools and graduated from Clarendon High School in 1985. He had attended Clarendon College. He worked for approximately 5 months at the Hedley Feedlot and at the time of his death was working as a farm laborer. He was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Pat Roberson of Clarendon; one sister, Lori Roberson of the home; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Ruby Hill of Throckmorton; and his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Joy Roberson of Clarendon.

**Registrations being taken for Girl Scout Camp**

Registrations are still being accepted for Quivira Girl Scout Resident Camp to be held at Camp Cibola near Clarendon. The camps are scheduled for July 13-19 and July 20-26. Program for the first week will center around Texas heritage. Activities will include a Mardi Gras, Mexican pinata party, a rodeo with stick horses, a chili cook-off, a re-enacted Civic War with water balloons, includes swimming -- both lessons and open swim, archery, crafts, hiking and other outdoor adventures.

The theme for the second week of camp will be Camp Cibola Heritage. Scheduled activities will include a carnival, a pie throwing contest, and many other activities which have been popular with girls during Cibola's 15-year history. The usual activities associated with camp including swimming, crafts, hiking and archery will also be available.

The cost of the camp will be \$75 a week. Non-registered girls and out-of-council Girl Scouts will pay \$85. Two week campers will pay \$140 and \$150. A \$10 trading post fee includes snacks and other goodies during the week.

Families with more than one girl wanting to attend camp can take advantage of a "sister plan" which allows the second girl in the family to attend camp for a reduced fee.

The youngest girls at camp live in a cabin unit. Girls in the Junior Girl ages live in covered wagon tents and

the oldest girls live in teepee tents. There is also a wilderness unit for girls who want to "rough it". Their unit will do more cook-outs and outdoor living.

Most of the meals are served in a dining hall, but girls may elect to do some cooking out. Swimming is provided in a large outdoor pool and for those who progress to canoeing, there are lakes near-by.

**Don't Mess With Texas**

The state's hard-hitting new anti-litter slogan is gaining popularity, even among tourists, according to Texas experts on tourism.

"Don't Mess with Texas" is a different approach to getting people to stop littering, and it's gotten a lot of publicity in recent weeks. Some Texans were fearful that visitors to the Lone Star State would think the welcome mat had been pulled in. Not to worry.

"We've reached the conclusion that most tourists think it's clever," said Tom Taylor, director of the Travel and Information Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. Taylor's division is responsible for the 12 Texas tourist bureaus throughout the state. Each year, some 3.2 million visitors pass through the tourist bureaus.

"We've talked with our travel counselors, and they tell us that out-of-staters appreciate the campaign. They've noticed the trash along the roads, and they're glad to see we're finally getting serious about the problem," said Taylor.

Larry Todd, executive director of the Texas Tourist Development Agency, agrees with Taylor. "People I've talked to from other states really like the 'Don't Mess with Texas' approach. They feel like only Texans can get away with such a bold, brash approach because it fits our image. We're known throughout the world as a friendly bunch that's proud of our heritage and protective of our state."

During the Sesquicentennial year, Texas is expecting to attract 20 percent more tourists than last year. Tourism is one of the largest income producing industries in the state.

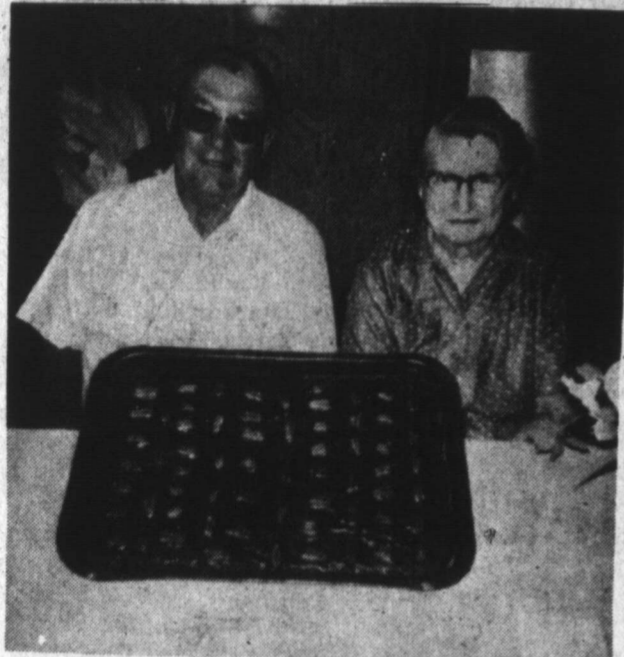

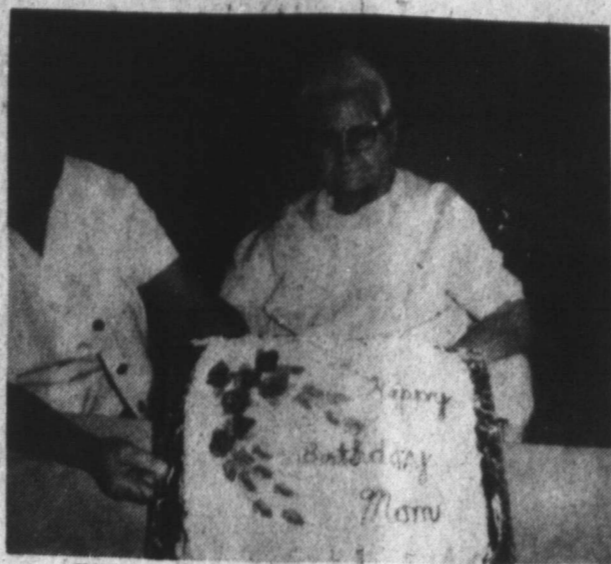

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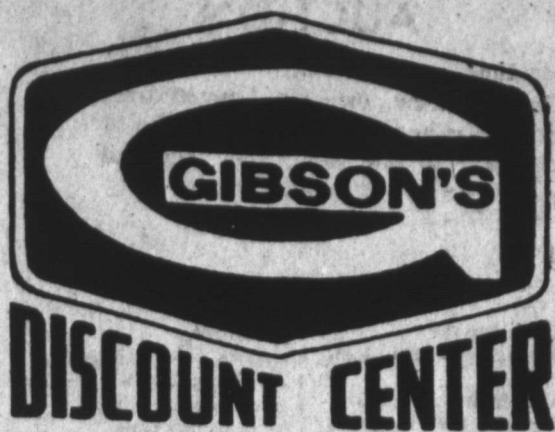

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### ANTACIDS FOR CALCIUM?

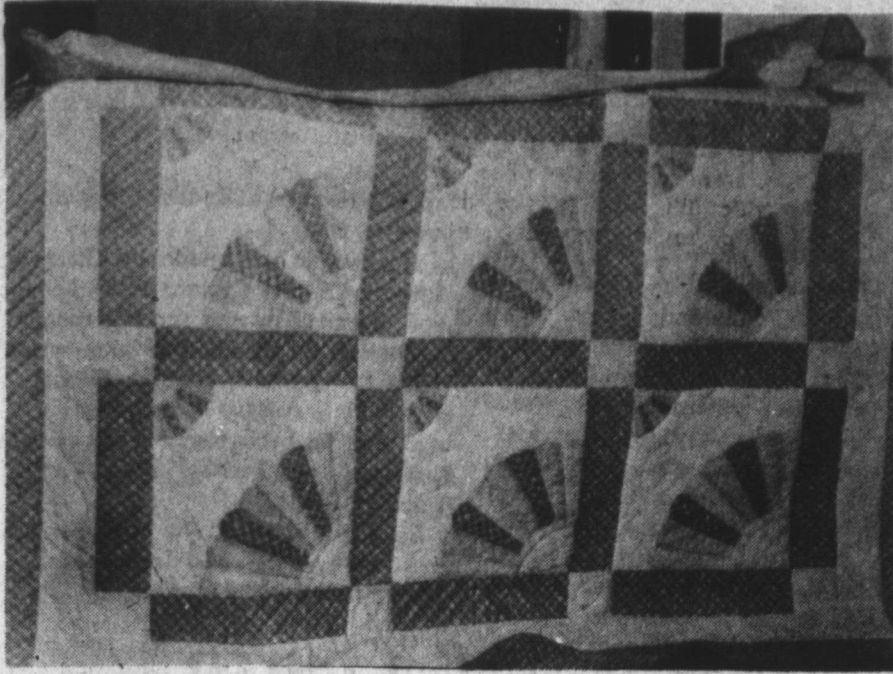
Most women now know that one of the three ways to help prevent osteoporosis is by making sure there is sufficient calcium in the diet - 1,000 mg. of elemental calcium per day before menopause and 1,500 mg after menopause. The other two approaches that complement calcium are obtaining regular exercise throughout life and, for some women, taking estrogen supplements after menopause.

Recent advertisements for at least one antacid tablet suggest that the product be used because it is a source of calcium. An antacid tablet that contains only calcium carbonate would be an acceptable, although expensive, calcium supplement for long-term use.

But before taking antacid tablets instead of traditional calcium supplements, consider the following: [1] Some antacids contain no calcium and, therefore, are worthless as calcium supplements. [2] Antacids containing calcium carbonate plus other antacids (such as aluminum and magnesium salts) may stimulate stomach acid after long-term use and could cause chronic upset stomach (gastritis). [3] Antacids containing aluminum salts may be constipating and could actually drive calcium out of the body by increasing its excretion.
