Sheriff says there has been major breakthrough in Haar case

Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson announced there has been a major breakthrough, and that an arrest is imminent in the death of Margaret Haar, age 24, who was found strangled in her home June 27. Thompson stated that they have a suspect, which can be placed at the scene at the time of Ms. Haar's death; they have a set of latent prints, and a psychological profile on the suspect.

The reason for committing the crime, and many other things," stated Thompson.

The Texas Rangers, Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Amarillo Police Department have been helping the Donley County Sheriff's office with their investigation.

"We feel that the victim knew her assailant," stated Sheriff Thompson, "and we intend to file capital murder charges as soon as the suspect has been apprehended," he continued.

Texas Farm Bureau calls for spending cuts

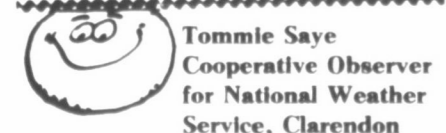
The Texas Farm Bureau agrees with Governor Mark White's call for spending cuts, but differs on how to do it, according to S.M. True, president of the state's largest farm organization.

"We agree with Governor White that expenditures should be cut and applaud his insistence on efficiency in all state agencies," the Plainview cotton and grain farmer said following the Governor's message Wednesday to the special called session of the Legislature.

"We disagree with the Governor that there are some programs that shouldn't be cut," True said. "If we are serious about balancing the budget, spending reductions should be administered equally across the board, and I emphasize 'equally.'"

Meeting held to see if enough interest in community foundation

On Thursday, August 7th, a meeting was held at the Lions Club to determine if there was enough interest to establish a community foundation. The program was co-sponsored by the D.C.S.C. and the Chamber of Commerce. Marcia Shieldknight and Nona Johnson of Shieldknight, Wilson, Stopper, Wood and Assoc., Inc. conducted the informative meeting on charitable giving.

Using a community foundation makes it possible to help the home city of the foundation. It is possible for foundations to be created by communities with contributions coming from many donors rather than from a single individual or family. Community foundations basically are created with two purposes in mind, 1) to encourage local citizens to create endowment funds within the community for the express purpose of serving local community needs in the future; and 2) to provide a vehicle for the community to address community needs through a grant process administered by local community leadership.

America's heritage was built on citizens who became concerned about solving community problems. For the past few years loss of federal funds has caused hundreds of charitable organizations either to curtail services to their communities or look to other sources for funds.

Insect infestations found in cotton

Donley County Farmers should be checking their fields for insect infestations according to County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

Bollworm and Aphid infestations are being found in some cotton fields. Fields need to be checked frequently to detect bollworms while they are very small and less than five days old, for this is the most effective time to control them.

Greenbug infestations are being found in a few irrigated fields of grain sorghum. Guidelines for determining the need for an insecticide application are: 1 - Six inches to boot stage - before any entire leaves are killed 2 - boot to heading stages-before one functional leaf is killed; 3 - heading to hard-dough stages - when greenbug numbers are sufficient to kill two or more-normal sized leaves.

Day Care

Pre-school classes are scheduled to begin at Adams Day Care Center. There will be two different class schedules to chose from. The first schedule will be Tuesday, Thursday classes from 9:00 to 11:15 and the tuition fee will be \$20.00 monthly.

The second class schedule will be Monday, Wednesday, Friday pre-school classes from 9:00 to 11:15 and the tuition fee will be \$30.00 monthly.

Ages for pre-school will be 3 and 4 year olds and any children who will be 5 but will not start kindergarten this fall.

Class curriculum will include science, colors, ABC's, numbers, arts and crafts and other enriching activities.

A snack will be served at 9:30 a.m. each morning.

Any children 3, 4, 5 year old who are already enrolled regular, full-time care at the center will be included in the pre-school program at no additional charge.

Other activities for full-time day care will include gymnastics, puzzles, music, free play and outside play when weather permits.

The day care center has purchased an eleven passenger van and will be able to provide transportation to and from Clarendon elementary school.

The center opens at 6:30 a.m. and will be providing early morning care

and transportation to school for \$15.00 weekly.

There will also be transportation from school at 2:45 and again at 3:30 and afternoon care for \$15.00 weekly.

If you are interested in early morning care, afternoon care and round trip transportation to and from school for \$20.00 weekly.

There will be 10 spaces available for morning transportation and 10 spaces available at each afternoon pick-up.

Since space for school-age children is limited you can enroll your child anytime in order to reserve your child's place.

There will be an afternoon snack and planned activities for all school-age children in care.

We will also be available to care for school-age children on school holidays. There will be an additional charge of \$4.50 a day anytime your school-age child is in care all day.

Rates for children 18 months through 5 years who are in care at the center full time will be \$37.50 a week.

Family discounts are available if there are 2 or more children from the same family enrolled at the center.

Drop-ins are welcome at the center anytime from 7:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Rates for drop-ins are \$1.00 an hour. Family rates are available for 2 or more children in the same family.

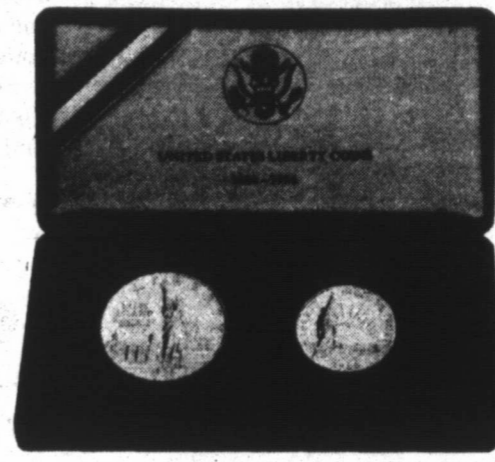

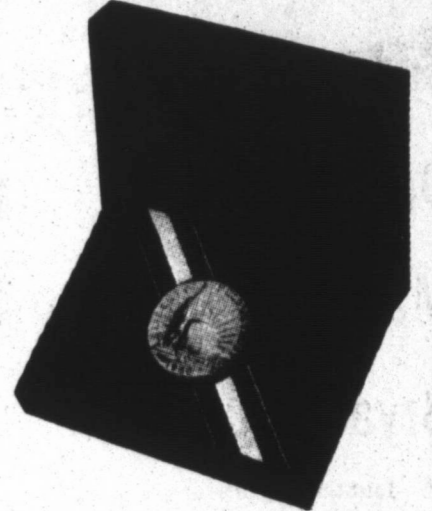

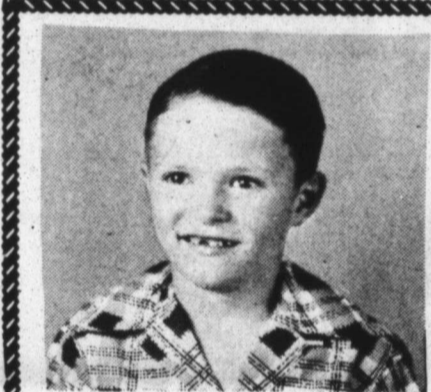

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SINUS HEADACHE RELIEF

The most common form of pain reported to physicians is headache. And two of the most common types of headaches are caused by either muscle tension or sinus problems. Muscle tension headache may feel as if a tight band is being constricted about the head at the forehead. Sinus headache is characterized by pain in the forehead, around the eyes, or behind the eyes - area near the sinuses. Sinus headaches tend to linger for longer periods of time than do muscle tension headaches.

Both headache types can often be cared for with nonprescription medicines. Muscle

tension headaches often respond to rest, neck massage, warm baths, and pain relievers such as aspirin or acetaminophen.

Sinus headaches may respond to warm, moist heat placed over the sinus areas. Although a dampened towel may be used, there are special heating pads that have been developed for this purpose. Medicines that may be helpful include decongestants and antihistamines as well as nonprescription pain relievers. Sinus headaches are often associated with allergy, and, for this reason, antihistamines may be of special value in those individuals who have allergic symptoms.

City Minutes

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular session on July 22, 1986, in the board room, City Hall at 7:00 p.m.

Members present were Mayor James L. Kuhn, Aldermen B.L. Graham, Lloyd McCord, Steve Smith and Gene White. Alderman James Sharrar was absent. Also present was City Secretary Donna Edwards.

*Minutes of the July 8, 1986 meeting were read and approved.

Bids for the Cat dozer were to be opened at this time, however, no bids were received so the next agenda item was presented.

*Passed a resolution to the Texas Legislature regarding the City's opposition to the possible diversion to other uses of State highway funding. The resolution is as follows:

RESOLUTION

Whereas, the Texas Legislature acted in a Special Session in the summer of 1984 to address a crisis caused by the deterioration of the 72,000 mile state highway system; and

Whereas, years of neglect resulted in Texas having more obsolete and substandard roads and bridges than any other state; and

Whereas, lack of state highway funding made it impossible for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to adequately maintain and expand roads to serve increasing numbers of vehicles; and

Whereas, the state's deteriorating highway network threatened the safety, economic health, and quality of life of every Texas; and

Whereas, the Texas Legislature acted with courage and wisdom to address the highway funding crisis by increasing fees and taxes paid by Texas highway users; and

Whereas, Texas highway users supported these increases in fees and taxes with the understanding that revenues would be used to maintain and improve their roads; and

Whereas, the diversion of revenues from fees and taxes paid by highway users from the State Highway Fund to general revenues is a breach of faith; and

Whereas, Texas voters have consistently supported the concept that those who use the highways should pay for them;

Now therefore be it resolved that we hereby ask the members of the Texas Senate and Texas House of Representatives to honor the com-

mitment made in the 1984 Special Session of the Legislature to repair and improve the state's highways. Essential highway improvement funds must not be diverted to other uses. Projects to prevent traffic accidents, reduce congestion, and improve mobility of all Texans must be completed without delay.

Adopted this 22nd day of July, 1986, by the City of Clarendon.

Those voting aye: B.L. Graham, Steve Smith, Lloyd McCord, and Gene White. Those voting no, none.

*Passed a resolution regarding the same subject for the U.S. Congress. The resolution is as follows:

RESOLUTION

TO THE TEXAS DELEGATION IN THE U.S. CONGRESS

Whereas, Congress increased the federal fuel tax to 9 cents a gallon in the Surface Transportation Act of 1982; and

Whereas, an amendment to that legislation sponsored by Senator Lloyd Bentsen provided equity to each state by guaranteeing a return of at least 85 percent of federal highway user taxes collected in that state; and

Whereas, prior to the enactment of the Bentsen amendment, Texas was receiving less than 75 cents for each dollar paid into the Highway Trust Fund; and

Whereas, the increase in the federal fuel tax and adoption of the 85 percent provision substantially increased the federal highway funds received by Texas; and

Whereas, the increased federal highway funds, together with additional state funds provided by the Legislature, are being used in a long overdue program to rehabilitate, improve, and expand the 72,000 mile Texas highway system; and

Whereas, the Reagan Administration has proposed legislation which would prevent Texas from receiving a fair return of federal highway user taxes collected here by destroying the equity achieved by the Bentsen Amendment; and

Whereas, Congress is considering legislation to reauthorize federal highway and transit programs;

Now therefore be it resolved that members of the Texas Congressional Delegation be urged to support legislation which includes the following:

1. Continue the present 85 percent minimum allocation program.

2. Remove transportation trust funds from the Unified Federal Budget, allowing revenues from user fees to flow unimpeded to provide improvements in transportation facilities. Funding levels should fully utilize revenues available in the trust funds.

3. Authorize the Secretary of Transportation to approve the Interstate Cost Estimate Administratively.

4. Provide adequate general revenue appropriations to meet transit capital needs.

5. Continue to dedicate all fuel tax revenues to the Highway Trust Fund.

Adopted this 22nd day of July 1986 by the City of Clarendon.

Those voting aye: B.L. Graham, Steve Smith, Lloyd McCord, and Gene White. Those voting no, none.

*The Board discussed airport finances and asked the airport board to attend the next meeting, August 12, 1986.

*Paid a \$217.95 bill incurred by the Assembly of God Church due to a faulty meter.

*Passed a resolution for the City to borrow \$16,000.00 for the period of 6 months to be repaid with 1986 taxes.

RESOLUTION

Be it resolved, by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon that the City Board of Aldermen finds it necessary to borrow the sum of \$16,000 for the General Fund to be repaid from uncollected 1986 taxes.

Passed and approved, this the 22nd day of July, 1986, with the following Aldermen voting aye: Lloyd McCord, Gene White, Steve Smith, and B.L. Graham. Voting no, none.

There being no other City business at this time, meeting was adjourned.
