FARM-STORED GRAIN UNDER CCC LOAN

When you get your commodity loan at your local ASCS county office, you sign an agreement with Commodity Credit Corporation. Your responsibilities are spelled out in the terms and conditions section of the agreement. It's all there in the fine print, so read your agreement carefully. Until your farm-stored loan is satisfied, you are responsible for both the quality and the quantity of the grain under loan. Deterioration, shortage or contamination can cost you money when it's time to settle up. Protect your interests and safeguard your commodity by using good storage management.

If your grain is in storage, you should check the grain carefully at regular intervals (every 2 or 3 weeks). Grain temperatures should be checked at each inspection because any evidence of higher than normal temperature is a danger signal. Look for insects (likely spots are grain surface peaks, at the unloading door and the southwest side of the bin). Use approved fumigant, if necessary, to kill insects. If your bin is equipped with fans, aerate to cool the grain when outside air is cooler than the grain.

CRP SIGNUP FOR 1987

Producers will be given the opportunity, beginning August 4, 1986 through August 15, 1986 to bid for a 1987 Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contract effective beginning the latest of the following: 1. October 1, 1986. 2. Date the 1986 crop is harvested. 3. Date a CCC representative signs CRP-1.

Annual payments will be made beginning October 1, 1987. Land designated for a 1987 contract may not be grazed after October 1, 1986.

1986 REFERENDUM ON ADVERTISING AND SALES PROMOTION OF LAMB AND WOOL

Ballots will be mailed to each known producer of wool or lambs in Donley County so that they receive them as near August 18, 1986, as possible. Any individual, corporation, partnership or legal entity is eligible to vote if all of the following apply: 1. Producer had an interest as owner or partial owner in one or more sheep; 2. Sheep were 6 months old or older for at least 30 days during 1985; 3. Ownership was for at least 30 days during 1985.

There referendum will be held August 18th through August 29, 1986. If producers indicate approval in the referendum, deductions will be

made from shorn wool and unshorn lamb payments for 1986 through 1990 to finance the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc. activities.

1986 CROP CCC LOANS

Producers with CCC loans on 1985 crop barley, corn, oats, rye, sorghum, soybeans, and wheat may, at their own option, extend the loan for 12 months. Storage cost for the added 12 month loan period will be paid by CCC for all the above commodities except soybeans. Interest will continue to accrue during the extended period. Producers who choose to extend their 1985 crop loans will not be eligible to enter into the grain reserve program or rotated at the end of the revised loan maturity period.

PUBLICATION OF FINAL PEANUT RULE IN FEDERAL REGISTER

A final rule providing procedures for determining farm poundage quotas for the 1986 through 1990 crops of peanuts was published in the June 20, 1986 Federal Register. Because there were some changes issued in the final rule different from those issued under the proposed rule, this is notification that a summary of the rule will be available in the county office for all peanut operators and others affected by the changes.

HIGHLY ERODIBLE LAND CONSERVATION RULES

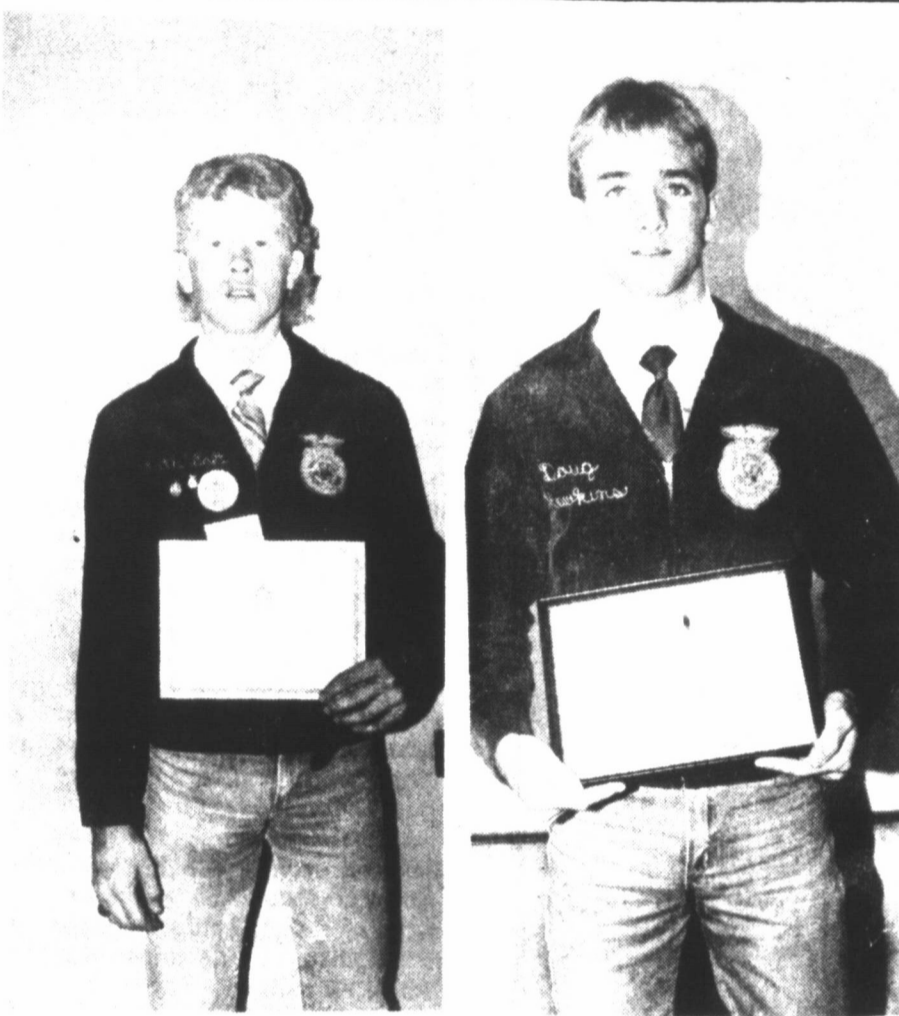
In conformance with the 1985 Farm Bill, the Agriculture Department recently issued rules concerning production on highly erodible farmland. Farmers who plant agricultural commodities on these acres without meeting conservation compliance or sodbuster rules will be ineligible for price and income supports, disaster payments, crop insurance, FmHA loans, farm storage facility loans and other farm insurance, FmHA loans, farm storage facility loans and other farm insurance, FmHA loans, farm storage facility loans and other farm program benefits. Economic development meeting Monday August 11

All community and county leaders and business people are invited to attend a meeting that will discuss economic development and a current financial analysis of Clarendon and Donley County. The meeting will be held Monday, August 11, at 7 p.m., in room 103 of the classroom building at Clarendon College.

Dr. Greg Taylor, Extension Community Development Specialist, Texas A&M University, will be the speaker for the meeting. In a recent article Taylor said that there's a close linkage between municipal government revenues and local economic conditions. Texas municipalities

obtain a large proportion of total revenues, relative to other states, from local property taxes, sales and gross receipt taxes and charges for services provided.

"Revenues derived from these sources are dependent on the status of the local economy," Taylor said. A growing economy will provide increased revenues from these sources, while a declining economy will lead to decreased revenues.

Dr. Taylor will have some interesting facts and figures about the sources of revenue for people living in Donley County and Clarendon.

Gibsons Discount Center reorganizing

"The Gibson's Discount Center is undergoing a major reorganization to make a better shopping center for Clarendon and the surrounding area, and we are not closing," stated Alex Saied, owner of Gibson's. "The store will phase out some departments and reorganizing others."

Saied continued. The one area they will be reorganizing and expanding will be their grocery department. This department will be enlarged and restocked. The meat market is temporarily closed but will be open

again in a few days.

Ken Graham has been made temporary manager of the store, and he said, "we are going to make every effort to make Gibson's a better store to shop, and we extend a cordial invitation for the people to continue to shop with us."

There is a sale underway on the merchandise to be phased out, Graham said. "This sale can result in big savings for our customers."

Mr. Graham and his wife Patsy will be in the store to assist customers. Mr. Graham is a cousin to Clarendon's "Mutt" Graham.

September 1st drinking age raised to 21

A different kind of dry spell is coming soon for some Texans.

W.S. McBeath, Administrator of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission issued a reminder that the legal drinking age will rise to 21 on Labor Day. The present legal age is 19.

At 12:01 a.m. on Monday, September 1, possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages will be illegal for any person who has not reached his or her 21st birthday. The only exception is if the underage person is in the immediate physical presence of his own parents or spouse who is over 21. Possession of an alcoholic beverage by the underage person is a misdemeanor with a possible fine of \$25 to \$200.

It is also a crime for the underage person to present false identification

or to misrepresent his age in an attempt to purchase alcoholic beverages, or to successfully make such a purchase even without misrepresenting his age. In either case, the first offense fine is the same as for possession. Giving alcohol to a minor carries a fine of \$100 to \$500.

Sale of alcoholic beverages to an underage person is the most serious offense. A fine of \$100 to \$500 and/or a year in jail is the penalty for the first violation. A second violation can result to the same jail term and/or a fine of \$500 to \$1,000.

McBeath also cautioned that the age change will affect persons entering package stores. Liquor stores may not allow underage persons to enter the store, and most such establishments have warning signs. Con't pg. 8

In peacetime, provides emergency medical treatment, means of survival, and evacuation of distressed personnel from land or the open sea. Provides contingency landing support and

emergency egress of astronauts from NASA's space orbiter vehicle.

During a recent rescue mission, SSgt Putman was credited with saving the life of a marine who was suffering from heat stroke. SSgt Putman attended the US Navy Jungle Environment Survival Training School, the Pararescue Advanced Casualty Care Course, and has been placed in instructor upgrade training. He was selected as this unit's NCO of the Quarter for October-December 1985, and also as NCO of the year for 1985. He was selected as MAC Kadena NCO of the Year in 1985, and is awaiting the results of his competition for PACAF NCO of the Year 1985.

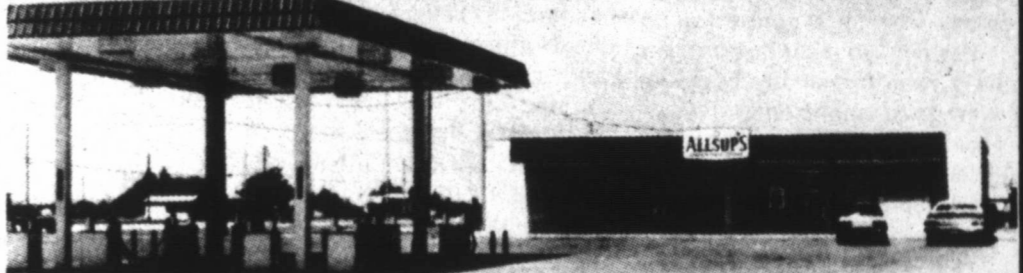

Community Suicide

(Editor's Note: The following article appeared in the March 12, 1936 issue of "The Wheeler Times"; it applies today—probably more so.)

One of the strangest phenomena witnessed in most town and small cities is the apparent eagerness with which many otherwise good citizens contribute to the tendency to commit community suicide.

These citizens will often show uncommon zeal in boosting any movement to obtain city improvements, to promote the location of new industries, to secure better educational facilities and so. Yet many of these same proud boosters will deliberately engage in a practice which nullifies all their otherwise laudable efforts—and wonder why their own doesn't go ahead.

We refer to the suicidal habit of buying away from home.

The enormous growth of the small order habit in recent years is largely responsible for the failure of many communities to make the progress which their natural advantages should make possible. The money that ought to be kept at home for the expansion of local trade and industry is sent away to distant cities, never to return. The life-blood of prosperity is allowed to ebb away through the indifference or thoughtlessness of the very persons who should set an example of local pride and loyalty.

The trifling saving here and there, usually more imaginary than real, is sufficient to cause the average citizen to forget his duty to his community and to himself, which if performed would mean far

more in the direction of local prosperity than all his other boosting efforts put together.

Why boost in one direction while committing community suicide in another? —Wellington Leader.

Xi Lambda Xi has been selected by the Panhandle Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society as Chairperson for their new comical fundraising project MS Arrest, Jail and Bail, which will be held this September 13th. The MS Arrest, Jail

and Bail, gives everyone an opportunity to put his friends, relatives, bosses, teachers, city officials, fellow students and workers....All those you love to hate....in Jail. (Temporarily, of course). Everyone has fun with this project while helping to raise much needed funds to support the services offered in the Texas Panhandle. MS, a disorder of the central nervous system, generally strikes men and women between the ages of 15 and 50. Nationally, 200 new cases are being diagnosed each week, many of whom live in the Texas Panhandle. The disease usually affects the patient's ability to talk clearly, to walk, or to see clearly. Although there is no known cure, there is much that can be done to help individuals function at their best level on a daily basis through counselling to reduce emotional stress, exercise programs, physical therapy, diet and adequate rest.

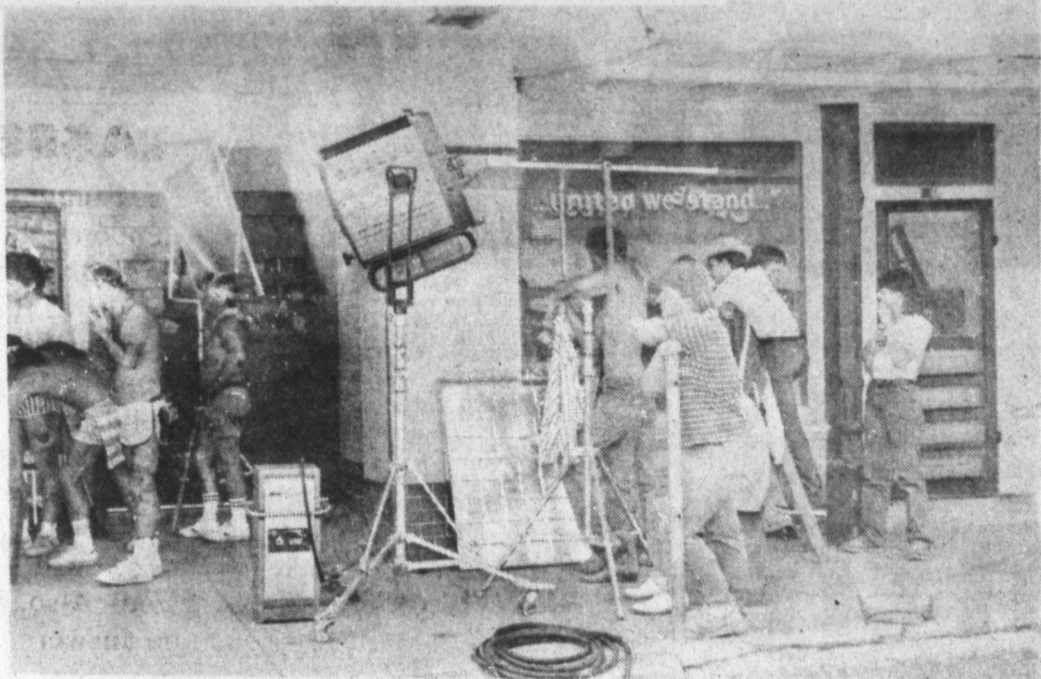

Clarendon site for Guess Jeans Commercial

GUESS JEANS - What are Guess Jeans? This may not have been a very familiar product in Clarendon a week ago, but now everyone around knows what Guess Jeans are. Gregory Lunn Challenge, which is

a film company that makes commercials with Laura Gregory as the producer and Roger Lunn as the director, moved into Clarendon, Monday, July 28 to film a 60 second commercial for Georges Marciano,

the designer and distributor of Guess Jeans from Los Angeles, California.

Lyssa O'Brien, the consultant from Guess Jeans who organized the commercials for Guess Jeans stated,

"We have filmed all of our Guess Jeans commercials in Texas, with the exception of one, made in Mexico. The Texas feel is just what we want for our Jeans."

Guess Jeans are stone washed, and believe it or not, you can even purchase a pair with that beat up look, holes and all. Miss O'Brien said, "In California, you can purchase a pair of Guess Jeans for about \$40 a pair. If you want holes in them, they are about \$56.00 a pair, and strange as it may be, we sell more jeans with holes than we do without." To get the holes in them, we wash them 10 times longer than we do the regular jeans."

To make a commercial, first you have to write the script, then a commercial artist takes over and draws each scene to be shot. From that the producers start out to find the right place to film the script. This script was written by Roger Lunn and since Guess makes their commercials in Texas, they set out to find just the right place to shoot.

They drove around Texas last October or November and coming to Clarendon they saw the Mulkey Theatre, and decided that this was most similar to the artist's drawing.

The film company brought in some 30 to 40 people to help with the film. This included camera men, prop people, make-up artists, clean-up crew, professional models, caterers and miscellaneous other crew members. Then they hired some 40 to 50 Clarendon and surrounding area teenagers to be extras, rented several buildings on Kearney Street, old cars, motorcycles, as well as miscellaneous items, food, gas and lodging. When asked "How much do you think the film company and their employees contributed to the economy of Clarendon," the assistant producer said, "I would think in the neighborhood of \$75,000."

The cost of the commercial will be about \$300,000.00. Miss O'Brien said, it would take approximately 1.3 million to buy air time for the commercial to be shown on prime

time television. This commercial is scheduled to be shown nationally in September or October."

The film company spent three days shooting in Clarendon. They shot outside and inside the Mulkey Theatre, the high school and a pool side scene. They shot two days in Claude, and one day in Amarillo. Out of the six days shooting, they will cut the film to 60 seconds.

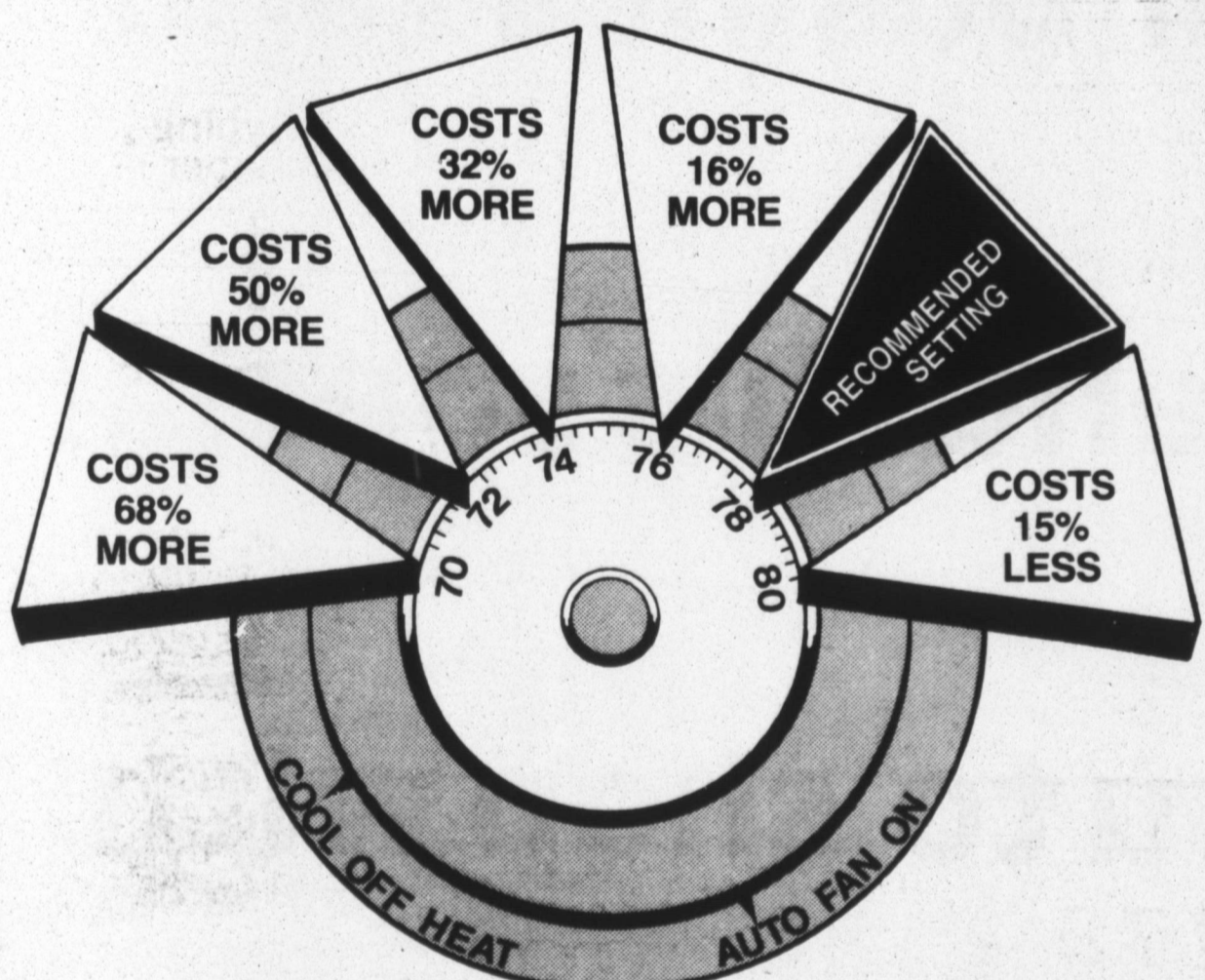
Lunn said when the film was finished, they would send a copy to the Clarendon Press, and it could be shared with all who wish to see it.

One of the film makers stated, "Clarendon had a great bunch of kids, and they did an excellent job, and we can't say enough good things about their cooperation and attitude. They were simply wonderful with the exception of a couple of incidents, we are very pleased with the way the people of Clarendon accepted and cooperated with the making of the film."

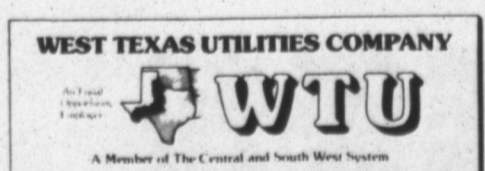

“Many young people do not realize it is a criminal offense to ignore the warning signs and enter a liquor store,” said McBeath. “It is criminal trespass under section 30.05 of the Texas Penal Code, which is a class B misdemeanor.”

Another common misconception is that drinking age violations only apply to public places. “That’s not true,” said McBeath. “It will be just as illegal in a party barn, a fraternity house or a car parked on private property,” he said.

McBeath urged voluntary compliance on the part of both licensees and underage former customers. Anyone who has a question about the upcoming change can obtain clarification from the nearest district office of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, or at the Main Office in Austin, telephone (512) 458-2500.

Bill Britten of Syd Blue’s Discount Liquors stated that he will strictly enforce this law.
