Volunteer counselors ready to help county farm families

Farm and ranch families in Donley County can obtain free financial counseling service through a new project provided by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Known as "Texas Volunteers for Rural Families", it uses trained volunteers who have agricultural and business experience, and its services are confidential, explained County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

"The goal of this service is to rebuild rural Texas one family at a time," Gooch said.

The volunteer counselors, trained by Extension Service specialists of Texas A&M University, will help families or individuals look at their financial situation and analyze available options. "The decisions on what to do then are those of the family or individual," the Extension agent said.

Among the areas on which the volunteer counselors can assist are procedures for family or business budgeting and financial planning, financial restructuring, debt restructuring, reorganization of a business to make maximum use of available resources and computer applications.

The project is funded by an \$84,000 grant from ACTION-Center for Volunteers Inc., which was announced earlier this year by U.S. Senator Phil Gramm (R-TX). ACTION administers domestic volunteer programs sponsored by the federal government.

Farmers of 1970's eligible for money back on fuel

Forget there and now, this is a matter of here and then. If you were a farmer in the 1970's you're entitled to a refund for some of your fuel expenses. But you have to act before June 30, 1988, reports Ronald Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent.

This refund is a result of a settlement reached by the Department of Energy with oil companies that allegedly overcharged for crude oil during a period regulated by price ceilings.

Consequently, farmers can get back about \$80 or more for every 100,000 gallons of fuel used between August 19, 1973 and January 27, 1981, says Gooch. That equates to a little over \$14 for every 100 acres of cropland in production during the seven-and-a-half year period, according to economists with the Extension Service.

Word processing offered for first session by CC

Two sections of BAS 142 Word Processing I will be offered this summer at Clarendon College. They will begin Monday, May 30 and will continue each Monday and Wednesday through July 6. The first section is from 1-5 p.m. The second section is from 6-10 p.m. Instruction for the course is Pamela Denney. In this course, students will learn to operate the IBM Personal Computer using Word Perfect, one of the most popular pieces of word processing software on the market today. Students will also obtain general information about computers to become "computer literate."

This course is designed primarily for the student who has never used a computer or who knows nothing about word processing. However, those with computer and word processing experience will also want to take the course. The only prerequisite is that students already know how to type. A speed of about 30 words a minute or better will be adequate.

About half of each class period will be lecture/demonstration with the other half being hands on experience. At the end of the six weeks, a student should be able to use almost all of the functions available in WordPerfect.

Texas Ag statistics

Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will be contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1988 planted acreage estimates and mid-year livestock inventories.

"These surveys are very important this year because they will be the first measure of the impact of the changes in the 1988 national farm program," state statistician Dennis Findley explained.

"Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their production and marketing plans in light of these changes."

Individual reports will be combined with other reports to set state estimates. Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1988 acreage forecast will be published July 12, and the mid-year cattle inventory will be published July 29.

"Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since one report represents similar operations of the same size and type. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley added.

Wheat Field Day will be May 26

Activities for the regularly scheduled Wheat Field Day at the USDA Conservation and Production Research Laboratory at Bushland will start at 1 p.m. on May 26, according to Dr. B.A. Stewart, Director of the laboratory. Both dryland and irrigated small grain nurseries will be featured. Dr. Kenneth Porter, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Wheat Breeder, says several new varieties and hybrids are being evaluated. Yields from Mall Grain Trials for several years, including 1987, will be available.

In addition to small grain breeding research with livestock grazing, limited tillage, wheat streak mosaic, fertility, as well as control of Russian aphid and greenbug will be discussed.

Drs. Stewart and Porter invite everyone interested in Agricultural Research to the Field Day. "Our research is most valuable to the area when people see and adopt new varieties or practices," Stewart said.

The field day is sponsored by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Agricultural Extension System, USDA-Agricultural Research Service, and Texas Wheat Producers Association.

Sales tax rebates up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$120.7 million to 1,041 cities and 81 counties that levy local option sales taxes.

"The economy of Texas is recovering," Bullock said, "and the consumer confidence is reflected in the rebates going to local governments."

Clarendon received a net payment of \$10,974.24 compared to last year's payment of \$9,233.58 represents an increase of 18.85%. Payments to date this year are \$35,783.85 compared to last year's payments of \$31,407.58 represents an increase of 13.93%.

Hedley received \$1,149.05 compared to last year of \$898.18. This means an increase of 27.93%. Payments to date for this year are \$2,209.79 compared to last year of \$2,248.90 for a total of 1.74% decrease over all.

Howardwick received a net payment of \$7,930.14 compared to last year of \$7,292.72 for a 8.74% increase. Payments to date this year is \$30,004.06 compared to last year of \$28,223.43 for a 6.31% increase.

Other cities: Claude had an increase of 20.28%, Silverton a 21.52% increase, Childress 3.00% increase, Wellington 5.0% increase and Memphis 23.86% increase.

May's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in March and quarterly filers for the first quarter that were reported to the Comptroller's office by April 21.

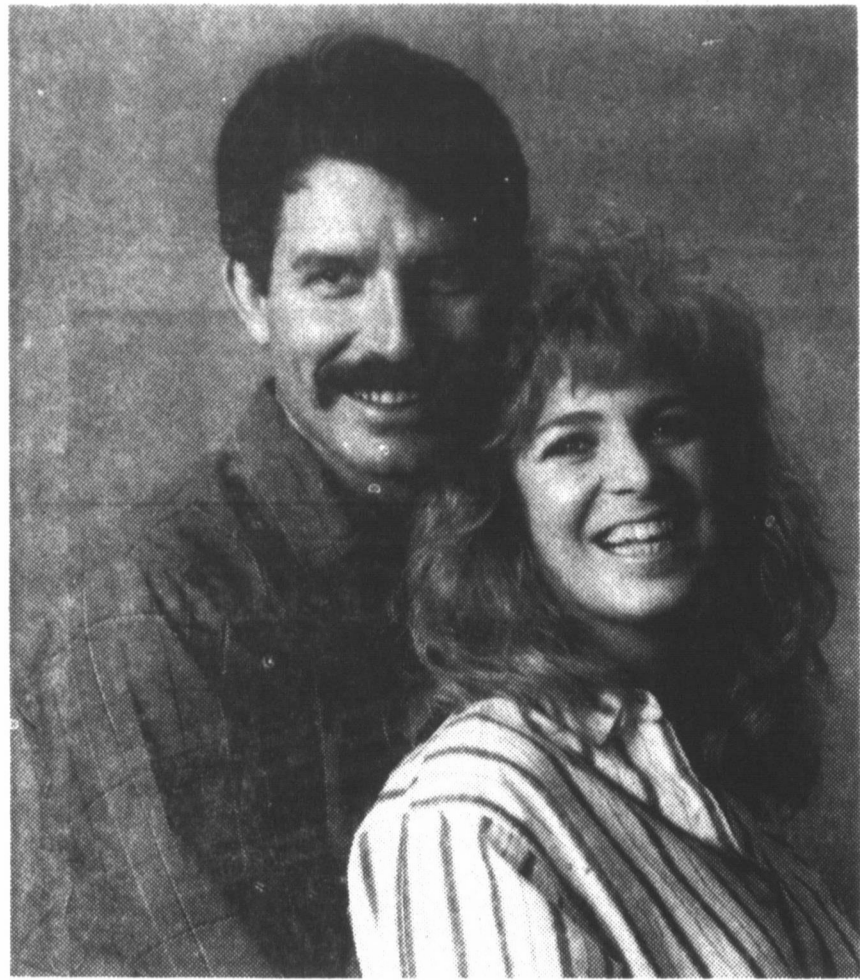

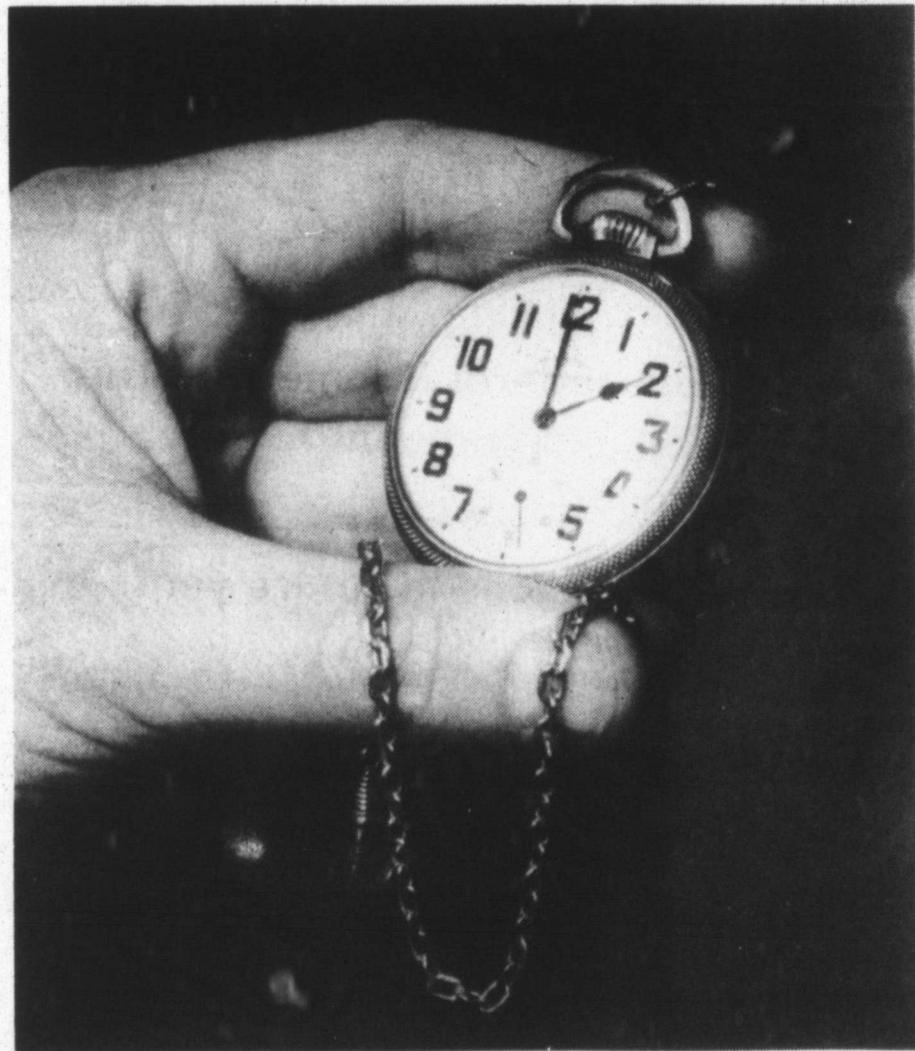

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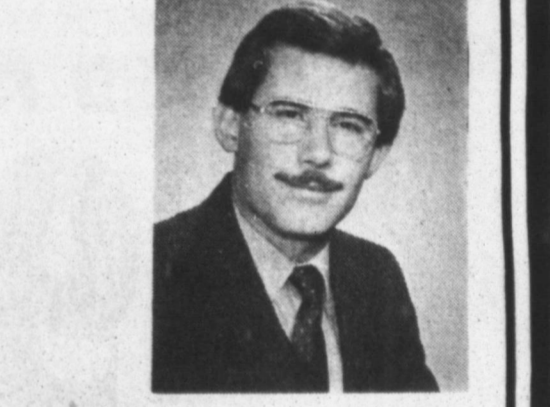

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Wanda Holman ties lead ropes for Texas Saddlery

Wanda Holman has lived in Clarendon since 1960. She was born and raised in Leslie, Texas. She married Homer Holman in 1961 and they have four grown children. Homer passed away in 1980 and Wanda had to support the family and make her own way.

She has been with Texas Saddlery for the past 10 years. She handmakes anywhere from 1,000 to 1,200 lead ropes every month. She spends many hours tying lead ropes and cinches at home, in addition to the time she spends working at the shop. Working under the name of Holman Manufacturing, she gets paid 22 cents for each lead she ties after office hours.

Holman is soft spoken and very dedicated to her work, her hands, which she said hardly ever get tired, are calloused and worn. "They are used to the work," she admitted.

Each lead rope is individually tied. The process of tying the lead takes her approximately one minute. When Holman braids or ties a lead rope, she does each one separately. She does, however, work in bundles, with each bundle consisting of 10 lead ropes. She'll braid the snap into one end and then knot the other end of the rope. After she finishes all 10, she'll go on to the next bundle. The rope usually comes on a large spool, which is purchased from a rope company in South Texas. Before the leads are tied, Holman will cut 600 feet of rope into 10-foot lengths. She will sometimes use scissors, or to speed up the process a hatchet and cutting block.

Texas Saddlery has been in operation for nearly two decades, and it is one of the leading manufacturers of cotton lead ropes in the nation. Although the company's name appears on these lead ropes, which are sold in tack stores nationwide, Wanda is responsible for their production.

When Wanda first started to work for the Texas Saddlery it was still located in Amarillo and Wanda drove the 120 mile round trip every day until they moved to the old school building in Clarendon. Wanda is supervisor of the leather goods shop and the chances are if you buy a lead rope from Texas Saddlery it was handmade by Wanda Holman.

Just imagine yourself in this mother's place if this was your child, you would want everything done that's possible to help your child be well again.

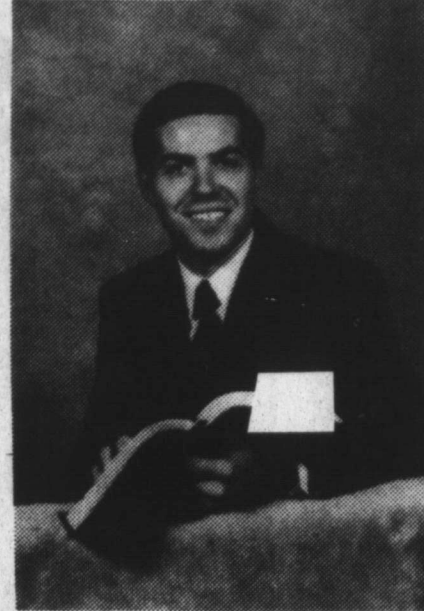

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Concerns About Caffeine

For several years there have been concerns expressed about the possibility of negative, long-term effects of caffeine on the body. Suspected health problems include benign breast lumps in women, behavioral problems in children, heart disease, and cancer of the pancreas.

According to the January issue of the *FDA Consumer*, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration believes that caffeine (in coffee, tea, and soft drinks) is safe. Several human and animal studies have concluded that there is "no association" between coffee drinking and pancreatic cancer. An FDA review has also failed to show any relationship "between benign breast disease and coffee consumption." In addition, the FDA has said that the studies which supposedly reported a link between caffeine and heart disease, were "inconclusive" because the adverse effects reported could have been due to substances other than caffeine, such as tobacco and alcohol.

A 1986 review of caffeine and behavioral problems in children indicated "inconsistent findings" in the various animal studies quoted. Other studies have shown that children tend to be neither more nor less sensitive to caffeine than are adults.

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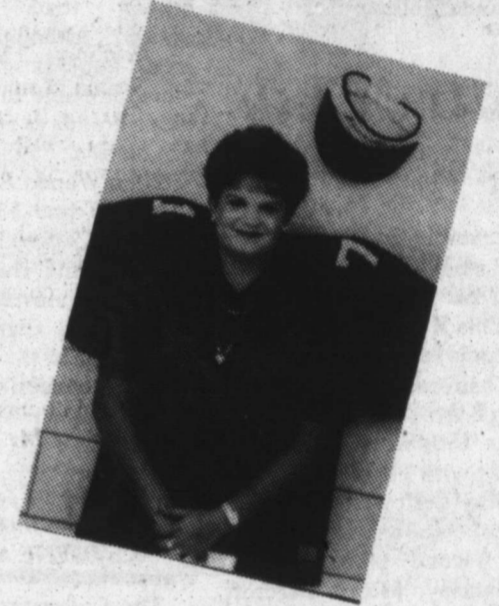

Graham is the granddaughter of Viola Graham of Clarendon.

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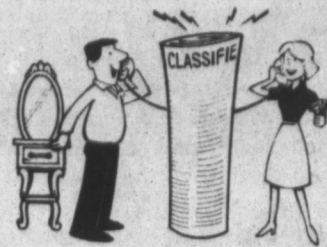

All regulations and prohibitions herein imposed shall be in addition to the regulations of all other State or Federal regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, including but not limited to the Railroad Commission of Texas, the Commissioner of the General Land Office of Texas, the Parks and Wildlife Commission of Texas, United States Army Corps. of Engineers, the United States Coast Guard, and any other department of the United States Government.

Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation desiring to drill any well within the city limits of the City of Clarendon shall make application and obtain a permit for such drilling from the City Secretary for the City of Clarendon.

Section 4. It shall be unlawful for any person, acting either for himself, or as an agent, employee, independent contractor or servant of any other person, to commence to drill, to drill or to operate any well or to assist in the drilling, or completing or operation of any such well for which a permit is required hereunder if a lawful permit therefor has not been obtained.
