**Colorsounds aids reading, spelling**

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) What helps squirmy junior high students improve in reading and spelling? Colorsounds.

It uses songs to teach sight words and the 16 common vowel sounds of English. Color-coding the dictionary markings of the sounds is part of the program devised by Mike Bell, University of Texas doctoral student.

Youngsters first learn vowel sounds and their colors. Then, given the words to a song which is played in class, they identify the sounds in the song and color-code them. At home, students reinforce their learning by counting how many times each sound occurs in the song and by writing source words in a notebook.

## Wildlife at Top 4-H

David Rideout, biologist in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, has recently been nominated to receive one of four awards to be presented to 4-H leaders by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. This is the first year that this award has been established and Rideout is one of four 4-H wildlife project leaders in the entire United States to receive such an award.

David Rideout will be flown to Washington D.C. in middle March where he and the other three to be honored will receive their plaques. Texas, Louisiana, Kentucky and California are the four states to be represented, there will be one other man and two ladies receiving this new honor for 4-H Wildlife leaders.

Rideout says that he doesn't have any of his own children in 4-H and he never was involved with 4-H as a child, but he feels that the opportunity to work with the kids is terrific. He doesn't limit his wildlife activities to only 4-Hers, however, many youth in the Childress area are able to attend his programs.

Although the 4-H does supply some guidelines for the wildlife project, Rideout thought of what his area youth might be able to do, see and learn locally. Among the activities the kids have participated in at Rideout's initiative have been field trips to the Matador Wildlife Management Area, a trip to the state fish hatcheries in Dundee, a trip to the Wichita Wildlife Refuge to see buffalo and trips to local fish farms and ranches.

The kids have seen slide presentations, heard local game wardens talk on the laws, they have tried to catch fish, and participated in a quail banding program.

Rideout has had guest speakers, such as Larry Henry, a highway patrolman in Childress who catches rattlesnakes to sell. Henry showed the kids some of the do's and don'ts involving rattlesnakes. The kids handled non-poisonous snakes such as garden snakes and bull snakes. One little 4 year old girl really enjoyed handling the snakes. Rideout remarked that about 1/4 of his 22 participants are girls. The kids also had a doctor show them first aid for snakebite.

Liz Rideout works for the County Agent in Childress and her suggestion and encouragement got David involved with the 4-H wildlife projects. While there aren't many wildlife programs in the State, Rideout took the initiative and invented programs for his group. He began working with the kids in 1977 when he divided his interests into three main groups; mammals, reptiles, amphibians and birds. That proved to be too much work, so Rideout has limited himself in order to provide quality programs rather than quantity.

At a regional 4-H leadership meeting a few years ago, Rideout presented a talk on the success of his little wildlife project and generated more interest in other cities to try the program. As a result of his enthusiasm, he was appointed to be on the State Wildlife Conservation Board in 1979 where he and many other leaders from all over Texas met in Brownwood and discussed ideas for working with the 4-H in communities for the better education, understanding and benefit of the youth and the communities in wildlife conservation.

Rideout remarked that most kids don't really understand about wildlife control,

they don't understand about management and habitat. His goal is to teach them to understand a little, then when they grow up they will be more responsible and responsive adults when it comes to wildlife management. His programs are geared to give an appreciation and a general overview of the field of wildlife management to encourage the youth to keep these ideals in mind and be better conservationists. With this in mind, Rideout encourages any youth, any age to attend his programs, regardless of their 4-H affiliation.

David Rideout is certainly an outdoorsman and a craftsman par excellence. His hobby is Indian bead and feather working of a museum quality and authenticity. His love of the Indian lore and the skill with which he can create war bonnets, spears and other authentic Indian artifacts is exceeded only by his ability to find Indian artifacts. Rideout stopped to help some men on the highway get out of a ditch. When he returned to his truck, he found a 4" flint spear point! If that isn't superiority, what is? Congratulations to Wildlife Biologist David Rideout.

### The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN-With inflation pushing the price of a new car out of the reach of many pocketbooks, consumers are searching for lower-costing transportation. Many, for the first time, are considering buying a used car.

If you are one of the many who decide to purchase a used car, take a few precautions when shopping so you will end up with one you can be satisfied with, one that won't cause any unpleasant surprises when you get it home.

Why should the purchase of a used car so often lead to misunderstandings? Well, primarily, because the typical consumer doesn't enter the market often enough to know what to look for, and what to avoid. If the consumer does his "homework," he will know

for the name and address of the title owner of the car. (Usually the used car dealer won't have the title in his name.)

Call or write the owner and ask for information about the car; the mileage when sold, the selling price, and any problems he might have had with the car. Then compare what he tells you with the information given by the used car dealer.

Check the odometer of the car. Examine the tires, the grease and oil stickers, the brake pedal and the interior of the model you choose. A low odometer reading won't mean much if other indicators point to heavier use.

While some reconditioned used cars will have a limited warranty, most are sold "as is," so you should be very careful to check for any potential problems. This means thoroughly test driving the car, being on the lookout for odd noises, oil burning, "mushy" brakes, or unusual shakes. Try all equipment, testing heater, air conditioner, windshield wipers and radio. Also check the tires. If anything needs repair or replacement, you can bargain to have the price of the car reduced by the amount you'll have to pay to fix it.

If you're seriously

interested in the car, take it to a trustworthy mechanic for an expert's opinion of its condition.

Then think over the car and price for at least a day before making up your mind. It's a good idea to check at least three dealers, too, before making your final decision.

Demand a detailed written receipt describing all of the promises and representations the salesman makes to you.

Be sure that a warranty is in writing and that it spells out the services that will be offered.

And when you do decide, shop around for the best financing. Banks, credit unions, savings and loan associations, and finance companies all make car loans. When you shop for financing, remember that you should compare the annual percentage rate you would have to pay.

## SOLAR FACTS

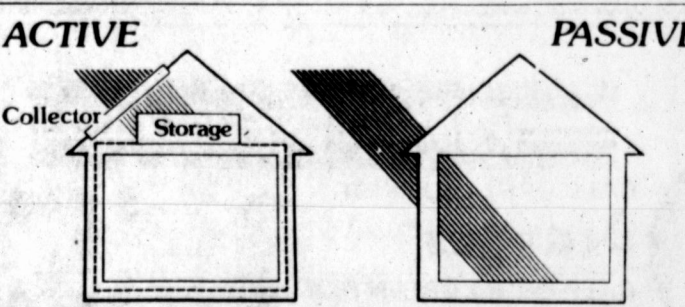
### SOLAR ENERGY SYSTEMS: ACTIVE AND PASSIVE

While solar energy is understood by most people as the heat that comes from the sun, few Americans are familiar with the systems that have been developed to harness this heat for use in our homes.

Generally speaking, there are two distinct types of solar energy systems—active and passive. At the risk of oversimplification, active systems can be defined as those which use mechanical equipment to collect and transport the sun's heat. Passive systems, by comparison, collect and transport heat by non-mechanical means. Both systems can be installed in existing buildings as well as new ones.

When most people think of a solar home, they envision a house with large solar collectors mounted on the roof. These roof-mounted flatplate collectors are, in fact, an identifying mark of an active solar energy system.

As the roof collectors accumulate heat, water or air is circulated through them to absorb the heat and carry it to storage units. From the storage units, a system of pumps, valves and fans is used to move the heat out of the storage unit and through the building.



While active solar energy systems may be more discernable to the passer-by, passive systems are rapidly growing in popularity. With passive solar energy systems, the building itself is used to store and transfer heat. In most cases, the system is not distinguishable from the building itself.

Generally speaking, passive heating systems require a large south-facing glass area to gain as much of the sun's heat as possible. Within the building, heat-absorbing materials such as masonry are used for the walls and/or floors. As the sun enters the building through the glass, the walls and floors absorb the heat and distribute it into the room. Heat flow is accomplished through such natural means as radiation, convection and conduction. To avoid heat-loss at night or overheating during the day, movable insulation in the form of shutters or insulated curtains is employed as part of the passive system.

At times, a minimal amount of mechanical equipment may be used to enhance the efficiency of a passive solar energy system. When this is done, the resulting system is termed "hybrid." Because hybrid systems still rely to a great degree on the building itself to collect and distribute heat, they are usually categorized as a type of passive system.

As might be expected, passive and hybrid systems are capturing the attention of consumers because of their simplicity, reliance on common building materials and few, if any, moving parts. In addition, passive systems generally cost less than active ones, and require little in the way of operating and maintenance costs.

Regardless of whether a homeowner is considering installation of an active, passive or hybrid system, all of these solar energy designs offer the opportunity to significantly reduce the consumption of fossil fuels and to pare down conventional heating bills.

"Well, now," he grew immediately contrite, "wasn't no more your fault than mine. I just flat out didn't see you. I shore do hate it."

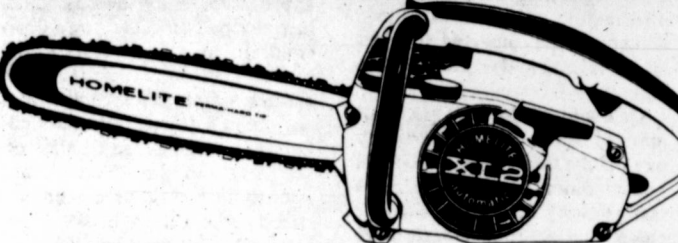
"Blind corner," I handed my money to the checker. "Forget it."

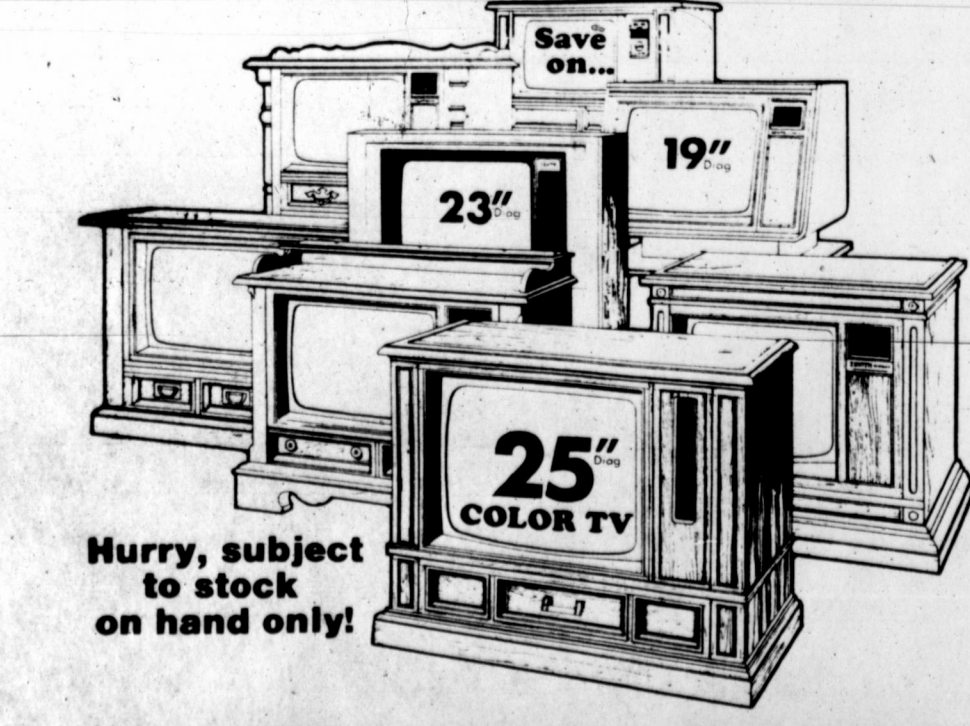

## Widows, widowers may qualify for special tax benefit

A taxpayer who became a widow or widower in 1978 or 1979 may be entitled to a special tax benefit. The benefit allows the taxpayer to use the "Married Filing Jointly" Tax Table or a Tax Rate Schedule in computing the tax liability, a tax rate significantly lower than those in the "Single" category.

To qualify for the benefit, the taxpayer (1) must have been entitled to file a joint return with the deceased spouse for the year of death, even if one was not actually filed; (2) must have a child or stepchild who qualified as a dependent; and (3) must have furnished over half of the cost of maintaining a home which was the principal residence for the dependent child or stepchild for the entire year.

Taxpayers who take advantage of this benefit should file Form 1040, check Block 5 under Filing Status, "Qualifying widow(er) with dependent child," and figure the tax using the "Married Filing Jointly" tax table or tax rate schedule.

The IRS adds that the last year a taxpayer may file jointly with, or claim an exemption for, a deceased spouse is the year of death. The special tax rate benefit is available only for the two tax years after the spouse's death.

*Nutrition And You*

Unlike the laws of physics which apply to us equally, nutritional requirements vary from person to person. Many factors interfere when it comes to nutrition's "universal truths." That is why many people misunderstand the U.S. "Recommended Daily Allowances" (USRDA).

The USRDA is a general guideline, established by the government, which focuses on preventing deficiency diseases in the larger population. However, there is no way to recommend a single diet or program of supplementation that could provide each of us with optimum nutritional health.

It is also important to remember that these guidelines are for "satisfactory" health—that is, the absence of illness or disease. While it can't be scientifically defined, "optimum health" means much more—stamina, vitality, and a sense of well-being conducive to a long, active life. Nutrition is essential to this ideal health condition.

Americans can do much better than to meet the USRDA guidelines, but our



diet has been deteriorating in some important ways since the beginning of this century, according to the Science & Technology Department of Shaklee Corporation.

Even with our increased affluence, many people are getting less than the recommended nutrients, and adolescents and the elderly are at greatest risk. Dieting Americans, at any time about half of our population, cut calories at the expense of their nutrient intake. Stress and physical exercise also create additional nutritional demands.

Many scientists believe that the USRDA guidelines do not apply to all of us at all times. Nutrition is always a personal matter. We should each pay close attention to our changing personal patterns and nutritional requirements.

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**A NEW GOLD**

Injections of gold compounds have been used for many years in treatment of persons having rheumatoid arthritis...a potentially crippling disease of the joints and other tissues. Gold injections often relieve pain and stiffness and delay joint deformity.

Up until recently, only gold injections have been available for treatment of this form of arthritis. A form of gold that can be taken by mouth called **auranofin** is now being investigated. An oral gold compound offers the obvious advantage of freedom from pain on injection. Also, oral gold can be taken at home whereas injections are usually given in the physician's office. Home administration should be more convenient and less expensive.

But **auranofin** seems to offer still further advantages over its injectable counterparts. The side effects caused by injectable gold compounds do not seem to be as severe with the oral preparation. In addition, patients who have not responded well to gold injections may benefit from the medicine taken by mouth.

Evidence is now accumulating that oral gold is both reasonably safe and quite effective. Although **auranofin** is not presently available for general use, this new gold holds promise for many persons who have rheumatoid arthritis.

**1. GET OUT OF THE RUT.** Think over your shopping patterns and eating habits. Start with a kitchen audit, listing the items you usually buy. Take the list when you shop and carefully compare items by brand, price, size and grade to see whether you've been buying the best for your money. When you feel like buying something not on your list, leave it on the shelf unless you really need it. Put it on next week's list and then, if you still want it, buy it. Plan your meals well in advance, but stay flexible enough to substitute especially good buys when you spot them. Shop alone and after you have eaten. Statistics indi-

**2. USE UNIT-PRICE DATA.** Compare the cost of similar products of various sizes by weight, volume or count. Check to see if larger quantities are more economical than smaller ones.

**3. BE A BRAND SWITCHER.** Different brands of the same product can be roughly equal in quality and nutritional value yet vary widely in price. Try generic brands and store labels.

**4. LEARN NUTRITIONAL ALTERNATIVES.** Study up on the nutrients essential for health and what foods provide them. Protein, for example comes in many forms. A meal containing beans and rice, wheat, corn or milk can be as rich in protein as one featuring sirloin steak. Products contain information about nutrient content, percentage of minimum daily requirements per serving,

**5. TRY NEW MEATS.** Grains for cattle feeding are expensive in relation to the amount of meat produced. Meat from grass-fed cattle and calves is less expensive and is more healthful since it has less fat. Since it is leaner it shouldn't be cooked too long or at too high a temperature. Try organ meats such as liver, tongue, or tripe. Don't forget fish and poultry as meat varieties in your menu planning.

**6. TRY CHEAPER CUTS.** Learn how to cook these cuts. Though the taste is different, you might be pleasantly surprised. Try marinating a cheap cut.

**7. BUY BY THE SERVING.** Don't ignore the more expensive boneless cuts of meat. Though bony meats are cheaper per pound, they yield less edible meat per pound. Figure a serving as 1/2 to 3/4 pound for boneless cuts; 3/4 pound for roasts; 1/2 to one pound for very bony cuts such as spare ribs. It could cost you more to feed your family with cheap, bony cuts than one smaller expensive cut.

**9. GET OUT THE COOK-BOOKS.** (or read a good recipe column) They will give you many more ideas on how to use leftovers and how creativity can work savings in the kitchen. Consider making from scratch many of the things you habitually buy in prepared form. But be careful that higher-priced ingredients don't make homemade dishes more expensive than prepared ones often cake mixes are cheaper than scratch.

**10. INSIST ON FRESHNESS.** The date marked on all perishable foods is the "pull date" the last day on which the product can remain on the shelf in the store. It is not a spoil date, however. I once bought a jar of yeast that was only 1 week from its "pull date". It didn't last me as long as it should have. I didn't read the label!

**11. BUY QUANTITIES YOU CAN USE.** Large quantities are often bargains, but only if they will keep safely until you can use them up. Store them properly. Buy fresh fruits and vegetables at their peak season, when prices are usually lowest.

**12. CONSIDER GROUP STRATEGIES.** A neighborhood group might save by buying in bulk directly from wholesalers and farmers. Or a shopping club could check the adds for specials then send members on shopping trips to different stores to buy for the whole group. This would be effective only in a larger city or if you lived in the country.

**13. SAVE ON CEREALS AND BAKED GOODS.** There are two benefits in

**14. SAVE ON MILK AND EGGS.** Nonfat dry milk commonly costs about half as much as the wet variety and you can use it for cooking or for drinking. Determine which of any two sizes of breakfast eggs is the better buy. Grades AA and A are commonly used in preparing egg dishes, but grade B if available, is fine for baking and other cooking. Check the price difference, if large or extra large are only 7c to 10c more than medium, they are the better buy.

**TERRAIN:** In elevation, the surface of the state varies from sea level along the coast of the Gulf of Mexico to 8,749 feet at the summit of Guadalupe Peak in the Guadalupe Mountains. Terrain varies from the subtropic Rio Grande Valley to the Great Plains in the far north, from the lush pine forests of East Texas to the mountainous Trans-Pecos region of West Texas.

**Improper pruning can result in poor growth**

As the dormant season for many plants approaches, home gardeners should review proper pruning techniques before manning pruning shears and saws, advises Ronald Gooch Donley County Agent.

Improper pruning can result in poor growth, unnatural plant forms, poor flower and fruit production, and occasionally even death of the plant, Gooch adds.

Following basic guidelines for pruning can transform a tree or shrub into a beautiful plant specimen.

To begin, have a reason for pruning, emphasizes Gooch. Consider technique, season of the year and the need for pruning before taking that first snip. Many times there is no reason at all for pruning if the tree is hale and hearty.

The winter season when plants are dormant may not necessarily be the best time to prune every plant on your landscape. Deciduous trees and shrubs, vines, ground covers, and evergreens probably can be pruned at this time of year, says Gooch. However, exceptions include spring-flowering shrubs such as azaleas, forsythia, bridal wreath and gardenias, which should be pruned after they flower. Do not prune roses until mid-February.

Using proper tools is important for safety and adequate cutting. Use hand shears for small twigs under one-half inch in diameter. Long-handled lopping shears are best for branches one-half to one inch in size.

Larger branches require a pruning saw. A long-handled pole pruner or saw is necessary for cutting higher branches.

Gooch recommends making cuts flush with the trunk since stubs do not heal properly. As years pass stubs decay and the deterioration spreads down the trunk until the tree falls over.

Seal cuts more than two inches in diameter with a pruning paint sealer. The sealer will dry hard and protect the wound from insect and disease invasion and moisture loss.

As important as seasonal pruning is, it's even more important to prune when needed, says Gooch. Prune and repair damaged plants as soon as possible. And always prune after transplanting, particularly with balled and bare rooted plants. Pruning will compensate for roots that plant lost in the digging.

Pruning is perhaps the least understood and most abused of all the many chores a gardener may tackle. When pruning, have a purpose in mind and do the job right, emphasizes Gooch.

**RESISTANCE TO ROOT ROT**  
Improved cotton strains (TAM-MAR and CAMD germplasm) are being developed for resistance to root rot, in comparison with other cultivars, by scientists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Root rot was much more severe in 1979 than it had been in recent years. In the uniform MAR test at Temple the trend was for the LEBO, GN, AND newer CDPS strains to be less susceptible than the Tamcot CAMD-E standard. It was noted that even under the severe conditions of 1979, Blank-SU had fewer dead plants than did the poorest performing strain of the previous year, ORSC-2. The recently released variety Tamcot SP37H had significantly fewer plants killed than the Blank, MAR-17-30, and Tamcot CAMD-E standards. The trend was for several new 1978 strains to be better than the older standards and Tamcot SP37H. The new Maroon material had few dead plants even to 6 to 8 weeks after plants begin dying in the nurseries. These same strains also show good resistance to *Verticillium* wilt and to seedling disease pathogens. Results in 1978 and 1979 suggest that within the

TAM-MAR germplasm, the trend continues for accumulating genes for a higher and more stable resistance to *Phytophthora* root rot in cotton. The newer strains probably have levels of genes for an intermediate level of resistance. In 1980, even though root rot was not as severe, root rot at Temple was favorable for evaluating resistant material. The LEBO, the TAM-COT SP21S, and TAM-COT 37H continued to be consistent in having fewer dead plants than TAM-COT CAMD-E, which was earlier found to have partial resistance and is now used as the standard. **ANHYDROUS AMMONIA TOXIC TO ROOT ROT**  
Research during the past 2 years has shown that deep application of anhydrous ammonia is beneficial in controlling the severity of root rot of cotton, according to scientists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The fungus grows through the soil as mycelial strands and forms sclerotia, providing a means of

beneficial insects that can move to other plants and crops to provide biological control. Source: T. L. Austin, E. D. Bryant, Lubbock, TX 79404-8101.

**EFFECTIVE SELF-MEDICATION**  
Health Care Costs  
In 1978, health care expenditures in the U.S. averaged \$863 per person. Health care, notes economist Simon Rottenberg, amounted to over nine per cent of the gross national product; only about eight percent of that was accounted for by medicines and sundries.

According to experts at The Proprietary Association—a trade association representing manufacturers of nonprescription medicines—the average American spends about \$19.11 for nonprescription medicines—a small outlay compared to his tobacco products (\$78.85), alcoholic beverages (\$96.47) and candy (\$26.42).

As James D. Cope, president of The Proprietary Association, pointed out, if only five to ten percent of the people now self-medicating for minor ailments sought professional help instead, it would add billions of dollars to the nation's health care costs. Consumers, health care economists, government providers and health professionals are looking for ways to control those costs.

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**LORSBAN EFFECTIVE IN GREENBUG CONTROL**  
The appearance of insecticide-resistant greenbugs has indicated the need for new chemicals effective against greenbugs on sorghum. Chemical control is an important part of the management program developed by scientists of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, even when greenbug-resistant sorghum hybrids are grown. When evaluating new insecticides, they are interested particularly in chemicals that are easy on natural enemies, either inherently or by use of special application methods. One of the most promising new greenbug insecticides evaluated is Lorsban. It was as effective for greenbug control as standard materials on the Texas High Plains, even at low rates (0.1 lb. A/A) which may save
