Death Still Hasn't Taken a Holiday

In the first half of the summer driving season, Texas didn't see a single day without a traffic death. The Texas Coalition for Safety Belts is promoting a "One Deathless Day" campaign for the 101 day period. As of July 15, that goal had not been achieved.

Texas came closest to reaching a deathless day on four different days, with three traffic deaths each. Surprisingly, July 4 and 5 were among the four. The deadliest day thus far was Saturday, June 25, with 20 traffic deaths.

The last day Texas experienced a deathless day was over 10 years ago on January 5, 1977. Although that goal has not yet been reached this year, the Coalition remains hopeful. The campaign period, which began on May 28, will end Labor Day weekend, September 5.

Fire Destroys

Seedhouse

A fire at the Clarendon Gin on Wednesday, August 17th, destroyed the seed storage facility. The building and many of the contents were lost.

The fire started in dry grass about 6:00 p.m. It spread to the back side of the seedhouse, where it set fire to a pallet. The wooden pallet then set fire to the wooden frame of the building and some of its contents. The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department extinguished the blaze.

According to Wondell Luttrell, owner of the gin, the fire destroyed a number of gin machine belts, 6 cotton stripper belts, seed, and various other items. Some of these were insured; some were not. A large lot of spare electric motors that were in the corner of the structure appear to have been undamaged.

Gin employees are removing the remains of the structure, and hope to have the area cleared up soon.

Donley County Cotton Crops Need Rain Soon

Dryland cotton in much of the county needs rain very badly. What started out as a very promising year may end up as a virtual loss.

Many cotton plants are starting to shed immature bolls, due to moisture stress. Unless these fields get a sizable rains soon, there may be little to harvest. Other fields, including many of those that are irrigated, are in good shape. Where the plants have gotten adequate water, there may be a bumper crop. Prices appear to be fairly good, as well.

Cotton insects remain a problem. County Agent Ronald Gooch and Insect Scout David Lowrie are both concerned about high numbers of insects. Lowrie reports that several fields have sizable number of boll weevils. And a number of area farmers have already sprayed for boll worms.

Alfalfa has reproduced fairly well this year. Hay crops are generally irrigated. There have been several cuttings taken from the fields east of Clarendon. Hay prices should remain quite strong due to the drought.

Peaches have produced exceptionally well this year, and area fruit stands appear to be doing good business. Local watermelons are maturing, as well.

Many pastures are dry and dormant. Local cattle raisers, like cotton farmers, would like a good "slow soaker". But then, most ranchers are not too picky about when it rains. One old rancher on the Edwards Plateau often said "I never turn down a free beer, a heifer calf or a care if that rain was on Christmas Day or if it extinguished the Fourth of July.

In the middle of August, there probably would be almost no one who would object to an inch or two of precipitation.






RECENTLY ENACTED LEGISLATION HAS CHANGED THE WAY CHECKS WILL BE PROCESSED

Starting September 1, 1988, new requirements must be followed regarding the placement of check endorsements.

This means that any checks you deposit with us must be endorsed in a specific area on the back side of each check.

Your ENTIRE endorsement (whether a signature or a stamp)—along with any other endorsements, ID information, driver's license number, etc.—must fall within 1/2" of the trailing edge of a check.

As you look at the front of a check, the trailing edge is the left edge. When you flip the check over, be sure to keep all endorsement information within 1/2" of that edge.



These new endorsement guidelines apply to both personal and business checks.



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Motion Sickness Medicines

Motion sickness occurs as the result of both "visual" and "balance" causes. Interestingly, motion sickness in children is related to age. Children age 2 to 12 years old are often affected, while infants may not be affected at all.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration recently indicated that four medicines, all classified as antihistamines, are safe and effective in treating the nausea, vomiting and dizziness associated with motion sickness. These four ingredients, *cyclizine hydrochloride*, *diphenhydramine hydrochloride*, *dimenhydrinate hydrochloride*, and *meclizine hydrochloride*, are commonly found in nonprescription motion sickness medicines. Because all four are antihistamines, products containing them usually carry warnings that they may cause drowsiness, that alcohol should be avoided, and that caution should be used when driving or operating machines while using motion sickness medicines.

Dimenhydrinate should not be given to children under two years of age. *Diphenhydramine* should not be used in children under age six. Read all product labels carefully before using.







WEEDS

We all know that plants grow at different rates depending on their kind, species, moisture, sunlight, climate, and care. There are many different varieties of plants, such as: climbing, vines, broadleaf, and even those popular ones known as weeds.

It is unknown just when weeds were documented in history. Weeds

This is where the parallel between the secular field and the Spiritual field stops. While we try everything in our power to eradicate the weeds from the earthen fields, Jesus tells us not to pull or poison the weeds out of His Spiritual field.

How often have you seen this being done in God's church today? How hard is it for each one of us NOT to do this very thing with our judgments, our prejudices, and our lack of love.

Jesus literally likened His Kingdom to a field. One to be planted in. One to be loved. One to be sought after. But one point to be made is that God giveth the increase! (1 Cor. 3:7)

Health Care Issues

In today's world it seems as though everyone is having to comply with rules and regulations. The area of long term care is certainly no exception to the regulatory process. Even as I write this article, we are in the midst of preparing to comply with new rules that will govern the way in which we operate in the nursing home industry.

Basically, the Texas nursing home industry has to comply with two regulatory agencies. Our provider contract is held with the Texas Department of Human Resources. In order to be contracted a facility must comply with all state and local laws, ordinances, and regulations which relate to health and safety. The facility must also be currently licensed by the Texas Department of Health as a nursing facility. The Texas Department of Health has the responsibility of on-site surveys of each facility. The survey team usually consists of a Generalist, RN, Dietician, Social Worker and Pharmacist. Their primary purpose is to insure the facility continued compliance with the Minimum Licensing Standards. During an on-site survey, the Health Department survey team looks for compliance in the following areas:

- (1) Governing Body and Management
- (2) Physician Services
- (3) Nursing Services
- (4) Food and Nutrition Services
- (5) Pharmacy Services
- (6) Social Services
- (7) Medical Records
- (8) Physical Environment/Safety

Any facility that is continually out of compliance with established standards may have Medicaid payments held in suspension or eventually lose its contract to provide services. I don't have enough space to elaborate on all of the standards with which we must comply. Suffice it to say that the Minimum Licensing Standards from the Health Department are 91 pages long. Only those persons who are directly involved in long term care realize the volume and complexity of the regulatory process. I personally believe that the next 3 to 5 years will be a period of rapid change in the regulatory process. The question that I am asking myself more than ever is, "Will the Medical Center Nursing Home be ready to meet the challenge of those change." Next week I plan to change directions a little as I share my thoughts on, "The Rural Health Care Crisis."

Credit Quality has Improved for Area Farmers

The credit quality of area farmers and ranchers has improved substantially through 1988, according to John S. Rike III, President of Rolling Plains Production Credit Association. Stocker cattle operations, especially, should also fare well due to the lowest cattle numbers in 30 years.

"Overall, the credit quality of our member-borrowers has improved," says Rike. He noted that in 1988, the association has not had to channel any additional funding into its loan loss reserve accounts.

According to Rike, approximately 65 percent of the PCA's loan portfolio is invested in cotton production; another 25 percent is in livestock; 5 percent goes to wheat farmers and the remainder is spread among various other enterprises.

Even though the association's loan activity increased and financial indicators improved, the PCA reported a net loss of \$413,350 for the first half of the year compared with last year's net income of \$217,877 at mid-year. Rike attributes the loss to the \$743,305 assessment paid to the Farm Credit System in March 1988. Rolling Plains was one of nine Texas Associations required to make this payment.

Under provisions of the Agricultural Credit Act of 1987, financially strong Farm Credit institutions were required to pay a one-time assessment to the Farm Credit Financial Assistance Corporation (FAC). In turn, the FAC will use the pooled capital to support the nation's ailing Farm Credit institutions. Congress is now considering legislation which could reverse the assessment and return a portion of the \$743,305 to the association. Rolling Plains PCA maintains a healthy capital to assets ratio of 35 percent with some 13 million in capital funds.

Statewide, the Texas Farm Credit System reported \$900,000 in net income for the first six months of 1988, compared to a net gain of \$6.8 million for the same period in 1987. Nationwide, the Farm Credit System recorded a \$336 million profit over the two quarters, compared with a loss of \$201 million for the same period last year.

Production Credit Associations in Texas specialize in short- and intermediate-term loans for financing producers' livestock, equipment, supply and real estate needs. Rolling Plains PCA has approximately 730 loans outstanding for a total of \$36 million to farmers, ranchers and ag-related businesses in Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dickens, Donley, Foard, Hall,

Hardeman, Haskell, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Motley, Shackelford and Stonewall counties.
