Hospital District Board to vote on tax rate Sept 2nd

The Board of Directors of the Donley County Hospital District will meet in open session on Friday, September 2nd to vote on the tax rate for fiscal year 1988-89. At the present, the Board is proposing a 6% tax increase as was discussed at a public hearing on Augsut 25th. This increase will amount to an increase of .01/\$100. The tax revenues that come into the District are used in three primary areas: (1) Retiring the District's bonded indebtedness; (2) Maintenance and operating costs of the facility; (3) Indigent health care costs. With the facility continuing to operate and provide health care to the citizens of Donley County, the costs of providing that care are increasing. There is also the need to comply with new State and Federal regulations. Once again, the public is invited to this open meeting on Friday, September 2nd, 7:00 p.m., in the Dining Room of the Medical Center Nursing Home.



Back to School

Parents who "buckle up" themselves and their children could save much more than a price discount during back-to-school activities this

Back-to-school means new tennis shoes and notebooks and more cars on the road. Driving through mounting bottlenecks and snarled traffic with the number of vehicles exceeding holiday loads requires every precaution. "Buckling up before driving to the next shopping center or sale can be a major defense against being injured or killed," said Carla Baker, statewide coordinator for the Safe Riders Program at the Texs Department of Health.


The proper use of child safety seats is especially important during this potentially dangerous driving time. "Most accidents happen close to home in town, during peak traffic," said Baker.

Although use of child safety restraints has increased slightly since last year, the 1988 figures are still below 1986, according to the latest Texas Transportation Institute survey. After reaching a peak of nearly 60 percent in 1986, the rate of compliance with the state's 1984 child safety seat law declined to 49.9 percent in 1987 and has risen to 51.9 percent for 1988.

"Many parents see that their children have new clothes and books but then neglect them when they ride in a car or truck," said Baker. "School-age children should be buckled up securely even if the destination is a shoe store only three blocks away. And little brothers and sisters--state law requires all chil-The Clarendon Firebelles, assisted dren under age 2 to ride in a safety seat. Because young children are more apt to be seriously injured in an accident, it's best for them to ride in a safety seat until age 4." Baker

A growing list of statistics continues to prove the wisdom of older children and adults using safety belts. Almost four out of five occupants who escaped serious injury in accidents on Texas roads in 1987 were wearing seat belts, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety. There were three times more fatalities in accidents where occupants did not wear safety

Information on safety belt and safety seat use and on locations where low-income parents may borrow a safety seat is available from the Safe Riders Program. For information from Safe Riders, call toll-free, 1-800-252-8255.



Disaster Legislation

Current legislation, if enacted, would authorize disaster payments. Before you plow or make other use of failed acres, producers must file an ASCS-574 (Application for Disaster Credit). We are now required to appraise all failed acres. If you must make use of the acreage prior to the time an appraisal can be performed by this office, you must leave representative strips throughout the

Producers who plan to harvest affected grain crops for other than grain should request appraisal prior to harvesting the crop,

Producers must maintain acceptable production evidence if the crop is sold or stored off the farm. If the crop is stored on the farm, a bin measurment service should be requested prior to disposing of any of the production.

1988 High Moisture Feed Gain Loans Producers who dispose of their high moisture grain through commercial feedlots or use on the farm. may receive a farm-stored loan on 100% of the adjusted dry weight. The producer shall, when requesting the loan, either immediately redeem the loan with certificates or substitute the eligible production. If the production is subsituted, the loan cannot be reeemed with certificates. The producer shall certify that title to the commodity has not been transferred when the request for loan is

The moisture level of the commodity must be greater than 15.5% for corn and 14% for grain sorghum. Producer must present a scale ticket from a state approved scale showing gross weight, tare weight, date, and signature of an approved weighman. You must also present satisfactory evidence showing commodity, quantity, class moisture. Loans must be requested within 30 days after harvest of the commodity but no later than December 31, 1988.

Measurement Service Reminder If you have signed up for measurement service and have not been notified that the service is completed prior to starting harvest, please let us know and we will get that farm completed so you can certify. Also beware that when notified of the completion of the service you have only 5 working days (7 days) to come into the office and certify those acres.

CRP Farm Certification Please remember that all CRP farms must certify the acreage use on an ASCS-578 before an annual payment can be made. This must be done in person in the county office. **Emergency Haying and Grazing of** ACR and CU

The Donley County Committee made application for emergency haying and grazing of ACR and CU. The application was not approved because Donley County had not suffered a loss of 40% or more, relative to forage and grazing production. This means that there cannot be having and grazing of these restricted acreages beginning May 15th through October 14, 1988.

Get the most from freezers

The money saved by freezing fresh produce or food bought on sale can easily be eaten up by energy costs if you don't make good use of your home freezer.

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A frost-free freezer costs about \$15 per month for electricity, depending upon its size and your local electric rates. You can keep your freezer from using more electricty than necessary by making sure it operates efficiently, according to Bonnie Piernot, a consumer economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"A freezer inside the home requires less energy than one kept in the garage because it doesn't have to work as hard to maintain its low

temperature," she said. "When the garage is the only space available, put the freezer against an inside wall, if possible, since it will be cooler there. If your garage has no ventilation, consider adding a roof vent for air circulation and lower temperatures," said Pier-

The specialist said a full freezer runs more efficiently than one that's half empty. If you use your freezer very little, consider pulling the plug on it, buying only what you need for a short period and storing it in the refrigerator-freezer.

"Older freezers often use extra energy because they have leaky gaskets that let cold air escape," she said. "Test the rubber gasket by placing at piece of paper in the door and closing it. If you can pull the paper out without tearing it, the gasket needs to be replaced."

Depending upon the size of the freezer, Piernot said replacing a rubber gasket is about a \$15-25 do-it-yourself job.

"Don't freeze foods you eventually have to throw away. If your family doesn't eat zucchini, for example, freezing quarts of it will simply be a waste of money. Freeze foods you need and use most often and in amounts you can use withing the recommended storage time," said the specialist.

For best quality in frozen foods, Piernot suggests checking the temperature of the freezer with a freezer thermometer to make sure it is at 0 degrees Fahrenheit or less.

"Invest in moisture-vapor proof plastic bags and wraps, freezer wrap, freezer containers or heavy duty foil

to prevent freezer burn," she said. "Don't try to cut corners by using old plastic bread bags or containers not meant for freezing since that will just reduce the quality of the food."

"Also label and date frozen food packages. Then keep a simple inventory of your freezer to tell you what's on hand and remind you to use packages of food within the recommended storage time," said the specialist.

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

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

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

Only last week, I spotted a bumper sticker which read, "I live for weekends, holidays, and vacations. No doubt all of us have felt this way on numerous occasions, but deep down, we know that our lives would be much poorer--and not just from a monetary standpoint--if we had no

Why is this? I believe God has put into us a desire to work, to produce, to accomplish, to contribute to the good of the community, and has placed His stamp of approval upon honest labor. One could rightly say that He now only approves of our being working people, He commands it. "Six days shalt thou labor and do all thy work" (Exodus 20:9). "... We beseech you, brethren, . . . to do your own business, and to work with your own hands, . . . that ye may walk honestly with them that are without, and that ye may have lack of nothing (I Thessalonians 4:10-12). "For even when we were with you, this we commanded you, that if any would not work, neither should he eat. For we har that there are some which walk among you disorderly, working not at all, but are busybodies. Now them that are such we command and exhort you by our Lord Jesus Christ, that with quietness they work, and eat their own bread" (II Thessalonians 3:10). "The sleep of the laboring man is sweet, whether he eat little or much. . ." (Ecclesiastes 5:12). Having spoken of the hard work of a virtuous woman, the writer of the Proverbs says, "She stretcheth out her hand to the poor: yea, she reacheth forth her hands to the needy. (Proverbs 31:20).

Why, then, should we celebrate the fact that we have work to do? Because, He who commands our labor, He who knows our every need, sees that we need protection from the dangers of idleness. We need a continuing source of provision for ourselves and our families. We need the "sweet sleep" which honest labor brings. And we need to have that little something extra to give to those who, for whatever reason, have not been able to provide for themsel-

But perhaps a word of warning should be included here. Perhaps "how to work" is a lesson we have learned a bit too well. We have had the Protestant work ethic drilled into us for so many generations that perhaps we forget that the Word also says, "In six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that in them is, and rested the seventh day: wherefore the Lord blessed the sabbath day, and hallowed it" (Exodus 20:11). And in the verse just previous to this, we are told to do no work on this seventh, blessed, set-apart day. In Exodus 23:12, we have this commandment restated, with the added comment that a man's servants and animals, as well as he himself, need a time of refreshing. In the eleventh verse of that chapter, God instructs that even the land itself be given a rest once every seven years.

And so, as Labor Day approaches, we should say to each other, "Enjoy your job. It's one of God's many, many blessings to us." But we should also say, "Enjoy those days off, those vacations, those holidays. They, too, are His gifts, and we need not feel guilty about our enjoyment of them." May God grant you the blessing of meaningful, productive work, and may He grant you those times of refreshing--even this weekend--when you can relax, be renewed, and have your thoughts turned again to His love and provision of your every need.







Martin Community reunion held

Pork referendum set for September 7-8

Pork producers in Donley County will have an opportunity to vote in a special referendum September 7-8 as authorized by the Pork Promotion, Research and Consumer Information

Purpose of the referendum is to determine the continuance of the 100 percent checkoff program which provides funds for pork research and promotion to enhance the pork industry, said Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The checkoff is at the rate of 25 cents per \$100.00 on all hogs and pigs as well as on all imported hogs and pork products.

Referendum voting will be conducted in the county Extension office during normal business hours September 7-8.

Producers and importers unable to vote in person may request an absentee ballot from Dr. Bill Thomas, Extension Swine Specialist, Kleberg Center - Room 212, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843. Absentee ballots will be available from August 1 until the close of business on August 26. Absentee ballot return envelopes, containing the ballot and registration/certification statements, must be signed by the voter and mailed so as to be received in the County Extension office serving the county of voter residence by close of

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Texas government ends fiscal year in black

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday, August 26, said Texas government will end its fiscal year next week in the black for the first time in two years.

"When the state closes its books on the 1988 fiscal year on August 31, we'll be ahead by nearly \$100 million, and that's a sure sign the Texas economy is rebounding," Bullock said.

Last year at this time, the state was in the hole \$745 million. At the end of 1986, the balance in the General Revenue Fund was a minus \$231 million.

Bullock made the announcement at the West Texas Council of the Texas Chamber of Commerce's mid-year meeting Friday morning in Abilene.

The dramatic turnaround from a large deficit to a positive balance in just one year is further evidence of Texas' strong economic recovery, Bullock said.

He said that state income from sales taxes, motor fuels, insurance, oil and natural gas and the franchise tax are all better than expected.

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"Texas manufacturing is coming back because of the lower value of the dollar and increasing competitiveness of U.S. exports. Consumer spending is being buoyed by confidence that the recession brought about by the collapse of oil and real estate speculation is over and that better times are ahead," Bullock

Bullock said that in June he raised his revenue estimate of 1988 major fund revenues by \$319 million in anticipation of the economic improvement, but "the economy's performance has even exceeded or expectations."

Bullock's early revenue estimate for the 1990-91 state budget shows projected state income for the next session of the Legislature will be enough to cover the cost of state services at the current level for the first time in five years.

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
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
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
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
