TEAMS Test assesses skills

For the fourth consecutive year, students in all odd-numbered grades in Texas public schools will be given statewide examinations to determine their progress in mastering the basic skills of reading, writing and mathematics.

The Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) testing program was mandated by education reforms passed by the Texas Legislature in 1984. TEAMS tests cover the basic skills of students in grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11, and the 11th grade test serving as an exit-level exam which students must pass in order to receive a diploma.


The TEAMS testing schedule for the 1988-89 school year calls for the exit-level exam (which consists of two parts, English language arts and mathematics) to be administered Oct. 25 and 26 and again on May 2 and 3. Students have four opportunities to pass the exam, beginning in their junior year.

The exam for grades 3, 5, 7 and 9 will be administered between Feb. 6 and 17, while the first grade exams will be given between April 3 and 14. School districts can choose any days between those dates to give the examinations.

Although high school students must pass the exit-level test in order to be eligible to receive a diploma, passing scores on the tests in other grades are not required for promotion, said Keith Cruse, director of student assessment for the Texas Education Agency.

"There is some misconception about passing requirements for the tests at grades 1, 3, 5, 7 and 9," Cruse said. "There are no penalties for not answering a certain number of questions correctly. The purpose of the tests is to gather information about how well students are mastering the basic skills."

Parents can learn how their child performed on TEAMS from the TEAMS Confidential Student Report, a standard report sent to all

school districts. The report shows how many objectives a student mastered on each section of the test (mathematics, reading and writing), the total number of questions answered correctly on each section, and the scaled score for each section. Another section shows whether the student demonstrated mastery of the minimum competencies for that particular grade level on each section of the exam.

"By State Board of Education rule, the school district must send home to the parents information on mastery

of specific objectives, how many questions the student answered correctly and the score on the writing test," Cruse said.

Cruse added that the best way for parents to help their children prepare for the TEAMS test is to ensure they get adequate rest and understand the purpose of the test.

"Be sure that they get a good night's sleep and understand that the purpose of the test is to help with the student's instructional program," Cruse said.

Exit Level TEAMS Registration

The spring administration of the exit level TEAMS test will be conducted on Oct 25 and Oct 26, 1988. Individuals who did not previously pass the TEAMS test but who have met all other graduation requirements will be permitted to take the appropriate section(s) of the exit level tests.

The test will be given in the high school library beginning at 8:10 a.m. Registration packets may be picked up in the school counselor's office beginning Sept. 6, 1988. Examinees will be requested to complete a registration form by September 20, 1988 in order to test. For further information, call the school counselor's office at 874-3241

Local Shop Featured in National Magazine

The *Quarter Horse Journal*, a national magazine with an audience of thousands of horse-lovers, has a feature story on a Clarendon business in the September issue. The story features James Owens and his handmade boots. The article, which portrays Clarendon as a picturesque town, should draw tourists to the area.

Owens' shop building was built in 1892. While the business itself is not that old, it is nevertheless, one of the oldest enterprises in one of the oldest towns in the Panhandle. James Owens brought the shop from Mrs. Opal Borden after the death of her husband, Pete Borden. Borden was one of several men from who James Owens learned part of the art of bootmaking. Now Owens' son, Jim, works with him in the business.

According to the article, Owens has a nation-wide clientele, including several celebrities (The article mentions several by name.) But it also emphasized that many of Owens' boots sell to working cowboys. Those boots are tough and wear well.

WTU Asks Permission to Increase Fuel Factors

West Texas Utilities Co. has asked for permission to increase fuel factors effective on January 1989 bills. In the request filed today with the Public Utility commission the company stated that the primary reason for the increase is the expiration of a 20-year gas supply contract at the Rio Pecos Power Station.

"This contract was essentially a fixed price contract which let us buy fuel at pre-1973 Oil Embargo prices," said WTU local manager Jerry Chambliss. "Compared to the average cost of fuel during the last 20 years, this 22 cents per million BTU gas will have saved our customers almost \$350 million by the time the contract expires in late December 1988," he said. That includes the period in the early 1980s when average fuel prices had reached \$4 per million BTUs before declining to \$1.95 in 1987.

The company will continue to operate its system in a way that will minimize fuel cost and is presently studying gas supply proposals. However, WYU expects to pay eight to ten times more for replacement gas than the cost of the expiring contract.

The local manager emphasized that this change is tied primarily to expiration of one contract. Since 1985 WTU has lowered the factor five times, and had six refunds totaling almost \$50 million as a result of other contract changes.

WTU filed the request four months before the effective date of the factors to allow the commission time to review the request and process it

The article did a surprisingly good job of describing the local bootmaker. It described his quiet, unassuming manner, his high standards, and his willingness to work hard. The article emphasized the high quality of Owens' handmade boots.

The article did not mention the fact that Owens won the Saints Rost Award from the Chamber of Commerce last year, nor did it mention the hours that he has donated to the Saints' Rost Museum.

Businesses like Owens' Boot Shop contribute a great deal to Clarendon's economy. Each time the shop sells a pair of boots for someone outside the area, it brings money into the local economy. Fortunately, Clarendon has been blessed with a number of such export-oriented businesses, and the money that they have brought into the community is a major factor in the difference between Clarendon and many once-comparable cities that are now almost ghost-towns.

through necessary channels.

Under the request a typical residential customer using 635 kilowatt-hours a month would see an increase of \$2.97 or 5.7 percent per month on the electric bill.

Fuel factors cover the cost of boiler fuel used to make electricity. All other costs essentially are covered in base rates and can only be changed through a lengthy rate case proceeding. The company's last rate increase went into effect in January of this year. WTU officials do not anticipate the need for a rate increase in the foreseeable future although there could be some changes in the fuel factor as prices change.

READY OR NOT HERE I COME!

We have all played hide and seek at one time or another. Remember how it's played? One person closes his or her eyes and begins to count. One...Two...Three...Four...Five...

The others in the game scramble to find hiding places. Your heart pounds and mind races as you crunch your body down into the tightest place you can find. Trying hard not to be too conspicuous you freeze, not moving a muscle. Ninety-seven... Ninety-eight...Ninety nine...One Hundred. "Ready or not, here I come!" You hear the cry ring out across the yard. You see some of your friends still trying desperately to hide themselves. Some are even unaware that the game has begun. You hear cries of disappointment as many of your friends are found. You hold your breath hoping you won't be next.

Wasn't that game always fun to play? Remember the excitement, the laughter, the disappointment, and the sheer terror when you were found? "Hide and Seek" But aren't we still playing it today?

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
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

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Rx Ulcer Medicines

Ulcers are open sores that develop in the mucosal lining of the stomach and small intestine, with the duodenum (first portion of the small intestine) being the most common site. Gastric (stomach) and duodenal (small intestine) ulcers result from the corrosive action of hydrochloric acid and pepsinogen, digestive juices secreted from the lining of the stomach.

Nondrug approaches to ulcer treatment include discontinuation of smoking and alcohol ingestion, dietary changes, rest, and learning how to handle excessive levels of stress.

Popular antacid formulas contain aluminum hydroxide, calcium carbonate, and various forms of magnesium. Antacids have been used for decades to neutralize excessive acid.

Prescription medicines are also used to treat ulcers. Coating agents such as sucralfate appear to bind to gastrointestinal tissue and form a protective coating over ulcers. Special antihistamines (H2 receptor blockers) including cimetidine and ranitidine reduce the secretion of acid and pepsinogen into the stomach. Anticholinergics such as propantheline block the action of acetylcholine, thereby decreasing the stimulation of stomach acid production.

In executing the campaign, McStay/Regian is producing a series of television commercials that are filmed in different locations around Texas. The "Chicken Stampede" spot currently being seen statewide was shot on a ranch near Weatherford. Previous spots include "The Dude," filmed on a dude ranch in the Hill Country, "Blizzard," shot in Amarillo, and "Banana Split," shot beside Houston's ship channel.

More recently, some 200 townspeople in Athens were extras in a DQ commercial for the Beltbuster that celebrates the town's annual hamburger festival, and the entire populace of Earth was invited to be part of a new spot for the DQ Country Basket. These commercials will be seen later in the Fall.

The "This Is DQ Country" theme also led to the association with spokesman Bob Phillips. Phillips, producer and star of Texas Country Reporter that originates at WFAA-TV in Dallas was looking for a sponsor to take his program into statewide syndication at the same time McStay/Regian was searching for the right spokesman for Dairy Queen. It was a natural match. Phillips had built a credible image with more than 16 years of presenting programs about rural Texas to television audiences, and Dairy Queen had a statewide presence with its family oriented restaurants.

Dairy Queen is Texas Country Reporter's sponsor and Phillips, who logs about 90,000 miles annually searching for tales of small-town Texas, does much of his traveling in a Dairy Queen - decorated van. In his years of wandering down Texas back roads, Phillips says he has eaten a bunch of Dairy Queen meals. His favorite DQ refreshment is a chocolate chip Blizzard with a dollop of hot fudge. "The hot fudge cools down and hardens a bit inside the ice cream and it's just heaven," he says.

Phillips says he learned long ago the role of a Dairy Queen in small Texas towns. "We'll go into a small town looking for somebody but not knowing exactly where they live," he explains. "If we don't have exact directions, we always stop and ask the Dairy Queen operator. They always know where everybody lives."

Mitchie Fuston, local Dairy Queen manager stated, "we really appreciate our local customers and invite everyone to visit with us."

As many as 36 million people in the United States suffer the stiffness and pain of more than 100 different forms of arthritis. The two most common types are rheumatoid arthritis and osteoarthritis.

Another type of arthritis, rheumatoid arthritis, is a long-lasting disease in which chemicals in the joint damage the surface. Rheumatoid arthritis develops in joints throughout the body. It usually occurs in people between the ages of 20 and 30, but can occur in anyone. Symptoms include weakness, fever, and appetite and weight loss.

Pain in the joint begins as mild discomfort then progresses to severe pain. The pain and swelling develops because bone ends become rough and begin to wear.

If you have any signs of developing arthritis, TMA advises you to contact your physician for proper diagnosis and treatment.
