Hospital Fund Goal Reached

The news that Hall County residents and friends of Hall County Hospital reached a goal of \$366,000 Saturday, October 20 to save Hall County Hospital.

Reports are coming in this week that the Associated Press wire story about the fete have run in most major newspapers, radio and television all over the state and is spreading nation-wide.

A celebration was held October 22 shortly after 5 p.m. that the fund drive went over the time shortly before 4:00 p.m. climaxed one of the most remarkable fund raisers in this or any county's history in order to keep a hospital's doors from closing.

The crowd at Saturday's celebration has been estimated at 400, but if you considered how many cars were also coming and going the activity probably involved another 100 or so.

It took over six weeks to raise the money, and efforts are continuing to raise the Phase II goal of \$500,000 as this weekend the final truck stop is being held at Cyclone Stadium parking lot. Plans call for the Truck Stop to be open Thursday night to midnight, Friday night after the football game all night and all day Saturday.

Other fund raisers of which Postal Regulations prohibit newspapers from writing about are also being planned.

The initial drive to raise \$366,000 for the local hospital met with mixed response in the beginning, and the drive possibly involved somewhere in the neighborhood on p. 2.

Funeral services for Thomas Earl Naylor, Jr., age 61, were held at 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 1, 1988 in the First Baptist Church in Hedley with Rev. Bryan Knowles, Former Pastor and Dr. Winfred Moore, Pastor of the First Baptist Church in Amarillo, officiating. Interment was in Rowe Cemetery with arrangements under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors.

Mr. Naylor died at approximately 8:00 p.m. on Friday, October 28, 1988 at his residence 5 miles northwest of Hedley after becoming entangled in a hay baling machine. He was pronounced dead at the scene at 11:05 p.m. by Justice of the Peace M. O. Weatherly. He was born August 20, 1927 at the Naylor Community and had lived in Donley County all of his life except from 1954 to 1969 when he lived in Moore County. He married Faye Owens on November 14, 1948 at Hedley. He had been a farmer most of his life. He was a Veteran of World War II, a member of the National Rifle Association, a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, and a member of the First Baptist Church in Hedley.

Plan To Party Smart

Like most products, beer is best enjoyed in moderation, a fact many adults sometimes forget. Beer Drinkers of America, a non-profit consumer education organization, urges anyone who drinks alcohol to remember these Ten Tips for Smarter Partying and Hipper Hosting next time they host or attend a party.

1. Know Your Limit—Stay Within It

Many factors affect how much you can safely drink: how much you weigh, whether or not you are in good health, if you've had something to eat, and whether you are tired or refreshed.

2. Know What You Are Drinking

Different drinks contain different amounts of alcohol. A frozen daiquiri, for example, contains twice the alcohol of a glass of wine. A martini has twice as much alcohol as most light beers.

3. Designate a Driver

Then rely only on that non-drinking person to provide transportation for the evening.

4. Don't Let a Friend Drive Drunk

If a friend has been drinking too much, don't let him or her drive. You may have to take away the keys. He may get angry. But you might save your friend's life.

5. Call a Cab

Impound charges, attorney's fees and DWI fines cost far more than cab fare.

6. Food for Thought

Food slows down alcohol absorption. So, if you host a party, serve plenty of food—the higher in protein and carbohydrates the better. Cheese and nuts are good choices. Offer some alcohol-free beverages too.



7. A Good Host Is a Good Friend

You may have to provide transportation for guests who need it. If that isn't practical, offer a place for guests to spend the night.

8. Last Call for Alcohol...But the Party Isn't Over

As the host, you control the bar. Close it at least an hour before the end of the party and offer your guests a new round of interesting food and alcohol-free drinks before they leave.

9. Care Enough to Save a Life

If you have a friend who appears to have a drinking problem, talk to him or her...when sober. Offer your support and friendship, and urge that he or she seek professional help.

10. The Kids Are Watching

Remember that children imitate the behavior of their parents and other adults. Make sure your actions set an example which emphasizes responsible behavior.

hood of 2,500 donors making more than token contributions to the drive.

Saturday night, most citizens watch news accounts on the three Amarillo TV stations about the "We Did It" celebration. Hall County has been visited by national news magazine photographers, television's 20-20, and C&N is due to show up soon.

About 400 people, including a marching band, color guard, elderly people in wheelchairs, and school children in Halloween costumes, marched three times around the town square Saturday in the town of 5,000 people to celebrate reaching the goal.

"We did it!" yelled the crowd as a giant check for \$366,000, signed "Those Who Cared", was given to Pat Godfrey, chairman of the hospital board, amid the din of honking car horns and blaring sirens.

"I almost can't believe we did it," Memphis resident Orvilla Evans said. "But we really wanted to save our hospital."

A sense of pride among Hall County residents marked a turnaround from early September, when an analysis team from Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital found that the hospital wouldn't survive much longer in the face of declining patient loads, fewer doctors and shrinking Medicare payments, problems that have caused the closure of more than two dozen rural Texas hospitals since 1984.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor and Citizens of Clarendon:

I was appalled Monday at the number of sight-seers at the train-car wreck. I have been a member of the Clarendon EMS for a year now and cannot believe the way the local people insist on going to the accident scene and get in the way of the emergency service team members.

I was in my private car on the way to the scene and could not cross the West-bound lanes of Hwy. 287 because of the number of vehicles who had the intersection blocked while the drivers tried to see what is going on. I know they did not realize that I had a right to be there but the rescue van was coming up behind me with full lights and sirens and they still did not get in any hurry to move out of the way.

I will not name names but almost feel like I should because I know several of you and am very disappointed that you got in the way of our rescue efforts. One man came right up to the car and tried to tell the rescue team how to do their extrication. This man is not a trained rescuer and had no business telling the firemen how to do theirs. Our firemen have had extensive training on how to extricate a patient. Let them do their job without interference. Another local man stood right in the middle of the back of the ambulance when the attendants tried to load the patient and was asking if the patient was a man or a woman. There were children (with their parents right beside them) laying on the track underneath the train trying to see what was going on.

I cannot believe the things I saw and Monday's accident was not the first time I have seen such insensitivity by onlookers. I have assisted in working a code where I had to break through the crowd

running between the house and ambulance to get equipment and supplies. I have had to have onlookers move their vehicles from behind the ambulance so I could leave the scene with my patient. Those of you who are guilty of such things ask yourself if you were the patient would you want a bunch of lollygaggers hampering the efforts of your emergency team? If the answer is "no" then think twice before you go running to the next accident scene.

If you have a scanner stay home and listen to it, you'll eventually get the answers—you don't have to rush to the scene the minute you hear the call come over the scanner. And, if you feel you must go to the scene please stay way back and out of the way of the emergency personnel.

I have one more request—please don't quiz the emergency personnel for gory details afterwards. We have feelings too and it

hurts when we lose a patient or have a patient who is seriously ill or injured. We have to put those hurt feelings behind us so we are ready for the next call and it is hard to do that when we are constantly berated by your questions.

Thank you for letting me air my feelings.

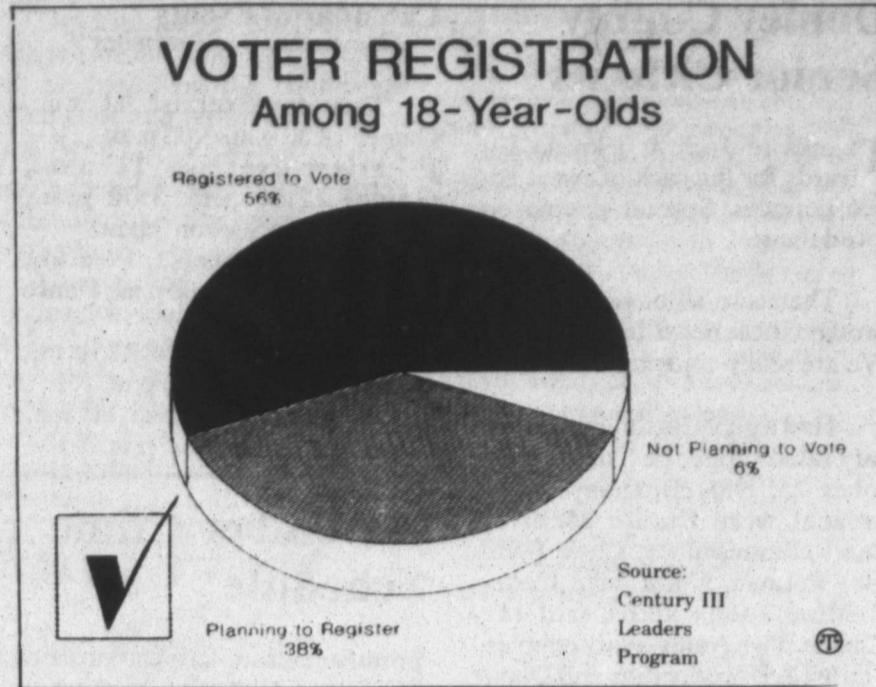

Immunization Clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled in Clarendon, November 28 from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at the Donley County Community Action office at 100 Sully.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, and mumps. Influenza vaccine will be available at area clinics.

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

Hotel Rooms for Cancer Patients

The Amarillo Unit of the American Cancer Society, in conjunction with Amarillo hotels and motels, is helping to meet the lodging needs of cancer patients.

The Guestroom Program is a cooperative effort that provides complimentary housing for needy cancer patients and their family members who come to Amarillo from the outlying areas of the Texas Panhandle, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Kansas for treatment, reported David Rau, volunteer chairperson for the Guestroom Program.

"The program was designed to ease the physical, emotional, and financial hardships that occur when a patient has to travel great distances for treatment," said Mr. Rau.

The American Cancer Society is working with fourteen hotels and motels who have agreed to participate in the program. Qualified patients stay in only one hotel which is selected on a rotating basis.

"Cancer patients undergoing radiation therapy may need up to six weeks of housing," added Mr. Rau. "The hotels have been very generous to donate the rooms for the needed time period."

A review committee evaluates each case to ensure proper placement and need. Two days advanced notice is required to coordinate placement with the participating hotel.

Hotels and motels participating in the A.C.S. Guestroom Program include the Amarillo Hilton, Big Texan Inn, Camelot Inn, Days Inn, Fifth Season Inn East, Fifth Season Inn West, Hampton Inn, Howard Johnsons East, La Quinta Inn Coulter, La Quinta Inn-Amarillo Medical Center, Los Cuartos Inn, Quality Inn Westgate, and the Sheraton Amarillo Hotel and Towers.

ASCS News

The Disaster Assistance Act of 1988 provides that:

Producers requesting disaster payments or deficiency payment forgiveness for a crop must purchase multi-peril crop insurance for 1989 if the crop's actual production is less than 35 percent of the expected production and multi-peril insurance is available in the county for the crop:

1. Is greater than 125 percent of the average premium rate for the 1988 crop in the county.

2. Is greater than 25 percent of the highest of the following for the crop: a. Disaster payment, b. Advance deficiency payment forgiveness, c. FmHA emergency loan.

FCIC has extended the insurance sales closing date for all 1989 fall seeded small grains to October 31, 1988.

All producers need to be aware that:

Disaster payments shall not be paid nor 1988 advance deficiency payment refunds forgiven, if multi-peril insurance is, required and not obtained.

The fact that a sales closing date has passed shall not be an eligible condition for granting a waiver of multi-peril insurance requirements.

Acres reports and production evidence must be submitted in a timely manner to allow County committee's to make insurance requirement determinations before applicable insurance closing dates.

Disaster payments will be available to eligible producers on

losses which are greater than 35 percent of their normal production.

Eligible producers with crop losses greater than 65 percent of their normal production must agree to purchase multi-peril crop insurance under the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation for the 1989 crop for which disaster payments are made. This requirement may be waived under certain conditions.

Disaster applications for crop losses must be filed in this office not later than March 31, 1989. Acceptable crop acreage certifications and production evidence must also be furnished.

Payments will be calculated by determining the amount of loss below 65 percent of the crops normal production and multiplying the eligible loss by the applicable disaster payment rate. There are two payment levels: 1. 90 percent of the payment rate for losses in excess of 75 percent of normal production. 2. 65 percent of the payment rate for losses between 35 and 75 percent of normal production.

For computing payments, the target price will be used for producers of wheat, feed grains, and upland cotton who are participating in the 1988 program and for producers who are not enrolled in these programs, the county loan rate will be used.

If you have suffered a crop loss due to drought, hail, excessive moisture, including insect infestation or plant disease resulting from these perils please check with this office concerning your eligibility.

One important factor to consider is that if the final deficiency payment on a participating program crop is less than what the advance payment rate was, those payments may be retained if the crop produces less than its normal yield not to exceed 35 percent of the expected production. If you did not request advance payments, you may do so by November 1, 1988. To qualify a disaster application must be filed and production evidence furnished.

A limitation on the total annual payments that a "person" may receive under agricultural programs and prescribed rules for payment limitation has been modified. The modifications to the payment limitation provisions brought about by the 1987 Act have effectively implemented a payment "eligibility" program as well as a payment "limitation" program.

The statute now requires that before any "person" is eligible to receive any payment subject to the new rules, such "person" must be "actively engaged in farming."

A "person" may be many things: an individual farmer, an individual who is a member of a joint operation, a corporation, a joint stock company, an association, a limited partnership, a trust, an estate, or a charitable organization. A state and all of its political subdivisions and agencies are considered as one "person" and therefore are jointly eligible for only one limitation. A joint operation (general partnership or joint venture) is not a "person", neither is a cooperative association of producers that markets commodities for producers.

A husband and wife may be separate "persons" if they can show that each of them brought separate farming operations into their marriage and have maintained them as separate operations throughout their marriage.

A cash rent tenant will be combined as one "person" with the owner of the land being rented unless the tenant makes a significant contribution of labor or a significant contribution of management and a significant contribution of equipment to the farming operation.

Because all "persons" are required to be "actively engaged in farming" before any payments may be issued, producers applying for payments will need to provide information to the County Committee to substantiate their active engagement in farming. Providing such information is voluntary but if information is not provided, the County ASC Committee will not be able to make an "actively engaged in farming" determination and the producer will be ineligible to receive any payments.

Generally, in order to be determined "actively engaged in farming" a "person" has to make a significant contribution of capital, land, and/or equipment to their farming operation, as well as, a significant management.

The Act now provides that no individual may receive payments subject to these new rules from no more than three entities in which the individual holds "substantial beneficial interest if the individual is not receiving payments as an individual or from more than two en-

titles if the individual is receiving payments as an individual.

Determinations of "actively engaged in farming" and "person" will be based on the conditions which exist in a farming operation as of April 1, or such other date as may be announced by the Deputy Administrator, State and County Operations.

County ASC Committees are required to make an initial determination regarding "actively engaged in farming" and "persons" within 60 days of the date the producer provides the necessary information to make such determinations.

coat thoroughly. Press the mixture into a greased 13 x 9 x 2" pan. Cool and cut into squares. It's a grand slam!

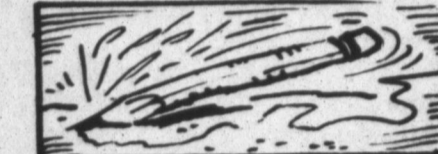

Meeting was adjourned. Hostesses were Rene Stroud and Tammy Taylor.

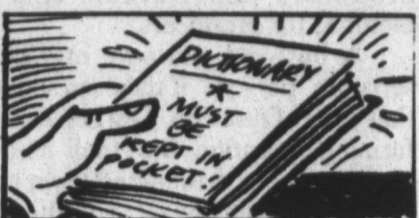

Tony Bramblet is in the Veterans Hospital in Amarillo. Best Wishes to Tony for a speedy recovery.

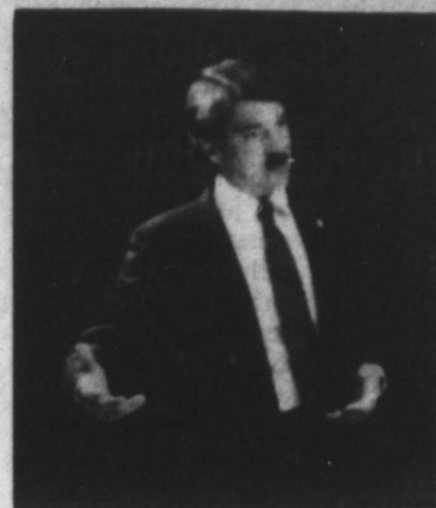
T. E. Naylor was fatally injured in a farm machinery accident at his home on Friday night Oct. 8th.

Doorposts

Deuteronomy 6:7-9

What's in a name?

by Jon Leggitt

Better late than never. So goes an old saying. This is the twenty-seventh article Mack and I have written under the title "Doorposts," and we thought it was about time to comment upon our choice of a name for this column.

If you are a regular reader of "Doorposts," you have probably looked up the scripture reference which heads our article each week: Deuteronomy 6:7-9. Those verses read:

"And thou shalt teach them (God's words) diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up.

And thou shalt bind them for a sign upon thine hand, and they shall be as frontlets between thine eyes.

And thou shalt write them upon the posts of thy house, and on thy gates.

Religious profession is absolutely useless unless it is translated into practice. A true faith will be practiced daily, and will have at least three characteristics. First, it will be a heartfelt faith. The verse just preceding those quoted above says, "And these words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart." To the Hebrews, the heart meant very much what we mean today when we use the word "mind". God's laws are to have the full consent of the mind and the implementation of the will.

Secondly, a true faith will be personal. These verses tell us that the Word is to be enshrined in "thine heart," taught to "thy children," and talked about in "thine house." Corporate worship and group activities are essential, but they must not take the place of the precious, intimate, personal fellowship with God.

A true faith is, in the third place, a witnessing faith. God's ways are to be taught to the children of the home. They are to

God-fearing home to its own members, to its guests, and to the strangers who pass its gates.

The eighth and ninth verses were, in later times, taken quite literally by the Jews. Portions of scripture, especially verses from this sixth chapter of Deuteronomy, were worn on the person and attached to the doorposts of their homes. Too literal, you say? Too legalistic? Possibly. But in a day when advertisements on billboards and in neon lights, on radio and television, and in all the other media hawk Satan's wares all around us, it's no wonder that so many young people (and not-so-young people) turn to these things. The devil's merchandise greets our youth on every hand. God wants His Word to be taught to His people just like that. It should greet them at every turn. Why? Because our hearts are prone to forget God and His ways. "Be on guard lest you forget the Lord" says the twelfth verse.

What's in a name? Mack and I hope that "Doorposts" has helped, and will continue to help remind that God's ways is the only way to live, and we pray that, for as long as this column runs, it will serve no other purpose than to lift up "that Name which is above every Name," the beautiful Name of Jesus Christ.

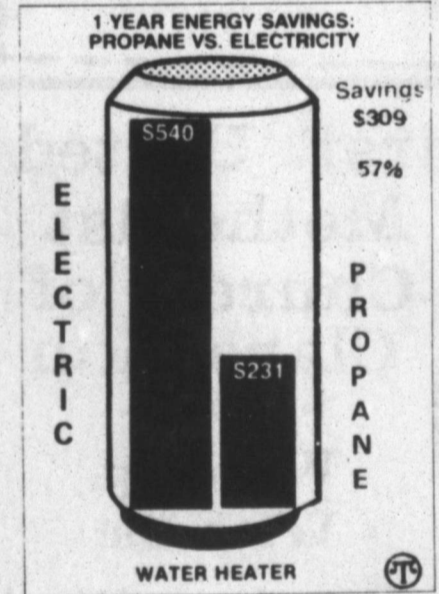

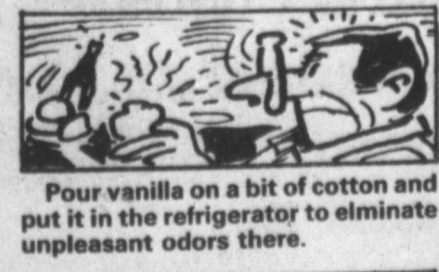

September Statewide Unemployment Coasts at 7.1 Percent

Unemployment in Texas rose slightly from 6.7 percent in August to 7.1 percent in September, according to statistics released today by the Texas Employment Commission. Last September unemployment was 8.5 percent.

"There are more than 100,000 Texans employed today than there were a year ago," said Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers of the Texas Employment Commission. "The nonfarm labor force now totals nearly 7.8 million Texans."

Nabers said she believes the state economy will continue to slowly, steadily improve in the months ahead. "In September most new jobs came from hirings in the government and services sectors. We saw minor increases in transportation and public utilities and in the nondurable goods segment of manufacturing," she said.

Texas metropolitan areas with the lowest September unemployment rates were Bryan-College Station, at 4.3 percent; Lubbock, at 5.0 percent; Midland, at 5.7 percent; Dallas, at 5.7 percent; Abilene and Austin, both at 5.8 percent; Amarillo, at 5.9 percent; Fort Worth-Arlington, San Angelo and Wichita Falls, all at 6.1 percent; Waco, at 6.5 percent; Houston, at 6.6 percent; Victoria, at 6.7 percent, and Sherman-Denison, at 6.9 percent.

Those areas with September unemployment rates above the state average were McAllen-Edinburg-Mission, at 18.0 percent; Brownsville-Harlingen, at 12.4 percent; Laredo, at 12.1 percent; El Paso, at 11.1 percent; Beaumont-Port Arthur, at 10.1 percent; Corpus Christi, at 8.9 percent; Galveston-Texas City, at 8.4 percent; Longview-Marshall, at 8.3 percent; San Antonio, at 7.8 percent; Brazoria and Killeen-Temple, both at 7.7 percent; Odessa, at 7.6 percent, and Tyler, at 7.4 percent.
