J. G. McDougal, President Of Hedley Bank Resided In Donley 37 Years

J. G. McDougal, 66, co-founder of the town of Hedley and president of the Security State bank there, died in a Memphis hospital Sunday morning at 1 o'clock.

A resident of Donley county for 37 years, McDougal was prominent in civic affairs and was one of the founders of the bank of which he was president for 25 years.

He was born January 12, 1872. He moved to the Indian territory from Kemper county, Mississippi, in 1890 and to Texas in 1901. He married Miss Mattie Pyle about 30 years ago. She died in August,

Funeral services were conducted from the First Baptist church in Hedley Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock with the Rev. M. E. Wells, LELIA LAKE CREEK pastor, officiating. Interment was made in the Hedley cemetery.

This, the last herd of wild buffalo in the Panhandle was caught near the XIT pasture on Coldwater creek, north of where the town of Stratford now stands.






