### All 4-H'ers Can Enjoy A Dog Project

Whether living in the city or on the farm, a 4-H member can take part in the 4-H dog care and training program and gain valuable learning experiences.

All 4-H members can benefit from this program, said Terry Floyd, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It enables any youngster with an interest in animals to learn responsibility and basic care and management practices.

Specific objectives of the dog care and training program are these: 1. To learn about major dog breeds and be able to identify their characteristics; 2. To study the responsibilities of dog ownership; 3. To demonstrate dog care and management in feeding, care, han-

dling, grooming and and fitting; 4. To keep records of all costs and management practices; 5. To learn and follow dog health regulations, including first aid and simple treatments for ailments not requiring veterinary attention; 6. To train a dog to follow simple commands; 7. To understand the role of scientific research in dog husbandry; 8. To develop sportsmanship, cooperation, decision-making ability and public speaking skills through participation in demonstrations, tours, judging and exhibits.

4-H'ers in the program can exhibit their animals at various dog shows over the state, including the annual State 4-H Dog Show, to compete for awards, Floyd said. Also, those who excel in the program can win awards provided by Ralston Purina Co., including an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago each fall for one member per state and six scholarships at the national level.

## WTU Puts Lower Winter Rates into Effect

Customers of West Texas Utilities Co. will see approximately a 12.5 percent drop in their rates beginning this month (November). The reduction is the result of using the lower winter rates, which will be in effect six months. Using higher summer and lower winter rates is part of the States' plan to encourage energy conservation during the summer when air conditioning creates the peak demand on electricity use.

According to WTU local manager Jerry Chambliss, a residential customer using 476 kilowatt hours of electricity a month, the average for November 1987, will see his bill go from \$43.53 to \$38.02. Other customer groups will see similar reductions, Chambliss said. Since mild fall weather has reduced many customers' cooling and heating use, the actual decrease in the electric bill from September when average use was 906 KWH to November will probably be around 50 percent. That decrease includes the combined impact of lower winter rates and lower use resulting from mild weather. The actual size of a

customers' bill is determined by their use.

According to the local manager, the electric company is still waiting for final approval from the Public Utility Commission regarding a request to change the fuel portion of the bill. Fuel is used at power plants to make electricity.

Although the average cost of fuel on the company's many fuel contracts has not changed significantly, WTU faces a December

expiration of a very low cost 20-year gas contract at one of its nine power stations. That was for gas at pre-oil embargo prices of 22 cents per mmbtu and has saved customers \$350 million. It must be replaced with gas at today's prices which are almost \$2 per mmbtu.

Paying for this replacement gas will mean customers using 476 kilowatt hours of electricity will see an increase of approximately \$2.95 on the January bill if the PUC com-

pletes its review and approval process by then.

The local manager added that since 1985 WTU has lowered the fuel portion of the bill—called the fuel factor—five times, and had six refunds totaling almost \$50 million as the results of other fuel contract changes.

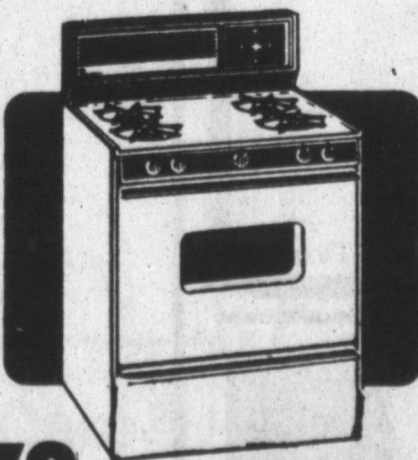



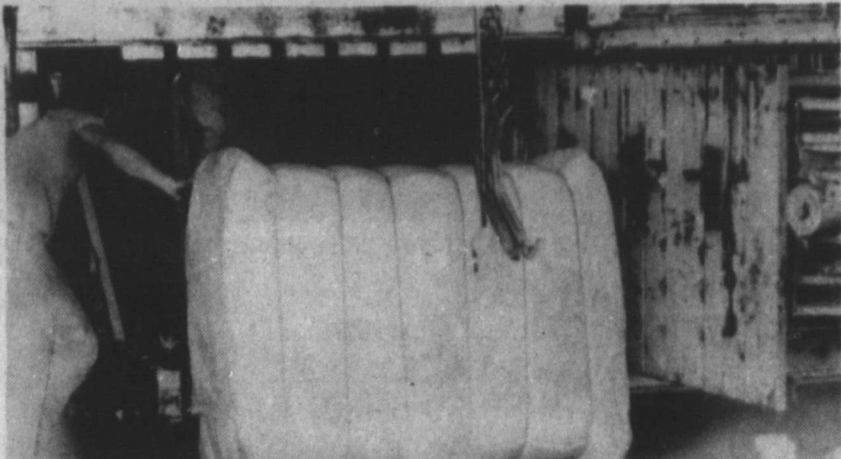

### Remove Insecticide Ear Tags Each Fall

Cattlemen who use insecticide ear tags for horn fly and ear tick control should remove the old tags during the fall roundup.

"Tags that have been attached to an animal for four to five months will not emit sufficient insecticide to adequately control the total fly populations," said Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

During the past three fly seasons, use of pyrethroid impregnated ear tags has created a statewide problem with insecticide resistance to all currently labeled pyrethroids for the horn fly.

The ear tag system for fly control exerts a constant selection pressure on the pest population and results in killing the weakest and most susceptible pests. Other pests which have the genetic ability to survive a sub-lethal dose of insecticide become parents for the next pest generation.
