Signup for 1989 Farm Program

Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Ling announced that the signup period for the 1989 Farm Program for wheat, feed grain, and upland cotton will begin December 19, 1988 and continue through April 14, 1989.

During the signup, producers may request (wheat and feed grain at 40 percent/ cotton 30 percent) an advance deficiency payment. These payments will be all in cash. Advance payments will be limited to the producer's intended program acreage. These payments will not be made until a new person determination has been processed by the COC. It is very important that these payment limitation forms be completed as soon as possible and filed in this office.

The restaurant will feature char-broiled steaks and Mexican food.

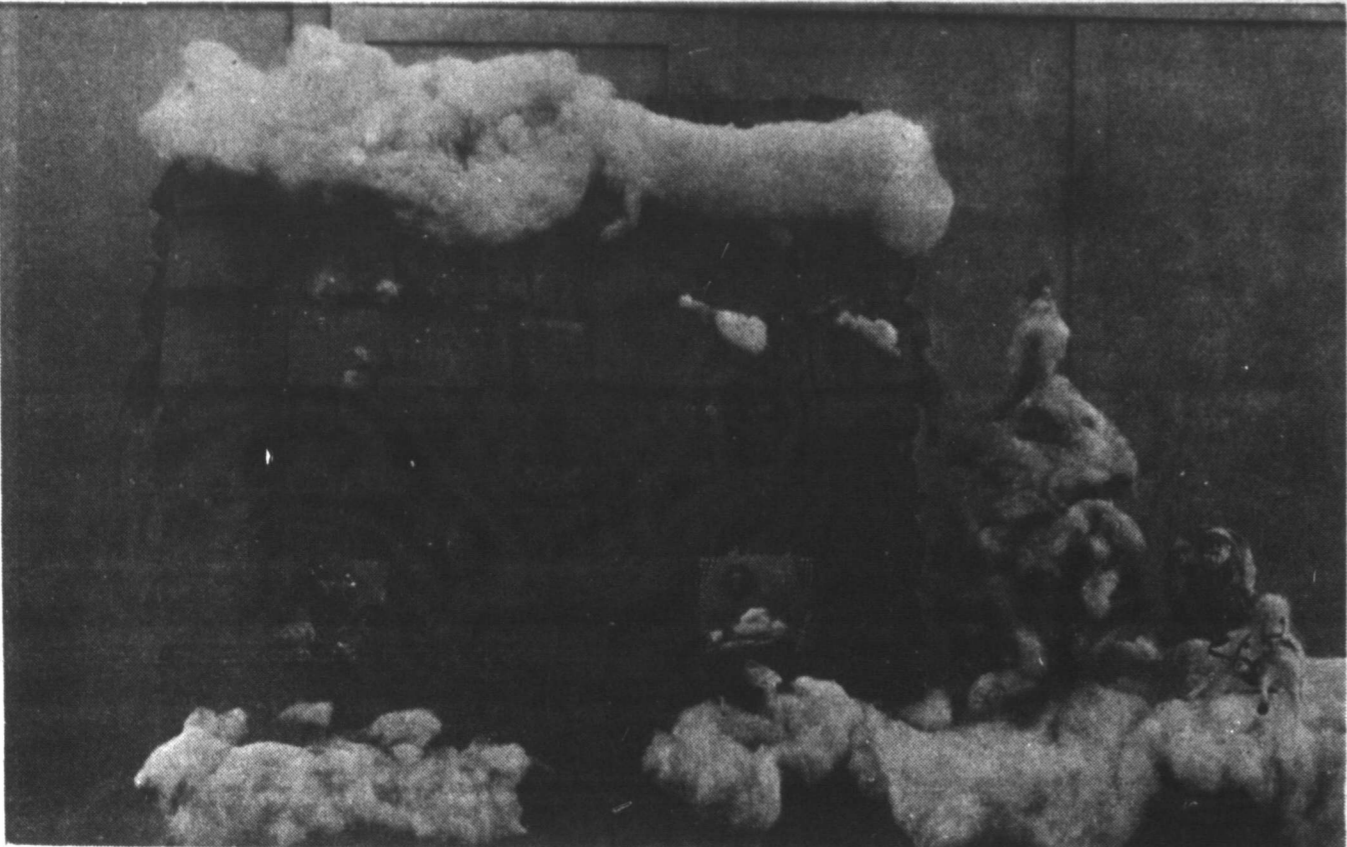

Firearms Safety

It's a safe bet that there will be more than a few long boxes under tree on Christmas morning. A new shotgun for Dad, a new deer rifle for Brother or maybe that first .22 rimfire for "squirrel". Hunting firearms are a traditional gift in outdoors-oriented homes. But with this gift comes an awesome set of responsibilities.

Back when I watched for long boxes under the tree, new guns came with a little yellow flier entitled "The Ten Commandments of Firearm Safety." Later, I saw them again when I received my certification as a state firearms safety instructor. The "Ten Commandments" is an excellent distillation of basic gun safety, and I'm pleased to report a growing number of states require the completion of a firearms or hunting safety course before a hunting license is issued.

However, simply reading a list of rules or completing a firearms safety course does not make one accident- or bullet-proof!

Only when those rules are consciously and constantly applied and when safety is paramount in the firearm user's mind is one truly handling a firearm in a safe and responsible manner.

I won't recite the "Ten Commandments" here nor try to teach a firearms safety course. I will, however, list my own basic principles of safe firearms use.

- Keep the muzzle pointed in a safe direction AT ALL TIMES. This one principle will avoid most major catastrophes. This prohibits holding a firearm in the crook of your arm and waving the muzzle about as you turn, pulling an "un-

loaded" firearm toward yourself, as well as deliberate pointing. Always be muzzle conscious!

- All guns may be loaded, even your own. Remember, you are not infallible. The first thing to do when you pick up a firearm is to check the action. If the firearm is unfamiliar to you, ask for assistance; don't fumble around with it!

- Don't trust the safety. On most modern firearms the safety blocks the trigger, not the firing pin. It keeps the trigger from being pulled inadvertently by a twig or a careless finger. It does not mean the gun cannot fire! The only "safe" mode for a sporting firearm is when its action is open.

This is by no means a complete list of rules. It doesn't even begin to cover the many contingencies of the hunting field. However, it does cover the basics of safe gun handling that are equally important to veterans as to novices.

But rules and safety procedures only work if they are applied. Perhaps one of the greatest hidden dangers in firearms use is the complacency that comes with many years in the field or with the successful completion of a safety course. No one is immune to an accident with a tool, with a firearm or with a vehicle if he lets his attention wander away from the safe and proper principles of its use.

Letter to the Editor

from Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox

The State song "Texas Our Texas" may someday have to be changed to "Texas Their Texas" if we do not act soon to reverse the trend of foreign ownership of Texas businesses.

In the last twelve months, we have seen control of our major banks move from Texas to New York, Chicago, and North Carolina.

McCorp, the last of Texas' large bank holding companies, is struggling to remain a Texas property. The other gigantic Texas bank holding companies, that faced massive loan defaults, fell to bailouts by out-of-state banking interests.

Now an even more ominous cloud is on our economic horizon.

Recently, the Antitrust Division of the Attorney General's Office received complaints regarding Texaco's sale to Saudi Arabia of half of its refinery operations, including its Port Arthur refinery.

This sale will adversely affect the ability of independent Texas businesses to compete in local markets and put thousands of employees at the mercy of foreign interests with no lasting ties to our state.

However terrible the results of such an acquisition, there are no state laws designed to stop or even detect such takeovers by foreign interests and the state's antitrust laws do not provide the answer to this problem.

This is just one of many significant acquisitions by foreign investors in our state. The economic downturn in the Texas economy has resulted in bargain-basement prices for our businesses and property, and has made the easy targets for anyone with money to invest.

Internationally, as the dollar becomes weaker and weaker, and our trade balance worsens, the result will be increased foreign ownership of the vital industries of our state.

The solution to the problem of foreign ownership of our vital industries will not be easy. A recent bill in the United States Congress by Rep. John Bryant would have required reporting of foreign ownership. Unfortunately, the bill died in the Senate.

State Representative Paul Colbert has announced that a similar

Clarendon Farmers Can Learn About New Crops, New Markets

Clarendon farmers have the opportunity to learn about better ways of marketing, and producing, traditional vegetable crops, as well as new alternative vegetables and strawberries at the 1989 West Texas Vegetable Conference in Hereford, Jan. 17.

The program will be held in the Hereford Community Center, 100 Avenue C at Park Avenue, at 8:30 a.m. More than a score of scientists and experienced growers and shippers will address the theme, "Profitable Alternatives."

"For growers who are serious about the vegetable business, this program will present vital, practical information they can use to make profitable decisions for 1989 and beyond," said Dr. Roland E. Roberts, vegetable specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and conference coordinator.

The session will open with an update on research to improve one of the area's major vegetable crops, potatoes, and on a new entry into the marketplace, the Texsprout mungbean. This will be presented by Dr. Creighton Miller, professor of horticulture with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES), College Station, and Doug Smallwood, TAES research associate, Lubbock.

Other specialty crops for Texas will be discussed by Tom Longbrake, Extension Service horticulturist, College Station. Getting a profitable mix of specialty crops

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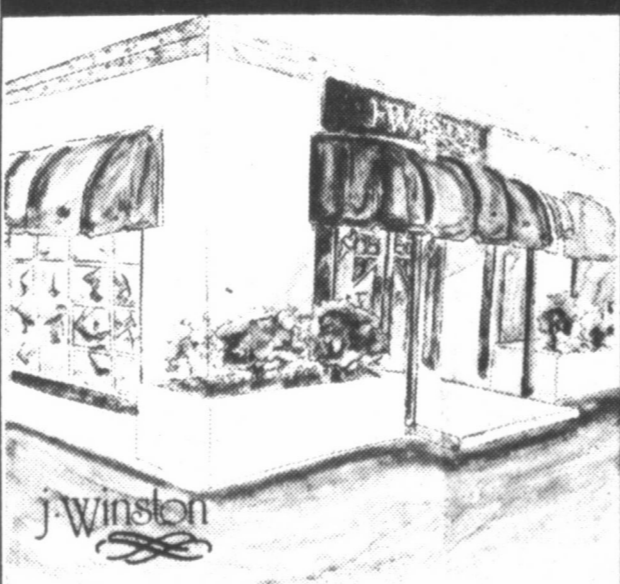

Wheat and feed grain producers may elect to participate in an optional diversion program (0/92) which they devote all or a portion of the wheat and feed grain permitted acreage to a conversing use (CU) and receive deficiency payments on an acreage not to exceed 92 percent of the crops permitted acreage. The deficiency payments rate on the CU acreage will not be less than the estimated deficiency payment. Upland cotton producers may participate in the 50/92 program.

During this sign up, but ending February 3, 1989, producers can declare their intentions to plant from 10 to 25 percent of each program crops permitted acreage to soybeans or sunflowers and still protect that program crops acreage base history.

Wheat- Target Price is 4.10%; Loan Rate is 2.06%; Acreage Reduction is 10%.

Sorghum- Target Price is 2.70%; Loan Rate is 1.75%; Acreage Reduction is 10%.

Cotton- Target Price is .734%; Loan Rate is .500%; Acreage Reduction is 25%.

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PMS Responds to Different Therapies

The symptoms associated with PMS (Premenstrual Syndrome) are numerous and include depression, bloating, headache, irritability, sleeping difficulties, and breast tenderness. Medicines that have been advocated for the relief of PMS symptoms include nonprescription pain relievers, anti-inflammatory agents, various hormones, certain vitamins, diuretics, and antihistamines.

Vitamin B-6 and vitamin/mineral supplement combinations have been used with varying success in PMS. In one study reported in *The Journal of Reproductive Medicine*, women who took six daily doses of a vitamin and mineral supplement received significant reductions in PMS symptoms as compared to women in the study who took only two doses each day or women who took placebo supplements (no active ingredients).

Pain reliever medicines such as aspirin, ibuprofen, and mefenamic acid decrease the production of prostaglandins by the body. Prostaglandins, which are often found to be excessive in PMS, are hormones that sensitize the body's pain receptors. Hormones that are sometimes effective against PMS symptoms include progesterone and the hormones found in oral contraceptive medicines.

bill will be introduced in the Texas Legislature. Other approaches are also possible. However, the time to act is now.

We must require the reporting of foreign ownership. It is not a solution in itself, but such information is necessary if the extent of the problem is to be understood and an immediate remedy is to be found.

Of course, the ultimate solution is a strong Texas economy built on a diversified industrial base. A strong economy will be disinclined and resistant to foreign ownership.

A cooperative effort by the citizenry, business, industry and government can keep Texas our Texas.

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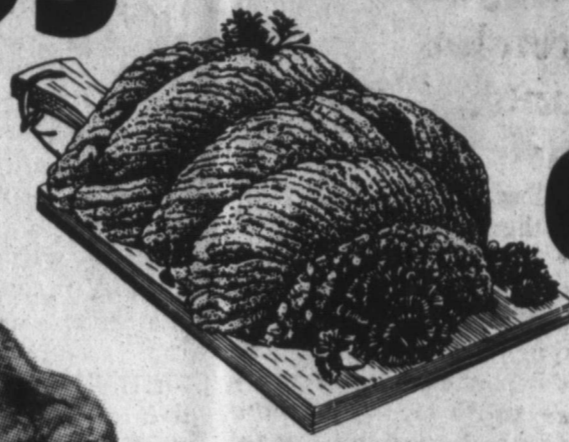
