Emergency personnel were called to the home of Jacky Marion Cast, in Clarendon, about 9:23 p.m. on February 3. Cast's body was lying on the floor of his house. He appeared to have died a couple of days earlier.

The back door of the residence had been kicked in and the kitchen door had also been forced open. A television was missing.

Preliminary autopsy reports indicated that Cast died of natural causes. He was 61 years old. The deceased lived by himself.

An investigation is continuing.

Cast was buried in Hollis, Oklahoma, on February 6.

WTU And CSW Plan Project

West Texas Utilities Company announced today that it is participating in a renewable energy project which will include locations in its service territory. The company and the other three electric utility companies of Central and South West Corporation (CSW) are planning the most comprehensive study of renewable energy technologies ever undertaken in the Southwest.

The \$10 million, five-year program calls for installing a large photovoltaic system connected to the electrical network, individual photovoltaic panels on customer rooftops, two solar-dish Stirling engines and several wind-powered turbines. This project will increase the CSW system's research expenditures for 1993 by more than 40 percent.

Glenn Files, president and chief executive officer of the Abilene-based electric utility company, said the renewable energy program is designed to lead to alternative sources of clean power for the CSW system's 1.6 million customers.

The multipurpose program will include testing for the best potential sites for sun and wind exposure in WTU's 53,000 square-mile service territory, and in the 100,000 square-miles served by the other three utilities.

Beware Bacterial Meningitis

Bacterial meningitis is a serious infection of the membranes that surround the brain and spinal cord. It can be caused by a variety of microorganisms and can occur at any age, beginning in infancy through adulthood.

Immunocompromised individuals, meaning those with an impaired immune system, are more susceptible to meningitis. Depending on the organism that is causing the disease, infections may occur during any month of the year. However, autumn through early spring is the time of highest risk. In 1991, outbreaks of meningococcus meningitis were reported in Texas, Florida and Virginia.

In infants, the first signs and symptoms are nonspecific and include a high-pitched cry, irritability, anorexia, vomiting and lethargy. In adults, a respiratory illness or sore throat often precedes the fever, along with a headache, stiff neck and vomiting. Adults may become very ill within 24 hours, with the length of time even shorter in children.

A number of disorders resemble bacterial meningitis, however. Therefore, the most important step in discovering the infection is to be aware of the disease and not take the symptoms for granted. Some groups, such as college students living in dormitories, should be very aware of the symptoms since the disease is contagious and their living conditions place

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Ombudsman Program Works

The Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program was formally established by presidential mandate in 1971 to assist the states in establishing investigative units serving the nursing home residents. In April 1981 the Governor's Committee on Aging, (now the Texas Department on Aging) and the Texas Department of Health entered into an agreement which provided for mutual participation of both agencies in the complaint/investigation/resolution process.

An Ombudsman serves as an impartial mediator who receives complaints from residents in long-term care facilities, their families, friends and staff. The Ombudsman attempts to resolve those complaints as quickly as possible by examining the facts associated with the complaints and interviewing the individuals involved.

The complainant and/or resident of a long-term facility has the right to remain anonymous throughout the complaint investigation. Volunteer task force members will not discuss any complainant, resident or facility with anyone other than the Regional Ombudsman or authorized members of the Health Department Staff.

The skills desired in persons for the Ombudsman Program include: observation, listening, interviewing, speaking, reasoning, negotiating, an advocate for the person's rights as a nursing home resident, cooperating with the Facility staff towards the common goals of quality care and maintaining strict confidentiality.

Regional Ombudsman and task force volunteers must be certified by the state to participate in the program. An initial training program is provided. After certification, additional training on a regular basis during the required quarterly meetings enhance skills and knowledge.

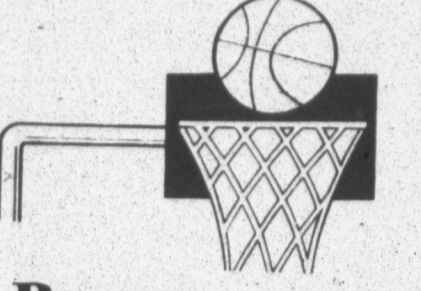

If diagnosed early enough, treatment is available. For those who may have been exposed, that is, close contacts of those with the disease, drugs or perhaps a vaccine will be recommended. As with all medical matters, a physician is the best source of information and advice.

All net proceeds from the annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo provide funds for scholarships and research projects throughout the state.

Social Security News

When you apply for Social Security benefits, you should begin by obtaining as much information as you can about the particular type of claim you're filing. You may obtain free publications about each of the major Social Security programs—Retirement, Disability, Survivors, and Supplemental Security Income (SSI)—by calling or visiting the Amarillo Social Security office. We also provide a free booklet about Medicare. These booklets explain the programs and what you'll need to have available when you apply for benefits.

Generally, filing for Social Security retirement or survivor benefits is a simple process. You can usually provide the application information for a claim by phone. The completed application is then mailed to you for verification, signature, and return to our office for processing. Your birth certificate, proof of recent wages, and other documents (depending on the type of claim) will be needed at this stage. You may bring the original documents to our office, where they will be photocopied and returned to you. Or, you can mail them to the office and the same procedure will be followed.

In a few weeks, you'll be notified by mail of your Social Security monthly benefit amount and the date it will begin. You'll also receive a Social Security booklet explaining your rights and responsibilities as a beneficiary and how to report changes that may affect your benefits.

Disability claims take longer to process because an individualized medical evaluation is needed. You may be able to speed up the process by bringing copies of your medical records with you when you apply and the names, addresses, and phone numbers of all doctors, hospitals, and clinics that have treated you. Even if you don't have all the documents you need for your claim, you should still file as soon as possible.

If you know in advance that you will be applying for benefits, you should call Social Security ahead of time to request the appropriate booklet for your type of claim. The information you receive may save you a lot of time and make the claims process seem much less complicated.

Government pensions may reduce Social Security benefits

"Government employees planning to retire soon should be aware that their Social Security benefits may be reduced by their government pension," said Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo.

"Social Security benefits are generally reduced for people who also receive a pension from a job where they did not pay Social Security taxes," this usually applies to former Federal Government employees," said Talbot, "although some State and local government employees didn't pay into Social Security so they also may be affected."

Benefits are reduced to eliminate a "windfall" that government employees received before the law was changed in 1983. Talbot explained that Social Security benefits are geared to pay a higher rate of return to low wage earners. "For example," he said, "low paid workers could receive benefits up to 90 percent of their pre-retirement earnings. Highly paid workers receive considerably less." Before 1983, Social Security benefits for government employees

Initial tests indicate the best combination of solar and wind resources is located in the Fort Davis area of West Texas. Some equipment will be located in the region.

Files said that research, technological advances and economies of scale could help make the use of sun and wind for electrical power an affordable alternative for customers early in the 21st century.

Using renewable energy in the Fort Davis area will enhance the reliability of electric service there because the community is 100 miles from the nearest power plant. "A solar unit and wind farm could provide backup energy during power line maintenance," Files said. "It also could help us meet a significant portion of the electricity demand of the area while reducing the need for new power lines."

The four technologies that will be tested are:

- * A 200-kilowatt flat plate photovoltaic module. The photovoltaic cells are grouped together and convert sunlight to electrical current. The energy from the photovoltaics will be fed into the electric distribution lines that serve the University of Texas McDonald Observatory and other Fort Davis customers.

- * Roof-top photovoltaic units for six commercial buildings or residences in the area. Each unit will provide at least one kilowatt of supplemental electricity to the building.

- * Advanced wind turbines. A 2,000 kilowatt small wind farm consisting of at least six turbines will be installed.

- * Solar-powered Stirling engines, developed by Cummins Power Generation of Abilene, Texas. The solar-dish Stirling engine uses an array of mirrors to follow the sun and focus its energy on the engine, which powers an alternator to generate electricity. The Stirling engine can convert up to 30 percent of the sunlight into electricity, compared to the 10 percent to 15 percent efficiency of Photovoltaic modules. The Stirling engine also can be fuel with natural gas. Two sizes of Stirling engines will be tested-- a 7.5 kilowatt unit and a 25 kilowatt unit.

Files pointed out that research studies indicate wind power in Texas could supply approximately 10 percent of the electrical needs of the United States. He said the CSW project will help determine how much of this resource can be practically used as well as the environmental effects of renewable technology.

Central and South West's electric utility subsidiaries --West Texas Utilities Company, Central Power and Light Company, Public Service of Oklahoma, and Southwestern Electric Power Company-- use a variety of fuel sources.

For 1992, the system's fuel use by BTU was 40 percent natural gas, 42 percent coal, 10 percent lignite and 8 percent nuclear energy.

were computed as if they were low-wage employees, giving them the advantage of the higher Social Security rate plus their government pension. This unintended windfall was not payable to non-government employees and so it was eliminated.

Anyone can get a free estimate of his or her future Social Security benefits by filling out a request for a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement available from any Social Security office. However, Talbot cautioned government employees that their estimate may not accurately reflect their actual benefit. "That's because Social Security cannot calculate other pensions at the time an estimate is issued," he said. "However, when a person actually files for retirement benefits, information he or she provides about other pensions is included in the computation process and benefits are reduced accordingly."

The estimate statement Social Security provides includes a section, "Government Pensions and Social Security Benefits," specifically designed to alert government employees that "your Social Security benefits and those of your spouse may be lower than the amounts shown on this statement."

People who want a free estimate of their benefits should contact Social Security for the request form. Government employees should also ask for the free factsheet, "A Pension From Work Not Covered By Social Security," which explains in detail how the adjustments are made and should help the reader determine any reductions to make to his or her estimate.
