Copies will be distrib uted to key leaders who participated in the study group meeting and others in the community.

Call Trace - enables the customer to initiate a trace of the last incoming call received. The number, date and time will be recorded by Southwestern Bell Telephone so that the call's origin can be identified.

Selective Call Forwarding - enables the customer to forward incoming calls from specified telephone numbers (maximum of three) to another telephone number.



WIC Program **Adapted**

A growing number of women and children living in supervised shelters for the homeless are benefitting from nutrition services offered by the Texas Department of Health (TDH). The department's Special Supplemental Food Program for Women Infants and Children (WIC) safeguards--through sound nutrition--against health problems among low income mothers, their babies and children.

WIC services include providing nutritious foods, health assessments and nutrition counseling to eligible pregnant or breastfeeding women, new mothers, and their babies and children less than five years old.

To be eligible, applicants must undergo health screenings at WIC clinics to establish their nutritional needs. They also must meet state and federal guidelines for low in-

In addition, health officials have adapted WIC services and rules to meet the unique needs of homeless participants.

According to Debra Stabeno, Chief of TDH's Bureau of WIC Nutrition, "Our challenge in serving the homeless is greater than it is with other participants.

"We must provide homeless participants with foods that are not easily perishable. These people don't have refrigerators, freezers or other kitchen conveniences, so we try to supply a more durable food package," she explained.

The supervised shelters where homeless WIC participants stay must follow specific guidelines set by the U.S. Department of Agricul-

Among those conditions are: *WIC foods must benefit the authorized participant, not a facility for the homeless or other institution. The facility may not gain financial or in-kind benefits from any person's participation in

*WIC foods may not be included in communal feedings.

Shelter personnel may not make collective or bulk transactions for participants living in their facilities, although in certain situations--such as illness or disability-a proxy may represent a participant.

No facility may place constraints or restrictions on any person because of that person's participation in WIC.

For detailed information on the WIC program in Texas, its eligibility requirements, or the guidelines for shelters for the homeless, persons are urged to contact their county WIC office or clinic, or call, toll free, 1-800-WIC-





The most common types of arthritis include osteoarthritis, rheumatoid arthritis, and gouty arthritis. Effective management of arthritis symptoms involves relieving joint pain and stiffness, arresting joint deterioration, and maintaining joint mobility. These objectives can often be accomplished with:

Medicines: Aspirin is the medicine most commonly used to treat arthritis. Prescription-only antiinflammatory medicines for arthritis include naproxen, tolmetin, sulindac, and fenoprofen. Other prescription arthritis medicines include certain steroids, gold salts, hydroxychloroquine, and penicillamine.

Physical therapy: Appropriate movement of affected joints is needed to prevent joints from becoming stiff. Good posture and proper diet may help relieve stress on certain joints.

Surgery: If medicines and physical therapy do not control arthritis pain or if joints become severely damaged, surgery (e.g., hip or knee joint replacement) may be necessary.



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A small quail sure can produce man size excitement. A flushed covey can bring more excitement than one person can handle at one time.

How do I increase quail on my place? This question is most asked by landowners who really enjoy that man size excitement Now is a good time of year to make plans to increase quail numbers for the new year. If 20 to 30 percent of last years quail make it through the winter we are well on our way to a quail crop for the coming year. This carry over will provide the needed breeding stock for the next quail crop.

Ensuring a year around supply of food is one of the first considerations. If mother nature does not cooperate with moisture at the right time we may not be able to do much to increase food supplies. But if she does cooperate there are several things a landowner can do to increase year around supply of food.

One of the simplest and cheapest methods to increase food production is soil disturbance. This can be done by disking. This disking should be done in strips. These strips should be close to good cover. The disking should be completed before spring greenup. This disking can promote growth of many native food plants. Some of the most important are ragweed, sunflower and doveweed.

Another method used to increase food production is food plots. These can be planted using

annuals, perennials or a combination of both. These should also be placed close to good cover. These plantings must be treated like a crop. A good clean firm seedbed is a must. These plantings should be done timely, using proper seeding rates and if needed fertilizer and weed control. Some of the best plants to use are sorghum, millet, sunflower, partridge pea, Illinois Bundleflower, yellow clover, switchgrass, kleingrass and bristlegrass.

Planting woody species can sure fill a dual role. They provide food but also can provide good overhead cover. This type cover is used by quail for escaping predators and also as loafing areas. Some of the better woody species are native plum, skunkbush sumac, russion olive, sandcherry, lilac and honeysuckle. These can be planted in motts or multiple row plantings. Much care is needed to ensure a success when it comes to wood species planting. They must be planted properly, watered properly and have good weed control. Also protection from livestock and rodent damage is a must.

Increasing quail numbers can be big challenge for landowners. It cannot be done overnight but with proper planning and caring out that plan it can bring excellent rewards.

The Soil Conservation Service, working through the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District can help develop a plan for managing quail habitat. Please call or come by the office located at 4th and Sully for assistance.

Tomatoes Are Big In Local Gardens

If you are still weary of those exorbitant tomato prices since the winter freeze, you may consider growing your own toma toes.

Growing tomatoes in the backyard can be a fascinating and rewarding adventure, but it can be frustrating, too. A sickly tomato plant that produces few if any fruit certainly doesn't help anyone's gardening spirit. Whether you're growing tomatoes for the first time or as an old pro, you may profit from some useful advice on avoiding some common pitfalls. The tips come from Dr. Sam Cotner, Extension horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

First, don't grow tomatoes unless they can receive sunlight for at least six hours a day. Tomato plants placed between tall shrubs, under trees or between buildings simply will not produce a good tomato crop.

Second, good soil is essential for good growth and high yields. A dark, heavy clay or even a fine sand can be improved The local Soil and Water Conservaby working 3 to 4 inches of organic matter into the soil where the tomatoes are to be plant ed.

To raise a few tomato plants, prepare a space at least 2 feet square for gram and can take orders for fish at each plant. The soil should be worked to a depth of at least 12 inches. Liberal amounts of organic matter and a small amount of fertilizer, such as 10-20-10 or 12-24-12 should be mixed into the soil.

The key to growing tomatoes successfully is choosing the right variety of tomatoes. Select varieties that resist many of the common diseases. A few varieties most suited for Texas include: President, Whirlaway, Celebrity, Big Set, Sunny, Carni val, or the small fruited Small Fry or Cherry Grande.

Transplants should be planted somewhat deeper than they were originally growing. Plants growing in peat pots or peat blocks should not be removed, but rather the entire container should be planted. Sometimes it is helpful to break the bottom of the pots, but avoid damaging any of the

When setting tomato plants in the garden, use a starter solution to assure adequate fertility during the early stages of growth. Starter solutions can be purchased at local garden centers, or can be made by mixing one to two level tablespoons of a complete garden fertilizer in a gallon of water. About one cup of the starter solution should be applied in the plant hole prior to planting.

For best results, transplants should be set in the garden on cloudy days or late in the afternoon. The plants should be protected from adverse conditions such as high winds or excessive heat for a week or so after transplanting.

Almost all tomato varieties should be staked, trellised or caged for best results. Any method is good if it keeps the fruit off the ground. Tomatoes that are allowed to contact the soil often develop fruit rot.

The Chamber of Commerce is working hard on ways to serve the community. Please let us know how we can help you as an individual. The Chamber is supported by dues from the membership, but we want to be of service to non-members in the hope that it will ultimately benefit all of us. Texans need to plant 17 million trees before the year 2000. If Donley County is to do its part, we need to plant some 66,929 trees in the next 10 years. That is 6,693 trees per year.

What about working together on this as a fund raising project for the Chamber. Could we help area residents beautify their property, help the Chamber make ends meet and benefit both local and global environments at the same time?

On a different topic: as most of you know, the Chamber is working to capitalize on the tourist potential of the area. Since we "never done it before" it takes some time. We are researching and brainstorming and working, but we are starting to see results. Highway signs help, but there are a limited number available, and no new ones can be erected due to something called "the Lady Bird Law". We will try to help new, tourist-oriented business to use existing signs.

We still need to do a better job of reaching those 10,200 vehicles per day that pass under the Kearney street traffic light. In part we can do this by beautifying the area--planting flowers and trees, cleaning up unsightly areas. We can even fly flags. But we still need to get a message to those tourist vehicles. 

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

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
