Tax Deferral Available For Elderly Homeowners

Texas aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homes. They can take advantage of a tax option called "over-65 deferral" by signing an affidavit at the Donley County Appraisal office.

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can start or continue a lawsuit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that home.

Taxpayers need to be aware that tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the home, it does not cancel them. During the deferral time, taxes and delinquent interest continue to add up. When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, the taxes become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax and interest.

Filing of the deferral affidavit does not forgive penalties that are already due. Also, if the taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends, an added penalty may be charged if the account goes to a delinquent tax attorney.

State Recognizes Clarendon Library

Burton Memorial Library was recently accredited as a member of the Texas Library System for fiscal year 1993, according to Williams D. Gooch, Director and Librarian of the Texas State Library.

"We are pleased to award a certificate of system membership in recognition of the efforts this community has made in providing public library services," said Gooch. "This is a symbol of having achieved a level of excellence."

Burton Memorial Library is a renewal member of Texas Panhandle Library System, and serves citizens in the Donley County area. Burton Memorial Library had to meet strict criteria, according to city librarian, Mary Linn Bills, such as hours of access, professional staffing requirements, number of library materials, and local per capita support, to become a member. Public libraries must apply and qualify for system membership annually. Burton Memorial Library has been a member of the Texas Panhandle System for several years.

Authorized by the Library System Act of 1969, the Texas Library System was developed to improve library service in the state through cooperative efforts. Comprised of ten regions, the statewide system provides an opportunity for local libraries to make the best possible use of both their own resources and those available elsewhere in the system. These cooperative efforts are made possible through state and federal funds appropriated to the Library Development Program of the Texas State Library. This year the Texas State Library will distribute about \$8 million to the ten library systems.

New Uniform Coming

No longer just the signature brown, next year's Brownie Girl Scouts (ages 6-8) will be sporting blue chambray-look shirts, floral print top culottes jumpers, and flounced knit skirts. They may also choose western-look belt and fun t-shirts to complement the new colorful components.

Traditionalists can find comfort in that some elements remain. Girls may still choose to wear the familiar Brownie Girl Scout Beanie and will wear a sash or vest to display official recognitions they've earned.

The changed uniform is based on two years' of research involving interviews, surveys and focus groups across the country. Responses from girls who previewed the new uniform components were very positive. "It's really pretty." "Very Comfortable." "I'd buy it for a million dollars!"

The new uniform design is part of a complete program update for young girls and is the result of the Girl Scout organization's commitment to remain contemporary. Other changes include additions to the Daisy Girl Scout (ages 5 to 6) uniform, and revisions in the Daisy and Brownie Girl Scout Handbooks.

"Girl Scouting is as relevant today as it was 80 years ago," said Mary Rose Main, National Executive Director for Girl Scouts of the USA. "But girls of each generation

Wedding Celebration Planned

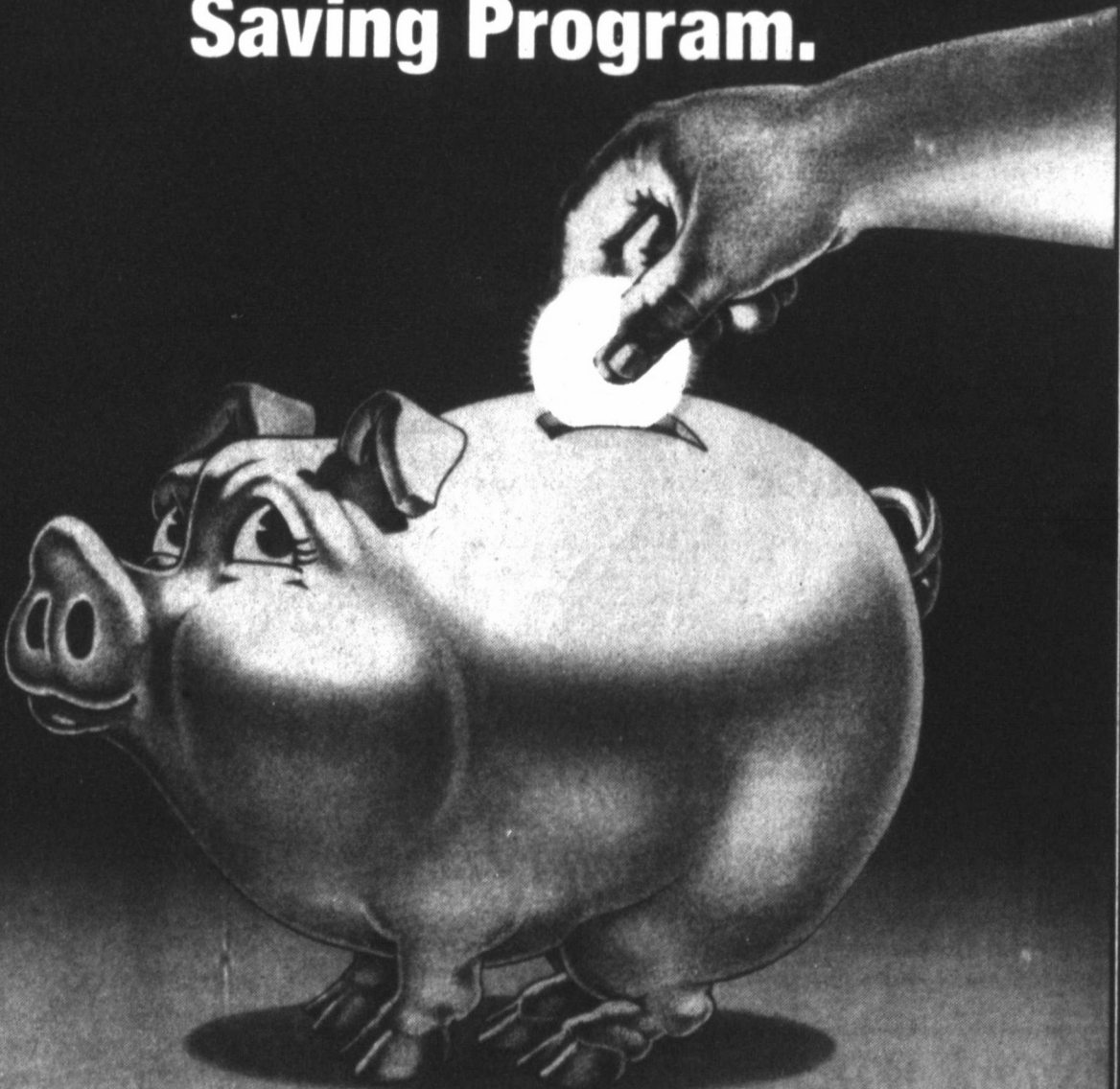

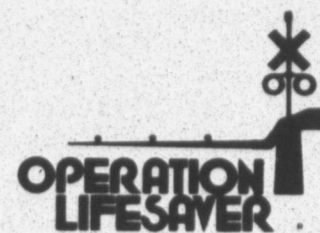
Notice To Reunion Visitors

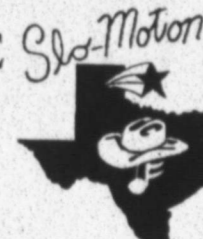

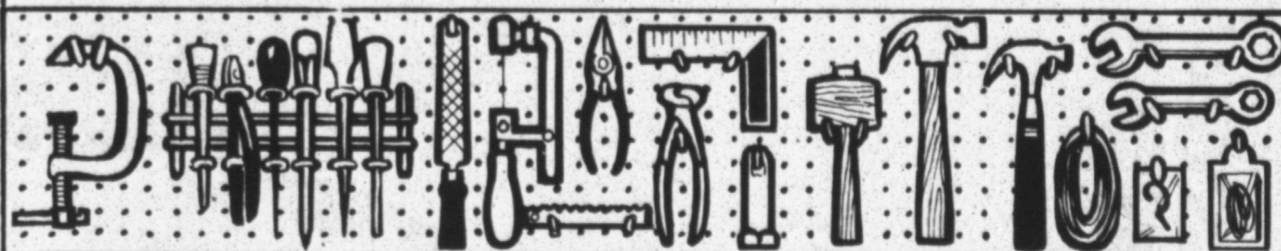

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber—not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30th to take advantage of this benefit on your 1993 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

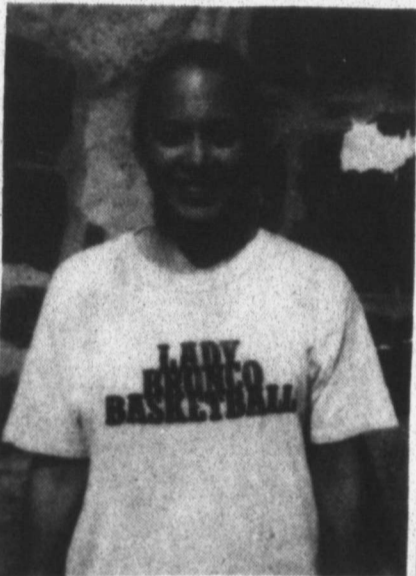

Distemper Can Kill

Canine distemper is a disease of viral origin which primarily affects young dogs. Since the advent of vaccination to prevent distemper, this disease has been on the decline. However, in recent years people have neglected vaccinating their pets and the disease has once again reared its head in certain locations. Once an unprotected animal is exposed to distemper, he will contract the disease. It will become established in his immune system and eventually affect the nervous system of the animal. Clinical distemper is characterized by matted eyes, runny nose, seizure activity and respiratory symptoms.

Approximately 50 percent of the animals which contract distemper will die in the best of circumstances and left untreated mortality approaches 80 percent. It is therefore wise to protect the animal early in its life with vaccination for distemper. This should be started as early as six to eight weeks of age in puppies and a second booster should be given four to six weeks after the initial vaccination. Yearly boosters are recommended and animals which are vaccinated routinely should never have to experience the terrible disease called "DISTEMPER".

Check It Out

Are you looking for a book with old-fashioned humor that signifies the particular period of time in which it was written? Burton Memorial Library has several books which fit this description, but *Recollections Of A Rebel Surgeon* by Dr. F.E. Daniel might hold an unusual interest for two reasons. One is the fact that a very humorous book has been created against the dramatic background of the Civil War. The second reason is the manner in which the library received this book.

This 264 page non-fiction writing is a collection of a Civil War surgeon's reminiscences as told to Dr. Daniel. According to the author in his introduction, "the occurrences do not relate to the professional duties of the army surgeon, as might be supposed from the title, but are, for the most part, recollections of fun, frolic, fishing, and flirting." The surgeon relates humorous situations which he actually experienced in army camps and hospitals from the time he was commissioned as Army Surgeon at age twenty-three by the Secretary of War.

Dr. Daniel refers to the surgeon as "the jolly old doctor!" By readers of the early "Texas Medical Journal", he was often referred to as the Journal's "169Fat Philosopher" and "Our Genial Friend", probably partly because of the amusing life stories he would

relate, with a twinkle in his eye, to the editor.

The "old doctor" is described by the author as a typical educated Virginia gentleman of the Old South. Dr. Daniel has done an excellent job of capturing Southern dialect which is evident in "cawn" (corn); "New Yawk" (New York); "Saddy" (Saturday); "dawg" (dog); and "laig" (leg).

I am still in the process of reading this exceptional piece of writing which was copyrighted in 1899. The pages are beginning to show a "yellowing tendency". Needless to say, it demands careful handling.

The library received this interesting book from the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and was being returned to Burton Memorial Library, the original owner. Librarian, Mary Linn Bills, is hopeful that someone in the community might have more information concerning circumstances that led to the FBI's temporary possession of the book. Did anyone happen to come in contact with the book during previous years? If you can enlighten our librarians with additional information, give Mary Linn or Mary a call. Thanks. In the meantime, the book is waiting for you, and is almost guaranteeing wholesale entertainment. Why not check it out?

Dear Editor:

The people of Donley County are to be congratulated on the record voter turn-out on the November 3rd general election.

We have 2281 registered voters in the county; 1735 (76%) voted. This is above the State and National average. We need another record voter turn-out for the very important Special Election, scheduled for May 1st. We will be electing a new senator to replace former Senator Lloyd Benson and voting on a School Finance Constitution Amendment, known as the Robin Hood Amendment.

Our Governor and Legislature are asking us to legalize a State property tax that was declared unconstitutional by the Texas Supreme Court, and at the same time raising the (C.E.D.) 82 cents top limit to \$1.00. Presently school taxes through various local school districts are capped at \$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation. The Robin Hood amendment is the largest potential tax increase in the history of Texas.

Amendment #1 has very little to do with education. It has everything to do with raw power, State bureaucratic control of local schools and getting us to pay for every new pet spending project they can think of, by a huge transfer of Taxes And Power.

After much politicking and back room deals the legislature wants you to vote on an amendment to make a state property tax legal. It not only transfers huge new taxing power to the Governor and legislature, but it transfers an immense amount of Power over local schools as well. The amendment allows the legislature to decide who will collect the taxes, how much they will be, and with some limits, where they will be spent.

I have been told, some legislators will try to pass a bill saying the amendment doesn't create a new tax limit district. Unfortunately this doesn't mean anything. The only thing that counts is what's in the constitution. The fact, in an informal survey of legislators, there was very little agreement on what the amendment actually said. The amendment is cleverly drafted to allow al-

most anything. Once it passes, you will never get to vote on whether your taxes go up again.

The Governor and his bureaucratic friends will tell you the Judge will shut the schools down, if we don't pass this amendment. That's absolutely not true. Even the Judge who controls the June 1st deadline for state school funding. We do not have to have a constitutional amendment to fix this problem. This problem is a creature of legislative statute and can be solved by a statute.

Basically the legislature needs to find about \$400 million for education. The budget for this year is going up \$4 billion. They could take just 10% of this increase to solve the education money problem. Now you can why I said the Robin Hood amendment has very little to do with education.

The Judge would only cut off State funding, if the legislature refuses to act in a responsible manner and even then the Texas Supreme Court could over-rule him, or the legislature could pass entirely new guidelines by the June 1st deadline.

The Bottom Line: We need to send a message to America that we will not be blackmailed. We will not allow them to waste another \$7 billion a year of our hard-earned money; and we expect them to act as responsible representatives and fix this problem without resorting to "back-room" politics, deal-making and more taxes.

Board Member's Code of Ethics

As a member of the Board I shall promote the best interests of the District as a whole, and, to that end, I shall adhere to the following educational and ethical standards.

1. Bring about desired changes through legal and ethical procedures, upholding and enforcing all laws, State Board of Education rules, and court orders pertaining to schools.
2. Make decisions in terms of the educational welfare of all children in the District, regardless of ability, race, creed, ethnicity, sex or social standing.
3. Recognize that decisions must be made by the Board as a whole and make no personal promise or take private action that may compromise the board.
4. Focus Board action on policy making, goal setting, planning, and evaluation, and insist on regular and impartial evaluation of all staff.
5. Support and protect school personnel in the proper performance of their duties.
6. Vote to appoint the best qualified personnel available after consideration of recommendations of the Superintendent.
7. Hold confidential all matters pertaining to school that, if disclosed, may needlessly injure individuals or the schools, and respect the confidentiality of information that is privileged under applicable law.
8. Attend all regularly scheduled Board meetings insofar as possible and become informed concerning the issues to be considered at those meetings.
9. Delegate authority for the administration of the school to the Superintendent.
10. Endeavor to make policy decisions only after full discussion at publicly held Board meetings, render all decisions based on the available facts, and refuse to surrender that judgment to individuals or special groups. [I.e. see all sides, represent all people.]
11. Encourage the free expression of opinion by all Board members and seek systematic communications between the Board and students, staff and all elements of the community.
12. Communicate to Board members and the Superintendent at appropriate times expressions of public reaction to Board policies and school programs.
13. Become informed about current educational issues by individual study and through participation in programs providing needed information, such as those sponsored by state and national school boards associations.
14. Refrain from using my Board position for personal or partisan gain.
15. Make certain the Board remains responsive to the community.
16. Remember always that my first and greatest concern must be the educational welfare of all the students attending the public schools.

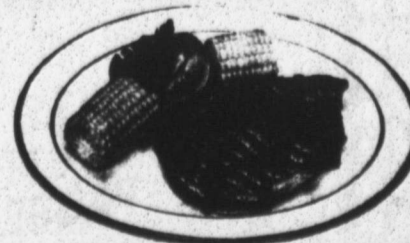
