Payment Limitations Given

No program benefits subject to limitation may be provided to any producer until the necessary payment limitation determinations are made. The producer will remain ineligible until all required forms are provided to the county office.

Payment limitation and payment eligibility determinations may be initiated by the County Committee or requested by a producer. If you request a determination, the request may be filed anytime before the final date for submitting CCC-502's.

There are statutory provisions that require entities earning benefits subject to limitation to: provide the names, addresses, and ID number of the entities' members to the County Committee by filing a CCC-501A. To inform the entities' members of the requirements for designation "permitted entities". "Permitted entities" must be designated on a CCC-501B by every member of the entity.

All CCC-501's and CCC-501's submitted by producers are subject to spot check through the end-of-year review will be required to furnish detailed information to the County Committee to prove their inputs used to determine significant contributions to the farming operation, contributions were commensurate with claimed shares of the farming operation, contributions were at risk, the "person" determination was correct, permitted entities were properly designated, land ownership was accurately reported, and any other pertinent factors used in the original determination were correct.

A determination of "not actively engaged in farming" results in the producer being ineligible for: deficiency and diversion payments, gains from marketing loans and loan deficiency payments except honey), CRP annual rental payments (if subject to '-P1), wool and mohair payments, and any benefit requiring a determination of "actively engaged in farming."

Dates To Remember

Final Date to request CCC loan for 1992 wheat and oats is March 31 and the final date to request CCC loan for 1992 cotton, grain sorghum corn and to Obtain A Cotton Loan Deficiency Payment, is May 31.

The last day to sign into the 1993 Farm Program is April 30, 1993. A contract may be revised or canceled prior to April 30, 1993, but after this date liquidated damages will apply to the contract. Producers are reminded that appointments are being taken for the farm program signup.

John Mangum, from Clarendon, and Bob Walters, from Dimmit, attended the American Farriers Association Convention in Albuquerque, New Mexico, February 24-27, 1993. These farriers are members of the Tri-State Professional Horseshoeing Association which is a Chapter Member of the AFA.

The AFA Conventions covered a variety of topics, including certification examinations, horseshoe forging competitions, lectures on shoeing and lameness, demonstrations of new products, a trade show with over 90 vendors, and the world's largest hands- on clinic.

John Mangum, Chapter President, also attended the committee meetings and Board of Directors meeting prior to the convention.

The placings for the forging competition were announced at the Saturday night banquet. High point winners will represent the United States as members of the AFA sponsored American Farriers Team, which will compete in England and Scotland this summer.

The AFA is a twenty-two years old non-profit educational organization dedicated to the improvements of the practice of farrier science, and the betterment of conditions for horses, horseowners and farriers. Its activities include programs of certification, education, communication, innovation and research in all areas of farrier science. The AFA head-quarters is located in the National Horse Center of the Kentucky Horse Park. The Horse Park is located in Lexington, Kentucky, the horse capital of the world

The yearly AFA convention is held in various locations around the country. The 1994 conventions is scheduled for Lexington Kentucky. Hospitalman Howard Brent Fricks of the United States Navy was present a citation, from his Commanding Officer, for superior performance of duty while serving as Medical Department Laboratory Technician on board USS John F. Kennedy from 1 Oc. tober to 31 December 1992. Hospitalman Fricks' outstanding performance of duty this period was instrumental in his selection as the Medical Department's Sailor of the Quarter. Extensive laboratory procedures were performed by Hosptialman Fricks on a daily basis. He spent many hours on and off duty studying laboratory manuals and increasing his knowledge and efficiency. His endeavors in the laboratory section have enabled the Medical Department to diagnose and treat the 5000 crew members on board with a "state of the art" laboratory. Hospitalman Fricks' keen sense of responsibility in the performance of his duties reflect great credit upon himself and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service.

Brent was a graduate of Tascosa High School in Amarillo. He is the son of Mr and Mrs. Bruce Fricks of Amarillo and the grandson of Joyce Park of Lawton, Oklahoma and Louise Dickinson of Clarendon.

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Electric Co-op Contest Scheduled for Teen-Agers

A rea teen-agers have a chance to be in Washington DC, in June for a first-hand glimpse of the political process.

Two winners from an essay contest will be awarded the expense-paid trip to Washington DC, which will leave Denton on June 10, and return there on June 22. The local Youth Tour contest is sponsored by Greenbelt Electric Cooperative, and local winners will join over 70 other coop-sponsored youngsters for the 12-day adventure.

Each contestant will be required to submit an essay not to exceed 750 words on the subject: "What Does your Rural Electric Cooperative Mean to You and Your Community?" Deadlines for essays in the 1993 Government-in-Action Youth Tour Contest is April 15, 1993, at 5 p.m. at the Cooperative office in Wellington.

Being a Youth Tour participant in Washington DC, is special. The Texans will visit with their respective congressman. They will place a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery.

Other tour highlights are visits to Mount Vernon, the National Archives, (home of the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and the Bill of Rights), the Smithsonian Institution, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, the FBI Building, and many other famous monuments and memorials.

The tour has been referred to by past participants as the experience of a lifetime. It has inspired many young people to go on to greater things. To be eligible, youngsters must be high school student at least 14 years old and not yet 19 as of June 10, 1993.

BARBECUE WHOLE

Some 85,000 Adopt-A-Highway and Keep Texas Beautiful volunteers around the state are expected to unite on Saturday, April 3, for the eighth annual "Great Texas Trash-Off". The event which is sponsored by the Texas Department of transportation in conjunction with the "Don't Mess With Texas" antilitter program is considered the largest one-day cleanup effort in the nation.

In Donley County, Adopt-A-Highway groups such as Hedley Lions Club, Hedley Lodge #991 & Chapter 413 OES, Medical Center Employees, and Donley County ASCS Office will arm themselves with trash bags and safety vests to combat litter.

Last year's Trash-Off yielded an estimated 2 million gallons of roadside debris which- in addition to the usual beer cans and fast food wrappers - included an uncashed check for \$19,987.27 and several denominations of hard, cold cash. Other not-so- valuable discoveries included a cast iron skillet, several love letters, and lots of underwear.

Trash-Off sponsor Coca-Cola will provide 33-gallon garbage bags and special incentive prizes to participants.

Since the Texas Department of Transportation launched the Don't Mess with Texas and Adopt-A-Highway programs in 1985, the state has seen a 72 percent decrease in roadside litter. KTB, the state affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, Inc., coordinated Texas' accredited community litter programs.


Lotus Final Computer Offering

The Good Timers Singers came out Tuesday to sing to and with the



Topdressing Wheat

Donley County Extension Office

Wheat in the Texas Panhandle and South Plains is rapidly breaking dormancy and beginning to green up as a result of the warm temperatures experienced the last couple of weeks. The cold front that moved through the area March 11 and 12 should not adversely affect the crop other than causing some leaf burn.

Now is a good time to consider topdressing wheat with nitrogen if needed. The dry conditions last fall resulted in many fields not receiving adequate fertilizer prior to planting. On the other hand, much of the wheat was not grazed, or only lightly grazed; and thus, may not need as much nitrogen as in years past.

Research on the Pullman soils has suggested little benefit from nitrogen fertilization where expected yields are less than 35 bu/A. The winter months have provided excellent moisture throughout most of the area. As a result the potential for high wheat yields is good. For this reason, many dryland fields could potentially benefit from nitrogen topdressing. Nitrogen deficient fields will often appear yellow-green in color once the wheat begins to actively grow. If this color persists after several days of sunshine, you can be reasonably certain the condition is due to inadequate

Dryland fields should be fertilized with 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen. Irrigated wheat fields that are showing deficiency symptoms should receive at least an initial application of 60 pounds of actual nitrogen. The nitrogen can be applied in the dry form as ammonium nitrate, ammonium sulfate, urea, or as nitrogen solutions. There is no strong advantage of one form of fertilizer over another. Urea is probably the least expensive, but it also has a higher risk of loss by volatility if applied to wet soil under warm conditions. Ammonium nitrate and nitrogen solutions are slightly more available to the plant initially. Some leaf burn may occur with the nitrogen solutions, especially under sunny, warm conditions. If applied before the wheat gets too big, the leaf burn should not adversely affect yield.

Topdressing of nitrogen should occur as soon as possible. The longer topdressing is delayed after jointing occurs the less opportunity the crop will have to benefit from the nitrogen. Once wheat reaches the boot stage of development 75 of the total amount of nitrogen it will use has been taken up by the crop. After the boot stage is reached, only protein content will be affected by additional nitrogen application.



Social Security News

Beneficiaries, report your 1992 earnings by April 15th

66If you worked and received Social Security benefits during 1992, you have until April 15, 1993, to report the amount of your 1992 earnings to Social Security Administration," said Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo. "Anyone whose earnings exceeded the annual earn-

ings limits must file a report. The earnings limits for 1992 were \$10,200 for beneficiaries age 65-69 and \$7,440 for those under age 65."


Social Security will compare the amount of earnings on your 1992 report with the estimate you provided when you applied for benefits or when you filed last year's earnings report. "Benefits paid in 1992 were based on that estimate," Talbot explained. "If you earned less than you estimated, you may be due additional money; if you made more than you estimated for 1992, you may have to repay some benefits."

People who turned 70 in 1992 only need to report earnings up to the month of their birthday. Self-employed beneficiaries who turned 70 in 1992 should prorate their earnings-that is, total the earnings for the year and divide by 12-and report the prorated amount for the months before their birthday. Those who were 70 ore older all year don't have to file a report.

"Filing your Federal income tax return does not take the place of filing your earnings report with Social Security," Talbot emphasized. "And, if you request a filing extension for your Federal income tax return, you do not automatically get an extension on the filing date for your Social Security earnings report. You must request each extension separately."

People who earlier reported they expected to earn more than the 1992 were automatically sent a reporting form in late February. Those who didn't get the form should call 1-800-772-1213 business days between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. to file their report.

What's bad news for some motorists is very good news for the many more who care about highway safety.

Drivers who get behind the wheel while under the influence of:

- · stimulants such as cocaine
- · depressants such as barbitu-
- · inhalants such as gasoline or
- marijuana
- · hallucinogens such as LSD

· and narcotic analgesics such as heroin, run a high risk of getting caught by one of the many Drug Recognition Experts (DREs). Police officers who have undergone a lengthy training program, supported by the U.S. Department of Transportation, that enables them to detect if a driver is under the influence of drugs-and if it's found that you are, you can go to jail. What's more, if you're involved in an accident, even if you weren't at fault, and it's determined that you've been taking illegal drugs, you could still go to jail.

Keep in mind that drug use greatly impairs your driving ability-and if you've been drinking as well as taking drugs, the impairment is even greater.

The DRE observes and records five categories of reactions that demonstrate signs of drug use:

- 1. Vital signs (pulse, temperature and blood pressure).
- 2. Psychophysical reactions (coordination of mind and body). 3. Signs of administration of
- drugs (injection sites, etc.). 4. Eye response (horizontal/vertical gaze nystagmus; eye convergence; pupil size under

varying light intensities). Studies have shown that DRE examinations are more than 90 percent accurate in determining what category of drug a driver has been abusing. To determine the specific drug, toxicology tests are then conducted by a chemist.
