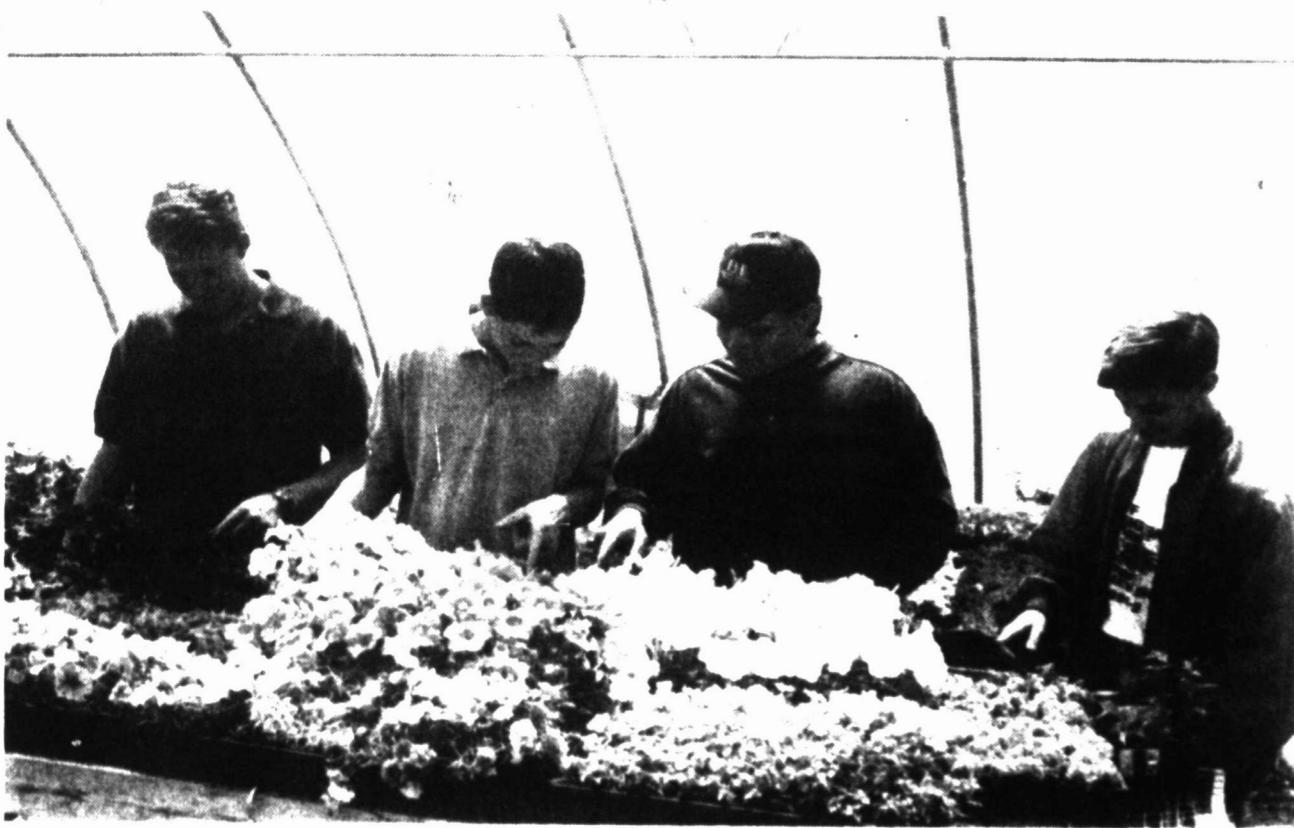

Elections Stir Fireworks and/or Boredom; Proposition Failure May Hurt School

Clarendon voters went to the polls on Saturday, May 1, to select representatives in several offices. Perhaps the bitterest races were those at Howardwick. Incumbent Mayor H.C. Clark had 77 votes, Dean Nazworth got 55 and Lanny Edwards took 6. In the alderman's race, Bo Whitaker got 51 votes, Robert Hall collected 68 votes, incumbent Weldon King polled 62 votes, while incumbent Bob Thompson won with 79.

Hedley's election was much less exciting. Voters there re-elected three incumbent aldermen who were running unopposed: Jim Roberts, 53, Charles Swinney, 56, and Henry Stephens, 50.

In the elections for the City of Clarendon, unopposed incumbent Steve Smith got 179 votes, with perhaps a dozen write-ins for a half-dozen other people. In the at-large elections for two aldermen, the votes were Delmar Wiggs, 134, Cleo Russell, 34, David Pitts, 126, Billie Shaffer, 50, and James Kuhn, 123. Pitts and Kuhn were incumbents.

Clarendon Independent School Districts elected two new trustees. Todd Knorpp got 235 votes, Dan Hall, 318, Ruby Hearn, 186, Elmonette Bivens, 298. Knorpp was an incumbent. (One incumbent trustee chose not to run again.)

Hedley elected Ben Carson, with 110, and Shirley Johnson, with 94. Both were incumbents and ran unopposed.

In statewide races, Donley County gave the most votes to Republican Kay Bailey Hutchinson with 224. Joe Barton scored 60, Richard Fischer, 43, Robert Kruger, Democrat, scooped up 170 and Jack Fields, 161. There will be a run-off between Kruger and Hutchinson.

County Voters followed the state pattern in voting for the proposed Constitutional Amendments. Proposition 1 had 263 for and 428 against. Proposition 2, for: 311, against: 370, and Proposition 3 lost by 257 to 420.

Failure of the Amendments throws the entire state school system into limbo. Several alternatives have been proposed. Most of these would probably be challenged in court. And any system will have to be approved by Federal judges who have already stricken down several legislative plans.

In the Panhandle, various ideas are being circulated, ranging from cautious to absurd. Yet in the final analysis, no one knows what can or will be done.

Locally, the situation could be serious. According to Superintendent Jeff Walker, Clarendon Independent School District has enough money to pay salaries through the end of the year and enough to open up in September. However, if the Federal courts freeze state monies—as they have threatened to do—then Clarendon schools would have to shut down about a month after they open.

New Business Coming

Michael and Ann Schlieckau will be opening a new business in Clarendon that may employ as many as five people. The business will be called AMS Enterprises. It will cover Clarendon, Memphis, Wellington and the surrounding area.

Michael says that he will be the only licensed heating and air-conditioning man in Donley County. He is also a licensed electrician.

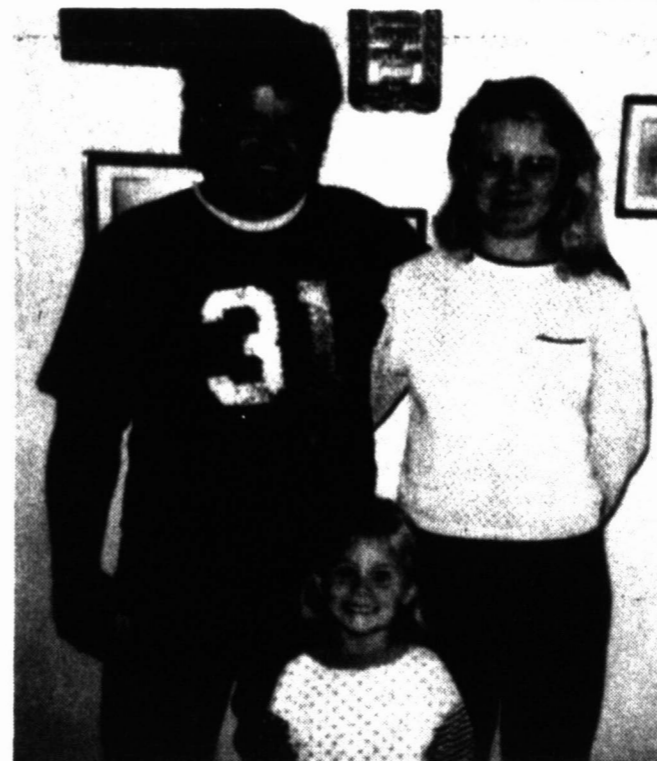
Schlieckau will work on air-conditioners in homes, businesses, tractors or vehicles. He will also do contract building maintenance, (such as keeping fluorescent lights repaired.) Schlieckau, a native of Colorado, has 17 years experience. He just completed the heating and cooling systems on the new Radisson Inn in Amarillo.

"We want to give our customers an honest dollar's worth of value for every dollar they pay us," said Michael. Until now, most people who wanted their air-conditioning repaired called Amarillo and paid mileage for the service technician's round trip. AMS is local and will not have travel charges.

To get acquainted, AMS is offering a Pre-Summer Service Special to prepare air-conditioning units for use. This includes a 15 point inspection as well as cleaning the evaporator and condenser coils. Pre-Summer Special will be \$100 to \$135 dollars.

Schlieckau said, "We also offer the lowest prices on refrigerant." (Since the Environmental Protection Agency announced a coming ban on manufacturing CFC's, prices of refrigerant have soared.)

The Schlieckaus are expecting their second child at any moment.

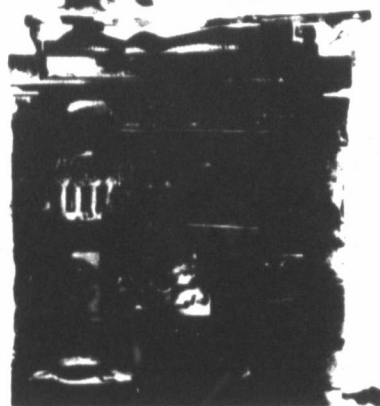

Hulet was preceded in death by his parents and six brothers.

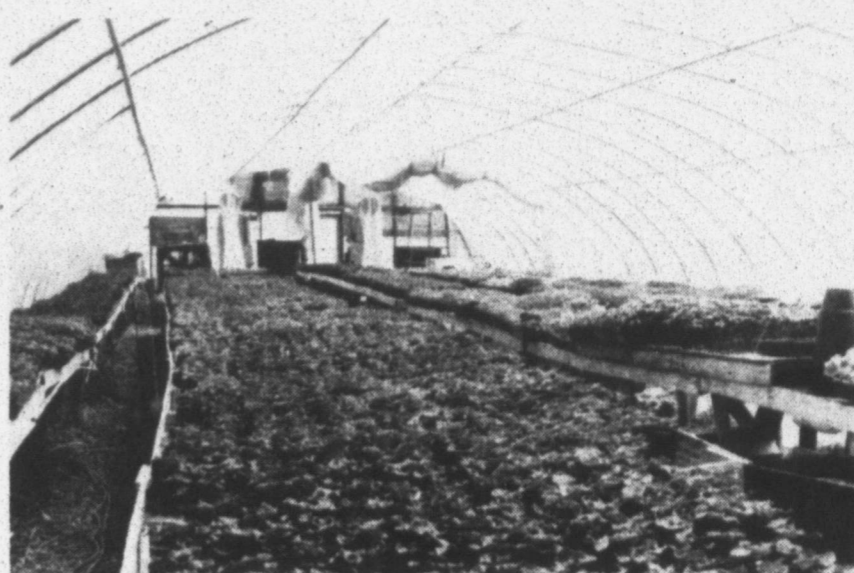

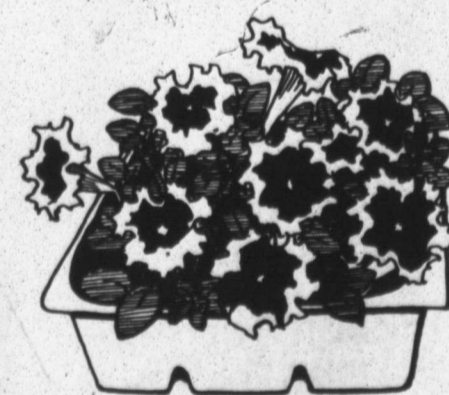

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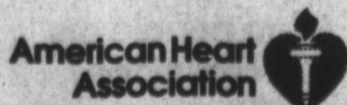

New Surgical Procedure Benefits Women

A growing number of the more than 650,000 American women who have hysterectomies (surgical removal of the uterus) every year, are benefitting from a new, minimally invasive surgical technique that dramatically reduces hospital stay, pain, scarring, recuperative time and costs for many patients.

Called Laparoscopically Assisted Vaginal Hysterectomy, or LAVH, the new procedure is gaining acceptance among surgeons and patients because of a new instrument developed by United States Surgical Corporation. In addition to serving as the surgeon's scalpel, the instrument simultaneously seals each edge of the cut tissue with three rows of tiny surgical staples, reducing blood loss and tissue trauma and eliminating the need for tedious hand sewing.

Like other laparoscopic surgery, LAVH is performed through tiny incisions using specialized surgical instru-

ments. The surgeon views a magnified image of a patient's internal organs on a video monitor via a laparoscope—a tiny telescope connected to a camera.

Until recently, abdominal hysterectomy patients faced a hospital stay of nearly a week, up to six weeks of painful recovery and were left with an unsightly four-to-six inch scar. In contrast, most women who undergo LAVH can leave the hospital within two days following surgery, have minimal pain, only 3-4 tiny marks and return to their normal activities in a week or two.

Laparoscopy was pioneered by gynecologists in the 1960s and is currently used for appendectomy, hernia repair, lung and bowel surgery and a broad range of gynecological procedures. Nearly 80% of all gallbladder surgery is done this way.

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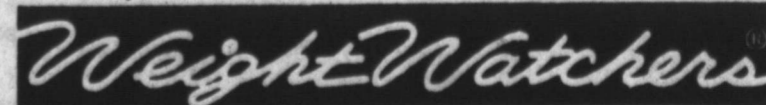

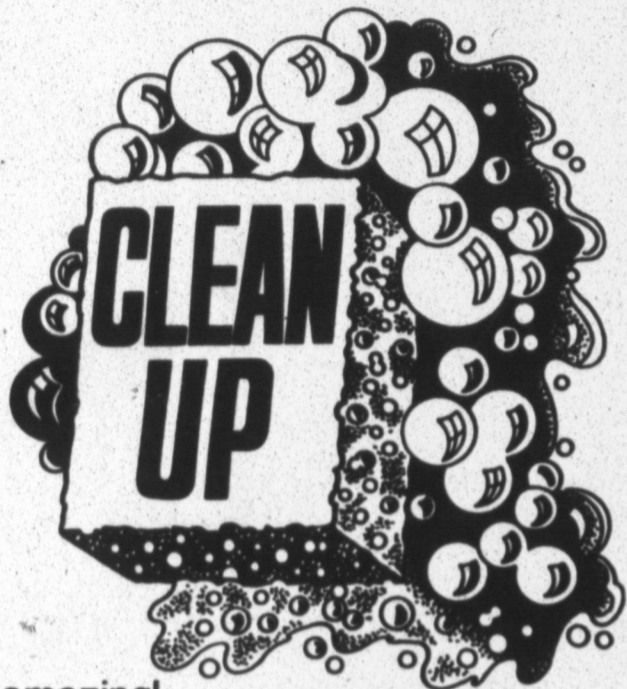

If everyone cleans up, all Clarendon looks better.

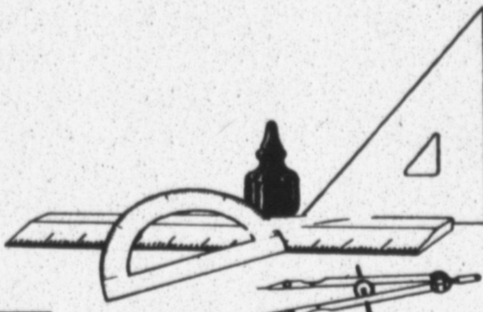

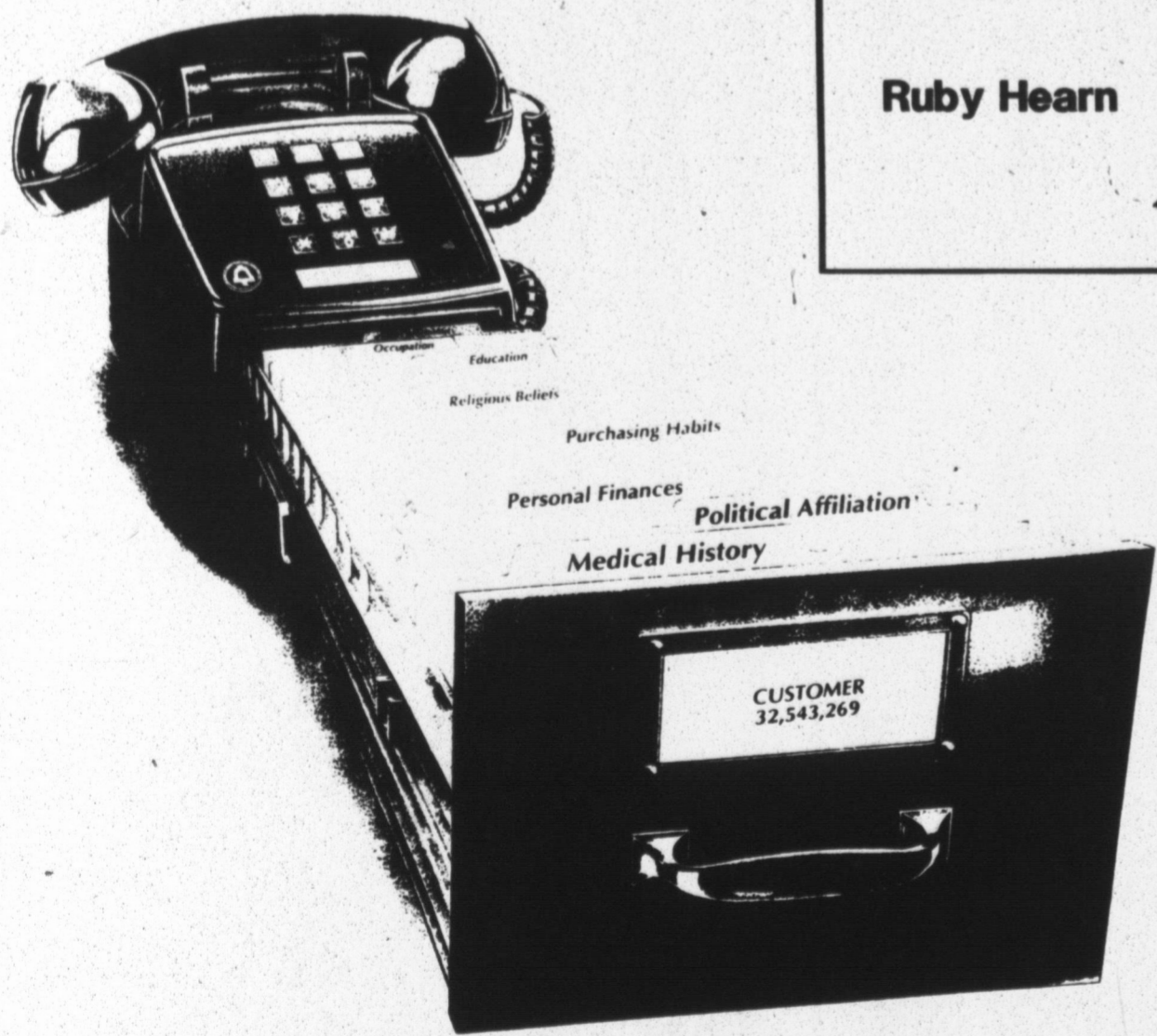

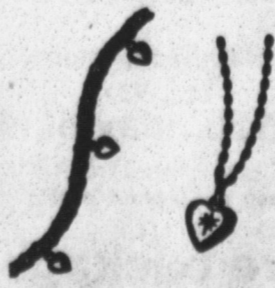
