Board Names Candidates for New CISD Superintendent

The Clarendon Independent School District has released the names of the final three candidates for Superintendent. The three men are: Mr. Hal Porter, High School Principal, Sunray, Texas (who has superintendent experience); Mr. Phil Barefield, Superintendent at Hart, Texas; and Mr. Bill Wood, Superintendent at Bryson, (near Jacksboro, Texas).

Mr. Tom Jarboe, of the Texas Association of School Boards, said, "These are all good candidates. Any one of them should do a good job for Clarendon." Jarboe and the TASB assisted in seeking applicants and in the screening process. TASB participation probably increased the number of applications and attracted quality applicants.

The three candidates will be interviewed by an elected committee of faculty members on April 12, 13 and 14. They will also meet again with the Board.

The Board will announce the new superintendent on April 20.

Jarboe praised the Board for their hard work. "The trustees have put in many long hours and have spent many late nights. They have chosen the cream of the crop out of many applicants. Some were really outstanding."

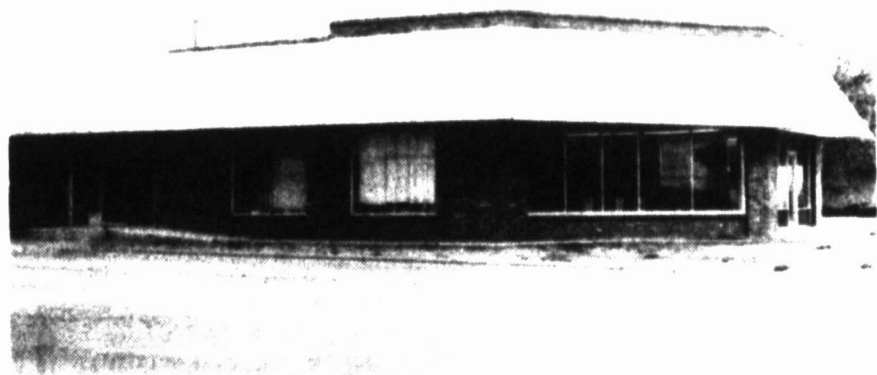

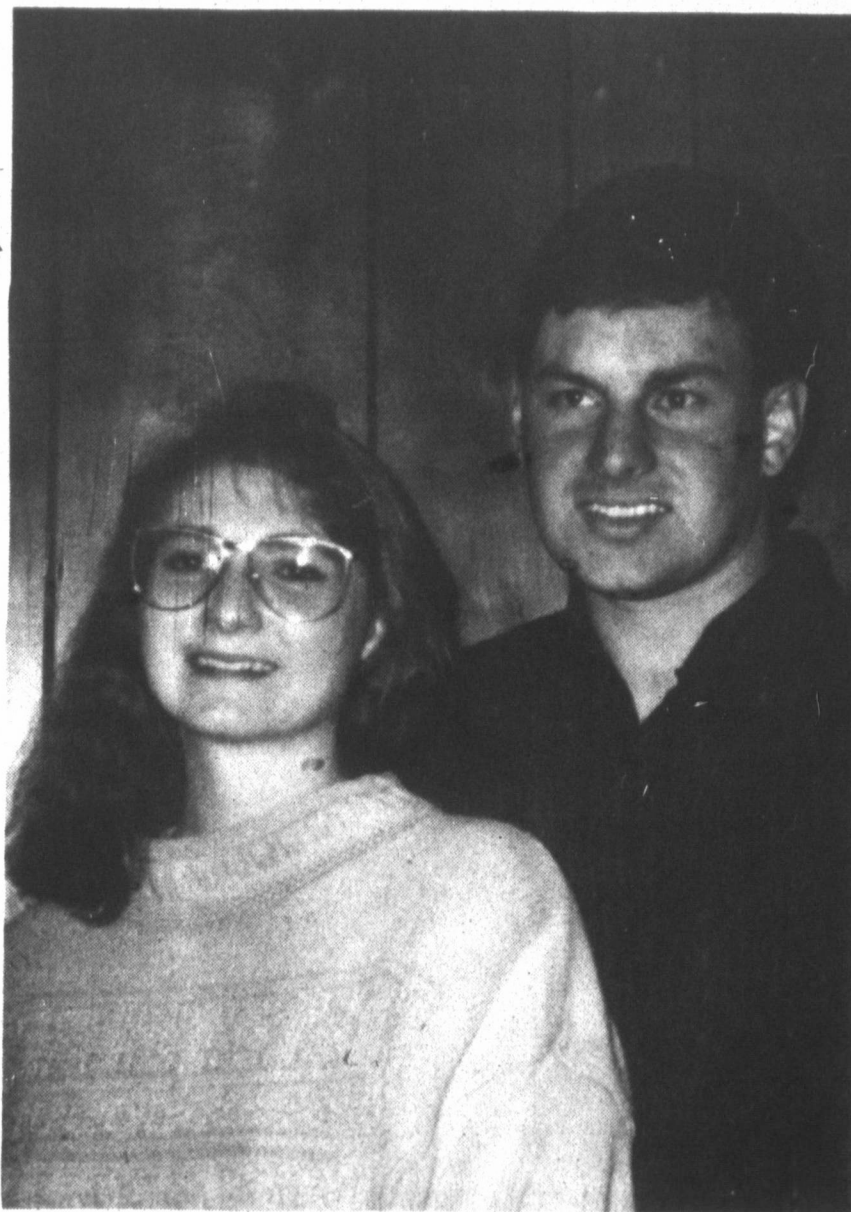
The doctors and staff of Amarillo Cataract & Eye Surgery Center have volunteered to participate in a Mission Cataract USA '93. They want to help the number of people living in their community who have no means to pay for needed cataract surgery. Together with more than one hundred seventy eye surgeons throughout the United States they will perform free cataract surgeries for patients who have no Medicare, Medicaid, third party insurance coverage or any other ability to pay.

On Saturday, April 24, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., by appointment only, free eye screenings will be given at their offices. The screening will determine those candidates with cataracts and financial need. Eligible candidates will be given a thorough eye examination and as many people as possible will be scheduled for cataract surgery at their own facility on Mission Cataract Day, Saturday, May 1. Due to the anticipated number of participants, they are limiting surgery to cataracts only. Please call 806-354-8891 to make an appointment for Saturday, April 24.

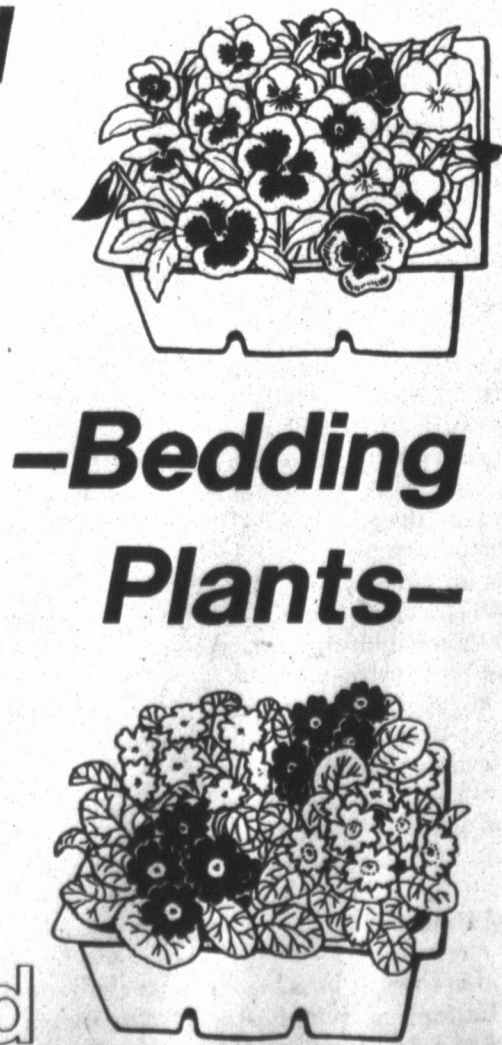

Are We Already Too Late?

Once again we are ready to Spring Forward with our time change. But there is a change that needs our attention and it will influence our nation which has a backbone of Agriculture Production and in a large measure supports the whole nation's economic health and welfare.

We have seen the nation of Russia come to their knees politically because of their reliance on Central Planning. Last week's paper had evidence that we too, are on the brink of making Russia's mistake.

Those who have written the Soil Conservation handbook have not taken into account weather factors in making their rules and regulations regarding the working of land that Farmers have been required to sow for erosion prevention. They would take credit through the CPR grass programs, the tree program and the overseeding programs, for the lack of dust in the air. While all of these factors may be instrumental to some degree in reduction of erosion, no consideration has been made of the fact that the farmers themselves have been the ones to sow, plant, and maintain the grass and the trees and the oversowing. They are better informed and have equipment that is better prepared to stop erosion through tillage than in 1977 when these rules were compiled. God has provided an unusual amount of winter moisture that has been helpful to farmers efforts. But we have to have enough common sense to know that there is only one chance to use what God has provided in the way of moisture to prepare the land for production. Nobody in Washington D.C. or the district Soil Conservation Offices can tell a Farmer when to use what moisture is available to till the land and prepare it for another year. We will make Russia's mistake and our production will be related to those decisions if we allow central planning to make the decisions about when our land is tilled.

When we approach officials in the Soil Conservation Office they are so concerned that their program will be turned over the EPA (Environmental Department) that they want to take all the power that they have been handed through compliance laws and

"throw the book" at those who are trying to use the God Given Moisture for the benefit of land preparation. Their answer is "you have a choice of complying with our rules and regulations or not taking part in the programs." Let's not throw the baby out with the bath water. That choice relates to not only the oversowing program, the lay out payments, (which do not fully compensate a farmer for his cost of oversowing, seed, fuel, time and wear and tear of equipment) but is also associated with marketing, the controls of over production related to world markets, foreign exchange, banking and all the necessities that make for farm operation.

Courts may be Redistricted

Steven A. Carriker, Chairman of the Senate Committee on Redistricting, has sent out a letter announcing hearings on possible reshaping of judicial districts. Last time this topic came up, the legislature tried to kill the district court in this area and create a new court in Houston.

Hearings will be held in Abilene, Nacogdoches and San Antonio. For more information, call (512) 463-1160 or (800) 253-9693.

The letter asks questions about current districts. Judging from the tenor of the questions, the legislature may well be planning to raid West Texas again, taking a court away from this area and giving it to Houston.

Some observers suspect the legislature is planning a new court district composed of minorities and designed to cater to minorities. One observer likened the situation to the fragmentation of Yugoslavia.

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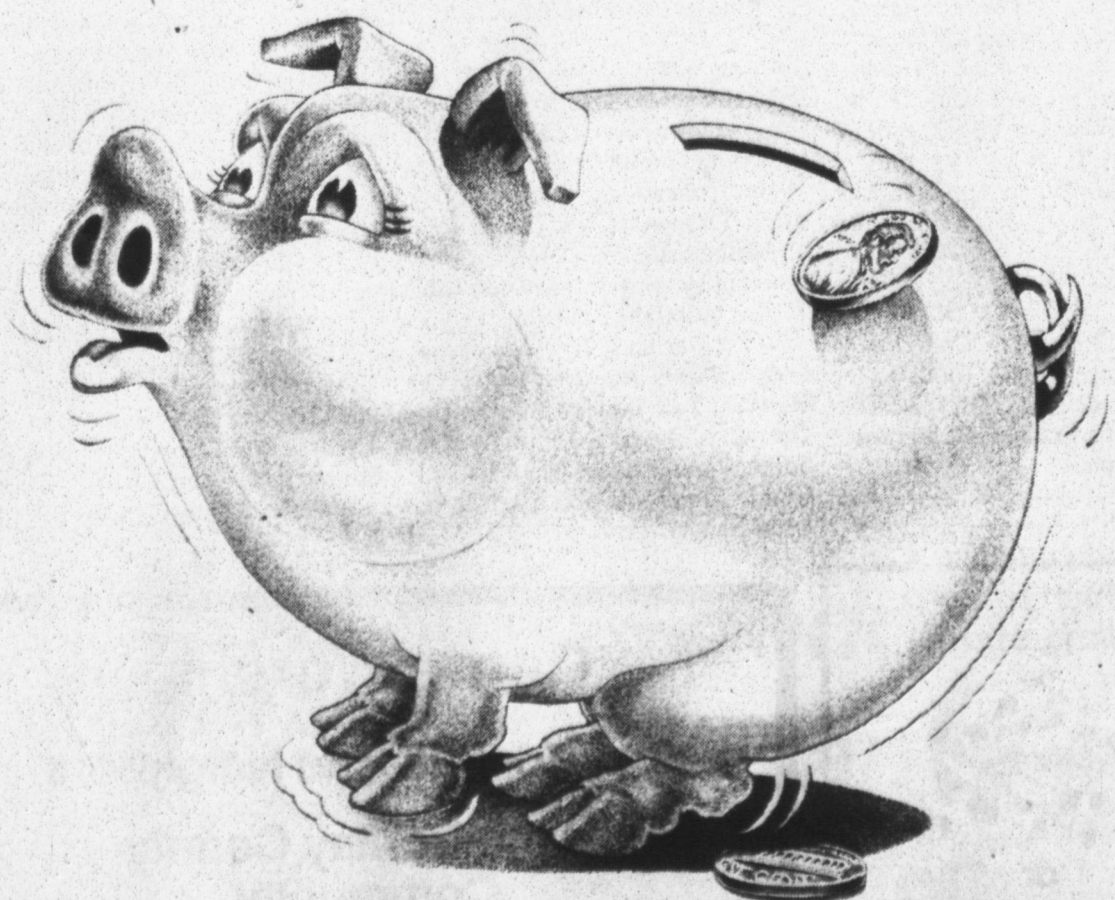

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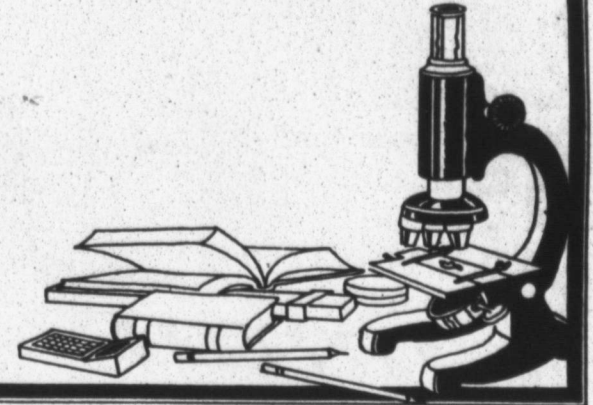

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Can Cats Catch Colds?

In cats, one of the most commonly seen diseases is feline upper respiratory disease. This disease is highly contagious and is caused by as many as three different organisms which infect the animal. It is characterized by sneezing, runny nose, cough, and matted eyes. It can be seen as early as a few weeks of age and up to three to four years of age if the animal has not been previously exposed or vaccinated against this disease complex. The organisms that cause feline upper respiratory disease can be viral, bacterial, or caused by a bacteria-like organism called Chlamydia. Often this disease is highly contagious and can go

through an unprotected cat population very rapidly. Usually, all exposed animals will become ill and some may even die due to the secondary effects of this disease. Severe respiratory congestion can cause respiratory distress and result in the death of the animal. Secondary infection from other bacteria can take place as a result of immune suppression caused by the primary invader organisms which cause the initial disease.

The good news is this is a very preventable disease complex. Young kittens should begin receiving vaccinations as early as eight weeks of age and should have a minimum of two vaccinations to prevent this disease complex. (The second shot or booster should take place four to six weeks after the initial vaccination.) Yearly boosters are required to prevent the disease occurring in older animals. These boosters are usually given as a part of routine annual vaccinations for the pet and should

be accompanied by vaccinations against rabies, and, if the pet is an outdoor/indoor animal, feline leukemia as well. A physical ex-

amination should be given at this time and the pet should be checked for internal parasites.

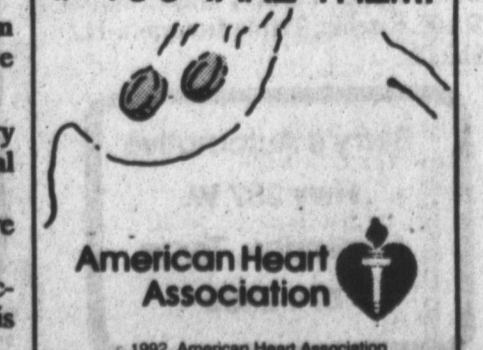
Politician to Ax Historical Body

Hospice Cares

Hospice of the Panhandle now brings its unique form of caring for the terminally ill to Donley County residents, announced Sherry McCavit, director of the non-profit agency based in Pampa.

Medicare-certified, Hospice of the Panhandle cares for persons who can no longer benefit from curative treatment and who have a limited life expectancy.

"Most hospice patients receive care at home from our team of professionals: physicians, nurses, social workers, counselors, therapists, aides, and volunteers," McCavit explained. "This team provides medical care and support services, not only to the patient, but to the patient's family, also."

Hospice is different from other forms of healthcare in five important ways, McCavit said.

1. Hospice offers comfort rather than a cure. Under the direction of a physician, hospice care focuses on pain and symptom control to help the patient live as fully and as comfortably as possible.

2. Hospice treats the person not the disease. The hospice team of professionals addresses the medical, emotional, psychological and spiritual needs of the patient and family.

3. Hospice emphasizes quality, rather than length, of life. Hospice neither hastens nor postpones death; it affirms life and sees dying as a normal process. The hospice movement stresses human values that go beyond the physical needs of the patient.

4. Hospice considers the entire family, not just the patient, the "unit of care." Patients and families are included in the decision-making process, and bereavement counseling is provided to the family after the death of their loved one.

5. Hospice offers help and support to the patient and family on a 24-hour, seven-days-a-week, on-call basis. Hospice of the Panhandle is a people call away for patients and their families who need help. Patients routinely receive periodic in-home services of a nurse, home health aide, social worker, volunteer, and other members of the hospice team.

"We never bill patients or their families for our services," added McCavit. She explained that hospice care is a covered benefit under most private insurance plans and is also covered Medicare/Medicaid benefit in Texas. One of the founding principles of this program, she said, is that basic hospice services will be provided to anyone who is eligible, regardless of reimbursement possibilities.

Although most of Hospice of the Panhandle's services are covered by private insurance or Medicare, these payments rarely cover the full cost of care, McCavit said. Therefore, Hospice relies on grants and community support to make up the difference, she said.

A speakers bureau composed of staff members and volunteers is available to present free programs on hospice care to any interested groups. The program includes a video (when a TV/VCR is available), a brief presentation concerning Hospice of the Panhandle, and a question-and-answer session.

Volunteers supply an important part of hospice care in many different ways, McCavit said. Hospice volunteers sit with patients, deliver flowers and treats, run errands for families, perform office tasks and fill in where ever they are needed. Hospice of the Panhandle's Volunteer training program prepares volunteers for their special work.

Social Security News

Generally, Social Security beneficiaries under 70 who work and earn over a certain limit aren't entitled to their full Social Security benefit. They must report their earnings to Social Security by April 15 each year.

The earnings limits for 1992 and 1993 are: 1992 under age 65 - \$7,440; 1993 \$7,680; age 65-69 - 1992 - \$10,200; 1993 \$10,560.

After you retire, you may have received payments for work you did before you started getting Social Security benefits. Usually, those payments will not affect your Social Security benefit if we know they are compensation for work done before you retired. However, many times we don't know this unless you tell us. This column describes some of the more common types of "special payments," helps you to decide if you receive one, and tells you what steps to take if you do.

If you worked for wages, income received after retirement counts as a special payment if the last thing you did to earn the payment was completed before you stopped working for your employer.

Some special payments to employees include bonuses, accumulated vacation or sick pay, severance pay, back pay, stand by pay, payments to teachers in non-work months, sales commissions, or deferred compensation reported on a W-2 form for one year that we earned in a previous year. These amounts may be shown on the W-2 in the box labeled "Nonqualified Plan".

If you were self-employed, net income received after retirement counts as a special payment if you performed the services to earn the payment before the first month of entitlement to Social Security benefits. "Services" are any regular work or other significant activity you do for your business.

Some special payments to self-employed people include income obtained by an owner of a business who does not perform significant services in that business, farm agricultural program payments, income from carryover crops (crops harvested and stored in one year but sold in another), or royalties paid to a person over 65 years old.

If you are a Social Security beneficiary and your total yearly earnings, including special payments, exceed the earnings limit, you must report your earnings to Social Security. But, before you do, contact us and tell us you think your earnings include a special payment. If we agree, we will count the amount of the payment as part of your total earnings for the year.

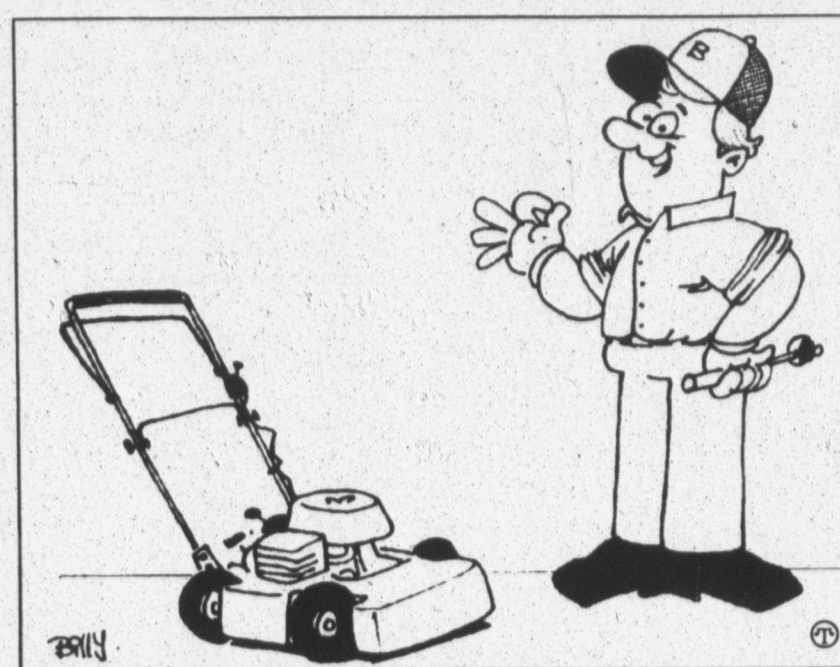

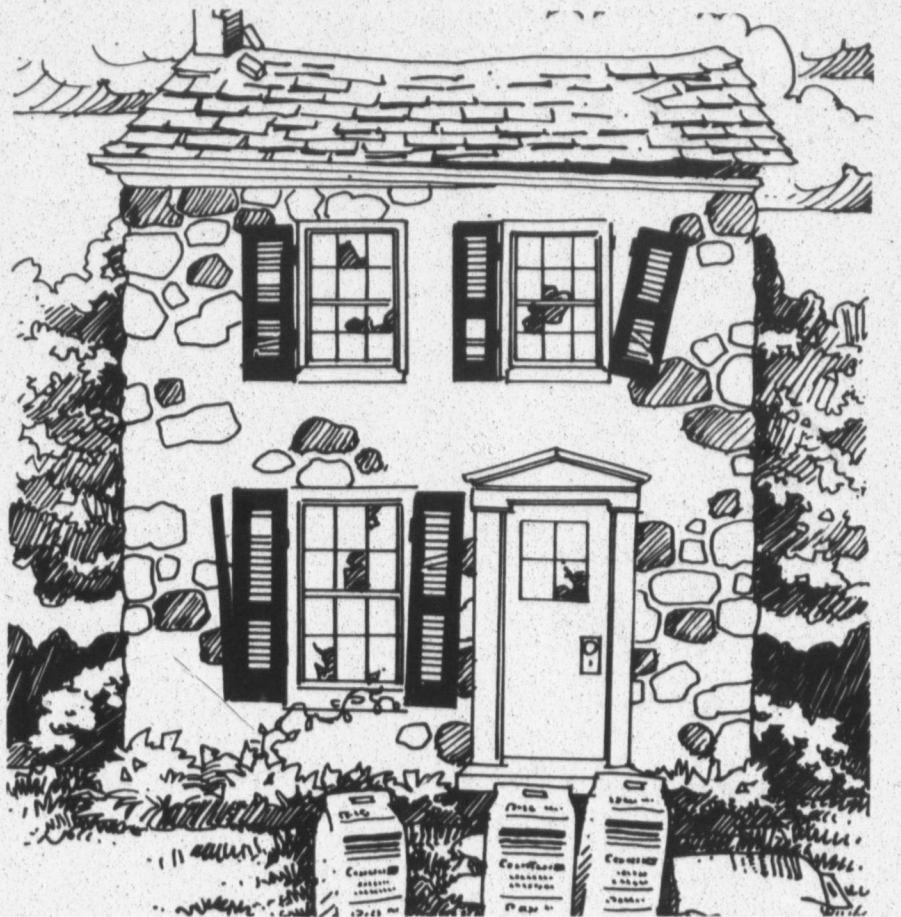

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$45,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on Jan. 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$5,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year... and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home.

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home.

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1992, you won't need to reapply for 1993 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 1993. And if you turned 65 or became disabled during 1992, you need to file for the additional exemptions.

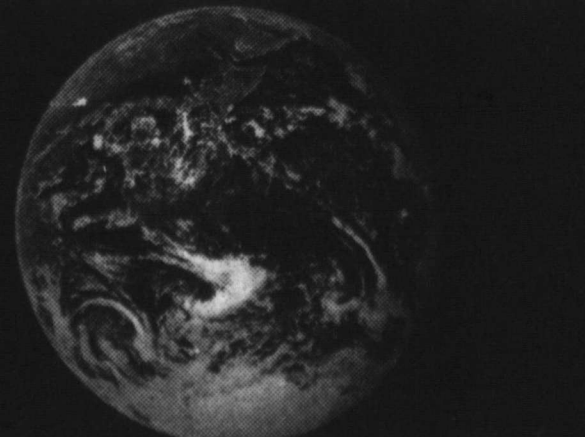
