**COUNTY GETTING NEW BRIDGE.** Workers are pouring the deck on a new bridge over Lelia Lake Creek 10 1/2 miles east of Clarendon on FM 2471. The new bridge is 240 feet long with a 30 foot wide deck. It should be open in a few months. While the concrete on the deck is curing, the contractors will build up and pave the approaches. Clarendon's Monroe and Sons are doing the work. The new structure is located just west of the T.E. Naylor farm. It replaces a low-water crossing which replaced an earlier culvert. Both the shallow crossing and the culvert washed out frequently, causing high maintenance costs.

## Donley County Pioneer Dies

One of Donley County's oldest native sons died Saturday at the age of 88. DeVerdie Eugene "D.E." Leathers was born May 11, 1901 near Lelia Lake, the youngest of eight children of a pioneer family which settled on farm and ranch land purchased shortly after the incorporation of Donley county in the 1880's.

"D.E. married Grace May Batson on August 4, 1918 and raised two children. They purchased a farm near Lelia Lake which they hung onto throughout the Great Depression and Dust Bowl years, later acquiring additional properties nearby and retiring to a home in Clarendon in 1966.

In 1940, the Leathers family was chosen "The Typical American Family" in a contest sponsored by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and big city newspapers across the nation in cooperation with the New York World's Fair of 1939-40. Then President Franklin Delano Roosevelt questioned "D.E." as to how the publicity was affecting him and the family. "I'm like Popeye the sailor...I am what I am!" he replied.

A tall gregarious man with a keen mind and an unstoppable sense of humor, "D.E." was quoted in an August 1988 Globe News article as saying "I love nature and human nature. I believe in treating everyone the same, rich or poor. Too many people let money make them jealous."

"D.E." loved the early days of the west and often recounted tales of his childhood on his parents' ranchland. He also loved the mountains of Colorado, making his first trip there in a 1915 model "T" Ford shortly after being married. He enjoyed camping and fishing and amassed a family movie collection of many miles of film dating back to 1940. His incredible memory for historic detail was called upon by those researching a soon-to-be-released book on the 1939-40 World's Fair, but "D.E." declined a network television programs' request for an interview on the subject.

Mr. Leathers had been a director of the First Bank & Trust Company of Clarendon since August 14, 1957. He also served in numerous appointed positions on boards and commissions during his lifetime. He was a member of Mason's A.F. & A.M. Lodge #700 since 1924.

Survivors include his wife Grace of the family home in Clarendon, a daughter Jean Williams of Dolores, Colorado, a son Johnny Leathers of Clarendon, 4 grandchildren, 7 great-grandchildren and numerous nephews and nieces. He was the last survivor of his parents' children and was preceded in death by grandson Jay Williams in 1977.

Services were Tuesday, January 30th at 10:30 a.m. at the First Baptist Church in Clarendon.

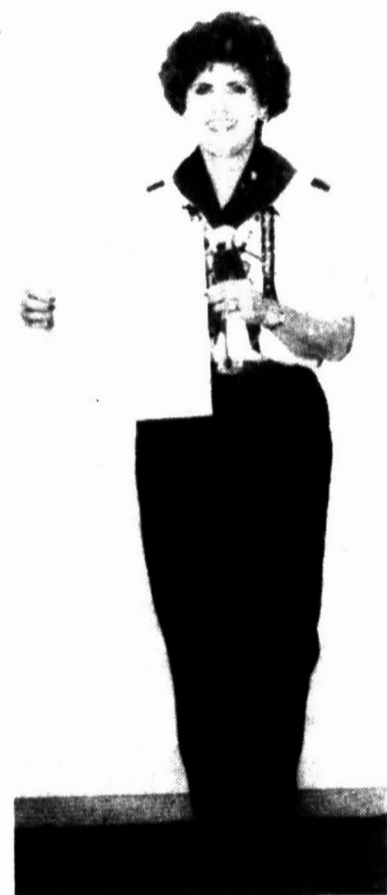
This program promises to be a very informative one and of interest to all families of attending students, as well as to interested individuals throughout our community.

## Leaders Sought

The Texas Agricultural Lifetime Leadership (TALL) program, designed to link modern agriculture with industry and other segments of society, is now open for applicants for its second class. The deadline for consideration is February 15, 1990, said Dr. L. S. Pope, who coordinates the program for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"TALL is designed to assist young men and women associated with agriculture in developing leadership skills," Pope said.

The first class of 24 members visited ten agricultural areas of Texas, as well as Washington, D. C., and northern Europe. During the two-year program, members were able to interact with more than 175 outstanding leaders, Pope said. A similar schedule is planned for Group II.

The basis for selection into TALL is evidence of leadership ability and desire to take on decision-making roles in Texas agriculture, Pope said. To enter, candidates must go through a rigorous selection process, including an interview.

TALL is sponsored largely from outside grants and scholarships, but participants must pay part of the cost. Members must be between the ages of 25 and 40 and be involved in an agricultural pursuit in Texas.

"Agricultural leaders must make some critical decisions in the years ahead," Pope said. "They must be

well-informed on key issues and must recognize the complex society in which we live. Also, they must be able to speak out and willing to address problems facing agriculture.

"It is important that they interact effectively with leaders outside of agriculture."

Candidates for the second class of TALL can obtain additional information from their local county Extension Service office, or write Dr. Pope at 242 Kleberg Center, Texas A & M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

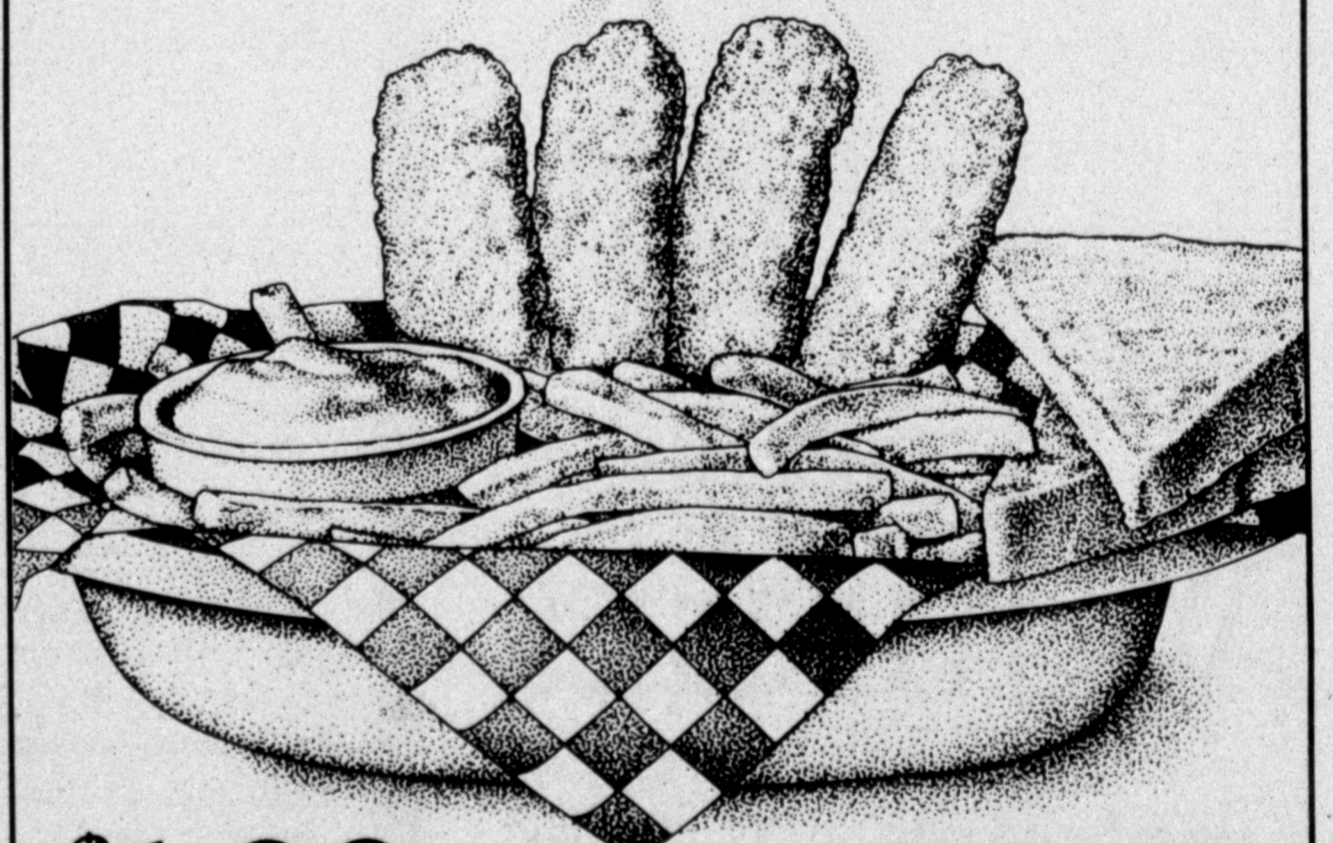

## Obituary

Everett E. Mann

Captain Everett Edward Mann, United States Navy (Retired), a Navy officer, naval architect and engineer, died on December 30th in San Francisco. He was 87 years old.

Born in Dryden, Virginia on April 16th, 1902, he grew up in the panhandle of Texas, where his parents, Robert Emery Mann and Minnie Lee (Young) Mann had settled near Hedley, Texas, where they farmed.

He enlisted in the Navy in 1921, at the age of 19, and subsequently received a Congressional appointment to the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis.

In 1934, he received a Master's Degree in Engineering from the University of California.

He began his Navy career in the submarine service on the Navy's early R-boats, and later served as the Engineering Officer aboard the battleship New York from 1939 until 1942.

Mann served during World War II in both the Atlantic and Pacific theatres and was awarded the Bronze Star for his service as Maintenance Officer of Service Squadron Ten, Advanced Repair Units, in the Pacific. His wartime service took him from the signing of the Atlantic Charter by Roosevelt and Churchill at the Atlantic Conference in August 1941 to the Japanese Surrender ceremonies aboard the battleship Missouri in Tokyo Harbor on September 1st, 1945.

In 1942-44, he served as the Planning Officer at the U.S. Naval Drydock, South Boston, where he oversaw ship repair as well as the special outfitting of the ship that carried F.D.R. on his wartime Atlantic crossings in 1943 to meet Allied leaders. For his service at the shipyard, Mann received a letter of commendation from Secretary of

the Navy Forrestal.

In 1944, he was ordered to the Pacific Fleet, where he oversaw the repair of battle-damaged ships as well as of ships disabled by the great typhoon of 1945. He was the Maintenance Officer, Destroyers Pacific from 1946-47.

At the war's end, as a member of Admiral Spruance's staff, Mann was among the first Americans to view the devastation wrought on the city of Hiroshima by the atomic bomb.

After the war, he was posted to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, where he was appointed Professor of Naval Engineering and elected to Sigma Xi, a scientific honorary society.

Following his retirement from the Navy in 1950, he joined the American President Lines as Chief Engineer. Later he became the Executive Vice President of Grove Valve and Regulator Company in Emeryville California.

He was a member of the Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers and of the American Society of Naval Engineers.

Captain Mann is survived by his wife of 62 years, Mary Evelyn (Woods) Mann of Millbrae; his daughter Frances Lee Riley, of Menlo Park; his son Professor Everett E. Mann, Jr., of Bakersfield; and his son Robert Woods Mann, of San Francisco. He is also survived by his sister Roberta Gerlach, who lives in Genesee, New York. His seven grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren make their homes in Virginia and California.

Captain Mann was the uncle of Joan Ray (Moreman) Whitmore of Harrison Arkansas, Dr. David E. Moreman of Front Royal, Virginia

and Jack A. Moreman of Clarendon, Texas.

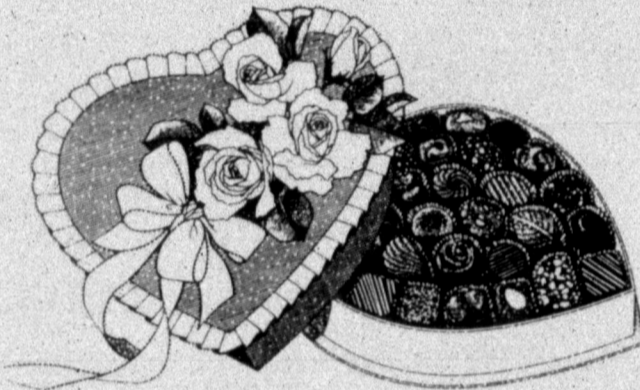

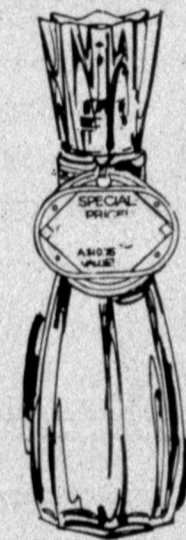

**Minutes**

January 9, 1990

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular session on January 9, 1990,

in the Board Room, City Hall, at 7:00 p.m.

Members present: Mayor James Sharrar, Aldermen Paul Bivens, David Pitts, James Kuhn, and David Davidson.

Members absent: Alderman Bobbie Kidd.

Others present: City Secretary Donna Edwards, San Thompson, Bob Williams, Willard Hudson, Walt Knorpp, Todd Knorpp, Dude Cornell, Steve Reynolds, Clayton Hill, T. Mullins, Gordon Maddox, and Ernie Johnston.

Minutes of the December 19, and December 28, 1990, meeting were read, and upon a motion said minutes were approved.

San Thompson, representing the Chamber of Commerce, discussed the plans of the Chamber of Commerce to send out letters to encourage small businesses that would attract tourism in Clarendon to locate here, i.e. antique stores, gift shops, and art galleries. He also showed the Board the sketch of the sign the Chamber of Commerce plans to erect. Mr. Thompson requested \$1,000.00 from the City of Clarendon Motel Bed Tax Funds to use to advertise and promote Clarendon for the purpose of attracting tourism and tourism oriented businesses. Motion was made to give the Chamber of Commerce \$1,000.00 of Motel Bed Tax Funds for the promotion of tourism in Clarendon. Motion carried.

The Board of Aldermen discussed the City's sanitation operation planning with two of the Don-

ley County Commissioners in hopes that the City and County can work together on this. The Board discussed financing for the dumpsters and equipment. Motion was made to secure a loan from Donley County State Bank for financing of the dumpsters and equipment. Motion carried.

Motion was made to authorize a letter to BFI advising them that the City desires to terminate its contract with BFI when the current contract expires on April 1, 1990. Motion carried.

Todd Knorpp presented the Board with current insurance specifications for the City of Clarendon. Motion was made to renew the City insurance with Knorpp Insurance. Motion carried.

Motion was made to approve the sale of the north 1/2 of Block 4 and the northeast part of Block 5, Miller's addition, Clarendon, Texas, for the bid of \$500. Motion carried.

Motion was made to approve the sale of the west 1/2 of Block 28, Grant's Addition, Clarendon, Texas, in the amount of \$345. Motion carried.

Motion was made to pass an ordinance providing for discounts for early payment of property taxes.

**ORDINANCE NO. 282**  
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR DISCOUNTS FOR EARLY PAYMENT OF PROPERTY TAXES.

WHEREAS the City Commission of the City of Clarendon believes that property owners are

entitled to a discount for early payment of property taxes levied by this district.

Now THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Clarendon that pursuant to Texas Property Tax Code Section 31.05 (b) discounts will be allowed as follows:

- (1) three percent if the tax is paid in October or earlier;
- (2) two percent if the tax is paid in November; and
- (3) one percent if the tax is paid in December.

**ORDINANCE NO. 283**  
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY TO DEFRAY COSTS OF COLLECTION OF DELINQUENT TAXES.

WHEREAS the City Commission of the City of Clarendon, deems it necessary to have a declared policy regarding the expense of collecting delinquent taxes due the City of Clarendon, and

WHEREAS the City Commission of the City of Clarendon is of the opinion that said expense of collecting said delinquent taxes should be borne by the delinquent properties and their owners who are responsible for causing such expenses.

Now THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Clarendon:

**Section 1:** Whenever any accounts for delinquent taxes owed the City of Clarendon are given to its tax attorney for collection, on or after July 1 of the year they become delinquent, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to, and shall collect, an additional penalty of fifteen (15%) percent of the delinquent taxes and penalty (including any interest owed) due on each delinquent property at the time of collection, either before or after suit and or foreclosure sale, as provided by Section 33.07 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

**Section 2:** In addition to the collection expenses provided for in Section 1 above, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to collect the actual expenses incurred by the Donley County Appraisal District in providing all data and information as to the name, identity, and location of necessary parties and the legal description of property necessary to the filing of any suit for delinquent taxes.

PASSED, APPROVED, AND ADOPTED this the 9th day of January, 1990.

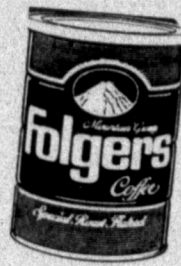
