

COUNTY GETTING NEW BRIDGE. Workers are pouring the deck on a new bridge over Lelia Lake Creek 10 1/2 miles east of Clarendon on FM 2471. The new bridge is 240 feet long with a 30 foot wide deck. It should be open in a few months. While the concrete on the deck is curing, the contractors will build up and pave the approaches. Clarendon's Monroe and Sons are doing the work. The new structure is located just west of the T.E. Naylor farm. It replaces a low-water crossing which replaced an earlier culvert. Both the shallow crossing and the culvert washed out frequently, causing high maintenance costs.

Donley County Pioneer Dies

One of Donley County's oldest native sons died Saturday at the age of 88. DeVerdie Eugene "D.E." Leathers was born May 11, 1901 near Lelia Lake, the youngest of eight children of a pioneer family which settled on farm and ranch land purchased shortly after the incorporation of Donley county in the 1880's.

"D.E. married Grace May Batson on August 4, 1918 and raised two children. They purchased a farm near Lelia Lake which they hung onto throughout the Great Depression and Dust Bowl years, later acquiring additional properties nearby and retiring to a home in Clarendon in 1966.

In 1940, the Leathers family was chosen "The Typical American Family" in a contest sponsored by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and big city newspapers across the nation in cooperation with the New York World's Fair of 1939-40. Then President Franklin Delano Roosevelt questioned "D.E." as to how the publicity was affecting him and the family. "I'm like Popeye the sailor...I am what I am!" he replied.

A tall gregarious man with a keen mind and an unstoppable sense of humor, "D.E." was quoted in an August 1988 Globe News article as saying "I love nature and human nature. I believe in treating everyone the same, rich or poor. Too many people let money make them jealous."

"D.E." loved the early days of the west and often recounted tales of his childhood on his parents' ranchland. He also loved the mountains of Colorado, making his first trip there in a 1915 model "T" Ford shortly after being married. He enjoyed camping and fishing and amassed a family movie collection of many miles of film dating back to 1940. His incredible memory for historic detail was called upon by those researching a soon-to-bereleased book on the 1939-40 World's Fair, but "D.E." declined a network television programs' request for an interview on the subject.

Mr. Leathers had been a director of the First Bank & Trust Company of Clarendon since August 14, 1957. He also served in numerous appointed positions on boards and commissions during his lifetime. He was a member of Mason's A.F. & A.M. Lodge #700 since 1924.

Survivors include his wife Grace of the family home in Clarendon, a daughter Jean Williams of Dolores, Colorado, a son Johnny Leathers of Clarendon, 4 grandchildren, 7 great-grandchildren and numerous nephews and nieces. He was the last survivor of his parents' children and was preceded in death by grandson Jay Williams in 1977.

Services were Tuesday, January 30th at 10:30 a.m. at the First Baptist Church in Clarendon.

The Texas Agricultural Lifetime Leadership Leadership (TALL) program, designed to link modern agriculture with industry and other segments of society, is now open for applicants for its second class. "Agricultural leaders must make some critical decisions in the years ahead," Pope said. "They must be

must recognize the complex society in which we live. Also, they musts be able to speak out and willing to address problems facing agricul-

"It is important that they interact effectively with leaders outside of agriculture."







A Controlled Burn.

66We're coming in.", squawked a voice over the dispatcher's radio. "It turned out to be a controlled burn after all."

"Ten-Four", riveted dispatcher's response.

Fire is the most totally destructive force known to man. We have seen forest fires take thousands of miles of timber over the past few years. American, South American and African continents have all suffered from raging grass and forest fires, many of which are intentionally set. And it seems that man is almost helpless to stop such a foe.

Fire can also be the most useful and beneficial natural tools available to mankind. Just imagine what life would be like without the controlled burn of a campfire or the controlled flame of a kitchen range-top.

So we see that fire can be both beneficial and destructive. The same can be said of Christians today.

In Matthew 3:11 John the Baptist said these words: "I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance, but he that cometh after me is mightier than I, whose shoes I am not worthy to bear. He shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost and with FIRE."

These were words spoken of Jesus the Son of God and His Holy Spirit to come.

What did John mean when he said, "with fire"?

Today we see a separation in many denominations of the church. While some burn with a fire most akin to a raging forest fire devouring everything in their paths, others sit smoldering, refusing combus-tion. What then is the solution?

yet to see what one person totally given over to the Spirit of God can

What we desperately need in our churches today are people that are not afraid or ashamed to burn with the Spirit of God. For if we truly did burn with the power of the Lord, everyone around us would see the total dedication to and love of Jesus we had. A person set on fire for God should burn on the inside like a glowing red hot boiler and walk in meekness and wisdom showing forth God's mercy and patience. A person set on fire for God will ignite every believer around him while not bruising their feelings. A person set on fire for God will never raise himself up but will raise up Jesus and put others first.

He began his Navy career in the submarine service on the Navy's early R-boats, and later served as the Engineering Officer aboard the battleship New York from 1939 until 1942.

Mann served during World War II in both the Atlantic and Pacific theatres and was awarded the Bronze Star for his service as Maintenance Officer of Service Squadron Ten, Advanced Repair Units, in the Pacific. His wartime service took him from the signing of the Atlantic Charter by Roosevelt and Churchill at the Atlantic Conference in August 1941 to the Japanese Surrender ceremonies aboard the battleship Missouri in Tokyo Harbor on September 1st,

In 1942-44, he served as the Planning Officer at the U.S. Naval Drydock, South Boston, where he oversaw ship repair as well as the special outfitting of the ship that carried F.D.R. on his wartime Atlantic crossings in 1943 to meet Allied leaders. For his service at the shipyard, Mann received a letter of commendation from Secretary of the Navy Forrestal.

In 1944, he was ordered to the Pacific Fleet, where he oversaw the repair of battle-damaged ships as well as of ships disabled by the great typhoon of 1945. He was the Maintenance Officer, Destroyers Pacific from 1946-47.

At the war's end, as a member of Admiral Spruance's staff, Mann was among the first Americans to view the devastation wrought on the city of Hiroshima by the atomic

After the war, he was posted to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, where he was appointed Professor of Naval Engineering and elected to Sigma Xi, a scientific honorary society.

Following his retirement from the Navy in 1950, he joined the American President Lines as Chief Engineer. Later he became the Executive Vice President of Grove Valve and Regulator Company in Emeryville California.

He was a member of the Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers and of the American Society of Naval Engineers.







Section 1: Whenever any accounts for delinquent taxes owed the City of Clarendon are given to its tax attorney for collection, on or after July 1 of the year they become delinquent, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to, and shall collect, an additional penalty of fifteen (15%) percent of the delinquent taxes and penalty (including any interest owed) due on each delinquent property at the time of collection, either before or after suit and or foreclosure sale, as provided by Section 33.07 of the **Texas Property Tax Code.**

Section 2: In addition to the collection expenses provided for in Section 1 above, the City of Clarendon shall be entitled to collect the actual expenses incurred by the **Donley County Appraisal District** in providing all data and information as to the name, identity, and location of necessary parties and the legal description of property necessary to the filing of any suit for delinquent taxes.






