## State Rules Against CISD

After a hearing on March 2, 1993, the Texas Education Agency entered a proposed decision that states, "Petitioner [Aleta] Thompson's appeal is granted."

The TEA document states that, "Petitioner Thompson satisfied her burden of proof in establishing a violation of 19 T.A.C. §149.43(c)(3) and local policy DOC. ... Neither Mr. Kepley nor Respondent district properly executed local policy." The agency further stated that: "Mr. Kepley's observation record of Petitioner Thompson during the Spring of 1992 is not to be considered in the final calculation of Petitioner Thompson's summative evaluation."

Mr. Kepley had no comment on the agency's findings. As of press time, Superintendent Jeff Walker had not returned the newspaper's phone calls. Board President Todd Knorpp said that he had not been informed of the hearing or the decision, therefore, of course, he had no comment.

The dispute goes back to Mr. Kepley's evaluation of Mrs. Thompson in the Spring of the 1991-1992 school year. In the Fall of that year both Mr. Kepley and an independent appraiser gave Mrs. Thompson a high evaluation. In the Spring evaluation, the independent appraiser again gave Mrs. Thompson high marks. However, Mr. Kepley awarded the teacher only 33 points out of a possible 61.

Mrs. Thompson requested a re-evaluation. That third evaluation was never made. Apparently the respondent, questioned whether there was a request for another evaluation. The TEA document states, "At hearing, he did not deny or profess confusion as to Petitioner's intent and request for another observation. Despite this, Mr. Kepley failed to arrange for another observation by a third appraiser as directed by local policy and by 19 T.A.C. §149.43(c)(3)." The report continued: "Furthermore, Mr. Kepley's credibility on his recollection of events was successfully challenged by Petitioner Thompson. During his testimony, Mr. Kepley admitted that Petitioner did request another observation and then contradicted himself in subsequent testimony."

Mrs. Thompson appealed to the Board of Trustees on August 13. Four board members voted to deny that Mrs. Thompson had a grievance. One Trustee voted for the teacher, and one abstained because he was related to the teacher's husband.

Apparently, had the Principal or the board agreed to a third evaluation, the matter would have ended at that point. The TEA document states that, "Petitioner Thompson was entitled to an observation by a third appraiser and was denied such by respondent. Accordingly, her appeal is to be granted and her 1991-92 summative evaluation score is to exclude the appraisal score provided by Mr. Kepley for the Spring of 1992."

The hearings officer noted that, "On a handwritten memo allegedly written to document his meeting with Mr. and Mrs. Thompson, Mr. Kepley scratched out the date of 5/19/92 and wrote 5/15/92. The date of 5/14/92 was set as the date for summative conferences with all the faculty."

The report continued, "There is no explanation provided by the Respondent for Mr. Kepley's original notation of 5/19/92, ... there is nothing to explain the error of 4 days in noting the date." It then states, "Mr. Kepley displayed a less than candid demeanor and willingness to directly answer questions during his testimony at the hearing." The Discussion section of the report concluded with the observation, "His demeanor and willingness to directly answer a question were less than candid at this point in time. Given these contradictions and less than straightforward demeanor, Mr. Kepley's credibility is severely eroded."

The school board extended Mr. Kepley's contract and awarded him a \$2,500 raise on February 11, at their last regular meeting, by a vote of five to one.

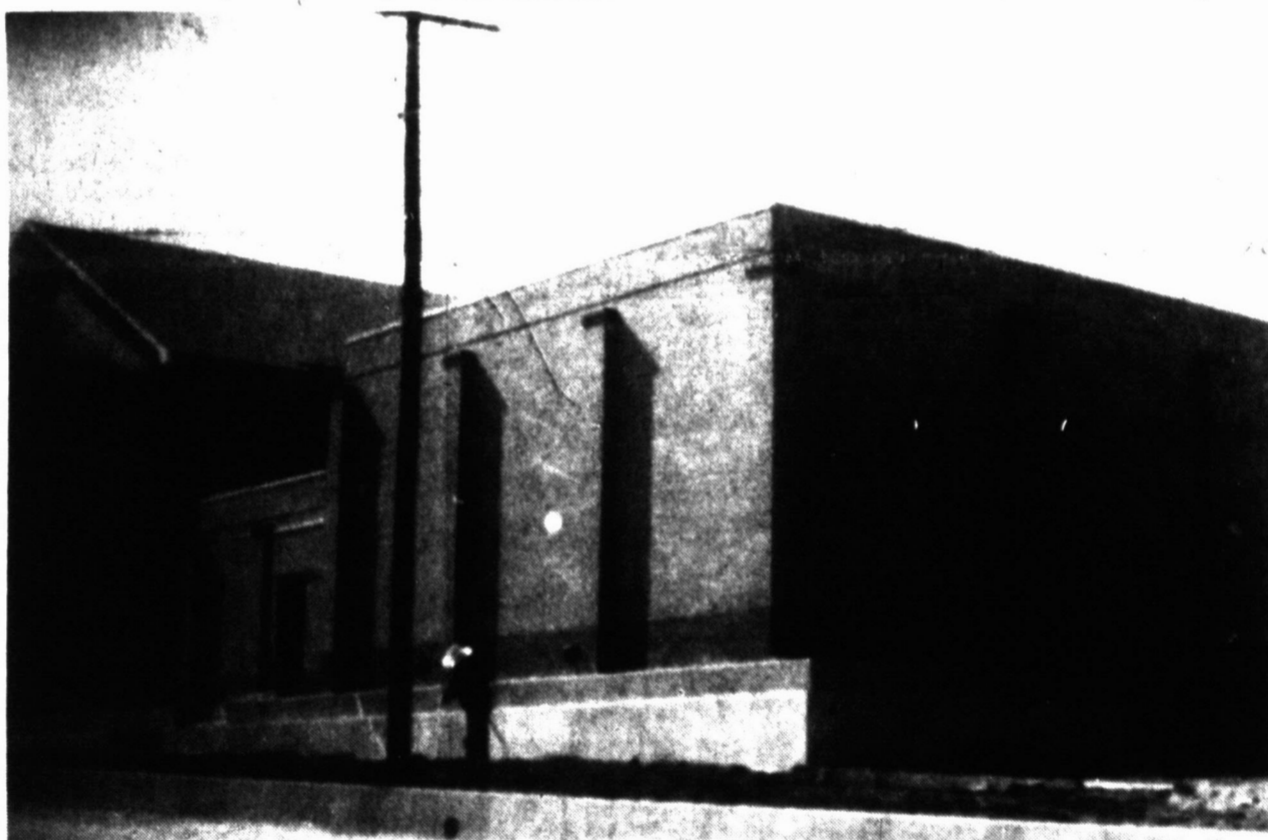
### Scouts Collect Food

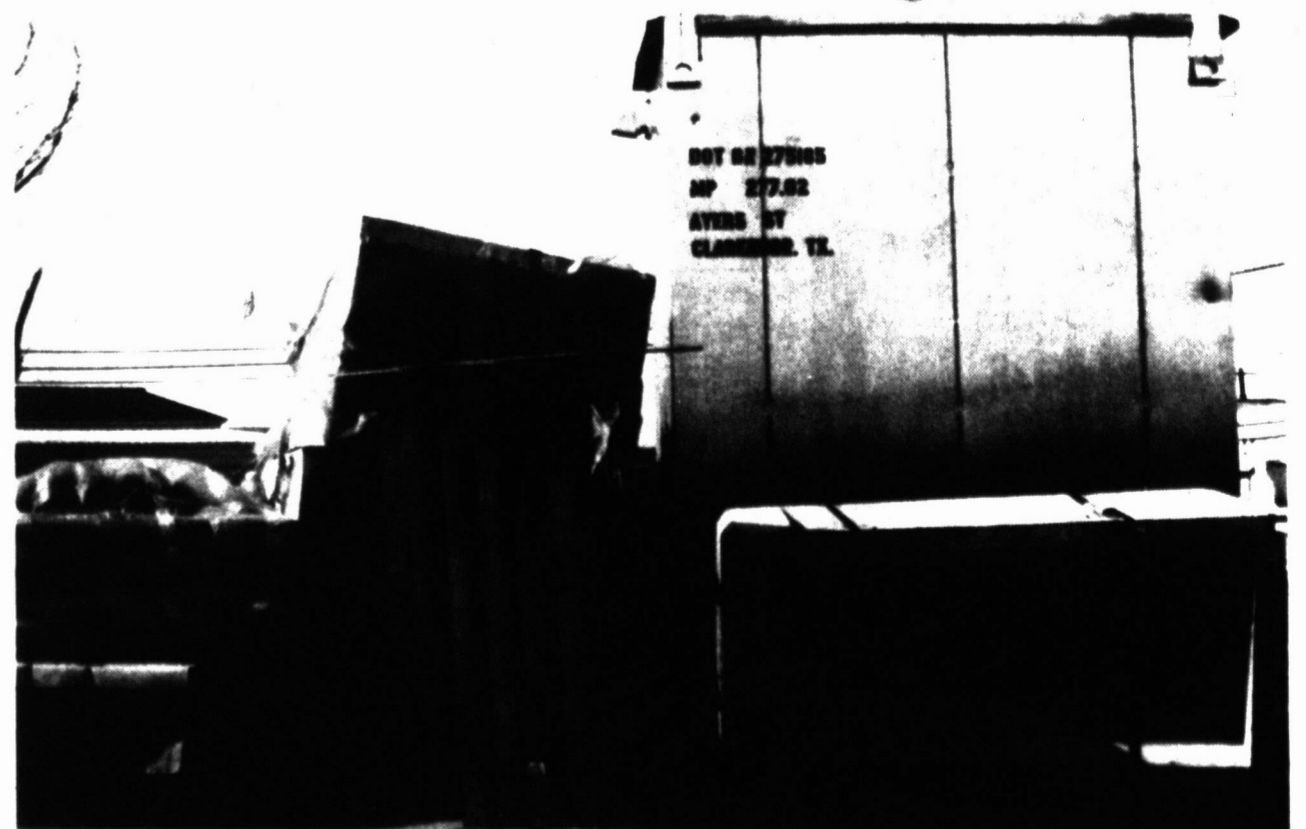

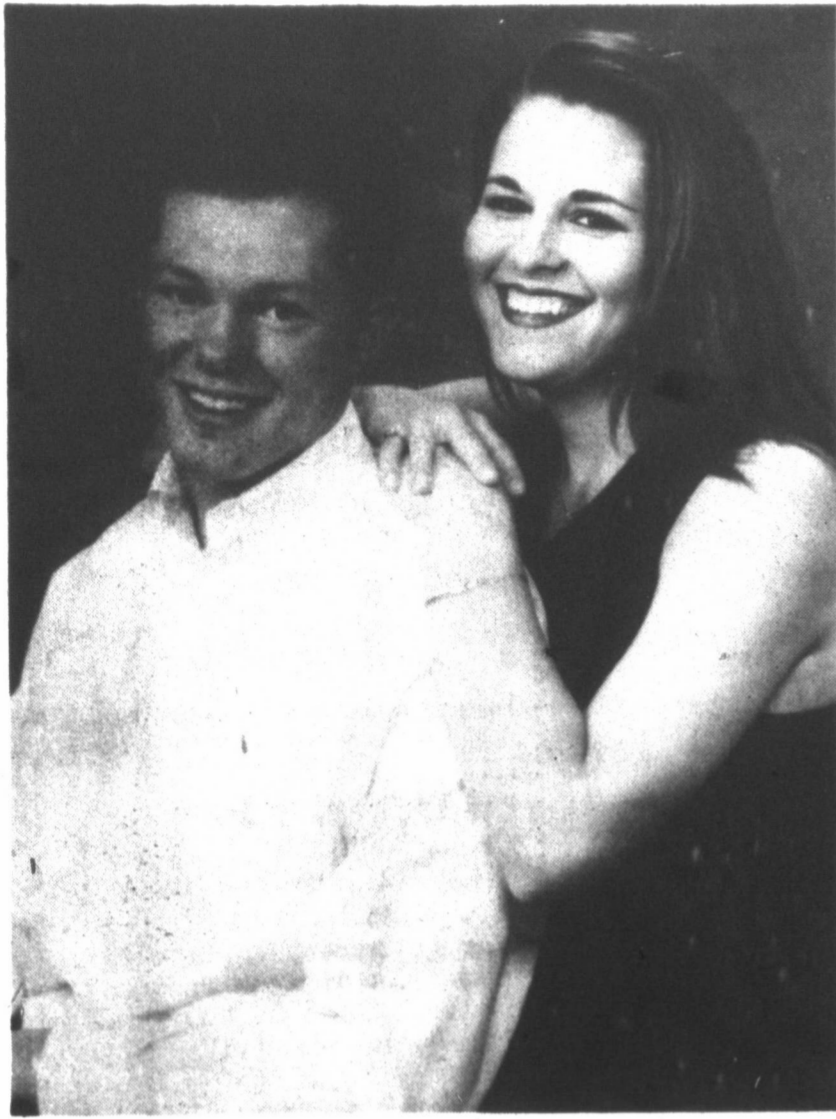

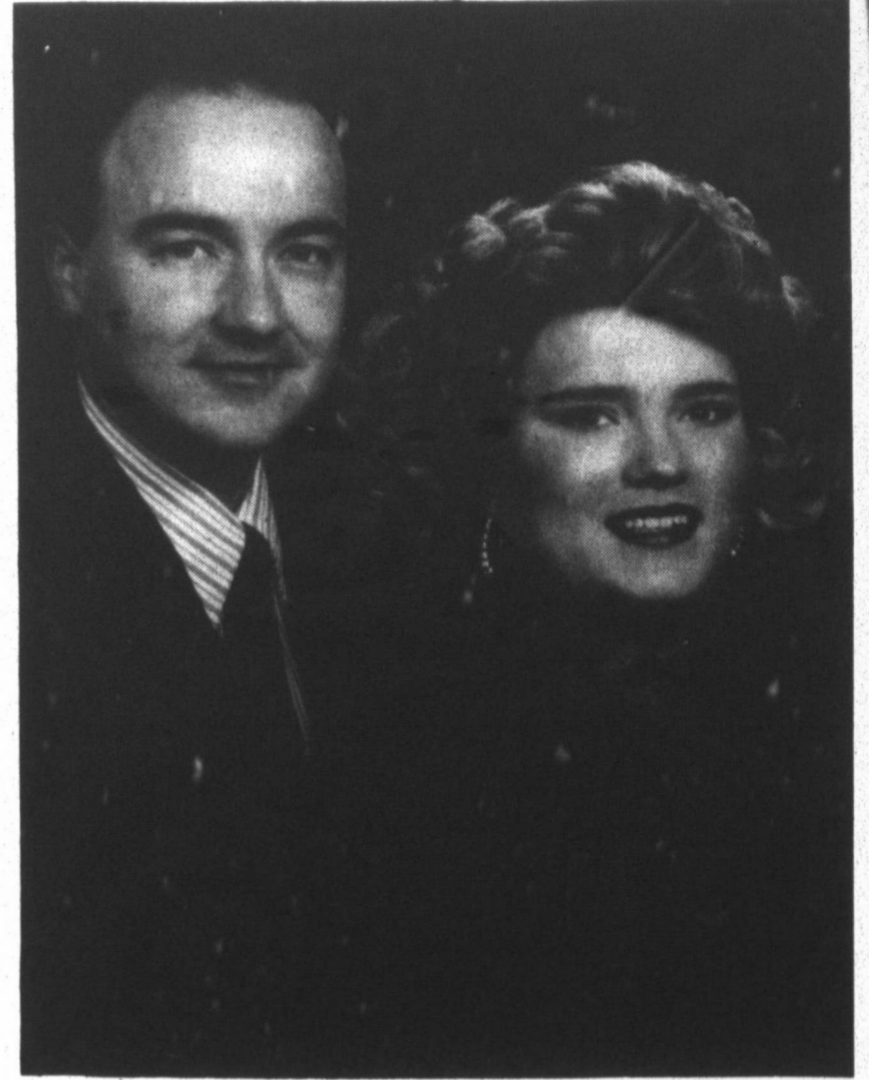

The Medical Center will soon be showing signs of Spring!

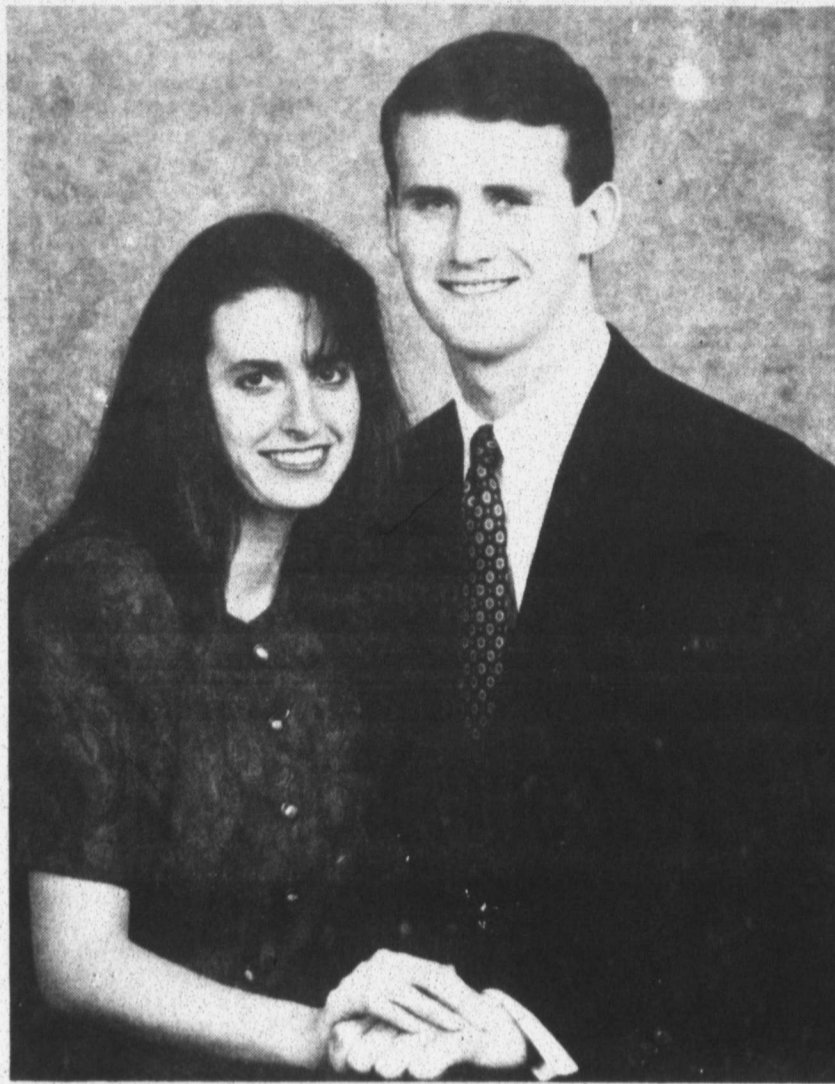

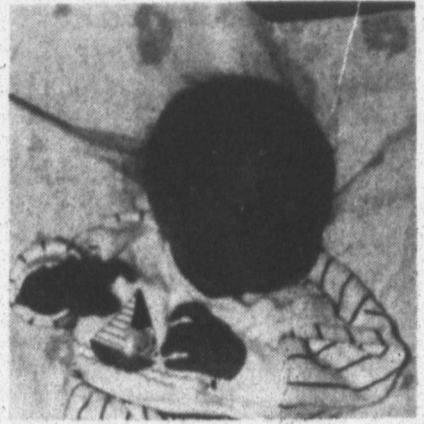
She is also the Granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Noah Stice of Samnorwood.

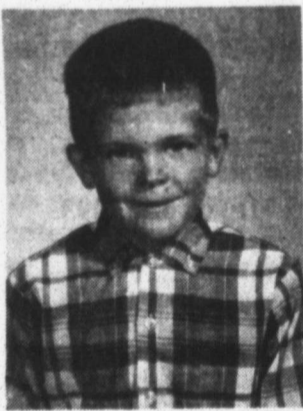

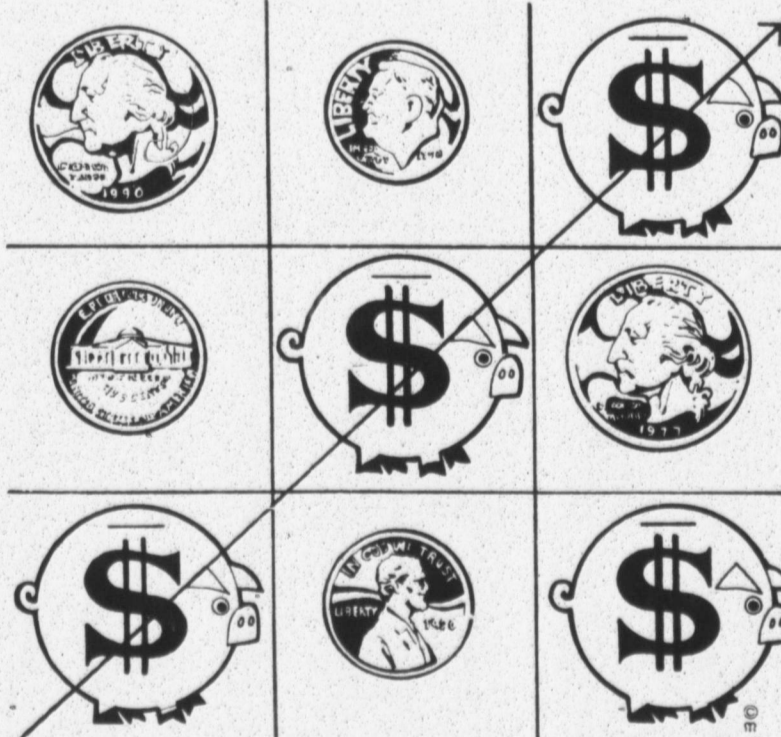

**New Test: Early Disease Detection**

(NAPS)—Now easy for doctors to detect and cure is a disease that's very common in both men and women.

The disease is chlamydia, a sexually transmitted disease (STD) that affects more than 2.5 million women, 1.8 million men and 110,000 infants in the U.S. Many people who have the disease don't know it and going without treatment can be dangerous. Women can contract a variety of

reproductive system disorders and pass the disease along to their newborns; men can get urinary infections and risk sterility.

If you're a sexually active adult, many experts believe you should be tested for chlamydia periodically. A fast, easy test that detects chlamydia, the Kodak SureCell test kit, provides accurate results from a patient sample in only nine minutes. In women, a swab from the cervix is collected; men submit a urine sample.

Once detected, chlamydia is easy to cure. The only way to

**Human Growth Disorders Can Often Be Helped If Caught Early**

(NAPS)—If you suspect your child is shorter than normal, you may be able to help instead of just worrying about it, say experts. Some short children are normal and healthy. Others may have growth disorders which, if diagnosed early enough, can now be

If the doctor determines that your child does indeed suffer from a growth disorder—more than two million children in the U.S. rank below 98 percent of their peer group—help may be available. Many children who are growth hormone

treated successfully. There are many reasons a child may not grow as fast as he or she should. Some are temporary and merely variations of normal growth patterns. Others are inherited or associated with other physical problems—for example, a bone disease called chondrodystrophy; Turner Syndrome, a genetic disorder in some girls; or nutritional deficiencies. Short stature could even be the first sign of a serious medical condition such as disease of the kidney, heart or lungs.

A rule of thumb for parents who suspect a growth problem in their child is that any child who grows less than two inches a year after his or her second birthday should be examined by a pediatric endocrinologist (or other growth specialist). Other questions to ask yourself include:

- Is your child still wearing last year's clothes?
- Is your child unable to keep up at play with other children the same age?

deficient can benefit from injections of synthetic growth hormone. In many cases, a child's growth rate and self-esteem increase dramatically with treatment. Children who are diagnosed properly and respond well to treatment can expect to reach normal adult height.

Doctors, nurses, psychologists, social workers and other professionals can work together to assist children with growth problems and their families in setting and attaining appropriate physical, emotional and educational goals, reports the Human Growth Foundation (HGF). HGF is a voluntary, non-profit organization that helps indi-

viduals with growth-related disorders, their families and health care professionals through education, research and advocacy. HGF also has established local support groups that parents can join, if their child suffers from growth hormone deficiencies.

**Vaccination: What You Should Know**

When you consider all your cat or dog brings to your life, it can be good to know it can be easy for you to save your pet's life.

What you have to do is take the animal to a veterinarian for regular vaccinations.

Animals, like people, are most susceptible to infectious agents during the first months of life. Newborn animals usually receive protection from antibodies in their mother's milk. To be sure kittens and puppies get this protection, the mother should be immunized before breeding. To maintain and strengthen disease resistance after the antibodies in the mother's milk have been depleted, a series of vaccinations should be administered to young animals from approximately six weeks to six months. Lifetime protection is maintained by annual "booster" vaccinations. There are many effective vaccination schedules and your pet is never too old to start. Vaccines are administered under the skin, in the muscle or by nasal spray.

There are vaccines available against:

- Rabies, for all animals. This disease is always fatal, even in humans, but preventable by vaccine.

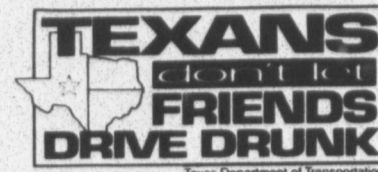

**Protect your rights - "Render" your property by March 31st.**

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district listing all the taxable property you own or controlled on January 1st of this year.

Almost everyone with personal property in the Donley Appraisal District has now been mailed rendition forms. Additional forms are available at the appraisal district office. Please complete the listing of your taxable personal property and return the forms by the end of March. All personal property must be rendered each year even if there has been no change from the prior year. You should include cars, pickups, trucks, RV's, travel trailers, and airplanes.

If you own a business, you should also render your business inventory held for resale and other business related equipment.

January 1 of each year is the assessment date in Texas; render only that property which you owned on January 1, but make your rendition before April 1. File your completed rendition with the Donley Appraisal District office in the Courthouse Annex. The rendition must be signed, and you may, although it is not required, file an opinion of market value.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 1, 1993

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be allowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed among school districts by the legislature and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set

a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state educational mandates imposed in compliance with the Texas Constitution or federal law, or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring expenditure of school district funds unless the obligation is fully funded. The amendment also requires the legislature to provide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school district's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendment applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31, 1993.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment would repeal the provision authorizing

the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, the amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."
