The 1990 graduating class of Clarendon High School will be celebrating their graduation on May 24, 1990, with an all-night, chemical-free graduation party to assure that none of the class of 1990 will be injured or killed in alcohol-related accidents.

Nationally, more young people between the ages of 16 and 20 are injured or killed between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 4:00 a.m. in May and June than during any other time of the year.

This will be Clarendon's second "Project Graduation"—the name used across the country for chemical-free graduation parties. It will be held at the Clarendon Country Club and will be open to seniors and their dates from 11:00 p.m. until 7:00 a.m. A variety of activities have been planned for the night, including a dance.

Clinic To Be Held

Immunization Clinic offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled to be held April 10, 1990 from 9-12 a.m. & 1-3 p.m. in the Texas Department of Health Office, 2nd Floor, 300 S. Sully, Clarendon, Texas.

Protection is against Polio, Diphtheria, Lock Jaw (Tetanus), Whooping Cough (Pertussis), Measles, Rubella, and Mumps.

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

April Is Child Abuse Month

"It shouldn't hurt to be child!" April is designated as Child Abuse Prevention Month. In the Panhandle area, the Regional Council of Child Welfare Boards is promoting efforts to raise awareness about child abuse. Billboards across the region will proclaim, "It shouldn't hurt to be a child." Lollipops with the slogan, "We care - Lick Child Abuse" will be distributed in elementary schools. Local child welfare boards are working with the elementary schools to invite parents to eat lunch at school with their children. Parents can register (at the schools) for a chance to win a family weekend package, including a suite at the Howard Johnson Plaza Hotel, a hand stamp from Wonderland, games at Putt-Putt Golf, movie passes from UA Cinema Six, TCBY yogurt, and other exciting prizes.

On Monday, April 30, from 5:30-7:30 p.m., there will be a public reception in Amarillo at The Bridge, the first children's advocacy center in the state. The Bridge, a project of the Panhandle Coalition for Child Abuse Prevention, offers a safe, home-like setting where victims of child abuse can be interviewed and observed by a team of social workers, law enforcement officers and prosecutors. The newly remodeled facility at 15th & Polk Street, next door to Polk Street Methodist Church, will be open for tours during the reception. Also, the drawing for the family weekend package will take place that night.

Former Resident to Work for Prison

Brian Tucker, DDS, has been named director of the Clements Unit's dental clinic. Dr. Tucker was born in Canadian and attended Clarendon Public Schools, Clarendon College and Amarillo College before graduating from West Texas with a degree in nursing. He received the DDS degree from Baylor College of Dentistry and has been in private or group practice of dentistry since 1979. He was formerly with Sherwood Dental Clinic of Amarillo. He is a member of the Panhandle District Dental Society, the Texas Dental Association and the American Dental Association.

Dr. Tucker is the son of James and Frieda Tucker of Clarendon and the grandson of Carl Zybach of Clarendon.

Dr. Tucker will begin his official duties on April 6th, the day scheduled for the prison unit to receive its first prisoners.

Fire Dept. Sets Signals

With the approach of severe weather season, the members of the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department would like to remind Clarendon residents of the meaning of the storm signals they will hear whenever severe weather threatens Clarendon.

1 Long Blast of Siren: - means that Clarendon is under a tornado watch or warning and that the intensity of the storm is increasing at a rapid rate. You should make whatever preparations are necessary to take cover should a tornado develop.

Several Long Blasts Of Siren Repeated: - means that a tornado has been spotted near Clarendon or approaching Clarendon, you should take cover immediately!

Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department will have several spotters out any time that severe weather threatens. Your best source of information is the Amarillo television and radio stations and your own eyes. Residents are reminded not to call the sheriff's department dispatcher under any circumstances to ask what the storm signals mean or what the weather is doing. The sheriff's department has a limited number of phone lines and personnel and these will be needed to communicate with the National Weather Service and storm spotters in the immediate area as well as for fires, ambulance, and law enforcement needs. When a large number of people call in all the phone lines are jammed and prevents necessary emergency calls from coming in and going out. Your best action is, if you are unsure whether or not you should seek shelter, just go ahead and do it, it can't hurt. You should also cut out the signals from the newspaper and put them where they are handy. Also, the meanings of the signals will appear on Mission Cable Community Channel 11 on the cable system during the severe weather times.

The emergency personnel appreciate your cooperation in not calling in for advice and information to help them do their job effectively. Of course, if you spot a tornado or if you have another emergency need, you are encouraged to call in.

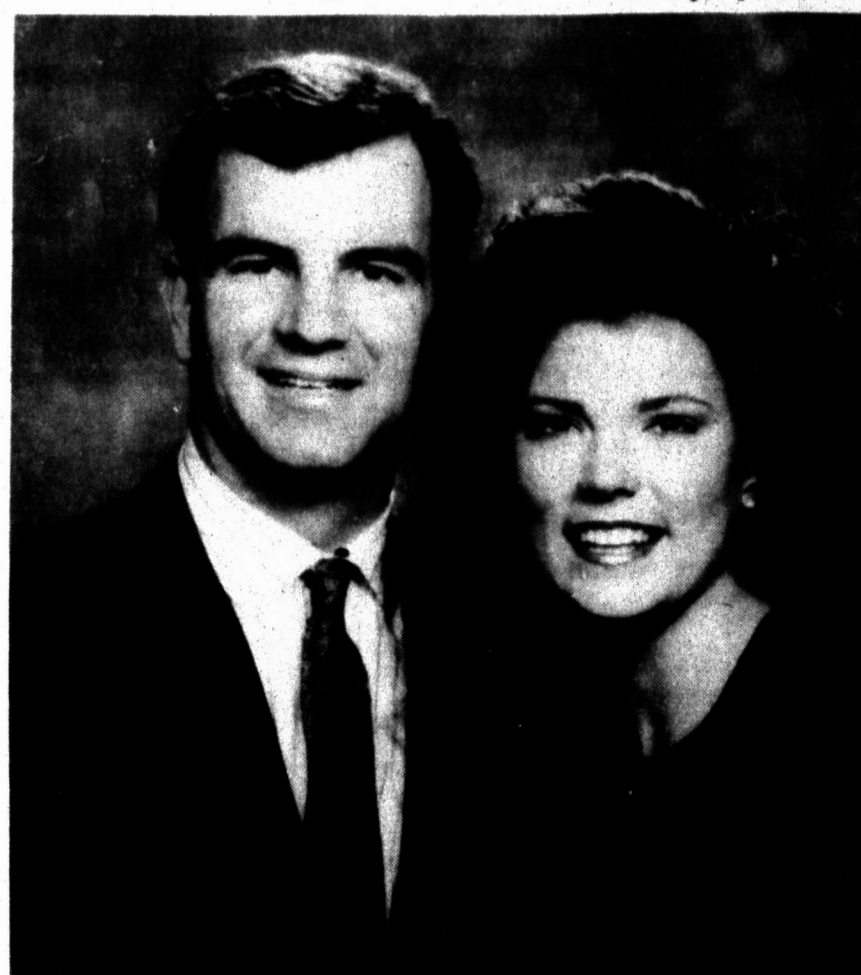

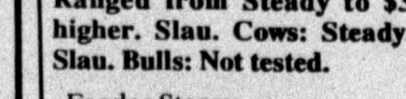

Additional Exemptions May Lower Your Taxes

If you became 65 or disabled during 1989 you may qualify for additional property tax exemptions on your homestead. If you bought a different home during 1989 you may need to file a new homestead exemption application. Applications should be filed by May 1.

If you received a homestead exemption on your present home in 1989 you will not need to reapply for 1990.

Farmers and ranchers who need to apply for productive valuation must do so by May 1. Applications are available at the Appraisal District office.

By filing an affidavit, over-65 homeowners may be granted a deferral on their property taxes. For complete details contact the Appraisal District Office.

Further details about the property tax system in Texas and how it works for you are contained in a pamphlet by the State Property Tax Board called *Taxpayer's Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*. Get a free copy at the Appraisal District Office.

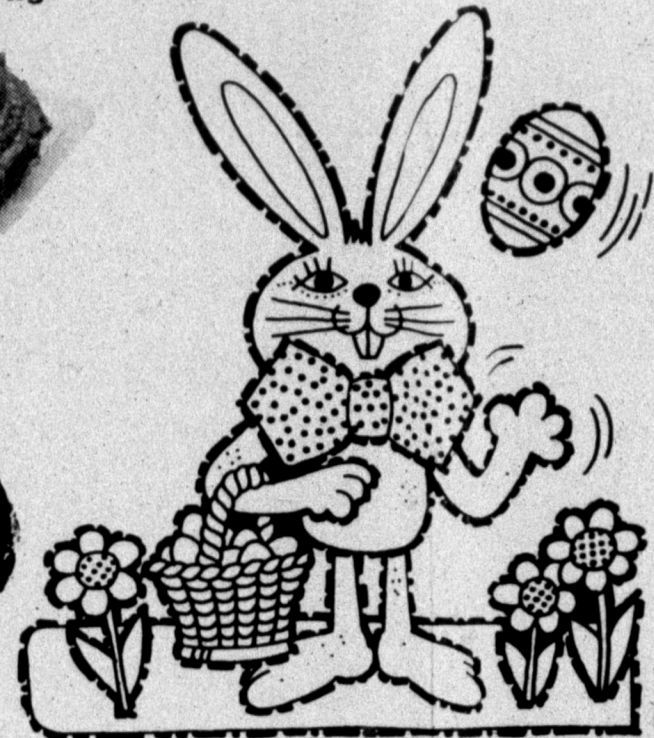

Porches by Perry Mack Garrison

Recently I had an experience that took me, unwillingly, back in time. Back to a place that I had forced myself, for the most part, to forget about. Back to the most painful corner my life has ever navigated. I was young and mixed up. Many things were forced into my realm of being at this time. With a broken and very distressed home and school seemingly being a maze of emotional torture chambers, I would take refuge for long periods in a small shelter-belt of Black Locust and Pine trees just half a mile from my house. I guess I should feel fortunate that I wasn't raised in a dense forest someplace, I would probably have moved out into the trees and grown up to be a modern-day hermit. But nevertheless, here I was a young unskilled mini-woodsman.

Many long hours were spent sitting and listening. In the summertime I would even spend several nights in a row camped out in this tiny chunk of the Texas out-back. And it seems that through all these wasted hours of retrospect and self-pity something good was formed. Something God built in my soul during these long nature filled hours. The ability to wait. I never looked back on this time

much before a few days ago. I watched a Christian video that forced me down memory lane. And you know what I found there? Through all the re-lived pain and loneliness I discovered that the fear had vanished!

It's like two porches on two different houses. When you stand on one you see things this way and when you stand on the other you see things that way.

So what I was really doing spending all those hours alone was standing on the porch that looks out into the future, wondering how God could use a poor, introverted boy from a broken home.

Now I'm standing on the porch that looks back across to the past. And guess what I see? I see myself, scared and shaking, standing on the porch across the way. And you know what I realized? Both porches face toward the same street and God takes care of the street.

Paul wrote in Ephesians 2:1-7, "And you bath He (Jesus) quickened who were dead in trespasses and sins. Wherein in time past ye walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience. Among whom also we all had our conversation in times past in the lusts of our flesh, fulfilling the desires of the flesh and of the mind and were by nature the children of wrath, even as others. But God, who is rich in mercy, for His great love wherewith He loved us, Even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ, (by grace ye are saved) And hath raised us up together and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus. That in the ages to come he might shew the exceeding riches of his grace in His kindness toward us through Christ Jesus."

I'm no longer frightened as I look forward because I've taken a look back and seen God's amazing grace in action in my life. They say that hindsight is twenty-twenty, but what I like about it is when I look across the street to the past I see that I wasn't on that porch alone....and I'm not on this porch alone.

Welcome to my porch, Lord Jesus.

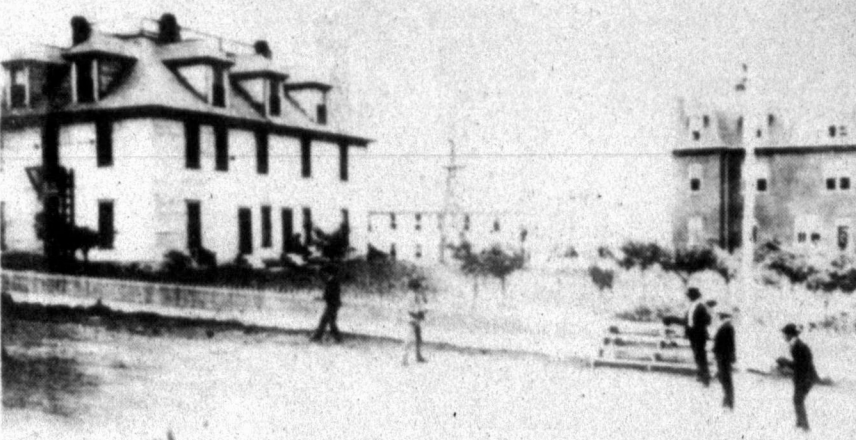

CLARENDON COLLEGE CAMPUS .. 1903

The Beginning of Clarendon College

(The information for this article was derived from the book, The Athen of the Panhandle by Ethel Harvey.)

During the summer of 1897, the citizens of Clarendon started a subscription to secure the building of a college in Clarendon. The school would provide an opportunity for boys and girls to complete high school, go on to college

and prepare themselves to enter a university, where they might study music, art and expression.

A committee presented the subscription of twenty-one citizens to the District conference of the Methodist Church, South, at Memphis in November 1897. They offered to build a two-story brick building on a four-acre campus and deed it to the church. The District forwarded the application to the Annual Conference and to the

Board of Education.

The Conference Journal for 1898 gave the following announcement of the opening of Clarendon College:

A school sprang into existence during the present year at Clarendon, Texas. It comes in response to the general demand for such a school in that country. Our church is the most progressive in that new field, and so the attention of the people generally is turned to us to take the responsibility of founding and operating such a school. They gave us a ten-acre campus and put an eight-room brick building on it and deeded for occupancy by January next. Its altitude is high and it is located 275 miles from Fort Worth, our nearest school, and commands a patronizing territory larger than the entire state of Mississippi, and embraces a population of about one hundred thousand.

The school has a faculty of four teachers and an enrollment of seventy-five pupils. Rev. J.W. Adkisson, A.M., has been chosen president. His large and successful experience in educational work gives assurance of the high character of the school.

Since this institution purposes to become correlated with the general system and policy of our educational work in Texas, therefore we

recommend:

That we foster this as one of our schools, and that we comment it to the favorable consideration of our people.

That Rev. J.W. Adkisson, A.M., be re-appointed to the presidency of this school.

By 1902, Clarendon College had developed all the characteristics of a senior college, with two boarding halls, an athletic club, four literary societies, and improvements of the Music, Art and Elocution departments offering more courses of study than the faculty and equipment could handle. Fewer courses were offered in the training school and the freshman and sophomore years of high school would be combined with the college. Only two years of college work would be offered and stress was placed on liberal arts, music, art and expression. By 1915 Clarendon College had the largest enrollment of any junior college in the south.

The editor of Clarendon College Magazine wrote this editorial in November, 1915:

...Let us strive toward one goal—A Greater and Better Clarendon College. Only once before has the enrollment of students exceeded what is this year. We are growing surely and steadily. Let us keep up with this growth in every department. Be a Booster. Get behind

your football team; show them you still believe in them, even though they may have been unlucky and have lost a game or two. Let's boost and support our intercollegiate debaters when they are selected. Help them in the preparation of their speeches, then come out to hear the debate, "root" for "our" men, and lastly, tell somebody else about it and bring them out. Do you believe that C.C. can produce just as good material for anything—athletics, debating, or whatever it may be—do you believe in your fellow students' ability? Then, if you do, let somebody know it! As it is said on the diamond, "Talk it up", make some noise, not the kind that has no effect, but make a fuss to some purpose, let people know where you are from. With our increased attendance, Clarendon has many opportunities for expansion this year that she has not had heretofore. It is up to the students individually as to what they shall do with these golden opportunities. Will we grasp them and push forward to the goal

of success, or will we let them slip by unnoticed, gone forever? No, let's make a supreme effort to put Clarendon in the forefront of all Colleges in the state. We can. Will you? Let your answer be in the affirmative and let us climb.

Clarendon College will be having its 52nd annual reunion April 21st-22nd. This article written in 1915 is apropos for the year 1990. Let it apply to the present. "Root" for your Alma Mater. Be enthusiastic about the upcoming reunion. Make some noise. "Talk it up". Strive to make your graduating class the largest in attendance, and strive for the more common goal—A Greater and Better Clarendon College.

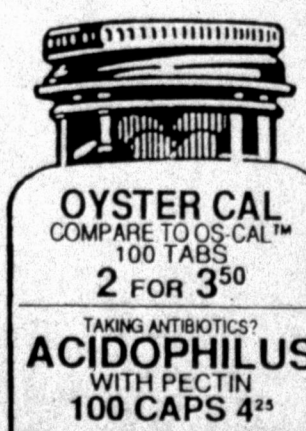

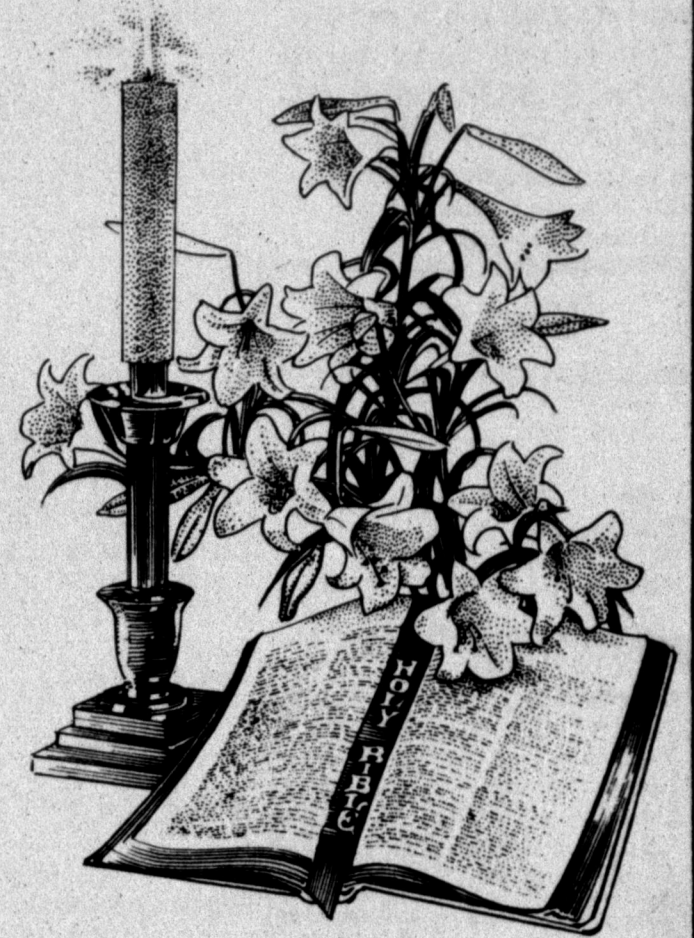

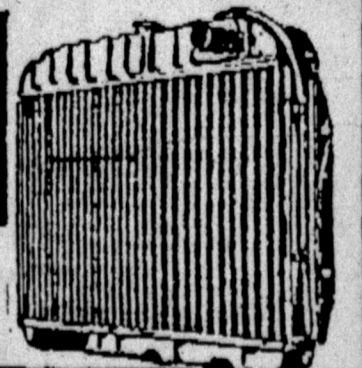
