Fire Dept. Sets Signals

With the approach of severe weather season, the members of the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department would like to remind Clarendon residents of the meaning of the storm signals they will hear whenever severe weather threatens Clarendon.

1 Long Blast of Siren: - means that Clarendon is under a tornado watch or warning and that the intensity of the storm is increasing at a rapid rate. You should make whatever preparations are necessary to take cover should a tornado develop.

Several Long Blasts Of Siren Repeated: - means that a tornado has been spotted near Clarendon or approaching Clarendon. you should take cover immediately!

Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department will have several spotters out any time that severe weather threatens. Your best source of information is the Amarillo television and radio stations and your own eyes. Residents are reminded not to call the sheriffs department dispatcher under any circumstances to ask what the storm signals mean or what the weather is doing. The sheriffs department has a limited number of phone lines and personnel and these will be needed to communicate with the National Weather Service and storm spotters in the immediate area as well as for fires, ambulance, and law enforcement needs. When a large number of people call in all the phone lines are jammed and prevents necessary emergency calls from coming in and going out. Your best action is, if you are unsure whether or not you should seek shelter, just go ahead and do it, it can't hurt. You should also cut out the signals from the newspaper and put them where they are handy. Also, the meanings of the signals will appear on Mission Cable Community Channel 11 on the cable system during the sever weather times.

The emergency personnel appreciate your cooperation in not calling in for advice and information to help them do their job effectively. Of course, if you spot a tornado or if you have another emergency need, you are encouraged to call in.

CLARENDON COLLEGE CAMPUS .. 1903

The Beginning of Clarendon College

(The information for this article was derived from the book, The Athen of the Panhandle by Ethel Harvey.)

During the summer of 1897. the citizens of Clarendon started a subscription to secure the building of a college in Clarendon. The school would provide an opportunity for boys and girls to complete high school, go on to college

and prepare themselves to enter a university, where they might study music, art and expression.

A committee presented the subscription of twenty-one citizens to the District conference of the Methodist Church, South, at Memphis in November 1897. They offered to build a two-story brick building on a four-acre campus and deed it to the church. The District forwarded the application to the

The Clarendon News

Board of Education.

The Conference Journal for 1898 gave the following announcement of the opening of Clarendon College:

A school sprang into existence during the present year at Clarendon, Texas. It comes in response to the general demand for such a school in that country. Our church is the most progressive in that new field, and so the attention of the people generally is turned to us to take the responsibility of founding and operating such a school. They gave us a ten-acre campus and put an eight-room brick building on it and deeded for occupancy by January next. Its altitude is high and it is located 275 miles from Fort Worth, our nearest school, and commands a patronizing territory larger than the entire state of Mississippi, and embraces a population of about one hundred thousand.

The school has a faculty of four teachers and an enrollment of seventy-five pupils. Rev. J.W. Adkisson, A.M., has been chosen president. His large and successful experience in educational work gives assurance of the high character of the school.

Since this institution purposes to become correlated with the general system and policy of our education-Annual Conference and to the al work in Texas, therefore we ment. Be a Booster. Get behind

recommend: That we foster this as one of our schools, and that we comment it to the favorable consideration of our people. That Rev. J.W. Adkisson, A.M.,

be re-appointed to the presidency of this school. By 1902, Clarendon College had

developed all the characteristics of a senior college, with two boarding halls, an athletic club, four literary societies, and improvements of the Music, Art and Elocution departments offering more courses of. study than the faculty and equipment could handle. Fewer courses were offered in the training school and the freshman and sophomore years of high school would be combined with the college. Only two years of college work would be offered and stress was placed on liberal arts, music, art and expression. By 1915 Clarendon College had the largest enrollment of any junior college in the south.

The editor of Clarendon College Magazine wrote this editorial in November, 1915:

... Let us strive toward one goal--A Greater and Better Clarendon College. Only once before has the enrollment of students exceeded what is this year. We are growing surely and steadily. Let us keep up with this growth in every depart-






[J.S. Rep. Bill Sarpalius' mobile office will be in Clarendon on April 13 from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. at the courthouse.
