High Speed Chase Ends with Federal Charges for Three

Just before midnight on June 15, three males drove away from a local convenience store without paying for the gas that they had pumped into their car. The attendant called the law and gave the license number of the vehicle, a dark blue, 1984 Toyota Tercel with Louisiana plates.

The report came back that the vehicle was stolen and the occupants were wanted for carjacking, armed robbery and one was wanted for attempted murder. The Donley County Sheriff's Department immediately began looking for the vehicle, and was soon in pursuit. After a high-speed chase, the three suspects abandoned the car near Ashtola, and fled on foot in the darkness.

The warden and four deputies from the Clemmons Unit in Amarillo brought in dogs and horses and joined the hunt. Since the site was near the county line, Armstrong County Sheriff's Deputies also began searching for the fugitives.

Authorities notified Ashtola area residents to remove the keys from their vehicles and to lock their doors.

Early Wednesday morning, the fugitives hailed H.A. Green, and asked for a ride back to Highway 287. H.A. Green picked up his son Jerry, then loaded up two of the fugitives into the back of the pickup and carried back to Highway 287, right to the waiting arms of law enforcement officers. The third man was apprehended east of Clarendon soon after the first two arrests.

The three men allegedly seized the Toyota at gunpoint in Lafayette, Louisiana, just before midnight on June 14, brandishing a small caliber revolver. About 2:15 a.m., they used that weapon (or a similar one) to rob a convenience store near Lake Charles. They fled west towards Orange, Texas.

Willie Leon Kelley, 38, of Winnsboro, South Carolina and Charles Junius, 43, of New Iberia, Louisiana were charged with car jacking, armed robbery, theft of gas and evading arrest.

Sereal Cleveland, Jr., 41, of Lafayette, Louisiana was charged with the same offenses, but was also charged with attempted murder, after allegedly shooting at his girl friend before fleeing Lafayette.

The three were turned over to the FBI. Car jacking is a federal offense.

Among those participating in the pursuit were Milton McElroy, Donley County Deputy, Deputy Jake Longan, Deputy Charles Blackburn, Reserve Deputy Kelly Hill, Reserve Deputy Butch Blackburn, and Donley County's well-known Game Warden, Gary Hunt. A number of other officers assisted in the search.

Football Camp Offered

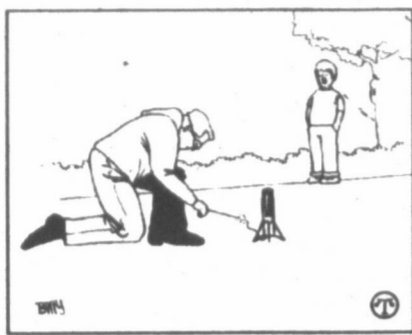

- Follow label directions carefully, observe local laws—and use good common sense.

They married on June 20, 1943. The couple has lived in Donley County most of their life.

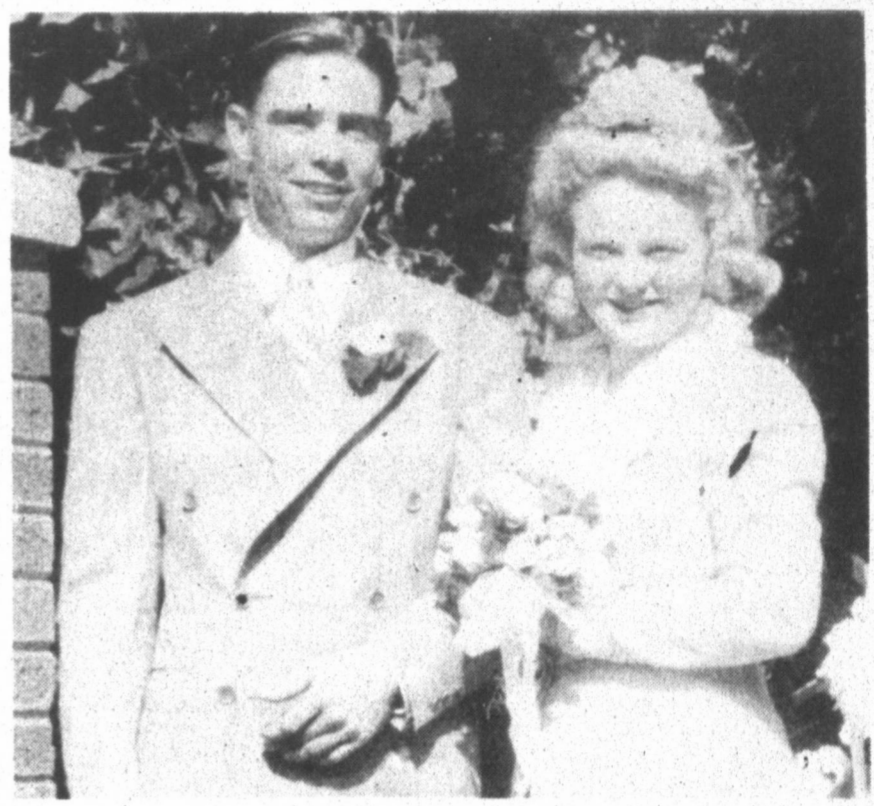
H.A. worked at North American Aviation in Grand Prairie and served in the Air Force before the couple began farming in the Ashtola community.

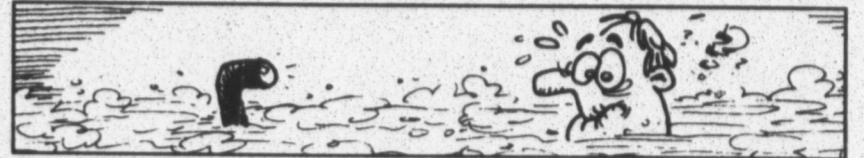



Social Security News

If you are 65 or older, or blind, or have a disability and don't have a lot of income or own much, you should know about SSI. Supplemental Security Income (SSI) can provide money to help you meet your needs. This program, administered by Social Security Administration, also pays benefits to children who have serious physical, mental, or sensory disabilities.

To be eligible for SSI, you must either: be 65 or older, or have a physical or mental disability that keeps you from working and is expected to last at least a year or to result in death; or be totally blind or have very poor eyesight.

Whether you can get SSI also depends on how much you own and how much income you have. (Income is the money you have coming in such as wages, Social Security checks, and pensions. Income also includes the value of non-cash items you receive such as food, clothing, or shelter.) The income limits vary depending on several factors, so check with Social Security to find out if you qualify. The value of the things you own cannot exceed \$2,000 or \$3,000 if you're married. We don't count the value of your home and usually we don't count your car.

If you apply for SSI benefits, you should bring the following information with you to the local Social Security office:

Social Security Number(s) for and/or any of your dependents, any Social Security number(s) on which you/or your dependent receive (or received) Social Security checks. **Proof Of Age:** a birth certificate or baptismal record. **Income and Resources:** payroll slips, bank books, insurance policies, car registration, burial fund records, and other information about your income and assets, your mortgage papers or your lease and landlord's name or other information about the residence in which you live.

Impairment and Treatment for a Disability: any medical reports in your possession types of treatments or tests, and dates of medical visits, a description of what

the impairment is; when it started; how it keeps you from working; and how it affects your daily activities, name, address (including Zip Code), and phone numbers of all doctors, hospitals, or other accounts, claims number from Medicaid, Department of Veterans Affairs, or any other agencies from which you receive or have applied for disability or other benefits.

Don't put off filing your claim even if you don't have all of this information. (Parents or Guardians should apply for children under age 18). Social Security staff will assist you in obtaining necessary information. You may qualify for SSI benefits even you're receiving Social Security benefits.

Facts from the Department of Agriculture

Warm Weather Food Safety Tips

(NAPS)—Warm up to food safety: That's the message from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), which warns there are more cases of food poisoning during the warm weather months.

It's important to take extra care when preparing cookouts and picnics, the experts agree. Here's some food for thought:

- Don't use food from damaged containers. Check cans and glass jars for dents, cracks or bulging lids, paper packages for leaks and stains.

- In the kitchen, clean preparation is essential. Wash hands, work area and utensils before preparing food. Marinate in the refrigerator. Don't thaw on the counter.

- Keep food cold. This is the best way to fight bacteria. Check that your refrigerator registers a safe 40 degrees F or lower; freezers and freezing compartments should be set at 0 degrees F or lower. When transporting food to a barbecue or picnic site, pack meat, poultry, salads and other perishables in an insulated cooler with an ice source and keep it in the shade.

- Keep hot foods hot with a thermos or insulated dish.

- Keep cold food cold until cooking on the grill. Also, be sure the coals on your grill are very hot—this may take 30 minutes or more. When you cook raw meat, poultry and fish, cook it thoroughly—ground meat and poultry should not be pink, juices should run clear and fish should flake

with a fork. Use a clean plate for serving cooked food and be careful that raw meat juices don't touch other food.

- In hot weather, food should never sit out for over an hour. Serve food quickly from the cooler and replace it inside the cooler fast.

- Leftovers? If there's still ice in the cooler when you get home, and the food didn't sit out at the picnic, the food is okay to save.

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Inadequate Car Seat Use Threatens Thousands Of Young Lives

(NAPS)—Every day, heading off to day care, shopping centers or the park, children are in danger of losing their lives.

No parent, grandparent or guardian would willingly put a child at risk. Yet every time an infant or toddler rides in a motor vehicle being restrained in a car seat, they are just that—at risk—and it happens more often than you might think.

The first law requiring car seats for children was enacted in Tennessee in 1978. By 1989, all 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico had enacted similar laws. At that time, car seat use was steadily increasing, primarily because, through education, the issue was top-of-mind with citizens.

Today, however, the usage rates have fallen stagnant and the tragedies perpetuate. Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death and injury among young children. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), child car seats are highly effective in preventing death or injury in motor vehicle crashes.

"We estimate that car seats are 70 percent effective when correctly used, which makes them one of the single most effective auto safety devices ever made," Michael Brownlee, associate administrator for NHTSA, says. "We believe that with child restraints, we are saving about 250 young lives each year. That number could double if every child in the country was buckled up correctly in a car seat."

"People who do not correctly use a child car seat may not fully appreciate the consequences," Brownlee says. "They either lack diligence, or in some cases, they lack knowledge. They need to be educated."

With the assistance of NHTSA and a host of state highway safety officials and independent consul-



tants, Midas Muffler and Brake Shops recently launched Project Safe Baby—an ongoing national program designed to increase the availability and correct use of child car seats.

Through the program, convertible car seats (appropriate for infants from seven to 20 pounds and for toddlers from about 20 to 40 pounds) are available at wholesale cost from participating Midas Muffler and Brake Shops.

In addition, educational materials for both parents and children will be distributed and, with the help of local and state safety officials, a number of programs designed to increase correct use of car seats are being implemented in communities across the country.

"We are pleased that companies like Midas are taking the initiative on the car seat issue and that they'll be using their considerable resources in our communities to make an impact on this national crisis," Brownlee says.

Officers skilled in the detection of drugs can now predict with a high degree of accuracy if you're taking a medication that makes you drowsy.

So, if you're taking an allergy medication that makes you drowsy, don't drive.

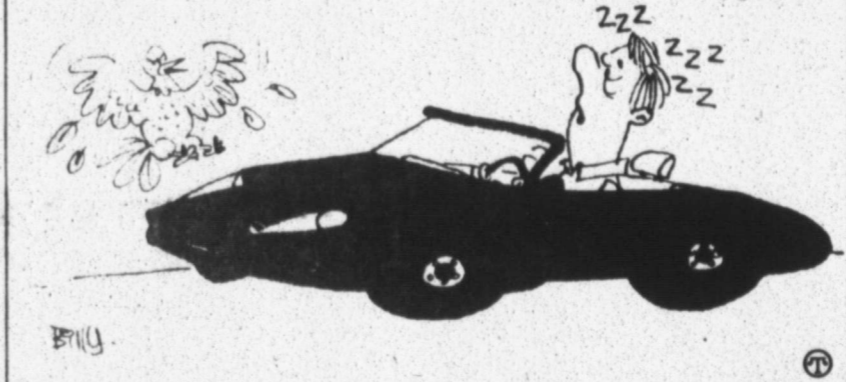

Allergy Medications: Good For Allergies, Not For Driving



If you're taking an allergy medication that makes you drowsy, don't drive.

(NAPS)—Here's news about allergy medications and driving that should give you a healthy knowledge about highway safety.

Whether your condition is seasonal or perennial, there are many drugs that ease the symptoms of allergic rhinitis. A large number of them are available without a prescription. The most commonly used drugs are antihistamines, which are generally effective for both preventing and stopping attacks.

Experts at the Department of Transportation National Highway Administration point out, howev-

WEEDING A FAMILY AFFAIR

Having picnics, going to movies, playing Monopoly—these are all activities that are national family pastimes. But what about weeding together? Yes, weeding—pulling those bothersome, unsightly weeds out of the lawn and garden as a family activity.

Though a family may get dirtier weeding the garden than playing Monopoly, there are many benefits, too. First, it's great group exercise—kneeling, lifting, stretching, pulling—and by the end of the season, your family will be in better shape than any other in the neighborhood. Second, it helps the environment when you carefully remove weeds, then prevent them from returning by installing landscape fabric instead of spraying with potentially dangerous chemicals.

Weeds in the Lawn

Weeds can destroy the serenity of any home lawn. Broadleaf weeds, such as dandelions, pigweed and ragweed, are common lawn invaders and difficult to eradicate. Fortunately, they're easy to pull out by hand and nearly any child can handle the task if an adult demonstrates how to do it correctly.

The best time to pull weeds is when the earth is loose or soft, such as in spring, a day or two after a light rain. Because a weed's roots can grow much longer below ground than its above-ground height, it's important to pull straight up to get as much of the root as possible. It's also important to grasp the weed at the crown, the thick-stemmed area just above the soil surface, to pull out the entire plant.

If a lawn has an abundance of broadleaf weeds, a weed-killing spray can be applied, but only as a last resort. Never apply an herbicide in the presence of children or pets and strictly follow label directions.

Weeds in the Flower Garden

Weeds in a flower garden are burdensome but easier to take care of if two or more people work on it together. The first step is to pull all weeds out by hand. The second step is to cover the bed with a landscape fabric, such as WeedBlock by Easy Gardener. Landscape fabrics permit air and water to travel through the fabric to the soil, but block sunlight from weed seeds to keep the area weed-free.

If the plants in the flower bed have yet to be planted, cover the bed with the fabric then cut holes or x's into the fabric with scissors everywhere you intend to put a plant or flower. Cut the holes or x's large enough to insert the plant directly through the fabric and into the soil.

If the flowers have already been planted, cut holes or x's into the fabric that are slightly larger than the plants themselves. Gently pull the fabric over the plants so that the fabric lays flat on the soil surface.

Once the fabric is in place, cover the fabric with gravel, pebbles or wood nuggets.

Sun Sense: a Summer Necessity

Does the summer make you see red—on your skin? Remember that painful sunburn last year? These are reminders that sun sense—including the liberal use of sunscreen—is not just convenient in summer, but a necessity for healthy skin.

Many people want a well-bronzed look in the summer. They do not realize that exposure to sunlight is a major cause of skin cancer.

Doctors now realize that sunburns may have serious consequences many years after the event.

"One serious sunburn in a young child increases his or her chances of developing skin cancer years later," says Dr. Turner M. Caldwell III. Caldwell practices at the High Plains Dermatology Center, and is a Clarendon native. "Sunburn increases the chances for skin cancer in general and melanoma in particular." Melanoma is the most deadly form of skin cancer.

Tanning is not necessary for good health, and in fact, is probably far more injurious than most sunbathers realize.

Experts recommend the following precautions:

- Avoid unnecessary exposure to sunlight, including "tanning".
- Wear long sleeves and pants to cover arms and legs. Cover face and other exposed areas with sunscreen.
- Use a heavy-duty sunscreen. SPF 15 is a minimum. Use higher numbers for longer exposure or where there are both direct and reflected rays.
- Stay out of the sun during the heat of the day. This not only reduces the risk of overheating, but places exposure during hours when the light is more filtered.

CCISD Minutes for June Meeting

The Board of Trustees of Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District met in a regular session on June 10, 1993 at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building.

Members present were President Johnny Floyd, Vice-President Phil Fletcher, Secretary Lynne Williams, Wayne Hardin, Derlene Graham, and Dan Hall. Elmonette Bivens was absent. School officials present were Jeff L. Walker, Superintendent, Phil Barefield, and Mike Word.

Minutes of the 5-13 and 5-24 meetings were read. Motion by Phil Fletcher, seconded by Wayne Hardin to approve the minutes as amended. The minutes of the 5-13 meeting were amended to read: Johnny Floyd noted the intention to add J. Walker added above Bronco Stadium. The vote was 5-0 in favor.

L.A. Watson requested the school's assistance in obtaining a clear title to property around the Martin Baptist Church. Mr. Watson will obtain a legal written request for future approval.

Sue Howard discussed the school's responsibility in maintaining the tennis courts. She anticipates an inspection from the Parks Department this summer. The basketball goals require the most maintenance. Repairs have been made or ordered. Vandalism has caused some large expenses for the school. Some tennis nets may be removed to allow room for skateboards this summer. Carlton Turvaille reported specific information on the difficulty in maintaining courts against damage.

Members reviewed written copies of the Campus Improve-

ment Plan for the High School and Elementary/Jr. High. Committee members were commended for their work. Wayne Hardin moved to approve the plans as presented. Phil Fletcher seconded the motion which was approved 5-0.

Mike Word presented the results of TAAS testing. Writing scores in the 4th grade rose to 95%, but scores in Reading and Math dropped. Total mastery for the total test was up. Improvement has been addressed in the Campus Improvement Plan. The 8th grade showed 97% in Writing, 79% in Reading and 71% in Math. All scores were up from the previous year. All scores are well above the state average in most areas.

Pat Cheek reviewed the TAAS scores for the 10th grade. Students scored above the state averages on all areas (Writing 85%, Reading 86%, and Math 68%). Freshman scores for this same group of students were 64%, 71% and 83% respectively. The High School Campus Improvement Plan addresses needed changes. Remedial instruction is available this summer at the school and summer tests will be given in Clarendon.

Dan Hall made the motion to approve the TAAS results as presented. Derlene seconded the motion which passed 5-0.

Mike Word stated that the Elementary/Jr. High would receive a certificate for High Performance Effort (437 of 6,184 schools in the state). Pat Cheek reported that the High School was one of 377 of 6,184 in the state to be eligible for an award of \$30,000 or more.

Jeff Walker commended the staff and principals for their good work. The school board joins in complimenting all school employees for excelling in meeting such high expectations.

Jeff Walker presented a letter proposing that the football field remain "Bronco Stadium". Wayne Hardin moved to rescind the action of May 13 regular meeting as noted in those minutes. Lynne Williams seconded the motion which passes 5-0.

Open Forum: Lynne Williams reported an inquiry from a parent questioning the policy of not allowing a child to complete the driving portion of driver's education if the child did not pass all

coursework the last six weeks. Jeff Walker agreed to investigate this policy.

Mike Word gave information on a bid for expansion of the elementary computer system. New features were discussed. An estimate is \$35,000 for the 4th grade. He will arrange for a demonstration at the next board meeting.

Johnny Floyd thanked Jeff Walker for a wonderful 29 years of service.

Phil Barefield reported that four principal applicants have been selected for interviewing by the screening committee. June 24-25 at 6:00 p.m. were set for preliminary interviews. June 15 at 7:00 p.m. will be a work meeting to formulate questions for the candidates.

Career Ladder proposals were discussed. Wayne Hardin moved to approve career ladder stipends for current recipients and all applicants. Dan Hall seconded the motion which passed 5-0.

Both Superintendents proposed raising above-base pay for teaching staff. Phil Fletcher moved to increase local increments for teachers to: Bachelor's Degree \$1000, Master's Degree \$1500. Lynne Williams seconded the motion which passed 5-0.

Jeff Walker discussed raising high school coaching stipends. The board will study a method of determining stipends based on a matrix evaluation.

Phil Fletcher moved to call for bids on a bank depository for school funds. Wayne Hardin seconded the motion which passed 5-0.

Dan Hall moved to amend the budget as presented and amended as attached. Wayne Hardin seconded the motion which passed 5-0.

"In particular, they are concerned that the public may confuse the American Heart Association with other groups whose names include words like American, National, Heart, Heart Disease, Heart Research, Cardiac, Cardiovascular, and so on." The American Heart Association is Not: Heart Support of America, American Heart Disease Prevention Foundation, American Heart Research Foundation, National Heart Saver Association, National Center for Cardiac Foundation, Open Heart Foundation, National Stroke Foundation.

"Only one organization-the American Heart Association-has an unsurpassed record of fighting heart disease and stroke through research and education for almost 70 years," Bailey says "Panhandle residents can look for their name and heart and torch logo. Their trademark is their guarantee of fiscal responsibility and effectiveness."

Howard Bailey said that the Texas Affiliated and other AHA offices across the nation have received numerous requests for information about such sound-alike and look alike organizations.

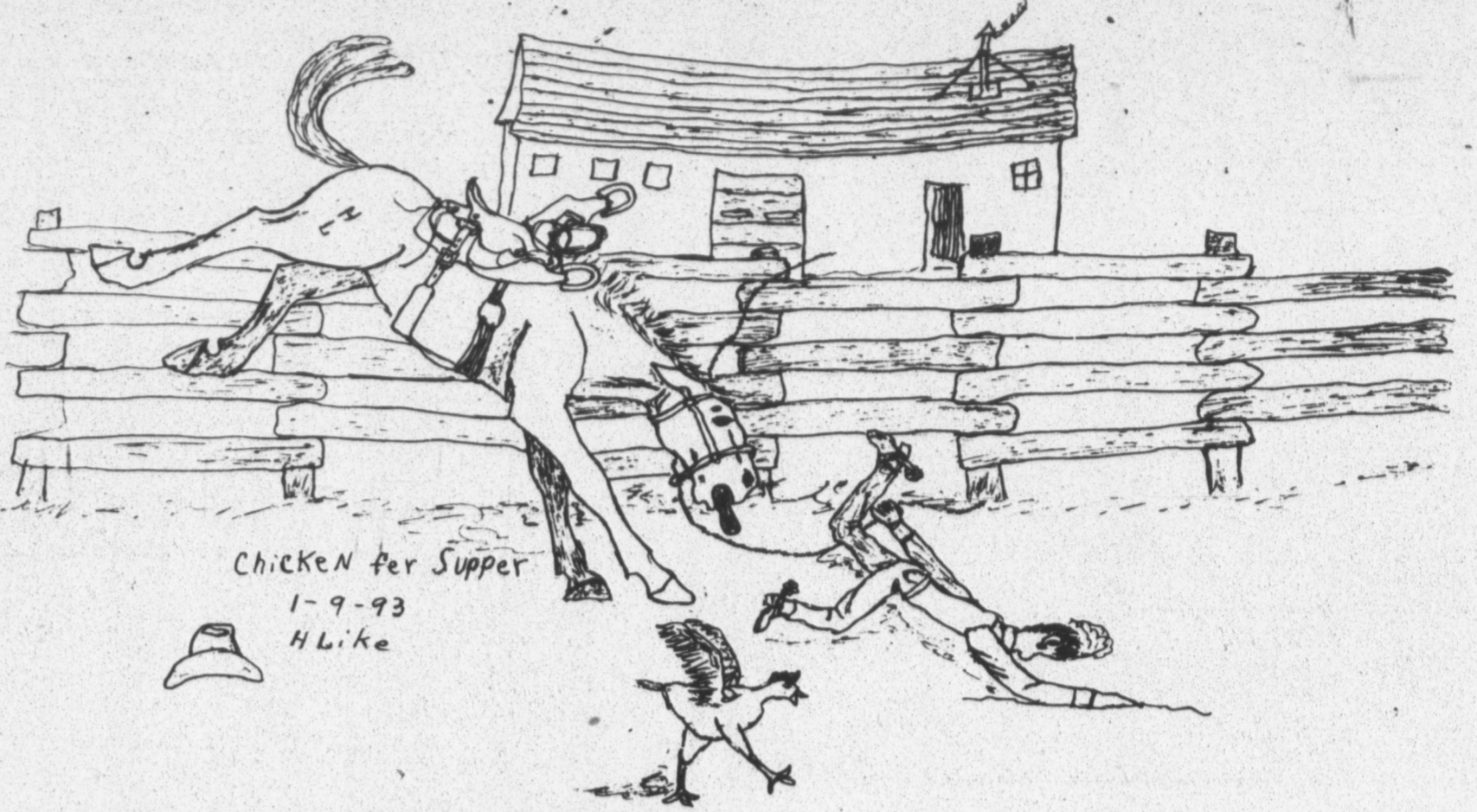
"While the AHA does not wish to question any legitimate not for profit agency raising funds for cardiovascular research, they do want the public to understand that there is no relationship between these sound-alike groups and the American Heart Association," Bailey says. "We believe prospective contributors might think that when they contribute to such groups they are giving to the American Heart Association, Panhandle Region." All donations should be mailed to the Panhandle Region One office at 2404 West 7th or to the Memorial Chairperson or Treasurer in each county of the Panhandle. The Panhandle Region office serves 25 counties of the Panhandle and will be happy to answer any questions concerning sound alike organizations.

More than 3.6 million people volunteer for the AHA, which is supported almost exclusively by private contributions.

The Council of Better Business Bureaus has defined voluntary standards for Charitable Solicitations. While not recommending one fund-raising method over another, the standards call for solicitations and informational materials to be accurate, truthful and not misleading. Total fund-raising and administrative costs are limited to 50 percent or less of total income.

"The AHA takes great pride in the fact that our fund-raising and administrative costs consistently remained well within these standards," Bailey says.

In fiscal year 1991-1992, the Association spent 34.3 percent of its total research, 31.5 percent on professional and public education, 13.1 percent on community services, only 13.6 on fundraising and less than 7.5 on management and general expenses.

Area law enforcement officers say that they are planning to watch the Donley County area with extra vigilance during the holiday period. Those who drink and drive can expect arrest and DWI charges. And DWI no longer is a slap-on-the-wrist in Texas.

"We are going to patrol. We're going to watch and we're going to act," said Sheriff Jimmy Thompson. Drunk drivers and folks who get into fights can expect room and board at the County Jail, but it will not be free. Perhaps the worst price is loss of freedom for a period of time.

"Peace officers will keep a particularly close watch on the Sandy Beach area and the Rodeo Grounds," the Sheriff said. "We want people to have fun, but we do not want them killing themselves or other people by driving drunk." Nor do deputies want anyone hurt in fights. Reserve deputies will be available if needed.

The Texas Department of Public Safety will be patrolling Texas' highways very carefully during the celebration period, including roads like the local sections of U.S. Highway 287 and Highway 70.

The lake area is always patrolled by Greenbelt security forces, and regional lakes and parks will be supervised by wardens from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department as well.

The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department will be ready to

respond in the event of fire. Fireworks are always a fire hazard at this time of year. Careless use of fireworks can result in civil suits as well as arrest on various charges.

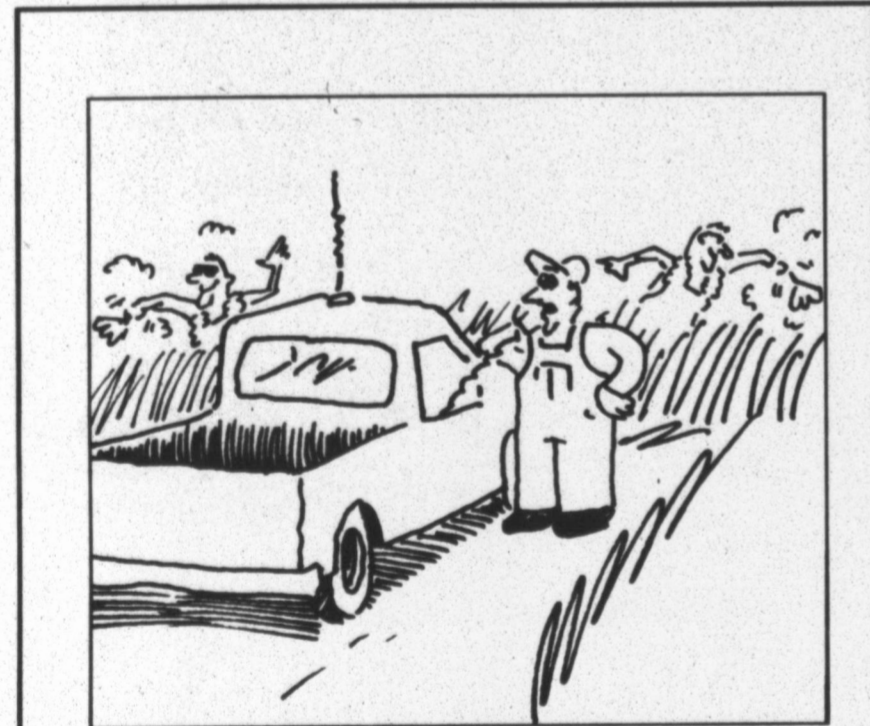
