New Laws Proposed for School Safety

According to the Association of Texas Professional Educators' *Legislative Watch*, the Texas Legislature is considering several bills to make schools safer.

The Texas Senate approved a bill which would designate drug-free school zones. The bill would double penalties for drug offenses near schools and places where young people hang out.

The bill would also make it a misdemeanor for a school superintendent or principal to fail to report criminal offenses on school property or at school sponsored events.

The bill also stiffens punishment for drug offenses committed near schools.

A similar bill has been introduced in the House, but its drug-free zones include only schools.

Another bill—one given tentative approval by the House of Representatives—would allow JP's more authority for handling truants.

Many law enforcement officers contend that too many administrators fail to call police soon enough, and fail to report incidents that would alert authorities to potentially dangerous or violent behavior. Students who pull a gun or threaten others often have a history of disruptive and illegal behavior, but offenses have usually not been reported to police.

Violence has increased in public schools in recent decades. It is no longer restricted to schools in poor neighborhoods in big cities. Even rural communities are at risk.

Administrators (including Trustees) can be sued for negligence in the event that a faculty member or student is injured. Personnel who do not report illegal behavior can be construed as having been negligent.

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Board Member's Code of Ethics

As a member of the Board I shall promote the best interests of the District as a whole, and, to that end, I shall adhere to the following educational and ethical standards.

1. Bring about desired changes through legal and ethical procedures, upholding and enforcing all laws, State Board of Education rules, and court orders pertaining to schools.
2. Make decisions in terms of the educational welfare of all children in the District, regardless of ability, race, creed, ethnicity, sex or social standing.
3. Recognize that decisions must be made by the Board as a whole and make no personal promise or take private action that may compromise the board.
4. Focus Board action on policy making, goal setting, planning, and evaluation, and insist on regular and impartial evaluation of all staff.
5. Support and protect school personnel in the proper performance of their duties.
6. Vote to appoint the best qualified personnel available after consideration of recommendations of the Superintendent.
7. Hold confidential all matters pertaining to school that, if disclosed, may needlessly injure individuals or the schools, and respect the confidentiality of information that is privileged under applicable law.
8. Attend all regularly scheduled Board meetings insofar as possible and become informed concerning the issues to be considered at those meetings.
9. Delegate authority for the administration of the school to the Superintendent.
10. Endeavor to make policy decisions only after full discussion at publicly held Board meetings, render all decisions based on the available facts, and refuse to surrender that judgment to individuals or special groups. [I.e. see all sides, represent all people.]
11. Encourage the free expression of opinion by all Board members and seek systematic communications between the Board and students, staff and all elements of the community.
12. Communicate to Board members and the Superintendent at appropriate times expressions of public reaction to Board policies and school programs.
13. Become informed about current educational issues by individual study and through participation in programs providing needed information, such as those sponsored by state and national school boards associations.
14. Refrain from using my Board position for personal or partisan gain.
15. Make certain the Board remains responsive to the community.
16. Remember always that my first and greatest concern must be the educational welfare of all the students attending the public schools.

WTU Presents Safety Program

Fourth grade student at Clarendon Elementary School were presented a program on Electrical Safety by West Texas Utilities Co. Tommy Hudson, Area Manager of Wellington. The students watched a video entitled *Play It Safe Around Electricity* and learned to avoid electrical dangers such as flying kites or climbing trees near power lines, staying away from downed lines and substations and observing overhead lines when working or playing. Mr. Hudson discussed the nature of electricity and what to do in case of accidents. After the program, students were given an opportunity to ask questions. Each student was given a booklet of safety information to take home.

AIDS Education Program Set

An HIV-AIDS program, with a central theme of healthy decision making, will be presented in the High School Auditorium on April 29th and 30th. The April 29th meeting will be at 6:00 p.m. and is for parents and community members. No students may attend this session. All parents are encouraged to attend this preview of the program that is scheduled for students, grades 8-12, Friday, April 30th. Parents and community members will be invited to tailor the program to meet the wishes and needs of the community.

This program has already been presented at many schools in the panhandle. Region XVI, the Education Service Center, endorses this AIDS program as an excellent program. If you do not want your child to attend this special program, classrooms will be provided as demand necessitates.

The goals of this program are twofold: (1) to educate teenagers about the facts and issues of HIV as it relates to their age group; (2) to introduce students to the importance of wise and healthy decision making and the consequences of poor decisions. Sexual abstinence is stressed. Also addressed is the issue of drug use and how it compromises a person's ability to make wise decisions.

The program was developed for rural communities and is presented by Texas Tech medical students from the Amarillo Regional Health Center. The experience of actual work with AIDS patients allows the medical students to provide additional expertise to the program.

Time will be allowed for participants to ask questions in an anonymous manner.

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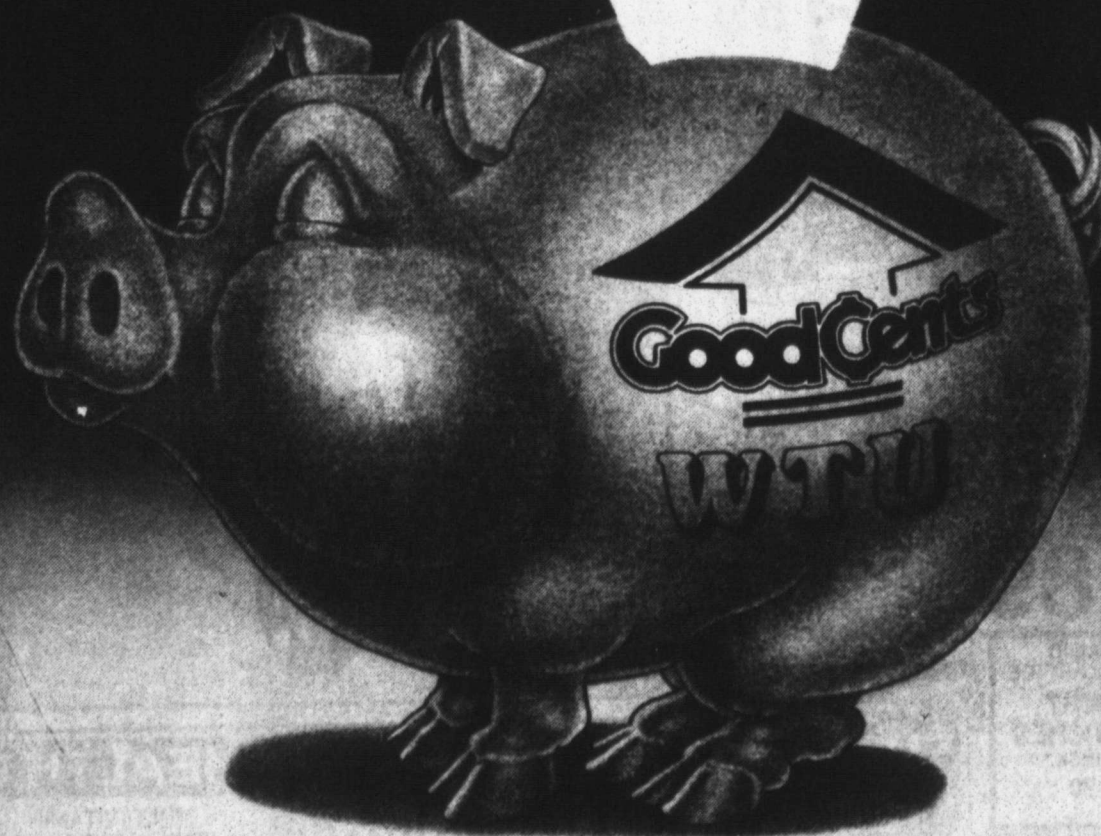

Feline Leukemia Increasing

Feline leukemia is very rapidly increasing disease in cats at this time. This disease is caused by a virus which is slowly growing yet is transmitted readily within the population. Once an animal is infected, it will do one of three things. The first is that an animal can actually clear the infection if it has a good immune system. The second situation is one in which the animal will fight the infection off, and the

virus will become dormant and be kept within the bone marrow of the animal. The third scenario is clinically apparent feline leukemia. Clinical feline leukemia can be presented in many ways but most often is presented as an animal which is chronically ill, runs a periodic fever, and is a "poor doer". These animals will often be presented to the veterinarian with the general complaint that the animal just isn't doing as well as it used to. These animals should be examined, and a blood test performed to either rule in or rule out feline leukemia as a cause of the animal's condition.

In the situation in which the infection goes dormant within the bone marrow, these animals when highly stressed may undergo a relapse and begin to show clinical signs.

Feline leukemia is a preventable disease. Vaccinations are available at most veterinarians which will help prevent the disease in unprotected cats. These vaccinations should be given to kittens and then yearly boosters should be provided. In most cases, veterinarians will test the animal prior to beginning leukemia vaccinations, because vaccination in an animal which is already a carrier will, of course, be of no use and can even cause a dormant affected animal to become clinical.

Once an animal is diagnosed as having feline leukemia, it should be well cared for and antibiotics used as prevention for secondary bacterial infections in this immune-suppressed animal. The animal should be confined within its dwelling so that it does not infect other animals with which it may come in contact. If the animal is an outside animal, consideration should be given to euthanasia so that the other animals with which it may come in contact do not become infected and the disease spread in that manner. Due to the somewhat nomadic nature of cats, especially tom cats, animals which are proven to be infected should be confined to relatively close quarters or euthanized to limit spread of the disease.

Lucero Assigned To Ship

Navy Seaman Apprentice John C. Lucero, son of Jose C. and Angie Lucero of Clarendon, Texas, recently deployed aboard the amphibious assault ship USS Saipan, homeported in Norfolk, Va for six months to the Mediterranean as part of the USS Saipan Amphibious Ready Group.

The ready group relieve the USS Guam Amphibious Ready Group now participating in Operation Provide Promise in the Adriatic Sea. The ready group is comprised of 2,800 sailors from the USS Saipan, USS Ponce, USS Pensacola, Beach Group-2 and Amphibious Squadron-6, and 2,200 Marines from the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit. The sailors and marines will form a Navy-Marine Corps team prepared to participate in contingency operations, as well as bilateral and NATO exercises throughout the Mediterranean region.

The ready group's mission follows the Navy's new strategy entitled, "From The Sea," which shifts the sea services' focus from a global threat to regional challenges and concentrates on near-land warfare and maneuver. The Navy and Marines Corps team operates forward to project a positive American image, build foundations from viable coalition, enhance diplomatic contracts, reassure friends, and demonstrate U.S. power and resolve. On short notice, these forces are poised to respond to crisis in distant lands, from the sea.

Alanreed ISD was the first Independent School District (901) in Gray County. Yes, on July 1, 1993 Alanreed ISD will be history. After two consecutive years of the County Education District (CED) system of finance, "the confiscation plan", Alanreed ISD is forced to close its doors. The CED system wiped out the Alanreed ISD system. Confronted with such a dilemma, the AISD Board of Trustees called for an election to see what the registered voters, who lived in the district, would determine. The voters voted to abolish (not consolidate) the district.

In compliance with the Texas Education Code, the commissioners court in each county where the district's territory is located, was called upon to determine to disposition of the territory within each county. The commissioners court in Gray County assigned all the territory, approximately 92 square miles to McLean ISD. About 89 square miles of the district is located in Donley County. The commissioners court in Donley County, very wisely and unselfishly, assigned approximately 49 square feet to Clarendon ISD and approximately 40 square miles to the Hedley ISD.

According to the Texas Education Code, the real property and buildings, where the school is located, in Gray County, will be assigned to the McLean ISD. The personal properties of the districts will be shared, based on taxable value, by all districts receiving AISD territory. This will be accomplished by the commissioners court of each county agreeing on the allocation.

Alanreed ISD will close without any indebtedness, paying all debts and outstanding warrants. The voters, living in the district, having defeated many consolida-

Vaccines Can Defeat Virus

One of the most easily preventable and most difficult to treat disease of dogs is the complex known as parvo and corona viruses. These viruses cause loss of most of the lining of the small intestine within the animal. Animals affected by Parvo virus and/or Corona virus can become suddenly very depressed, dehydrated, have profuse diarrhea with blood, and excessive vomiting. These animals are subject to death within 24 hours without proper supportive care. Proper care consists of intravenous fluids, antibiotics, and medication to control vomiting and diarrhea. Frequently, cost of treatment for Parvo and Corona virus can be very high due to the intense nature of the treatment required in order for the animal to survive.

Fortunately both of these diseases are relatively preventable by the use of routine, well placed vaccinations. Puppies should begin to receive vaccinations against Parvo and Corona virus as early as 6 weeks and should have a series of boosters to provide adequate immunity. A single injection or vaccination against Parvo and/or Corona virus is normally not sufficient to protect the animal and it is therefore recommended that more than one vaccination take place when the animal is relatively young.

In the unprotected, (unvaccinated), Parvo and Corona virus can affect dogs of all ages, and since treatment is relatively expensive, vaccinations function as an inexpensive form of "insurance". In some breeds, such as the Rottweiler, Parvo and Corona virus is much more severe. In these breeds vaccination is required on even a more regular basis early in the dog's life. Consult your veterinarian for advice about your animal.

Rabies!

Rabies is a centuries-old viral disease. In years past in the United States, incidence of Rabies was highest in domestic species, especially the dog. With the advent of widespread vaccination in the 1950's, incidence of reported cases of rabies in wildlife began to overtake those of domesticated species. In the United States at present, wildlife Rabies far surpasses cases in all domesticated species. Nationwide, important wildlife hosts of Rabies virus have included skunks, raccoons, and foxes. Superimposed on this terrestrial wildlife cycle is a largely independent cycle in insectivorous bats. At the present time, rabies in both wildlife and bats is not increasing, but is an ever present consideration, particularly in rural areas such as Donley and surrounding counties. Yearly vaccinations of the dog and cat population continues to be the best prevention of human exposure to Rabies. These animals in many cases act as "buffers" for humans against exposure to wildlife with Rabies. By law in Texas, Rabies vaccinations are to be administered by licensed veterinarians only. Humans, especially children should not approach and/or handle sick or injured wildlife, due to the risk of bite wounds and inadvertent exposure to Rabies. If injured or ill wildlife are discovered, contact the Game Warden with the Department of Fish and Wildlife in your area.

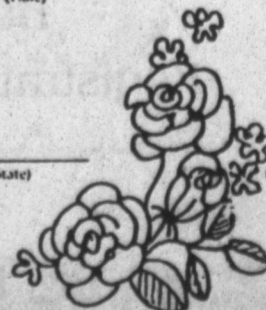

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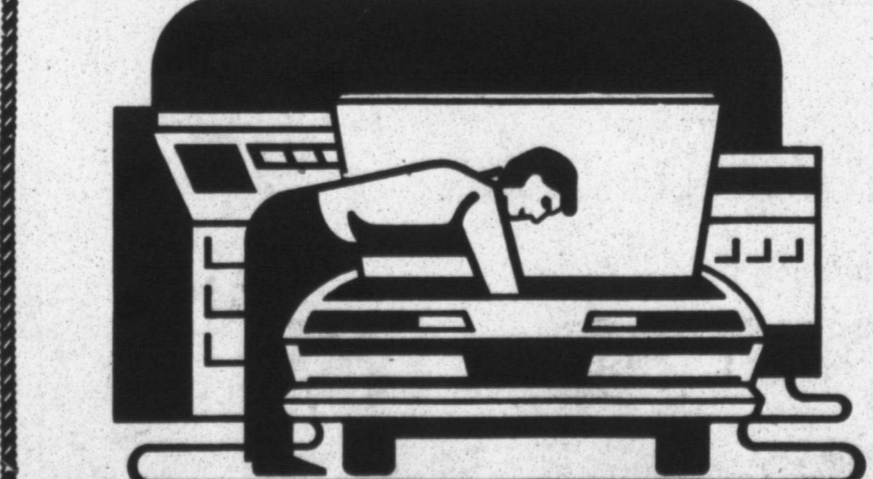
