Can your cell phone kill you?

We interrupt our continuing coverage of Indecision 2000 to bring you this special alert - Cell phones may be hazardous to your health.

I'm not just talking about driving off the road while talking on a cell phone here. Allegedly, the devices created by evil capitalist pigs can cause brain tumors in unsuspecting humans.

This news has been bantered about in the United States for some time as technophobes and Health Nazis continually try to find faults with modern pieces of the American way of life. (And of course if they can sue a few people in the process, so much the better.) But the most recent developments come from across the pond. Yes, jolly old England is getting into the act.

Her Majesty's government has set aside £7 million to research the possible health hazards of cellular phones. according to Ananova.com. That's about \$10 million to you and me. The Brits will be looking at the radiation emitted by every model of phone handset as well as studying emissions of radio waves from cellular base

The British government is advising people to keep their mobile calls short and saying that children under 16 should only use the devices when it's essential.

Additionally, a recent Associated Press story said the British government is distributing leaflets warning people of the dangers of the cell phone and telling them to compare radiation emissions when shopping for a mobile

So what evidence do the Brits have that they're taking these steps? Well, apparently not much. An English expert study of the matter concluded there was "nothing to indicate that mobile phones were a health risk" although there was slight evidence that the devices may cause "subtle biological changes."

It reminds me of a few years back when some folks were going around saying that high voltage electrical lines were causing cancer in the people who lived near them. That was eventually proved to be nonsense, and I suspect the cellular phone allegations will also be proven to be bogus - but not until some mindless people have been scared to death and some dishonest scientists, lawyers, and opportunists have lined their pockets.

Think I'm wrong? Let's look at England again. Ananova.com reports an enterprising company over there has come up with a way to block the supposedly harmful electromagnetic radiation emitted by mobile nes. They're selling WaveZorb adhesive patches which fit on cellular phones and shield the brain from

the radiation. The things are made of "carbon cloth" (whatever that is) and are "designed to stop microwaves entering the ear passage" which is "an open door through the skull and is said to be the main path to the brain for mobile

phone radiation.' Yeah. Right.

A company official is reported to have said the WaveZorb does not produce any neutralizing fields nor create ionic or electrical charges of particles, but somehow it stops up to 99 percent of microwave radiation without affecting the performance of the phone.

That's interesting. Given that the cell phone works by transmitting and receiving radio waves, I'm left to wonder how you block 99 percent of the waves and not affect the phone. That just doesn't make any sense, but then I suppose they aren't trying to sell the things to people who think things through.

If you're interested, the WaveZorb is reportedly available in gas stations and supermarkets all over the United Kingdom. They cost about \$8.35 and have to be replaced every six months. They aren't available in the U.S. as far as I know. I'm sure they will be soon, though, because the American people's knowledge of science is so pathetic many folks will buy WaveZorb patches in a New York minute.

As is the case with everything from global warming to saccharin, a little bit of knowledge can be used to whip up a frenzy or to lead the ignorant to pass bad laws or purchase silly products. And it's typically not until many years and millions of dollars later that the junk science

Proposal threatens health care availability

Texas employers already spend \$4,000 to \$6,000 per employee on heath insurance but proposed legislation could make that cost skyrocket even more -- threatening the affordability of health benefitspackages for both large and small employers. Protecting sensitive health information is important to Texas businesses, but well-intentioned privacy proposals can have unintended consequences.

In addition to recently passed federal laws addressing privacy and with more regulations on the way, one Texas proposal could create numerous obstacles for employers to shop for affordable insurance if passed in the next legislative session and could conflict with the federal legislation already in the works.

When smaller businesses shop for health care benefits, a potential insurance carrier will look at the health history of the employees. As currently written, the proposal would require for an employer to receive permission from every single employee, for a carrier to review medical information for the sole purpose of giving the business a fair bid. If even one employee does not release this information, a potential carrier can only assume the plan. worst and has only two choices: charge

an astronomical price or refuse to cover the a new, unlimited cause of action against company's employees altogether.

For very large multi-state employers, legislation could prevent employers from being able to manage employee benefit function in a singular, uniform manner, creating an administrative nightmare that would be very costly and confusing.

In addition, the proposed legislation could also affect employees' access to covered prescriptions. Many employers utilize pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs) to administer this benefit. Although most PBMs originated as claims processors, today they provide a wide range of services. They include: refill reminder programs, disease management education mail order pharmacies and most importantly, drug interaction monitoring to make sure you aren't taking medication prescribed by two different physicians that interact with each other. By using PBMs, employers are able to offer to keep costs down and keep employees healthy. While some proposals are for such type of healthcare delivery, the costs to comply with the consent requirements would basically put PBMs out of business and put employers out of luck when wanting an affordable prescription

Lastly, this legislation would create

employers, coupled with jail time for voluntarily providing health benefits to their employees while doing little to improve health care quality, accessibility and the number of Texans insured. Moreover employees' physicians would likewise be subject to civil (including punitive damages) and criminal penalties for failure to

That's why our organization - representing thousands of small and large employers across Texas is concerned about proposed legislation that could make it increasingly difficult for employers to provide much-needed benefits.

Personal information should be protected but information must be appropriately accessible to provide quality-based purchasing, data collection on health care outcomes, research, physician profiling and the fight against health care fraud and

The federal government is already taking steps to protect personal medical records from being misused. In Texas, we must work with federal regulations first before passing proposals that could do more harm than good.

Free market best way to provide services

Have you ever stayed up late at night worrying about whether there would be sufficient food in your community's grocery stores the next day? Paced the floor over whether there would be the correct quantities of food for everyone? Fretted over whether rich people would buy up everything and leave nothing for you? Probably not. And the reason you haven't provides clues as to what we should do in the important areas of education and health care.

The free-market process of food delivery was brilliantly analyzed by a 19th-century Frenchman named Frederic Bastiat: "On entering Paris where I came to visit, I said to myself -- Here are a million human beings who would all die in a short time if provisions of every kind ceased to flow toward this great metropolis. Imagination is baffled when it tries to appreciate the vast multiplicity of commodities which must enter tomorrow through the barriers in order to preserve the inhabitants from falling prey to the convulsions of famine, rebellion, and pillage.... What is the ingenious and secret power which presides over the astonishing regularity of such complicated movements, a regularity in which we all have so implicit, though thoughtless, a faith; on which our comfort, our very existence depends?"

Bastiat's observation is as appropriate today as it was then. I don't wish to frighten or panic anyone, but do you realize that there is no government department or agency in existence that plans for the delivery of food to your community? That's

right -- it happens all by itself without any government plans, directives, or guar-

When you walk into the grocery store and see all those shelves filled with things to buy, no government planner has made it happen. No bureaucrat has sat at his desk and figured out "demand curves" relating every item to every person in your community. No government employee has calculated how much of each cereal, vegetable, drink, pasta, and the thousands of other things on your grocer's shelves will have to be produced to satisfy your individual demand and the demands of the other consumers in your community.

I repeat: It all just happens, all by itself, without any government planning or direction. Getting nervous?

The process is what might be called "the miracle of the market." Each night, every person in America can go to sleep secure in the knowledge that the next morning, his grocery stores will be filled with all the food that he might want to buy.

Suppose, however, that during the Great Depression, the U.S. Department of Food had been established to protect the American people against starvation and the vicissitudes of the market. Suppose that from the 1930s on, all grocery stores in the United States were government-owned and that no one had been permitted to own a private grocery store. There would, of course, be less variety and fewer choices with respect to groceries, but everyone would undoubtedly feel a sense of comfort and security over the fact that the government was in charge of the "public grocery

Now suppose I came along and said, "I believe we ought to separate food and the state. Let's fire all the government food workers, sell off the state grocery stores, and turn the entire process over to the free

What would be the reaction of most people? "We can't do that. Food is too important an item to be left to the free market. How could we be sure that there would be enough food for everyone? What if one city didn't receive any food and another received all of it? What if grocery stores forgot to order food one day? For that matter, what if no one opened grocery stores in our community? What about the poor? How would they eat, especially when the rich would be buying everything? You place too much faith in the free market. This program favors the rich. The burden of buying groceries falls most heavily on

People would lack confidence in the free-market delivery of food because they would never have seen how a free market in food delivery had functioned.

Yet, when it comes to the supplying of food to hundreds of thousands of grocery stores all across America, people do have faith and confidence in the miracle of the free market. After all, when was the last time you heard someone calling for government grocery stores?

Now, let's talk about education and
