Project Range Care Planned

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service in March is launching Project Range Care, a five-year statewide educational effort aimed at helping ranchers improve their rangelands.

The program seeks ways to improve the management of livestock stocking rates to ensure ranch success and range sustainability.

"Ranchers do not intentionally overgraze their ranges and decrease their productivity," said Dr. Larry White, range specialist with the Extension Service.

Rangelands in Texas were severely overgrazed near the turn of the century. Range conditions continue to improve, but many areas still need careful management, White said.

Finances, extended drought, arid environments, over-optimism, or year-long grazing programs that do not allow pastures to "rest" may contribute to the problem, he said.

For example, in the more humid areas of the state that average 30 to 40 inches of rain annually, ranges may improve from fair to good condition in two to three years with proper grazing management. In arid West Texas, with an average rainfall of 10 inches, that same increase may take 5 to 10 years, he said. With drought, recovery is often slower.

Two-thirds of the state -- or nearly 170 million acres -- are rangeland, or non-cultivated land that produces native vegetation for grazing. Much of the agricultural income and food for Texans is produced by more than 20 million grazing animals. Additionally, wildlife supported by rangeland provides income and pleasure.

However, less than 20 percent of Texas ranchers closely monitor the impact of stocking rates on their range resources, according to a statewide survey conducted by the Extension Service.

"The animal stocking rate is the most important ranch decision," White said. "Ranchers are not in the business of growing livestock -- they are in the business of growing grass, or forage, to support that livestock, while conserving the other resources of the ranch. Forage serves as the foundation."

The Project Range Care logo symbolizes the relationship of plants, animals and man. A triangle illustrates the ecological balance of the system with all components dependent on each other, he said.

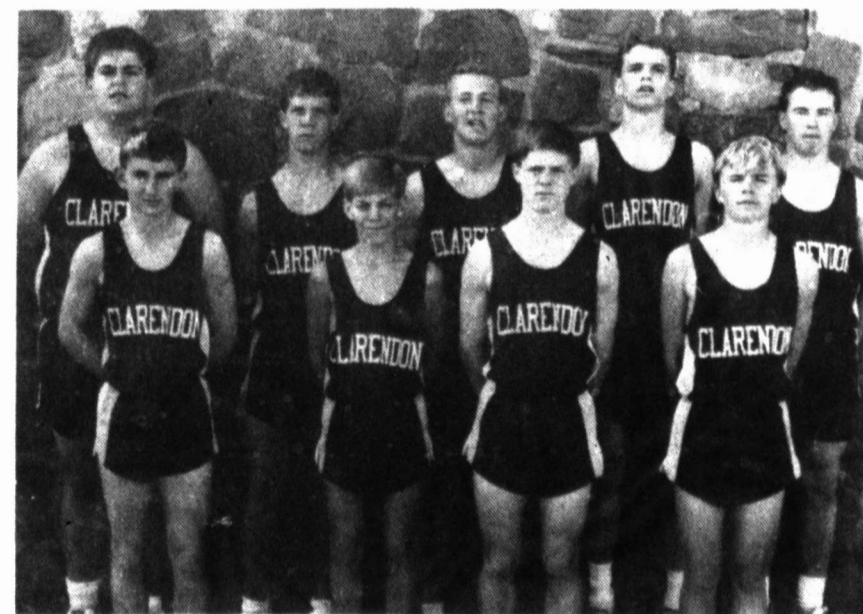
Man is at the apex of the triangle to show that managerial decisions are the key to successful stocking rates that achieve the desired human benefits, a balanced ecosystem, and improved production, White explained.

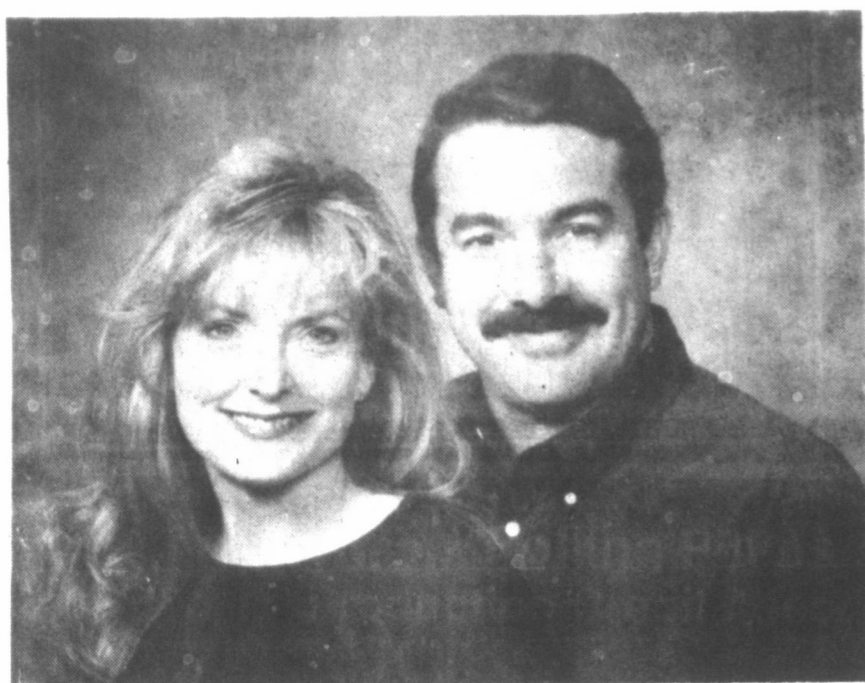

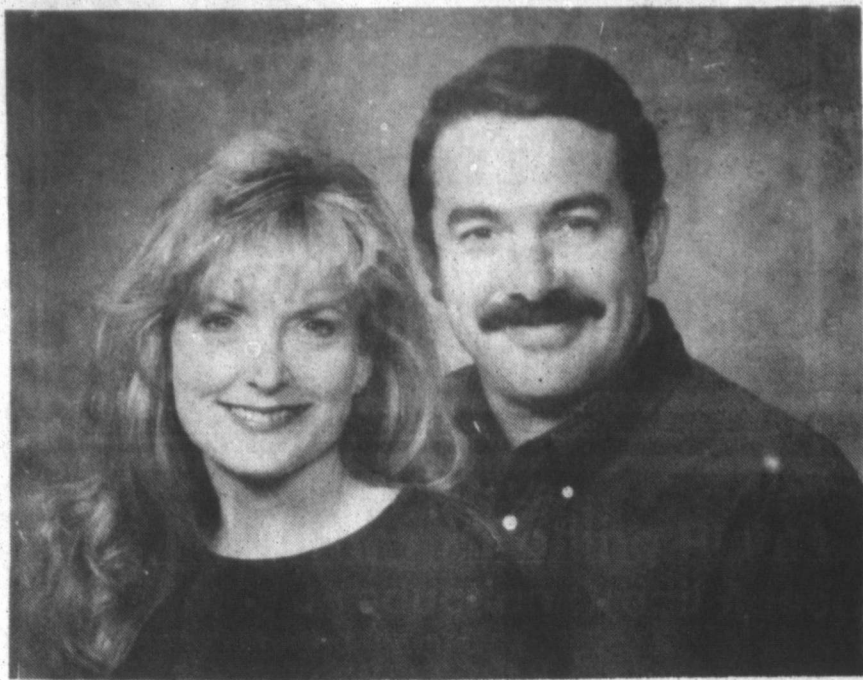

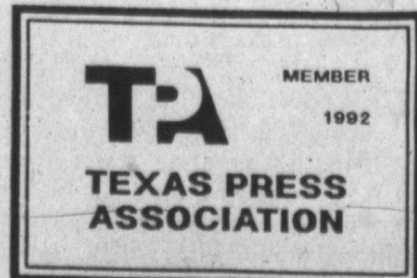

MINUTES PUBLIC HEARING MARCH 24, 1992 6:00 P. M.

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular session on March 24, 1992, in the Board Room, City Hall at 6:00 p.m. A Public Hearing concerning the Texas Community Development Program of the Texas Department of Housing & Community Affairs was held at 7:00 p.m.

Members present: Mayor Steve Smith, Aldermen David Pitts, McKinley Smith, and Bobbie Kidd. Members absent: Alderman James Kuhn.

Others present: City Superintendent Jim Roberts, City Secretary Sue Howard, Ernie Johnston, Peggy Smith, Earl Hartman, Jerry Chambliss, Betty Boston, Shirley Petty, Mac Stavenhagen, Trey Chamberlain, Bob Williams, William J. Lowe, R. L. Gilkey, Maggie Stewart, Cassie Row, James Owens, Wes Henson, Joe & Dortha McNutt, David & Helen Randall, Jerry Courtney, J. R. & Joane Leathers, Dickie Johnson, Eda Wallin, Bob McCombs, Pat McCombs, Jamie Johnson, Terri Floyd, Kathleen Yankie, Dave & Maureta Croslin, David Randall, Bright Newhouse, Bill Stavenhagen, Nova Neuhaus, Kevin Welch, Janice Barbee, Ferol & Anne Shelton, Frank Hommel, Bro. Bob Gilpin, and Gordon Maddox.

Minutes of the March 10, 1992, meeting were read, and upon a motion by Alderman McKinley Smith, seconded by Alderman David Pitts, said minutes were approved. Motion carried.

Motion was made to pay for Commercial Drivers License for the two trash truck drivers by Alderman David Pitts, seconded by Alderman McKinley Smith. Motion carried.

Dave Croslin spoke on the behalf of the motel owners of Clarendon. He would like the Board of Aldermen to consider an adjustment in the Motel Bed Tax to a lower rate. This matter was discussed briefly and was tabled until more research can be done. This will be discussed at the next meeting after research has been reported back to the Board.

Gordon Maddox, CPA, gave a report of the audit he conducted of the City of Clarendon. All reports were given an affirmative opinion. Motion was made to accept the audit by Alderman David Pitts, seconded by Alderman Bobbie Kidd. Motion carried.

Motion was made to appoint Sue Howard as the Local Records Management Officer as required by law, by Alderman Bobbie Kidd, seconded by Alderman McKinley Smith. Motion carried.

Motion was made to adopt a records management program by ordinance by Alderman Bobbie Kidd, seconded by Alderman David Pitts. Motion carried.

ORDINANCE NO. 295 WHEREAS, Title 6, Subtitle C, Local Government Records Act provides that a municipality must establish by ordinance an active and continuing records management program to be administered by a Records Management Officer; and

WHEREAS, the City of Clarendon desires to adopt an ordinance for that purpose and to prescribe policies and procedures consistent with the Local Government Records Act and in the interests of cost-effective and efficient recordkeeping; NOW THEREFORE: BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON

SECTION 1. DEFINITION OF MUNICIPAL RECORDS. All documents, papers, letters, books, maps, photographs, sound or video recordings, microfilm, magnetic tape, electronic media, or other information recording media, regardless of physical form or characteristic and regardless of whether public access to them is open or restricted under the laws of the state, created or received by the City of Clarendon or any of its officers or employees pursuant to law or in the transaction of public business are hereby declared to be the records of the City of Clarendon and shall be created, maintained, and disposed of in accordance with the provision of this ordinance or procedures authorized by it and in no other manner.

SECTION 2. ADDITIONAL DEFINITIONS. (1) "Department head" means the officer who by ordinance or administrative

policy is in charge of an office of the City of Clarendon that creates or receives records. (2) "Essential record" means any record of the City of Clarendon necessary to the resumption or continuation of its operations in an emergency or disaster, to the re-creation of its legal and financial status, or to the protection and fulfillment of obligations to the people of the state.

(3) "Permanent record" means any record of the City of Clarendon for which the retention period on a records control schedule is given as permanent.

(4) "Records control schedule" means a document prepared by or under the authority of the Records Management Officer listing the records maintained by the City of Clarendon, their retention periods, and other records disposition information that the records management program may require.

(5) "Records management" means the application of management techniques to the creation, use, maintenance, retention, preservation, and disposal of records for the purposes of reducing the costs and improving the efficiency of recordkeeping. The term includes the development of records control schedules, the management of filing and information retrieval systems, the protection of essential and permanent records, the economical and space-effective storage of inactive records, control over the creation and distribution of forms, reports, and correspondence, and the management of micrographics and electronic and other records storage systems.

(6) "Records management officer" means the person designated in Section 5 of this ordinance.

(7) "Records management plan" means the plan developed under Section 6 of this ordinance.

(8) "Retention period" means the minimum time that must pass after the creation, recording, or receipt of a record, or the fulfillment of certain actions associated with a record, before it is eligible for destruction.

SECTION 3. MUNICIPAL RECORDS DECLARED PUBLIC PROPERTY. All municipal records as defined in Sec. 1 of this ordinance are hereby declared to be the property of the City of Clarendon. No municipal official or employee has, by virtue of his or her position, any personal or property right to such records even though he or she may have developed or compiled them. The unauthorized destruction, removal from files, or use of such records is prohibited.

SECTION 4. POLICY. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the City of Clarendon to provide for efficient, economical, and effective controls over the creation, distribution, organization, maintenance, use, and disposition of all municipal records through a comprehensive system of integrated procedures for their management from creation to ultimate disposition, consistent with the requirements of the Texas Local Government Records Act and accepted records management practice.

SECTION 5. DESIGNATION OF RECORDS MANAGEMENT OFFICER.

The City Secretary, and the successive holders of said office, shall serve as Records Management Officer for the City of Clarendon. As provided by state law, each successive holder of the office shall file his or her name with the director and librarian of the Texas State Library within thirty days of the initial designation or of taking up the office, as applicable.

SECTION 6. RECORDS MANAGEMENT PLAN TO BE DEVELOPED; APPROVAL OF PLAN; AUTHORITY OF PLAN. (a) The Records Management Officer shall develop a records management plan for the City of Clarendon for submission to the Board of Aldermen. The plan must contain policies and procedures designed to reduce the costs and improve the efficiency of recordkeeping, to adequately protect the essential records of the municipality, and to properly preserve those records of the municipality that are of historical value. The plan must be designed to enable the Records Management Officer to carry out his or her duties prescribed by state law and this ordinance effectively.

(b) Once approved by the Board of Aldermen the records management plan shall be binding on all offices, departments, divisions, programs, commissions, bureaus, boards, committees, or similar entities of the City of Clarendon and records shall be created, maintained, stored, microfilmed, or disposed of in accordance with the plan.

(c) State law relating to the duties, other responsibilities, or recordkeeping requirements of a department head do not exempt the department head or the records in the department head's care from the application of this ordinance and the records management plan adopted under it and may not be used by the department head as a basis for refusal to participate in the records management program of the City of Clarendon.

SECTION 7. DUTIES OF RECORDS MANAGEMENT OFFICER. In addition to other duties assigned in this ordinance, the Records Management Officer shall:

(1) administer the records management program and provide assistance to department heads in its implementation;

(2) plan, formulate, and prescribe records disposition policies, systems, standards, and procedures;

(3) in cooperation with department heads identify essential records and establish a disaster plan for each municipal office and department to ensure maximum availability of the records in order to re-establish operations quickly and with minimum disruption and expense;

(4) develop procedures to ensure the permanent preservation of the historically valuable records of the city;

(5) establish standards for filing and storage equipment and for recordkeeping supplies;

(6) study the feasibility of and, if appropriate, establish a uniform filing system and a forms design and control system for the City of Clarendon;

(7) monitor records retention schedules and administrative

department and the retention period for each series. Records control schedules shall also contain such other information regarding the disposition of municipal records as the records management plan may require.

(8) disseminate to the City of Clarendon and department heads information concerning state laws and administrative rules relating to local government records;

(9) ensure that the maintenance, preservation, microfilming, destruction, or other disposition of the records of the City of Clarendon are carried out in accordance with the policies and procedures of the records management program and the requirements of state law;

(10) maintain records on the volume of records destroyed under approved records control schedules or through records destruction authorization requests, the volume of records microfilmed or stored electronically, and the estimated cost and space savings as the result of such disposal or disposition;

(11) report annually to the Board of Aldermen on the implementation of the records management plan in each department of The City of Clarendon, including summaries of the statistical and fiscal data compiled under Subsection (10); and

(12) bring to the attention of the Board of Aldermen non-compliance by department heads or other municipal personnel with the policies and procedures of the records management program or the Local Government Records Act.

SECTION 8. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF DEPARTMENT HEADS. In addition to other duties assigned in this ordinance, department heads shall:

(1) cooperate with the Records Management Officer in carrying out the policies and procedures established in the City of Clarendon for the efficient and economical management of records and in carrying out the requirements of this ordinance;

(2) adequately document the transaction of government business and the services, programs, and duties for which the department head and his or her staff are responsible; and

(3) maintain the records in his or her care and carry out their preservation, microfilming, destruction, or other disposition only in accordance with the policies and procedures of the records management program of the City of Clarendon and the requirements of this ordinance.

SECTION 9. RECORDS CONTROL SCHEDULES TO BE DEVELOPED; APPROVAL; FILING WITH STATE. (a) The Records Management Officer, in cooperation with department heads, shall prepare records control schedules on a department by department basis listing all records series created or received by the

department and the retention period for each series. Records control schedules shall also contain such other information regarding the disposition of municipal records as the records management plan may require.

(b) Each records control schedule shall be monitored and amended as needed by the Records Management Officer on a regular basis to ensure that it is in compliance with records retention schedules issued by the state and that it continues to reflect the recordkeeping procedures and needs of the department and the records management program of the City of Clarendon.

(c) Before its adoption a records control schedule or amended schedule for a department must be approved by the department head and the Board of Aldermen.

(d) Before its adoption a records control schedule must be submitted to and accepted for filing by the director and librarian as provided by state law. If a schedule is not accepted for filing the schedule shall be amended to make it acceptable for filing. The Records Management Officer shall submit the records control schedules to the director and librarian.

SECTION 10. IMPLEMENTATION OF RECORDS CONTROL SCHEDULES; DESTRUCTION OF RECORDS UNDER SCHEDULE. (a) A records control schedule for a department that has been approved and adopted under Section 9 shall be implemented by department heads according to the policies and procedures of the records management plan.

(b) A record whose retention period has expired on a records control schedule shall be destroyed unless an open records request is pending on the record, the subject matter of the record is pertinent to a pending law suit, or the department head requests in writing to the Records Management Officer that the record be retained for an additional period.

(c) Prior to the destruction of a record under an approved records control schedule, authorization for the destruction must be obtained by the Records Management Officer from the Board of Aldermen.

SECTION 11. DESTRUCTION OF UNSCHEDULED RECORDS. A record that has not yet been listed on an approved records control schedule may be destroyed if its destruction has been approved in the same manner as a record destroyed under an approved schedule and the Records Management Officer has submitted to and received back from the director and librarian an approved destruction authorization request.

Dr. R. L. Gilkey came on behalf of the Thunder Junction Board asking the community to support this effort.

The floor was opened for discussion of Thunder Junction. Several people from the community expressed their opinions. Motion was made by Alderman David Pitts for the City of Clarendon to pay an amount, not to exceed \$17,000.00, out of the Motel Bed Tax Fund for a feasibility study. Motion died for lack of a second.

Further discussion followed. Several citizens expressed the fear that the community might lose Thunder Junction if the feasibility is not conducted at this time.

Motion was made by Alderman David Pitts for the City of Clarendon to pay an amount, not to exceed \$17,000.00, out of the Motel Bed Tax Fund for the feasibility study, with the understanding that the money be paid back by Thunder Junction. Alderman Bobbie Kidd expressed the desire to have more time to learn more about the details of Thunder Junction. Concerned citizens expressed opposition in waiting too long to take action on this matter. Trey Chamberlain told Alderman McKinley Smith that he would pay the money back if the Aldermen thought they had made the wrong decision six months from now. Alderman Bobbie Kidd seconded the motion after that statement. Motion carried.

Mayor Steve Smith opened the public hearing concerning the Texas Community Development Program of the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs. This hearing was held to obtain the opinions of citizens regarding the proposed amendment to the City's 1990 Texas Community Development Program.

Motion was made by Alderman David Pitts, seconded by Alderman McKinley Smith, to pass the following resolution. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS, AUTHORIZING THE SUBMISSION OF A CONTRACT AMENDMENT REQUEST FOR THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FUND CONTRACT BETWEEN THE CITY OF CLARENDON AND THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND COMMUNITY AFFAIRS CONTRACT NUMBER 700251.

WHEREAS, the City of Clarendon entered into a contract with the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs to make improvements to the water system; and

WHEREAS, additional contract funds are available; and

WHEREAS, the City of Clarendon desires to extend water services to more homes;

Designers Visit Clarendon

Two internationally recognized recreation consultants will be in Clarendon, Tuesday through Thursday, in connection with plans for Thunder Junction.

Design firm for the park will be the Duell Corporation. Duell will work in conjunction with the Amarillo architectural firm of Vaughn and Associates.

Ira West, Duell vice president, will look at the Thunder Junction site located near Greenbelt Lake north of Clarendon in order to begin preliminary design work. A member of the American Society of Interior Designers, West has been with the Los Angeles firm for more than 25 years and has been involved in all phases of theme park design and development.

He will join Don Stewart of Economic Consulting Services, who conducted preliminary feasibility studies for the park. Stewart is to begin work on a comprehensive feasibility study of target market areas for Clarendon and Thunder Junction, and sizing and scope of the park.

The study, which will compile and analyze data useful not only for Thunder Junction, but also for the City of Clarendon in its tourism efforts, will be paid for by the city from its hotel/motel tax funds. The Clarendon Board of Aldermen approved the \$17,000 expenditure on Tuesday, March 24.

The Duel firm has designed many major theme parks. According to a year-end report by Amusement Business, Duell Corp. has designed in whole or part 19 of the top 30 theme parks in the United States.

RANGE--from 1. Locals Son Returns From Gulf

Stocking rates determine range productivity and forage regrowth, animal performance and health problems, competition with wildlife, soil erosion, and the cost of brush control.

Proper range management is not easy, White said. Ranchers must adjust their decision-making to environmental, economic, political and social constraints.

With Project Range Care, the Extension service will highlight new range management methods that can help ranchers match stocking rates with current forage production.

Workshops and training meetings conducted at the County level will focus on how to determine range condition and the amount of forage, how to assess livestock forage requirements, and how to grow more forage with the rainfall received. Other topics will include how to evaluate risk using rainfall records, how to monitor changes in rangeland using photoguides, how to prepare a lease that promotes proper stocking rates and how to manage mixed animal stocking rates.

Navy Petty Officer 3rd Class Ken W. Miller, son of Mr. and Mrs. M.W. Miller of Clarendon, Texas, recently returned aboard the mine countermeasure ship USS Guardian, homeported in Mayport, FL following an eight-month deployment to the Persian Gulf.

While operating in the Gulf, USS Guardian conducted minehunting and multinational mine countermeasures operations. The ship looked for mines in the Persian Gulf and found her first mine two days after arriving there, and located 25 mines in all during the deployment. Miller travelled over 10,000 miles during its trans-Atlantic crossing, which marked a first for one of the Navy's newest class of mine countermeasures ships.

USS Guardian also conducted search and rescue operations for two sophisticated aircraft that were lost at sea after the war. After locating them using mine

hunting radar, the ship was quickly reassigned to the northern tip of the Gulf to continue mine countermeasure activities.

He visited several foreign ports including Mina Sulman, Bahrain; Jubayl, Saudi Arabia; Abu Dhabi and Dubai, United Arab Emirates; Muscat and Salalah, Oman; Ojibouti; Hurghada and PRot Suez, Egypt, and Souda Bay, Crete.

Other ports included Augusta Bay, Sicily; Naples, Italy; Nice, France; Alicante and Rota, Spain.

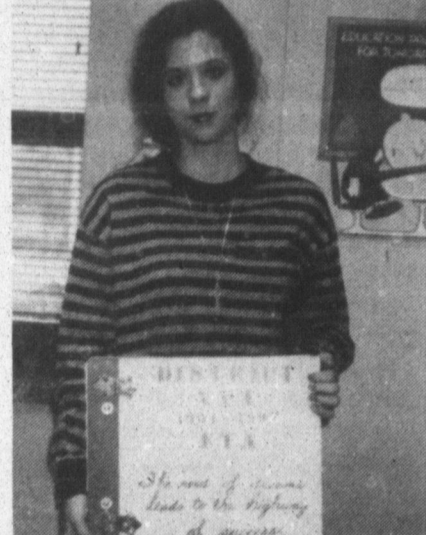
