#### Graham accepts plea of 'no contest' on DWI

Donley County Hospital District Administrator Alan Graham pled no contest to a charge of Driving While Intoxicated last Thursday, according to documents filed in the county clerk's office.

County Judge Jack Hall found Graham guilty, issued a \$750 fine, and ordered him to pay \$226 in court costs. Hall also handed down a sentence of three days in jail and gave the defendant credit for time

Graham was arrested for DWI on March 2 after he responded to an accident as a volunteer driver for the local ambulance service. He has since resigned as a volunteer. A subsequent investigation by the Texas Department of Health, which regulates the ambulance service, took no action against the

County officials declined to ment on the case.



## **Rural voices** endangered by Legislature

Last week I received a message on my answering machine. I don't know who it was, but I gathered it was from my old friends at the Texas Republican

The message urged me to contact my state sena-

tor and representative and tell them to approve the GOP's redistricting map. But what really chapped my hide was that the nameless telephone dude said that redistricting was necessary because the Democrats had failed to do their job in 2001. In other words, the D's should have commentary acted on redistricting during the Législature's regular session that year rather than having it end up in the hands of the

We have a word for that kind of revisionist history

in Texas. It starts with B and ends with T.

Longtime readers know well that I am no friend of the Democratic Party, but the way the Republicans are playing this issue is just plain wrong. More importantly, the GOP agenda will be a tremendous detriment to the voice of the Panhandle and all of rural West

Let's step back in time for a moment. In the past, a spirit of bipartisanship was used to govern the state under the philosophy of "what was best for Texas."

That approach was at its pinnacle when Republican George W. Bush was Governor, Democrat Bob Bullock was Lt. Governor, and Democrat Pete Laney was Speaker. That spirit ended when George Bush resigned to become President.

It's been downhill ever since.

Rick Perry, who succeeded Bullock and then ascended to the Governor's Mansion, has largely exercised his office in a purely partisan manner, which started with his veto-spree after the 2001 session. At the close of that session, it was expected that he would call a special session to deal with re-districting. He did not. As this column has discussed before, what happened next was a Republican-controlled Legislative Redistricting Board redrew the political map in Texas, which was later changed by the courts.

To say that the Democrats, who controlled the statehouse then, failed in their duty is false. They were not even given the opportunity to perform that duty because the GOP saw a chance to seize control

Now flash-forward where a new Republican-controlled Legislature is in special session to once again Perrymander the political lines for the sake of GOP power at the behest of U.S. Rep. Tom Delay (R-Sugar Land), who is the Majority Leader in the Congress.

(Don't try to think too much about why we're doing this now when we used to do it every ten years or why a member of Congress is pulling the strings of our boys in Austin. It will only make your head hurt.)

Different maps are now being cussed and discussed. Most of them have one thing in common: rural interests are succumbing to urban interests.

In recent days there has been much consternation about what will happen to our own beloved District 13, which is currently ably represented by Clarendon's Mac Thornberry. One idea has the Panhandle being split, and Thornberry's district being stretched down close to Ft. Worth. Now who is going to represent us better? Mac or some idiot urban Republican from the Metroplex?

Area farming and ranching interests are also worried about what appears to be a prevailing attempt to get rid of US Rep. Charlie Stenholm (D-Stamford) by Perrymandering his district to insure a Republican victory there. Charlie is one of the most conservative Democrats in the US Congress and has gained a lot of influence on the House Agriculture Committee.

There is some good news though. This week State Sen. Bill Ratliff (R-Mt. Pleasant) announced he was joining ten Democrats who are unilaterally opposed to bringing up redistricting for debate in the Senate. The move could kill the harebrained plan, but Ratliff could use some support from other clear-thinking members

It is time now for Sen. Robert Duncan (R-Lubbock), who represents Donley County, to step up to the plate and do what is best for West Texas rather than what is in the best short term interest of his party. -Duncan should join Ratliff and put this thing down for

## City has treated library director unfairly to fund the requested salary increase. The

In a tiebreaker vote, the Mayor, Tex Selvidge, cast a vote to deny raising the Library Director and Library Assistant a small pay raise until September, to make their pay more equal to less skilled city employees.

Although the Library has won unprecedented recognition and awards for the City of Clarendon through the hard working efforts and talented skills of its employees, the city mayor and council members failed to reward those efforts with a reasonable salary. Instead, they prefer to pay parttime summer help with few skills at almost equal levels to the library employees and pay less skilled and far less hardworking full-time employees much higher salaries.

A chart showing that Clarendon's library was the lowest in the area in compensation for hours of service was presented to the council.

The Library brings in more than enough money to fund the requested salary increase. The Library has enough money

Library has enough money in a savings account to pay these small increases. The efforts of the Librarians and the Friends of the Library seem to be wasted on the politicians who run the City of Clarendon. When an employer is being unrea-

sonable and unfair, the employee has no recourse other than to accept it or leave. People in any job should be shown respect and fair treatment. Determining wages based on who people are and not what they do is discriminatory and unreasonable. The Library Director feels that she has to resign because of the council's unreasonable and unfair treatment.
