# **Paving costs** average folks just 51¢ daily

The time for choosing is drawing near. Does Clarendon really want good streets, or would its citizens rather just gripe about streets? That's what it comes down to, and it really is that simple.

The need to adopt the city's paving plan should be

self-evident, especially after this last weekend. It finally rained; and while no one is complaining about the rain, it did make a mess of many of our streets... again

Blackie Hartwick lives on the corner of Third and McLean streets. He and his wife have been in favor of paving the streets since they moved to town eight years ago, they told me.

Besides the rough roadway, Mrs. Hartwick doesn't like the fact that "dust just fogs into the house" from the street when it's dry.

Their resolve was only strengthened after the recent deluge. Mr. Hartwick got about four inches in his rain gauge, and he also got nice hole - a gully really, possibly even qualifying as a crevasse or a canyon - down McLean Street in front of his yard. The washout measured 18 and one-half inches at its deepest point.

"If someone were to hit that, it would ruin their car," Mr. Hartwick said of the hole, which wasn't there

Mr. Hartwick, who turns 90 years old this Friday, doesn't want to hear complaints about the cost of the \$2.5 million paving project.

"It will cost us very little compared to the benefit our town will get," he said.

He's absolutely correct, and that's even truer when you finally break it down to what its really going to cost

We've heard the rumors that this project will add \$60 to your water bill, which is an out and out fabrication. Charges for residential water services will go up \$1.10 per month, and the monthly sewer fee will go up by \$10 per month. That's an increase of \$11.10 per month, and it's a far cry from \$60.

The new base rate for your water and sewer service will total \$38, up from \$26.90. Each individual city bill will vary based on actual your sanitation fee - how big your Dumpster is and how many neighbors you share it with - and based on your actual water usage - how long you stay in the shower and how much you water your grass. But regardless, the increase will still be the same - a total of \$11.10

Your taxes will go up, too. That will be an ase of 15 cents per \$100 valuation. How mu that means to you will vary based as the valuation of your home. The average home in Clarendon is valued at about \$34,000, which would mean an increase of \$51 per year. If your home is worth \$50,000, then your cost would be \$75 per year. And if your home is worth \$100,000, then your cost is \$130 per year.

Taken altogether, if the voters approve the \$2.5 million for the streets, the average homeowner will pay \$184 per year or \$3.54 per week. That's less than 51¢ per day in new taxes and fees. It's less than the price of a Coke in most places and less than the price of a cup of coffee.

For the family with a \$50,000 house, the cost is still only 57¢ per day, and a family with a \$100,000 home is only looking at 72¢ per day.

Is it worth four bits or six bits to have a good street? Maybe the question should be, what's your car worth? Or better yet, what's it worth to have a town you can be proud of?

Fifty-one cents, fifty-seven cents, or seventy-two cents per day is a very small price to pay. Most of us waste that much on little things. Why not put the money to good use and vote "for" the paving?

## Meanwhile...

Speaking of progress, we need to report some about the newspaper for the purpose of general interest and future historians. The landmark 125th anniversary edition was our first issue to be transmitted electronically to the press, which in that case was located in Granbury, Texas, at THE HOOD COUNTY NEWS. We followed that by electronically transmitting the July Fourth Pioneer Edition of The Donley County Leader to our new printers Community Printers in Shamrock; and beginning with our July 10 edition, we began transmitting the Enterprise to Shamrock every week for production on their Harris offset press.

Other papers in the region have been sending their files to the press this way for some time, but it is a breakthrough for us. Our goal remains as always to give you the best product for your money, and we're pleased to see readers are responding. Circulation continues a steady climb, and the number of subscriptions has reached its highest point since the change of

# Republicans are on a spending binge

I used to think that Republicans were interested in restraining - indeed, even reducing - the size of government. How naïve could I be?

Remember when President Bill Clinton, a Democrat, was in the White House, and Democrats controlled both houses of Congress? Those Democrats controlled the budget for fiscal years 1994 and 1995, and in each of those years total outlays increased by 3.7 percent. Meanwhile, inflation (as measured by the GDP price deflator) averaged 2.2 percent for 1994 and 1995. Not exactly a great spending record, what with the rise in spending far outstripping the inflation rate.

Republicans took control of Congress in the 1994 elections. So along with Clinton in the White House, from 1996 to 2001, outlays increased at an average annual rate 3.5 percent while inflation averaged 1.8 percent. That record was not all that different from the couple of years under complete Democrat control.

The 2000 election brought Republican George W. Bush into the White House;

the House remained in Republican hands, but in 2001, with one senator switching allegiances, the Democrats narrowly held the Senate. Spending for 2002 leapt by 7.9 percent while inflation was running at 1.1 percent, and for 2003, outlays again are projected to jump by 7.9 percent, with inflation expected around 2 percent. Yikes!

Now, of course, there have been some extenuating circumstances at work in recent years, i.e., the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, and the following wars in Afghanistan and Iraq. But what if we factor out defense spending?

Non-defense spending saw sizeable leaps under the Democrats in 1993 and 1994 - at an annual average rate of 5.5 percent. Under a Democrat White House and Republican Congress from 1996 to 2001, non-defense spending slowed to an average rate of 3.8 percent, though still well ahead of inflation. However, in 2002 and 2003, the increase in non-defense outlays will have jumped by an average annual rate of at least 6.4 percent.

Even with Republicans now in control of the Congress and the White House, President Bush proposed a 2004 budget that would see total outlays increase by 4.2 percent, including a rise of 4.2 percent in non-defense spending - that's roughly double the inflation rate. But the news gets worse, after a Republican Congress got its hands on the budget, the Congressional Budget Office now projects that outlays in 2004 will rise by 6.2 percent - that's about triple the inflation rate.

President Bush and his fellow Republicans have done some very good work on the tax side of the federal budget. In particular, reductions in personal income, capital gains, and dividend tax rates are providing a much-needed boost to the economy.

However, when it comes to spending, the Republican-controlled White House and Congress have failed miserably. In fact, judging by their record so far, the current Republicans in power are turning out to be bigger spenders than the Democrats.

So, who exactly are taxpayers supposed to rely upon to keep the size and scope of government under control? Raymond J. Keating is chief economist for the

AUSTIN - Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs announced that the Texas Department of Agriculture is seeking applications for the Family Land Heritage Program that honors farms and ranches that have been in continuous agricultural production by the same family for 100, 150 and 200 years.

Since the program started in 1974, the state has honored 3,773 farms and ranches in 220 Texas counties.

"Texas was built by agricultural pioneers," Combs said. "The Family Land Heritage Program honors their contributions to the settlement of the Lone Star State. It chronicles the unique history of Texas agriculture, a proud record that otherwise might be lost forever."

To be eligible for the program, the farm or ranch must meet these qualifications.

The farm/ranch has to have been agriculturally productive for 100 years or more and the line of ownership traced from the first family member to the present, either through direct relatives or by marriage.

The land must fit the old U.S. Census definition of a farm: 10 acres or more with agricultural sales of \$50 or more a year; or if less than 10 acres, sales of at least \$250 a year.

Owner(s) must be actively managing the everyday operation of the

If all the land has ever been rented to someone outside of the family, it will not qualify. If only a portion was leased, and as much as 10 acres retained in the family for agricultural production with sales of at least \$50 annually, it will qualify.

Deadline to submit applications for properties established in 1903 or before is November 15, 2003.

Farms and ranches that qualify will be honored during the ceremony in Austin in March 2004. The history of the farm or ranch will also be chronicled in a registry. Honorees can also obtain historic farm or ranch signage for their property.



## TV eating up family mealtime

HOUSTON - A generation of "TV-dinner" kids might be learning their eating habits from Home Simpson, according to a survey.

Researchers at Baylor College of Medicine found that more than 42 percent of dinners eaten at home by Houston area fourth, fifth, and sixth graders during a one-week survey were consumed while watching tele-

"These findings are troubling because family meals are important for children, from both a nutritional and a developmental standpoint," said Dr. Karen Cullen, a behavioral nutritionist with the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center.

Nutritionists are concerned that "TV-dinner" kids might tune out their natural hunger and the cues that tell them how full they are. They also point to research that suggests children tend to request food products that are more frequently advertised on television. Many of these products happen to be those that are low in nutritional value.



HOUSTON - Knowing your body's daily caloric needs can be an important first step in adopting a realistic diet and weight management

"It's easier to get up the willpower to turn down a 900-calorie double burger with cheese and sauce and opt for a 400-calorie chicken your entire daily needs are about 1,600 calories," says Joan Carter Clark, nutritionist with the USDA/ ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Between 20 to 50 percent of your daily caloric needs are determined by physical activity. The remainder is burned through basic body functions such as breathing, circulating blood, and keeping cells functioning.
