Official Visits Clarendon

Curtis Tunnell, archaeologist and executive director of the Texas Historical Commission, Austin, will visit Clarendon on Tuesday, March 24, to see firsthand the historical characteristics of one of the Panhandle's oldest towns and to discuss preservation questions with residents.

He will speak that evening on the topic, "You Can Paint your House Purple," or "Facts and Misconceptions about Historical Districts". All interested citizens are invited to attend the program, which begins at 7 p.m. in the restored courtroom of the Donley County Courthouse.

Tunnell, a native of Turkey, Texas, graduated from West Texas State University and earned his M.A. degree from the University of Texas. He worked as a professional archeologist for 25 years on projects in Arizona, Kansas, Illinois and Texas.

After serving as Curator of Anthropology at the Texas Memorial Museum, he was State Archeologist for the Texas Historical Commission from 1965 to 1981, when he became THC's executive director.

The hosting groups will be discussing with Tunnell the possibilities of getting Clarendon or portions of the town listed as a historical district on the National Register of Historic Places. The National Register, which is maintained by the National Park Service, is the nation's official list of cultural property that is worth recognizing and preserving. It includes property of local, regional and state significance, as well as that of national importance.





Screwworm Outbreak Reported In Southern Mexico

An unexpected screwworm outbreak in southern Mexico could find its way into Texas, which imports one million head of Mexican cattle each year.

"There's no question that cattle ranches, particularly in South Texas, could be threatened by a big screwworm outbreak," said Dr. Cliff Hoelscher, an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Hoelscher said that nineteen cases have been confirmed since late January across a large area spanning three Mexican states--

Campeche, Tabasco, and Chiapas. "We're greatly concerned because the outbreak is over such a large area and because evidence suggests that at least one sample collected in mid-August was not identified until recently," Hoelscher said. "That means the insect has cycled through several generations."

Even though the outbreak is approximately 900 miles from the Texas border, Hoelscher said, "it's only a short 3-to 4-day haul on a cattle trailer." Most of the cattle coming in from Mexico are fattened up in feed lots and ranches in South Texas, then shipped back across the border.

Hoelscher said the Texas Animal Health Commission routinely inspects Mexican cattle at the border and has found no screwworm cases.

He advised Texas ranchers to begin checking their livestock for wounds that might contain blowfly larvae of any type. If worms are found in the wounds, collect about ten worms, place them in a container of alcohol, and send them to a laboratory for positive identification.

Mailing kits are available from most county Extension Service agents. All samples, Hoelscher said, should be sent to the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (USDA-APHIS) Veterinary Services Screwworm Identification Lab, Box 969, Mission, TX 78572. Telephone: (512) 580-7360.

"Cooperation from the ranchers is the best way we will be able to learn of any outbreak in Texas," Hoelscher said.

The screwworm had been the scourge of the livestock industry for generations, accounting for \$250 million in annual losses in the United States in the 1950s and 1960s.

Eradication in the United States was largely achieved by 1978, after U. S. scientists discovered that the insect could be beaten by dropping plane loads of sterile male flies in the infested regions. The resulting matings produced no new offspring. Texas has not had a confirmed screwworm case since August 1982.

Mexico had been declared free of screwworms in February 1991 after no cases had been found for six months. Eradication efforts are under way now in Honduras and El Salvador, with a goal of ridding all of Central America of the screwworm by 1996.

Hoelscher said APHIS inspectors and Mexican officials will attempt to define the boundaries of the screwworm infestation during the next three to four weeks.

Immediately after the first case was confirmed January 22, planes began dropping 5 million sterile flies per week over the three Mexican states. Since mid-February, 31 million sterile flies are being dispersed per week in the outbreak area.

Officials speculate that screwworm-infested livestock may have entered Mexico from heavily infested Central American

Check It Out

Before continuing with a review of The Texas Collection, it might be a good idea to review the new library hours for those who are not aware of the change. The library is now open the following hours: Monday 1:00-6:00 p.m., Tuesday 10:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m., Wednesday 1:00-6:00 p.m., Thursday 10:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m., Friday 1:00-6:00 p.m., and Saturday 9:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m.

Whether you are looking for Texas non-fiction, fiction, or humor, almost any subject is available.

Horsetradin' by Ben K. Green offers twenty authentic tales of his own experience around western cattle towns. The stories are written so humorously that one who reads them cannot help but be entertained.

Suzanne Yasley's book, *Texas Quilts, Texas Women* is more than its title might imply. It not only displays beautiful patterns with which many are familiar, but begins when quilting was brought to Texas in the early 1800's. When Jane Wilkinson Long crossed the Sabine River into Texas in 1819, she was "the first woman of Anglo-American descent known to enter Texas." She is said to have brought the art of quilting to Texas, and the quilting bee became a social event. Jane Long knew legendary Texas figures such as Stephen F. Austin, William Travis, Jim Bowie, Sam Houston and pirate Jean Lafitte. Jane Long's experiences are interesting, but other frontier women also found comfort in the needle art of quilting while they faced the dangers of the Texas frontier. Each homemade quilt conveys a story. One can only hope that it does not become a lost art.

Are you musically inclined or need songs or poetry for a western program you're planning? Three excellent sources are: *Cowboy Songs and Other Frontier Ballads*, by John and Alan Lomax, and William A. Owens' two books, *Tell Me a Story, Sing Me a Song and Texas Folks Songs*. The books provide short histories of many of the songs. Although he was not a Texan, the Texas collection also includes a biography of Will Rogers. John McCarty tells the story of Billy and Olive King Dixon in *Adobe Walls Bride*. If you are interested in several biographies in one book, Joe Tom Davis', *Legendary Texans: Deaf Smith, David Burnet, Bigfoot Wallace, Shanghai Pierce, Charles Goodnight and others*.

Albert B. Paine depicted the life of Captain Bill McDonald, a Texas Ranger, in a book by the same name.

The Texas Collection also has books on Texas politics.

Grasses of Texas by Frank W. Gould includes botanical descriptions of all types of grasses in Texas, plus information on changes in grasses to modern advances in grass growth and development. He includes line drawings and maps of vegetational areas. This could be of help to a rancher or naturalist as well as a botanist or researcher.

Texas fiction are in the regular fiction section, but may be easily located by the Texas symbol on the spine. Jane Roberts Wood provides light reading in *The Train to Estelina* and *A Place Called Sweet Shrub*. Louella Grace's *Wide Horizons* may also appeal to the fiction reader.

These are only a small portion of the wealth of Texas information that is available. Why not "check it out?"



Ernie Johnston gave a report on trash hauling for the City of Howardwick, Homer Brewer, and The Oasis. The price of \$67.50 per dumpster per month was set. The dumpsters will be emptied once a week at this charge. Additional dumps will cost extra.
Ernie Johnston asked for permission to purchase a dozen used dumpsters. Motion was made by Alderman David Pitts, seconded by Alderman McKinley Smith, to purchase one dozen used dumpsters. Motion carried.

Ernie Johnston called to our attention that oil filters cannot be placed in dumpsters any longer.
City Superintendent Jim Roberts gave a progress report on the standpipe and fence.
Motion was made by Alderman Bobbie Kidd, seconded by Alderman David Pitts, to bill Mission Cable \$80.00 for repair of the paved street they dug up. Motion carried.

Discussion followed concerning TML Health Insurance. We received a letter from them stating that at this time they will not accept the City of Clarendon employees.
Judy Welch, Beryl Roper, and San Thompson were given an opportunity to discuss their brochures and present any ideas concerning the brochures. Motion

was made by Alderman James Kuhn, seconded by Alderman David Pitts, to accept Judy & Kevin Welch's bid for 10,000 copies at \$2,300.00. Motion carried.
