Economy Recovering

According to State Comptroller John Sharp, the Texas economy is improving. Donley county's economy seems go along with the state trend.

"Overall payments to Texas cities and counties have increased each month this year, indicating slow economic improvement and a gradual increase in consumer confidence," Sharp said.

Statewide, receipts from sales taxes are up slightly over eight percent. Donley County was up a whopping 30.05 percent for April (March sales) and a decent 7.3 percent for the year-to-date. Clarendon was up 23.35 percent over April 1991, and up 6.18 YTD. Hedley did not compute for the month, but was up 29.24 percent for the YTD. Howardwick racked up a big 97.08 percent increase for April and a 10.76 percent for year-todate. (That high percentage may be the Country Club in pervious years.) There is no question but that the county and its three major

communities did well. Not all towns in the region fared so well. Claude (Armstrong County) was off 29.43 for the month and -4.25 percent for the YTD. Briscoe County's figures were skewed by a recent tax increase in Quitaque. Carson County was up 67.11 percent for April and 13.86 YTD. (Groom was off a little, but Panhandle was way up.)

Childress figures were not comparable due to a news city sales tax, but were probably up some. Wellington posted and increase of 12.52 and 4.78 percent. Gray County (LeFors, McLean and Pampa) were -0.84 percent and -1.15 percent. Hall County (Estelline, Lakeview, Memphis and Turkey) were up for the month, down for the year +6.03 and -0.56.

Hansford (Gruver, Spearman) gathered in a 25.67 percent and 13.97 percent increase. Hardeman County (Chillicothe and Quanah) slipped 12,68 for the month, but still managed a 0.03 percent increase for the YTD. Hemphill (Canadian): -5.86 percent and - 2.89 percent. Hutchinson (Borger, Fritch, Sanford and Stinnett) got about 10 percent more trade for both periods. Kent County (Jayton) declined by 7.90 in April but perked up 3.88 percent for the YTD. Lipscomb (Booker, Darrouzett, Follett and Higgens) took just the opposite course, up 14.65 percent and down 2.60 percent respectively.

Moore County, (Cactus, Dumas and Sunray) eased up 10.89 percent for April but was down YTD by -0.83 percent. Ochiltree (Perryton) sagged by 22.61 for April and dipped 13.36 percent YTD.

Potter (Amarillo) was up 9.66 percent and 4.82 percent, but Randall (Canyon) did even better, with 35.28 percent and 9.84 percent. Wheeler (Mobeetie, Shamrock and Wheeler) were up, but Shamrock's addition of a city sales tax throw the exact figures off.

AIDS Killing Young People

According to a new report by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, the greatest rate of increase in contracting AIDS is among young people engaged in heterosexual (male-female) activity. It is spreading very rapidly among teen-agers.

AIDS is now the second leading killer of young men and the fifth leading killer of young women. What is really frightening about the figures is that the average time between contracting the HIV virus and the appearance of full-blown AIDS is about ten years. This puts the statistics behind the actual infection level, but it also allows HIV carriers a long period in which they are infecting other sexual partners with the virus. And more than 40 percent of the high school students that were surveyed reported having more than one sex partner.

The report characterizes teen-age sexual behavior as "high risk activity.'

The department notes that there has been an increase in the use of condoms, but noted that only a third of sexually active teen-agers use them. And condoms do not guarantee "safe sex". Accidents happen and AIDS is spreading.

HIV virus cannot be passed through accidental contact. The most common method of transmission is sexual intercourse; drug addicts are often infected by sharing







Childhood Poisonings: What Should You Do?

According to a recent article in Patient Care, 65 percent of all reported poisonings affect children younger than 5 years of age. The tireless curiosity of children from age nine months to five years makes this age group especially vulnerable to household poisonings. During the late afternoon hours, just before dinner, is the time when a large number of poisonings in small children tend to occur. Try to watch children closer during this time of the day, and follow good poison-prevention habits. If you suspect that a child has swallowed a poisonous material:

- (1) Quickly attempt to locate the material or materials that caused the suspected poisoning. Determine the amount of material the child could have ingested.
- (2) If the material is corrosive, such as drain or oven cleaner, give the child milk or water if conscious and able to drink the liquid on his or her own.
- (3) If the material is in the child's eyes or on their skin, flush the area with water for about 20 minutes. If you suspect the poison is a gas, remove the child from the area.
- (4) Call the area poison control center or hospital emergency room. Be prepared to provide the age, weight, and condition of the child and your phone number. Follow instructions provided carefully.



ASCS Taking
Applications.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is currently accepting applications for the 1992 feed grain, wheat and cotton programs. The sign up period ends April 17.

The program offers price support loans, deficiency payments and other program benefits to farmer who reduce their acreage bases by 5 percent for wheat, corn and grain sorghum, 10 percent for upland cotton and 0 percent for oats.

"Producers may request advance deficiency payments in cash when they sign up," according to Drew Thornberry, County Executive Director at Donley County ASCS.

Producers who meet acreage reduction and other program requirements may obtain price support loans at a national average rate of \$2.21 per bushel for wheat, \$1.72 for corn, \$1.63 for grain sorghum, \$.88 for oats and \$.5235 per pound for cotton.


Established target prices are \$4 per bushel for wheat, \$2.75 for corn, \$2.61 for grain sorghum, \$1.45 for oats and \$.729 per pound for upland cotton.

Thornberry said the 1992 programs have many planting options, the same as 1991. "Up to 25 percent of the crop acreage base for flex acres may be planted to any production crop, any oilseed, industrial, or experimental crop designated by the USDA or any other crop except fruit and vegetables.

Corn and sorghums permitted acreage will be combined. He said the planting mix is at the producer's discretion. Deficiency payments will acre as if corn was planted on corn base and sorghum was planted on sorghum base.

As with the 1991 programs, 0/92 conserving use (CU) acreage may be planted, at the producer's discretion, to minor oilseeds, namely sunflower seed, safflower, flaxseed, canola, rapeseed and mustard seeds. "If minor oilseeds are planted on this acreage, producers must choose between deficiency payment eligibility and price-support program eligibility," the ASCS official said.

With no further business, Clayton Srygley made a motion to adjourn seconded by Bob Thompson. Motion carried.


