Man Arrested for Burglary, **Hangs Self**

A New Mexico man who had just been arrested for burglary hung himself in the Donley County Jail in the early hours of the morning of February 14.

About 10:05 p.m. on Thursday, February 13, Billy Chadwick, Michael Williams and Jared Estes stopped by the sheriff's Office to report that there was a truck parked in front of Dude Cornell's Shell service station and someone was inside the station. They described the truck, a semi-trailer, milk tanker.

Law enforcement personnel immediately went to the filling station, but the burglar and the truck were gone. The front door was broken and several items were missing. They Sheriff's Office notified surrounding counties.

Officers in Memphis stopped a milk truck and notified Donley County. The driver refused to give permission to search the truck, so Sims Goodall, investigator for the District Attorney secured a search warrant. Investigators found several tires, some merchandise and a small amount of cash from Rancho, New Mexico was arraigned in Hall County, then transferred to the jail in Clarendon at approximately 1:00 p.m.

Officials in the jail report that Romero appeared calm. He read a book in his cell until at least 3:30 a.m., when Deputy Charles Blackburn made a routine check on all the prisoners. None gave any evidence of anything out of the ordinary. But sometime before 6:00 a.m., Romero apparently hung himself on an electric extension

The Sheriff's Office immediately called the District Attorney's Office and the Texas Rangers and requested an official investigation. They also asked for an autopsy.

Grant Awarded To Water District

The Texas Water Development Board awarded Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3 a \$11,787, 75percent matching grant to be used for the purchase of water quality testing and mapping equipment and for training. The District covers an area of approximately 3000 square miles and includes all or portions of Potter, Armstrong, Carson, Gray, Roberts, and Donley Counties.

Area municipalities and boards will hold elections in May, but candidates must sign up soon if they wish to run. Filing opened on Monday, February 17. The last day to file will be Wednesday, March 18. The following offices (in alphabetical order) will be up for election. Many of the incumbents now in office may may run for re-election.

The city of Clarendon has three slots coming up to vote. Those places are currently filled by Aldermen Steve Smith (now Mayor), McKinley Smith and Bobby Kidd.

The city of **Hedley** will be electing a mayor and all five councilmen. The City of Howardwick will have three positions coming up, those now occupied by Nancy McClintock, Clayton Srygley and Robert L. Hall.

The Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District will have four positions up for election. These include the places now occupied by Venita Sharrar (who has moved to Perryton), Phil Fletcher, Derlene Graham (filling the unexpired term of Chris Matthews), and the place now occupied by Johnny Floyd.

The Clarendon Junior College District will elect regents to fill the slots now occupied by Leo Smith, James A. McAnear, Sr., and Jiggs Mann. The Donley County Hospital District will elect four directors, for the positions now held by Johnny Leathers, Wanda Dromgoole, Connie Pitts

and Jim Cockerham. The Hedley School Board will be electing several trustees, but details were not available at press time.

Many of the incumbents now in office may may run for re-election. Citizens who would like to sign up to run for office may do so at the office of the entity that will hold the election.

The District will purchase a Geographic Information System to locate wells added to the District in January 1991 in the newly acquired portion of Carson and Donley County. The District will also use some of the grant funds to upgrade

their in-house water quality lab. The Board is authorized to use proceeds from its Agricultural Trust Fund for grants to local conservation districts in order to assist them with agricultural water conservation and water- quality testing





Good Gardens Start Now!

Area residents who are having trouble growing petunias, tomatoes or a variety of other garden plants may have soil infested with verticillium or fusarium organisms. These diseases are commonly called "wilt", but are caused by micro-organisms harbored in the soil.

Randy White, of White's Feed and Seed, cautions that it is time now to treat for such pests. Vapam, a soil fumigant--when properly applied--will help control wilt, as well as weed seeds, insect eggs and other pests. However, Vapam must be applied four to six weeks before planting. That means that gardeners must treat infested soil now if they want to plant at the normal spring planting time.



This is also the time to fertilize cool season grasses. White says, "We expect a bumper crop of weeds this year, due to the abundance of moisture during the fall and winter months." Some fertilizers have weed-controlling herbicides in them, or other herbicides may be applied separately.

Area residents with fruit trees will want to use a dormant oil spray soon, before bud break. These oils are not very toxic, but they do smother many disease organisms and insects eggs.

The workshops are conducted by highly trained extension educators who assist each participant in developing leadership and decision-making skills which they, in turn, teach to other community groups.

Dr. Judy K. Flynn, District Extension Director, said "Countless public policy issues affect the quality of today's family life in our area and people of the Panhandle care about those issues."

Developing leadership skills is essential, particularly for women. who are and want to become involved in the decision making process that drives all types of public policy, says Flynn.

The FCL program offers participants indepth training on ways to become agents for change and how to conduct group meetings. Two New Ways of Delivering Medicines

Transdermal patches and implants represent two of the newest dosage forms prepared by pharmaceutical manufacturers. Both of these dosage forms work on the principal that a slow and constant release of active ingredients is a desirable feature for certain medicines.

Transdermal patches are similar to small bandages that contain medicine. When patches are applied to the skin, the medicine inside the patch flows through the skin into the bloodstream at a steady and predictable rate. The first medicine approved for skin patch application was scopolamine, an atropine-like medicine used to treat motion sickness. Scopolamine patches are placed on the skin just behind the ear and provide protection against motion sickness for up to three days. Nitroglycerin and other medicines are available in the form of skin patches.

Implants are surgically inserted under the skin to provide controlled release of active ingredients. A large amount of medicine is implanted for slow release. In 1990, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration approved Norplant, a contraceptive, for implantation. Norplant continuously releases small amounts of hormone. According to a recent issue of FDA Consumer, Norplant protects against pregnancy for a period of five years.



Anyone who receives Social Security benefits and who continues to work has to report his or her earnings to two government agencies -- the Social Security Administration (SSA) and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). Earnings must be reported to IRS for tax purposes and the SSA because they may affect the amount of benefits payable.

"The fact that both SSA and IRS have an April 15 filing date

apparently causes some confusion about the need to file both reports," said Jim Talbot, Amarillo Social Security office.

"Sometimes, Social Security beneficiaries think filing an income tax return takes care of the Social Security earnings report requirement," he said. "And while the IRS does share tax return information with SSA, the tax return does not provide all the information that SSA needs."

A second confusing area, according to IRS officials, occurs when Social Security beneficiaries





think that they do not need to file a tax return if their income is under the Social Security earnings limit -- in 1991, \$9,720 for people 65 through 69; \$7,080 for people under 65. But there is no connection between the Social Security earnings limits and the requirement to file an income tax return.

A third confusing area arises when Social Security beneficiaries request an extension of the filing date for their income tax return and extension of the filing date for their Social Security earnings report.





Class Studies Dinosaurs

This past six weeks, Mrs. Hankins' second grade class studied dinosaurs in science. Many things were learned about these reptiles of long ago; from their size, what they ate, where they lived, to that there are still many unanswered questions about them. To better help the class understand these animals, and their size, the pupils drew, to correct size, and colored two meat-eating dinosaurs. The smaller dinosaur was called Compsognatheis, being only 12" tall and the Allosaurus was 10 ft. tall. The class also made a model of what it might have looked like during the time that the dinosaurs lived. Another interesting thing that was studied was how scientists find and put dinosaur bones together. To know about what it might be like to do this, the class went on a pretend dinosaur dig. What was dug was tried to put together and then draw in the rest of what the skeleton of this dinosaur might look like. Through this study we hope a few interesting facts and ideas have been learned, but also that a curiosity has been triggered to study and search out more about the reptiles of long ago.
