



Estlacks Sell Clarendon Office Supply & Printing

One of the older businesses in Clarendon, Clarendon Office Supply & Printing owned by G.W. and Ruby Dell Estlack, was sold effective April 1, 1992 to David R. Smith.

Smith has been associated with the business for the past four years learning the skill and technique of printing.

Estlack's first experience in printing came after his father, the late J.C. Estlack bought the Blake Print Shop and opened Estlack Printery in 1924. A newspaper, The Donley County Leader was established and added to the print shop with the first issue March 4, 1929. Later G.W. and Alfred Estlack bought the Clarendon News and G.W. Estlack became sole owner in 1959. Estlack sold the newspaper December, 1974 and expanded the office supply and commercial printing part of the business.

Through the 63 years Estlack has been involved with printing, the business has been housed in several locations, the first being in a part of the building now housing The Nook. Other locations in sequence were the building later to house City Gas: the old Holland Bros. building where the first issue of The Donley County Leader was printed and now the east parking area of First Bank & Trust; the Vera Lewis Estate building; and the present location at 104 South Kearney.



Jones is professor of composition and director of graduate studies at the Shepherd School of Musics, which he founded, at Rice University in Houston. His compositions include works commissioned by the Houston Symphony, the American Symphony Orchestra League, and the Shenandoah Valley Music Festival.

The Pampa performance is sponsored by the Pampa Fine Arts Association and made possible in part with grants from M.K. Brown, Mc-Carley, David and Nona Payne Foundation and the Texas Commission on

The first performance of the Premier Weekend will be at 7:30 p.m., Friday May 1, at the amphitheatre at Palo Duro Canyon. The second performance will be at 8:00 p.m., May 2, at the Amarillo Civic Center Auditorium. In addition to the premiered symphony, the Amarillo Symphony Orchestra will be performing numbers by Hector Berlioz, Anton Dvorak, and Richard Strauss.

While writing the symphony, Jones camped in the canyon and returned several times over the past two years to experience it in different seasons. He particularly wanted to capture the feeling one has when driving along the flat terrain and suddenly the bottom drops out an there's a 110-mile-long canyon. 

Chronic Obstructive Lung Disease Therapy

The term chronic obstructive lung disease or COPD is a term which refers to two conditions - chronic bronchitis and emphysema. While COPD cannot be cured, airway obstruction can be relieved and quality of life improved for many who suffer from this condition. This can be accomplished through proper nutrition, correct use of medicines in metered-dose inhalers, and appropriate exercise.

Nutrition: Excess body weight can make breathing more difficult. According to a recent article in the medical journal Patient Care, the recommended diet for persons with COPD includes plenty of protein plus vitamins and minerals (especially vitamin D and calcium if one is taking a steroid medicine). Minimize intake of carbohydrates and fad or junk

Medicines: One of the best methods of delivering medicines to the lung passages is by way of metered dose inhalers. Many persons do not use these devices properly and should discuss inhaler technique with their pharmacist or physician. A spacer device to help improve medicine penetration into the lungs may be recommended by some physicians.

Exercise: Regular exercise is part of COPD therapy. Lower-body aerobic exercises emphasizing endurance (such as cycling and walking) are considered better than exercises that emphasize strength.

Illegal Signs To Be Removed

The Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1992 which the President signed on December 18, 1991 requires in part 1) Any sign, display or device along the Interstate System or the Federal-Aid primary system which not lawfully erected (Illegal Sign)shall be removed by the owner of the sign not later than the 90th day following the effective date, 2) If any owner does not removed the illegal sign, the State shall remove it. Fertilization By Tim Trimble - CEA

Droper fertilization of cotton can pay big dividends to producers in Donley County according to demonstration results in 1991. The Donley County Extension Service along with Evans Fertilizer and cotton producer E. Wayne Barbee conducted a demonstration on proper fertilization on dryland cotton. Soil test were taken and recommendations from the test were based on a goal of 500 pounds of lint per acre. Lab recommendation for 500 pounds of lint, indicated a need for 50 units of Nitrogen and 35 units of phosphorus.

Four different treatments were used: treatment #1 = 50units N, 35 units P, preplant; #2 = 25 units N, 17.5 P, preplant; #3 = 100 units of N, 70 P, preplant; #4 = 25 units N, 17.5 units P, preplant and 32 units N, sidedress.

Results indicated that treatments #1 and #4 were the most cost effective with a cost of \$.04 and \$.038 per pound of lint and \$154.67 and \$156.53 return minus cost respectively. Treatment #2 at half the rate cost \$.026 per pound of lint with return a cost of \$134.02. This is approximately \$20.00 per acre loss in order to try and save \$10.00

Even though the check did very well without any fertilizer it can't be assumed that we could have made a good yield on all of the field with no fertilizer. This evident by the difference in yields from the other four treatments.

The use of soil samples and following the fertilizer recommendations should be the most efficient way to manage crop requirements. In addition, it is the most environmentally sound technique.

Waste Pesticides

By Tim Trimble

Farmers and ranchers in four regions turned in 197 tons of waste pesticides in a special state-sponsored collection program this spring.

The Texas Water Commission, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Department of Agriculture sponsored the four collection days on Feb. 24 in Edna, Feb. 27 in Elsa, March 2 in Munday and March 5 in O'Donnell. More than 270 private pesticide applicators, representing approximately 800 Texas farms and ranches, took part in the free, noquestions-asked collection effort.

About 10,000 clean, properly rinsed metal and plastic pesticide containers also were turned in at the four sites. The containers will be used exclusively for the manufacture of recycled pesticide containers.

Producers from as far away as Amarillo and Stanton brought materials to O'Donnell, where 80 tons of chemicals in more than 750 drums were collected. At the other sites, 559 drums were collected at Edna; 558 drums at Elsa, and 325 drums at Munday.

"This collection offered farmers and ranchers a rare opportunity to dispose of these hazardous waste pesticides," said Diane Wilcox, project manager for the water commission. "The majority of these farmers turned in pesticides inherited from their fathers and grandfathers, pesticides that have been banned from use for decades. These collections allowed farmers to get rid of these

chemicals in a safe manner, and in turn, ultimately protect the water resources and environment in their communities."

"This program made something available to farmers that in years to come the state will be glad of," said Harold C. Hohn, Dawson County farmer who turned in chemicals at O'Donnell.

"What we've collected in 40 years can't be brought to town in one day," Hohn told officials at the collection.

TWC Chairman John Hall agreed. "The tremendous response by our state's farmers and ranchers indicates that there is great need for this program. The Texas Water Commission will continue to provide this service not only for farmers and ranchers, but for all citizens of Texas by sponsoring 50 agricultural and household hazardous waste collection programs by 1995," Hall said.

Wilcox said the obsolete and unusable pesticides collected included 23 tons of arsenic chemicals, many of which were banned from use during the 1980's. Also turned in were approximately 8 tons of parathions, including ethyl parathion, a chemical banned in 1991; 3.9 tons of DDT, canceled from use in 1972, and 2.5 tons of chlordane, banned from use in 1990.





AIDS Killing Young People

According to a new report by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, the greatest rate of increase in contracting AIDS is among young people engaged in heterosexual (male-female) activity. It is spreading very rapidly among teen-agers.

AHDS is now the second leading killer of young men and the fifth leading killer of young women. What is really frightening about the figures is that the average time between contracting the HIV virus and the appearance of full-blown AIDS is about ten years. This puts the statistics behind the actual infection level, but it also allows HIV carriers a long period in which they are infecting other sexual partners with the virus. And more than 40 percent of the high school students that were surveyed reported having more than one sex partner.

The report characterizes teen-age sexual behavior as "high risk activity."

The department notes that there has been an increase in the use of condoms, but noted that only a third of sexually active teen-agers use them. And condoms do not guarantee "safe sex". Accidents happen and AIDS is spreading.

HIV virus cannot be passed through accidental contact. The most common method of transmission is sexual intercourse; drug addicts are often infected by sharing needle.

Although the Federal survey did not deal with individual towns, it should be noted that earlier reports show that the virus has spread to every community in the country. The State of Texas reported the presence of the virus in virtually every Panhandle county, including Donley.

There are no vaccines against the HIV virus. There is no cure for AIDS.

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




