


Paper Closes For Holiday



The new items of service and equipment in this application have been added to meet the company's increasing 9-1-1 customer demands and to allow GTE-SW to compete more effectively in the 9-1-1 equipment

The product line in the new offerings consists of a mini-computer and specialized console package for larger communities, as well as a personal computer with Automatic Number Identification (ANI) display for smaller communities. (ANI displays a caller's telephone number on the emergency dispatcher's computer screen.) In addition, the product line will include ANI and Automatic Location Information (ALI) display units compatible with, and similar to, those offered by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and other local exchange carriers in Texas. (The ALI feature displays a caller's address on the computer screen.) The rate charged existing 9-1-1 customers may be revised at the expiration of their contracts with GTE-SW if the proposed tariff is approved.

This filing has been assigned Docket No 9667. The hearing on the merits is scheduled for February 25, 1991, at the offices of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The deadline to intervene in this docket is December 31,

Home Tax Laws Change

Homeowners 65 or older may now pay the taxes on their current homesteads in four installments. Most elderly homeowners received their home tax bills this month.

Leon Willhite, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, explained the purpose of the new installment payment option authorized by state law beginning this September.

"In past years, older homeowners had to pay their entire home tax bill before the normal February 1 delinquency date or pay a penalty and interest on the unpaid amount. This was a hardship for many elderly homeowners with fixed incomes," Willhite said. "This new provision gives them the option of spreading out that payment," he said.

To set up installment payments, 65-or-older homeowners must pay at least one-fourth of their 1990 residence homestead taxes before the February 1 delinquency date. Then, three equal installments are due before April 1, June 1, and August 1.

If all installments are paid on time, homeowners will not be charged penalty or interest for late payment, Willhite said. However, those who fail to pay an installment on time must pay penalty and interest on that installment.

Homeowners 65 or over who are interested in arranging installments need to contact the tax collection office for each taxing unit -county, city, school, or special district -- at the address on their tax

This new provision does not apply to any past home taxes already delinquent or other types of property.



Germany Visited by Lura Helms

As a lot of you know we recently visited our daughter Karen, her husband Tim, and their children Elizabeth and Jesse. Tim is a Corporal in the U.S. Army and is attached to Echo 320th Field Artillery Division of the Berlin Brigade, Berlin Germany. They have been there for almost two years. They will be home in April

When they first went over, we resigned ourselves to the fact that we wouldn't see them for three years. Then last Christmas we learned that we would have a new grandchild in late September of this year. We decided in August that we couldn't wait almost a year to see this new addition to our family. Our grandson was born on September 3rd and we left for Berlin on September 19th. We had a wonderful visit with our children and saw the city of Berlin. We attended the October Fest, went to the Zoo, saw what is left of the wall, visited the Riechstag, and went shopping. We saw many other monuments, etc., but the most touching was the area know as "Death Strip". There were actually two walls between which guard towers were placed every

hundred meters, it is said that the ground between the two walls was laced with land mines, and that there were areas where next to the eastern wall six foot wide steel grids fitted with 6" steel spikes placed at 3" intervals next to the 10 foot wall above which were several rows of barbed wire, thus the name "Death Strip" without fear but rather with a sense of sorrow for all those who died trying to reach freedom. The wall itself is almost all gone now but there was a strip of it left near Karen and Tim's apartment. It's more like a big greeting card now. There are messages from all over the world of joy that the wall is down. We added our own greetings to the rest and brought back a few

pieces as keepsakes. The best part for us was just seeing the kids. While we were there it was hard to realize where we were. Seeing Brandenburg Gate for real after seeing it so many times on television gave me a feeling of both joy that it is open now, and sadness that it's beauty and grandure had been a forbidden barrier to so many people for so long. East German street vendors were gathered along the street, selling Soviet flags, military hats, uniforms, and uniforms insignia and pieces of the "Wall". I even did some horse trading with one of the vendors for a set of Russian stack dolls. I believe I got a bargain but who

Everywhere we went we were impressed by the cleanness of Berlin, which is a city of 1.3 million people. There was no litter, everything was very neat and well ordered. There were many beautiful parks and flowers bloomed everywhere. Almost all of the buildings have windowboxes full of flowers and there were even trees growing on the tops of some of the downtown buildings. The "Autobahn" was wonderful. There are no speed limits, but the lanes on the far left are for the fastest cars. The Germans seem to love to drive and they do drive fast. One of my favorite things were the little "Imbiss" stands which were on almost every streetcorner, where we bought bratwurst on a bun and pommis frits(footlong german sausage dogs and french fries) which were served with hot musnaise or curry sauce for the fries. We didn't go out and eat at restaurants while we were there because our daughter is a fantastic cook and we hadn't had her cooking for such a long time.

It didn't take long for Tim's buddies on base to find out what a good cook she is either. The first time Tim had to go out on field exercise after Karen arrived in Berlin, she fried him a chicken and packed it for him to eat on the train. The aroma attracted a lot of hungry mouths and Tim didn't set much chicken. The next time he told her to fry up some extra wings and he would give those away but that didn't work too well either. Then the week just prior to the next field exercise Karen began getting calls asked her to fry chicken. The day Tim's bunch left for the field she fried eighteen chickens and even

did special requests for some "Hot and Spicy" orders.

These Kids are far away from home and yet they have managed to make a home for themselves and their children. They have several close friends which for them is transported to Gilkey Clinic, (medimuch like family. They all help each cal) other and have fun at the same time. After seeing where they live and meeting their friends I felt much better about them being so far from us. I try to send them as much of transported from Crowell Nursing home as I can. About once a month we put a package together of Clarendon Press and Amarillo newspapers, video tapes of what they call normal television including commercials and local news and things they miss eating, like Tascosa ter, (medical) Hot Sauce and chips.

I think of them everyday and pray for their safe return as well as the safe return of all America's children on foreign soil.





Keep **Thanksgiving** Safe From **Uninvited Guests**

A favorite Thanksgiving food also is an ideal breeding ground for bacteria that cause food-borne illness.

Stuffing cooked with turkey or chicken is a traditional dish for many families during the holidays. It's also a food more likely to cause food sickness if not prepared, cooked or stored properly, according to Dr. Al Wagner, food technologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Food-borne illness may seem a mere annoyance to some, but it can cause serious problems. The Food and Drug Administration reports that food contamination can lead to arthritis, kidney damage, heart problems and in rare cases, death.

"This illness can cause the strongest athlete to double over in pain from stomach cramps, diarrhea, vomiting and dehydration,ø Wagner said. "An estimated 24 to 81 million cases of food illness occur each year in the United States, costing \$5 billion to \$17 billion in medical care and lost productivity."

Whether you plan to make stuffing from scratch or out of a box, cook it immediately after mixing it---separately from the meat, advises Dr. Bethann Witcher, Extension Nutritionist.

"If you cook the turkey in advance, remove the meat from the bones right after cooking and refrigerate or freeze it," she said. "If food is contaminated and held at room temperature too long, bacteria may produce a harmful toxin, Staphylococcus aureus, that cannot be destroyed by cooking."

Other holiday trimmings such as broth and gravy spoil easily and should be refrigerated quickly after cooking, she said. Always serve these foods hot and do not store them more than two days.

"Cream pies and cream puffs are often involved in food illness," Witcher said. "Since cream pies and cream-filled pastries get soggy if refrigerated too long, wait to fill them as close to serving time as possible, but do not allow them to sit at room temperature too long."

Foods that require hand preparation such as ham sandwiches, potato salads and chicken salads also need special care. she said. Serve the type of sandwiches that can be frozen and thawed as needed. Try freezing cubes of chicken to use in salads. Cubes will thaw as the salad stands, keeping it as cold as possible.

"Don't let huge quantities of leftovers fill your refrigerator for days," Witcher said. "Plan in advance how to use remaining foods

and freeze the rest." A few simple precautions in food handling can prevent happy holidays from becoming miserable ones. Following these tips, known as the "Four C's" to prevent food

*Clean your hands, utensils, equipment, working surfaces and also foods that require washing.

Cook foods until their temperatures reach at least 140 degrees Fahrenheit and maintain foods above that temperature when serving.

*Chill foods immediately after purchasing and after serving. Maintain at a temperature of less than 40 degrees F; keep refrigerators set between 32 and 40 degrees, freezers at o degrees.

*Keep raw foods and any equipment used to prepare raw foods away from cooked and ready-to-eat foods to avoid crosscontamination from bacteria.






