

Race is on for Turkey King title

While candidates for county offices vie for public attention and several local boards are canceling their elections due to a lack of interest, one burning question is on the minds of Donley County voters... who will be the king?

Twelve candidates have been volunteered to run for the exalted throne of King Turkey as part of the second annual Donley County Turkey Strut Festival to be held here April 19-21. Voting started last week at Duckwall's, and controversy may already be brewing. Election officials say one unnamed candidate demanded - without success - that their jar be removed from the voting place.

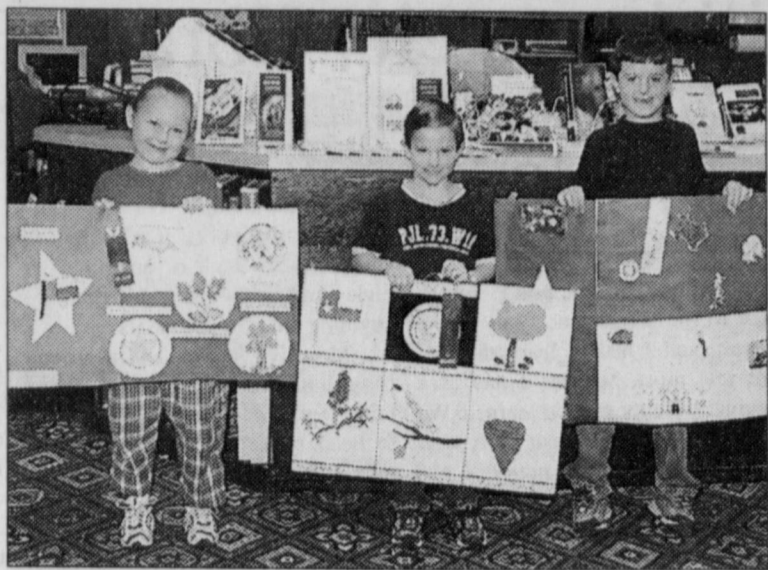
As of Tuesday morning, Methodist preacher James Ivey Edwards was the early leader with \$6 in his jar. Insurance salesman Bright Newhouse was in second place with \$2.50, and college dean Joel Zehr was in third place with \$1.58. On Zehr's tail feathers was high school principal Larry Jeffers with \$1.17.

Other candidates scratching the surface were retired café owner Mutt Graham with 52 cents, Howardwick Alderman Nancy Davis with 48 cents, and Hedley School Superintendent Bryan Hill with 23 cents.

Five candidates had yet to get off the roost. Returning candidates Mayor Tex Selvidge and Clarendon Alderman Michael Tibbets were both posting goose eggs this week as were car dealer Jim Blackerby and retired professor Zell SoRelle. Housing Authority maintenance supervisor Larry Hicks, a member of the presiding Royal Family and uncle to last year's king, was also searching for support in the polling.

Voting continues at Duckwall's variety store. Support your favorite turkey by putting money in their jar. The bird with the most money wins, and the proceeds will benefit the Donley County Tourism Council.

Senior Citizens celebrating 'March for Meals Days'

Donley County Senior Citizens (DCSC) announced recently the selection of March 28 as March For Meals Day. This year's local March for Meals Day is the first in what will become an annual event. Its purpose is to ensure that, on just one day at least, no senior goes hungry in Clarendon.

"March for Meals really is a community event," said Vida O'Neal, Director of the DCSC. "And that means we are calling on the citizens of the community - everyone of them - to help us serve our neighbors. In fact, we can't achieve our goal without community support and real, direct help."

DCSC currently serves approximately 23 home delivered meals each day. "We know that without our program, those individuals might go all day without a meal. Not only would they be hungry, but they would also suffer long-term consequences of malnutrition, deteriorating health, and in some cases social isolation," Vida said. "We also know there are

many other seniors in similar situations out there that we don't have the resources to reach. We need money, and we need volunteers. It is as simple as that. So we are inviting the community to work with us."

DCSC is asking individuals who want to join in this first annual March For Meals Day to do one of two things - either donate the money they would spend for their own lunch on March 28 or call the program at 874-2665 and sign up to work as a volunteer preparing or delivering meals throughout the year.

"We hope that the funds we raise and the commitments for help that we get on one day will be enough to help us provide meals for hungry seniors every day," Vida commented. "That's what this effort is all about."

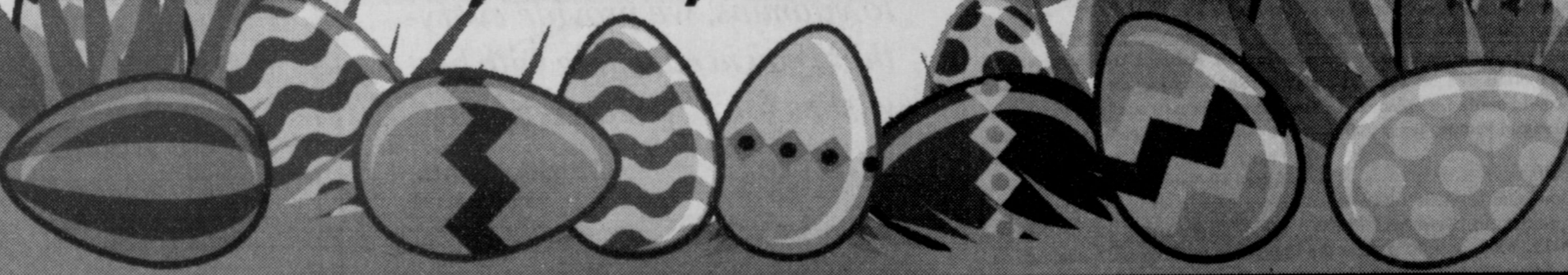

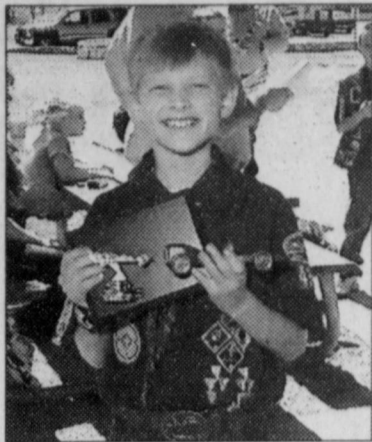
22 Cub Scouts race in derby

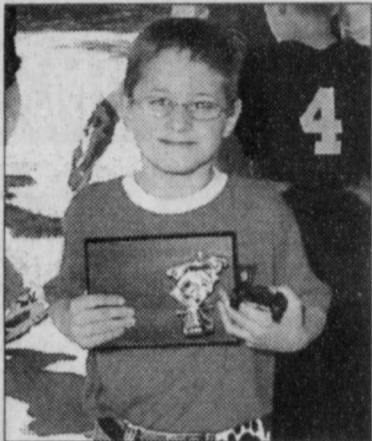

The Donley County Hospital Board met March 19 in the Conference Room of the Medical Center Nursing Home.

In the ambulance report, there were 47 calls reported in the month of February with a total billing of \$26,119.39.

District Administrator Alan Graham said the ambulance service was nearly moved into its new building on the Medical Center campus. At that time, the ambulances were still being stationed on Sully Street for approximately one more week. The curb and gutter work at the new building is almost completed with asphalt work to follow.

The hospital district has enough cash on hand to meet the projected expenses of the construction, but there will be some additional expenses to be met. Financing for this will be discussed at the April meeting.

Graham reported the nursing home has 53 residents with two inquiries added to the waiting list.

Holly Eads reported one indigent care application had been denied, and updates to the county Indigent Health Care Program book were in place.

The taxation of travel trailers was discussed. Board member Jerry May moved to exempt travel trailers from taxation. Motion died for lack of a second.

Fun Fishing Tournament to be this Saturday

Last week I had an unfinished sentence in my article that I would like to finish so that it makes more sense. I wrote that 80% of all trophy fish can be caught by boaters or bank fishermen. Duh! To complete this silly sentence, I would like to add: in 10' of water or less in March.

Our local residents are catching fish. For the next two months, fishing will be at its best. I have talked to some of my fishing friends that live at or near the lake; and from the sound of things, the crappie are biting best. Like I said a week or two ago, these crappies can be caught in 30' of water or in 5' of water. Herman Mooring and Robert Wagner have been catching crappie in the deep water along with a few sand bass. Jim and Sheila Burkett have been catching crappie

off their dock in 5' of water. I also have been catching them in 5' of water at night.

I went fishing last week and did very good with the crappie. The night I fished, I caught 20 crappie in the 15" to 16" range with one that measured 17 1/4" long, and she was fat! But I did encounter a problem that night. I took a nap around midnight. When I woke up around 1:30 am, I interrupted a family of raccoons who had eaten 6 of my 11 crappie that I had caught, including the 17 1/4" one that I never got to weigh because I didn't have my scales. I know that crappie had to be very close to 3 lbs., and it's been a few years since I have caught a 3 pounder. I was not happy, but that's how it goes in the great outdoors.

The raccoons at Lake Greenbelt are very smart, and they seem to be everywhere. I use fish baskets, and those coons drug the baskets to the bank and also got my minnow bucket, then had a feast. This week we have a beautiful floral mailbox with a bird nesting inside donated by Ellie Willinson. We appreciate her donation for this week's Friday fundraiser.

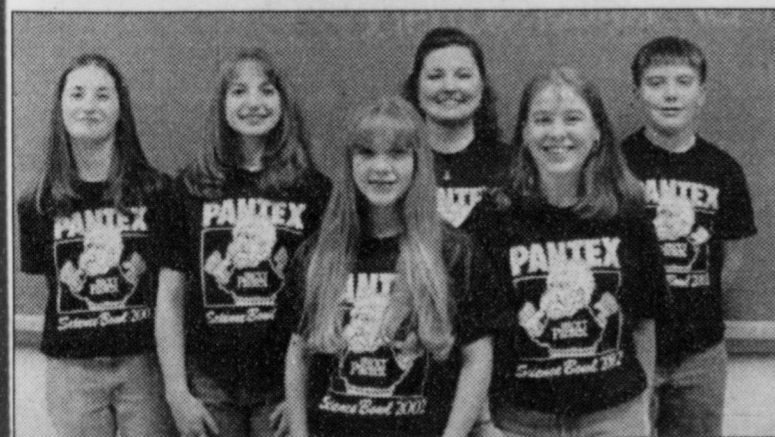

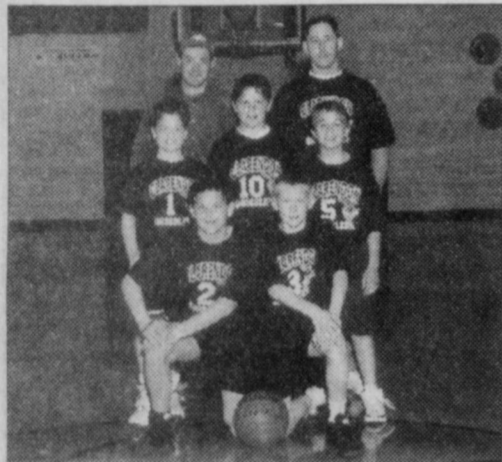
CC Bulldogs come back to beat Northern Oklahoma

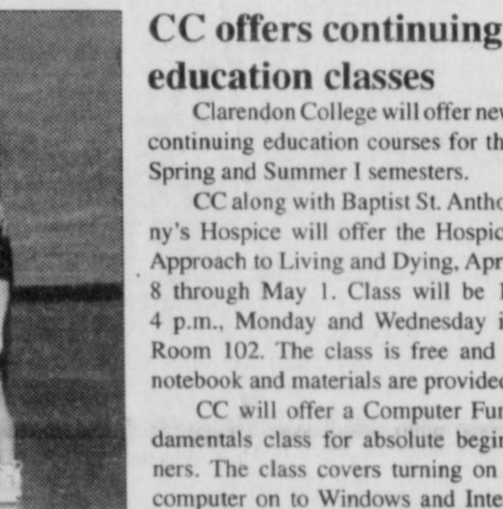
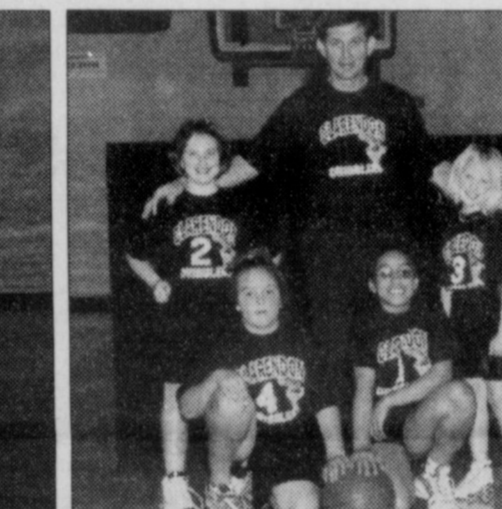

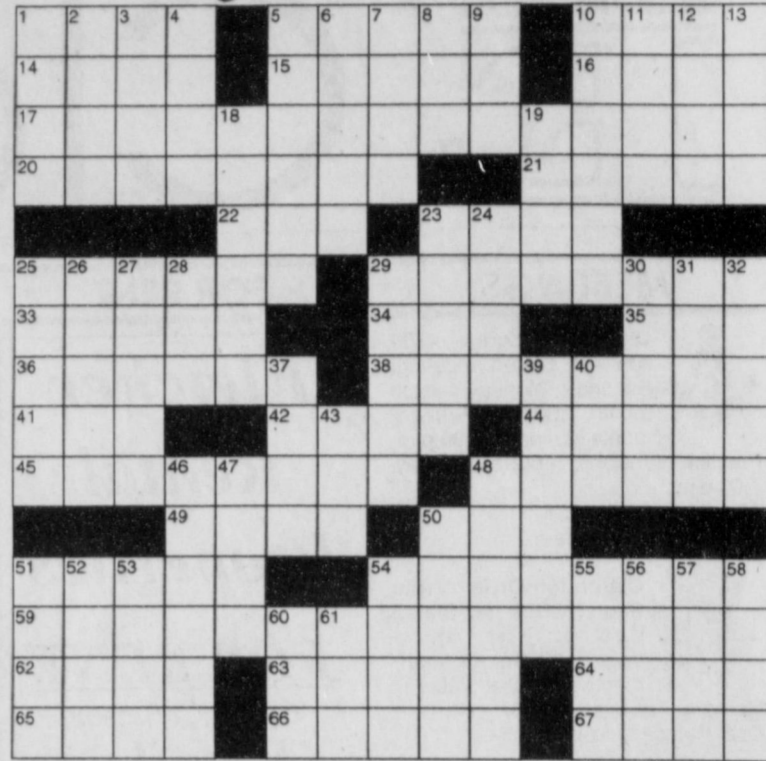

1 can cream of mushroom soup (undiluted)

1/2 t black pepper
2 t chili powder
3 cans 8 oz. tomato sauce
1/2 t ground cumin
1 can sliced black olives (2 1/2 oz.)
8 to 10 flour tortillas
1/4 c shredded monterey jack cheese
Combine turkey, 1 cup cheddar cheese, soup, pepper, and onion and set aside.
In a saucepan, mix chili powder, cumin, olives, and tomato sauce. Simmer 5 min. Spoon approx. 1/2 cup of turkey mixture down the center of each tortilla, roll-up, and place seam side down in a greased baking dish. Spoon tomato sauce mixture on top and cover with remaining shredded cheese. Bake at 350° uncovered approx. 20-25 min. 4 to 6 servings.
