

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# **Texas History** should not be watered down

The blood of Texans should be boiling with the news coming out of the Houston Independent School District where educators are trying to tone down our history.

The problem, they say, is that the traditional Texas history lesson - which engrains "Remember the Alamo!" in all of us - is insensitive to the youth of our state's growing Hispanic population.

'We don't want our Hispanic kids, or any kids, to feel like we're teaching a biased approach," HISD social studies curriculum manager Angel Miller told Fox News. HISD officials say they teach Texas Independence

without the "us versus them" attitude. Well, I'm sorry. But it was precisely an "us vs. them" situation, and any attempt to say otherwise is a disgrace to our heritage. "Them" being Santa Anna and the Mexicans who supported him. "Us" being Anglo Texan colonists and native Tejanos who loved liberty and Take a stroll down the River Walk in San

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supported the rule of law. There isn't enough space here to discuss all of the causes of the Texas Revolution, so let's summarize. First, Anglos were enticed to settle here under specific colonization laws, which the Mexican rulers observed or didn't observe as it suited their own needs. Second, the rule of law in Mexico was subject to the whim of dictatorial leaders like Santa Anna, who used brutal force against those who opposed his grab of power.

Texans had plenty of cause to be upset, and many Tejanos knew tyranny and injustice when they saw it. Hence, the Texas Revolution - a battle for Independence and for Liberty

Today at HISD, Miller and her supporters seem to subscribe to the notion that the Texas Revolution was driven by racism. But history does not bear that out. Then as now, educated people tended to support freedom, while less educated people tended to be willing to allow themselves to be victimized by oppressors. Such was the case with Hispanics in 1836 when upper class Tejanos generally supported the Revolution.

If Miller and her associates really want to help educate Hispanic students - and all students, they should focus on those men who risked their lives for freedom - men like Houston, Austin, Travis, Crockett, and Bowie and men with Spanish surnames as well.

Tejanos, while not as numerous as Texans, were involved in every aspect of the Texas Revolution from signing the Declaration of Independence to serving in the government of the Republic of Texas. There were prominent men, and there were soldiers like Manuel Flores who fought at San Jacinto - where the cries of "Remember Goliad! Remember the Alamo!" rang out.

The first vice president of the Republic was a Hispanic. Lorenzo de Zavala was born in Mexico, and by 1807 he became a newspaperman, extolling the ideas of democracy. He was imprisoned for that. Later, he would be involved with establishing a republican form of government for the newly independent Mexico. He served in the Mexican Senate and held high office there. But, when Santa Anna assumed dictatorial powers in 1834, de Zavala came to Texas. Here he signed the Declaration of Independence and helped draft the Constitution of 1836.

José Antonio Navarro was another prominent man in the battle for Independence. He served in the Tejas Mexican state legislature and the Mexican Congress. He later signed the Texas Declaration of Independence and served in the Texas Congress where he was a voice for the rights of Tejanos. He also was the only Hispanic delegate to the 1845 convention to consider statehood in the United States and helped draft the first Texas Constitution of 1845. He went on to serve in the Texas Legislature.

José Francisco Ruiz began his civil service with the city of San Antonio in 1805. He later became a military man with the local militia. He sided with the Texans in 1835 and attended the convention at Washington-onthe-Brazos in 1836. He and Navarro were the only two Native Texans to sign the Declaration. He became a senator in the First Congress of the Republic.

Captain Juan Seguin was given his rank by Stephen F. Austin, and he was at the Alamo when Santa Anna showed up. He was sent out of that doomed fortress to dispatch a message. He joined Gen. Houston and organized and led the Tejano unit which fought at San Jacinto. Following Santa Anna's defeat, Seguin was sent to San Antonio to accept the Mexican military surrender there, and it was he who oversaw the burial of the Alamo dead. He served in the Texas Congress and held a variety of committee positions.

Seguin, Ruiz, Navarro, and de Zavala. Those were just some of the men who helped win a war and secure the freedom that we Texans - brown, white, and black - enjoy today. They were on the side of good in the "us vs. them" struggle against Mexico. Texas Independence is their legacy, and we should not let people like Miller sully that heritage for the sake of a feel-good lesson plan.

Relations between Texans and Tejanos deteriorated in the years which followed the Texas Republic, and history teachers should not shy away from that rift. But that later friction does not diminish the just cause of the

With new people moving into Texas all the time from Mexico and other foreign countries like New York and Illinois, we need a stronger emphasis on Texas History in our schools. But let's not water it down for these new Texans. Remember what we fought for, remember who we fought against and who fought alongside us, and remember the Alamo. Don't let any of it become just a

footnote to history. God bless Texas.

Make your voice heard on city livestock

There is an extremely important City Aldermen meeting June 25. Each person who is opposed to their neighbor(s) having a Nuisance Ordinance, when we have an livestock in their backyards needs to be at this meeting. You do not necessarily have to speak, but you need to be counted.

We have elected Aldermen to enforce the City Ordinances, not rewrite them to appease a group citizens that do not want to abide by the rules. There are no surrounding towns that allow any citizen to keep livestock of any kind within the city limits, with or without a permit. This is the most absurd addition to an Ordinance any town could have. Why should any neighbor be subjected to this? There were citizens at the last meeting that indicated they did not intend to get a permit nor move their livestock out of the city limits.

So, what will the Aldermen do about this? Will they allow these citizens to just keep on doing what they have been doing for years, or will they enforce this Ordinance? If we are going to have Ordinances, they have to be enforced. Maybe finding a new place to move the livestock is a problem, but so is the smell, the flies, and other bugs that flock to this breeding

Any Alderman that is having a problem coming to a decision on leaving the current Ordinance in place needs to take a ride around town, and when they find these livestock, park their vehicles, get out and find a place very nearby to sit, or at the very least, roll down all the windows, and stay for a few hours during the day and into the evening. While they are there, they need to have a meal and/or snack. Then they can see how much fun it is to try to consume food, knock the flies away, and not breathe. Better yet, take a barbecue grill with them and cook this meal and/or snack. Only then can they fully appreciate the problems.

This truly is a no win situation if the Ordinance is removed, replaced with a Nuisance Ordinance, and neither one enforced. The Nuisance Law has been tried, verdict given, but no enforcement. So please, let's not go that route again.

So, for those of us who are for the Ordinance banning livestock in town, and want the Ordinance enforced, please mark your calendar, June 25, 7:00 p.m. to attend the City Aldermen Meeting. You cannot expect someone else to take care of this problem for you.


Panhandle Community Services offers HUD Housing and Weatherization assistance to qualifying lowincome families.
