Christmas In Clarendon

Clarendon will celebrate Christmas this year with several traditional activities--and some new ones.


All of these are long-standing traditions in Clarendon. Some people can remember similar events from their

Sheriff: "Teach Your Children Caution"

In an interview with The Clarendon News, Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson urged parents to teach their children the basic precautions file charges against the suspect, and other states may do so as well. that help to protect them from child molesters and similar criminals.

Child molesting is not a rare occurrence. It is not something that only happens in far off Los Angeles or Philadelphia. This is a problem that happens even in small towns. There have been several cases in

enforcement officers.'

Donley County in recent months. "Offenders are not always strangers," said the Sheriff, "often the person is a relative or a friend of the family." It is vital that children be taught to report adult misbehavior to parents, trusted teachers or police officers. Otherwise the child abuse may continue over a period of weeks, months or even many years. And the longer that the child is subjected to exploitation, the more severe the damage.

"There is simply no substitute for teaching children some ways to avoid becoming victims," said Thompson. "And the sooner violations are reported, the better it is."

Child abuse--particularly sexual abuse--is an unpleasant subject. But ignoring the problem only increases the danger and the prolong the damage.

Child Molester Arrested





City residents please be aware that under no circumstances can the city accept tires in the dumpsters or in the large open top dump box, unless the tires are first quartered. The State Inspector was checking the landfill at Memphis recently when the Clarendon trash truck dumped its load and four tires were discovered that had been put in dumpsters without the knowledge of the driver. This caused problems for Memphis and Clarendon as well. Seven tires were hauled off in the big dump box by BFI and were discovered by Pampa landfill operators who made the driver recover the tires from the load of trash and carry them away. BFI will charge us \$25.00 for each tire that is found in our trash. The City has posted signs advising that RICHARD GRAHAM

tires cannot be accepted, but a few are still trying to slip some by. The City will impose a \$200 fine for anyone dumping tires in the dumpster or big dump box, in order to evade the much harsher fines that will be imposed on the city for violation of the law that prohibits tires in any landfill.







On July 19, 1990, GTE Southwest Incorporated ("GTE-SW") filed revisions to the company's tariff pertaining to the features and associated equipment for providing emergency number services (9-1-1).


In this filing, GTE-SW proposes to modify its existing 9-1-1 tariff and to add more than 200 new service offerings. The new items of service and equipment in this application have been added to meet the company's increasing 9-1-1 customer demands and to allow GTE-SW to compete more effectively in the 9-1-1 equipment

The product line in the new offerings consists of a mini-computer and specialized console package for larger communities, as well as a personal computer with Automatic Number Identification (ANI) display for smaller communities. (ANI displays a caller's telephone number on the emergency dispatcher's computer screen.) In addition, the product line will include ANI and Automatic Location Information (ALI) display units compatible with, and similar to, those offered by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and other local exchange carriers in Texas. (The ALI feature displays a caller's address on the computer screen.) The rate charged existing 9-1-1 customers may be revised at the expiration of their contracts with GTE-SW if the proposed tariff is approved.

This filing has been assigned Docket No 9667. The hearing on the merits is scheduled for February 25, 1991, at the offices of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The deadline to intervene in this docket is December 31

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. 





New Book, Cee Vee: Our Home On the Range, Published

A book about the history of the Cee Vee Community, in the lower Texas Panhandle, is soon to be published by native Cee Vee, Texans, Marion Woodard McClendon and Jane Russell Grelle. The book has been thoroughly documented after three years of exhaustive research involving hundreds of personal interviews. Over 25,000 miles have been traveled by the authors while conducting extensive research at universities, museums, libraries, and courthouses across Texas, New Mexico and Colorado.

The book will feature a high quality cover, attractively hard bound with reproduction of CV ranch house in oil by Amarillo artist and former Cee Vee resident, Jack Hill. The book will feature more than 500 pages on superior quality paper and easy to read print. Over 900 pictures, eight in full color, and over 400 family histories sprinkled with area folklore have been collected for the book during the past three years.

Other highlights of the book will include reproductions of works of art by native artists, maps, charts, illustrations, school and church records, and copies of legal and other documents. The book will also be footnoted, indexed and cross referenced.

Cee Vee: Our Home on the Range is a comprehensive documentary of the community between the Pease Rivers and the people who settled there. The book recounts the rich and significant history which parallels the development of the united State, the State of Texas, the Westward movement, and the arrival of Western family farming. It also examines the origins of the CV Ranch and how the cattle arrived there. The drama unfolds as Charles Goodnight, Colonal William E. Hughes, Joe Loving, T.A. Coleman, Quanah Parker, C.C. Slaughter, and other stars of the Western frontier play their part in the birth and development of Cee Vee.

The reader will be able to follow the indian tribes up the Pease rivers, live with them and learn about their Cee Vee area campsites, and discover their trails as they roamed the prairies following the buffalo.

The book also lists the abundant variety of plants and wildlife, and describes how water and weather decided the future of Cee Vee, in Northwest Texas, and the forces that shaped this unique area.

Range will be valuable for many uses - reference, history, Texana, genealogy, humanities, school curriculum supplement, college and university general libraries and special collections, museums and research enters, family collections, and gifts. Early response indicates that the book will be a work to be treasured by families, researchers and historians for years to come.

High-risk **Persons Need Flu** Vaccine

With flu season near, officials at the Texas Department of Health have urged anyone who may be at high risk of infection to seek immunization. People most at risk of the potentially deadly disease, are those 65 or older, persons with chronic respiration, or hear problems and children weakened

"Influenza, which occurs most often from December through April, kills about 20,000 individua s in the United States each yearmost of them in high-risk categories," said Robert D. Crider Jr., director of TDH's Immunization Division. Crider said that persons 65 and older constitute on of the risk groups hardest-hit by influenza and its complications.

"Fewer than 30 percent of Americans in high-risk groups receive the recommended annual injection of influenza vaccine,"? he added. "We believe that one reason older people fail to be vaccinated is their unfounded fear that the vaccine can actually cause influenza. The truth is that a vaccinated person may still contract some strain of flu, but not from the vaccine. If that happens, though, the vaccine usually helps lessen the severity of

High-risk categories include the following people who are most likely to develop complications from influenza:

*Residents and employees of nursing homes and other facilities treating chronically it' patients of

*Adults and children with chronic heart or lung disorders, in-

cluding children with asthma. People under medical care for chronic metabolic disease, kidney or blood problems or weakened immune systems.

*Children, 18 and younger, who are receiving long-term aspirin therapy, which can place them at risk of developing Reye syndrome after influenza.

"We strongly recommend influenza vaccinations for all people in these high-risk groups, especially if they are pregnant women or international travelers," Crider advised. "People infected with the human immunodeficiency virus (the virus which causes AIDS) also may be at increased risk for flu

complications."
The vaccine for the 1990-91 *Persons 65 years old and season is designed to combat the A/Taiwan, A/Shanghai and B/Yamagata strains.




