## Clarendon voters turn out two incumbents Howardwick elects new aldermen; Blackerby joins Sansing, Moreman on CC board

Clarendon voters went to the polls Saturday and dashed the reelection hopes of two long-serving City Aldermen, those being Mac Stavenhagen and Billy Jack Land.

Voters instead chose Tommy Hill and Janice Knorpp as new members of the Board of Aldermen and overwhelmingly confirmed Alderman Mark White to a full term in office. White had previously been appointed to serve out the term of Alderman Smiley Johnson.

A total of 257 voters cast ballots in the city election. That's more than double the 119 who voted last year but is still a low turnout.

The number of voters registered in the city was not readily available at press time.

The final tallies were White, 219; Hill, 163; Knorpp, 137; and Stavenhagen, 130. Land's write-in candidacy drew 62 votes. The election will be canvassed this Friday, and the new aldermen will be sworn

in May 14. Howardwick will also have new faces on its Board of Aldermen. Donald Holladay, Sam Grider, and Bobby Murdock were top choices of the voters in that city.

Holladay received 43 votes, Grider got 42, and Murdock had 39. Vernon Byars, the only incumbent in the race, garnered 30 votes.

Sixty-two people cast ballots in Howardwick. As in Clarendon, officials did not know how many citizens

were registered to vote. Howardwick canvassed its election Tuesday night. Officials will take office May 14.

Also on Saturday, two incumbents were returned to the Clarendon College Board of Regents. Bill Sansing, who was appointed to serve out R.L. Gilkey's term, was the top vote getter with 238 followed by fellow incumbent Jack Moreman who received 191. They will be joined on the board by Jim Blackerby, whose total of 149 votes edged

out Sherol Johnston's 139 and Mary Douglas' 129.

A total of 261 people cast ballots the college election. That's only 10.2 percent of the registered voters in the Clarendon College District, but the turnout was up slightly from the last election in 2000 when only 7.7 percent bothered to vote.

CC officials said their election will be canvassed, and new regents will be sworn in this Friday afternoon.

## USPS asks for rural boxes to be left open

Postal Officials asked local rural mail customers to keep their mailbox doors open Tuesday after a pipe bomb was found in Amarillo.

The bomb was just the latest in a string of domestic terrorism incidents in which explosives were placed in rural mailboxes in Colorado, Iowa, Illinois, and Nebraska. Last week, pipe bombs injured four letter carriers and two postal customers.

Donley County customers with rural mailboxes and all rural customers within 150 miles of Amarillo are asked to secure their mailbox doors in an open position to allow the customer and the letter carrier to see in the box. Customers who have their address on the door of the mailbox are asked to place the address in a visible location the letter carrier can see when the door is open.

Clarendon Postmaster Lonnie Davis urged customers to use good judgment.

"I think common sense may be the best approach," Davis said.

Davis said if people see something suspicious in their mailbox they should not touch it. Customers should contact local law enforcement to report suspicious vehicles, activities, or items near or in mailboxes.

The Postal Service is also asking rural customers not to put outgoing mail in their boxes but to take it to the Post Office or give it directly to their letter carrier.

Postal inspectors described the pipe bombs as 3/4-inch steel pipes with a 9-volt battery attached. Anti-government letters accompanied the bombs. An eyewitness told the AMARILLO GLOBE-NEWS Tuesday that the bomb in that city was six to eight inches long with black wires and caps on the ends.

As of press time, national news outlets were reporting that law enforcement personnel had arrested a 21-year-old Minnesota man near Reno, Nevada, as a possible suspect in placing the pipe bombs in the Midwest.

## Swinney files appeal in suit against county

Former constable Jimmy Swinney is pursuing an appeal in his lawsuit against Donley County.

Swinney's attorneys filed a notice of appeal in the Donley County Clerk's Office on April 22, and Swinney paid the associated fee this week, officials said.

The county won a summary judgment in January from District Judge David McCoy, who ruled that the Donley County Commissioners' Court had not abused its discretion when it set Swinney's salary at \$3,170 in December 2000.

Swinney is now appealing to the Seventh Court of Appeals in Amarillo.

County Attorney Pro Tem Kaye Messer said after the court receives the appeal, Swinney's attorneys will have 30 days to file their brief then, her office will have 30 days to do the

same. "This could take up to six months," Messer said.

Messer said she is still confident the county will prevail in the lawsuit.

"I'm very comfortable with the county's position. We've won so far, and I still believe the commissioners did the right thing originally."

Swinney won a write-in campaign in November 2000 to fill the position of constable in Donley County's Precincts 1&2, which had been vacant for more than three decades. He took office in January 2000 and sued six months later alleging, among other things, that his \$3,170 annual salary was unreasonable.

In September of last year, Swinney resigned his office after he failed the test to become a certified Texas peace officer.

## Texas Education Agency to visit Clarendon ISD

Staff from the Texas Education Agency and educational leaders from other school districts will be visiting the Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District during the week of May 13. Known as a DEC (District Effectiveness and Compliance) visit, this monitoring team will be evaluating district efforts to improve student performance in special programs.

The DEC on-site visit focuses primarily on the decision-making and planning process as it relates to the quality of services provided for all students including those in special programs. A secondary focus of the visit is a review of the extent to which the school is in compliance with state and federal

requirements for special programs, which include English as a second language (ESL), career and technology education, federal title programs, gifted and talented education, optional extended-year programs, and special education. In addition, requirements for dyslexia services, prekindergarten notification procedures, and state compensatory education expenditures will be reviewed. Besides checking school records and planning procedures, the DEC team will confer with staff, students, and the CCISD District Improvement Committee during the weeklong visit. Because the monitoring team would especially like to have input from parents, two round table discussions

are scheduled for interested parents in the CHS Auditorium beginning at 5 p.m. on May 14. (See related story on page 3.)

For the past two years, all the administration and staff of CCISD have been participating in a major effort to assess student needs, plan programs, monitor and assess student achievement, and prepare the necessary documentation. With a heavy emphasis on site-based decision making, the three CISD Campus Improvement Committees have been instrumental in coordinating these activities. In addition, the District Improvement Committee has overseen the preparations and made recommendations. See 'TEA' on page 3.

## CHS officials name Lemley, Rodriguez as top honor students

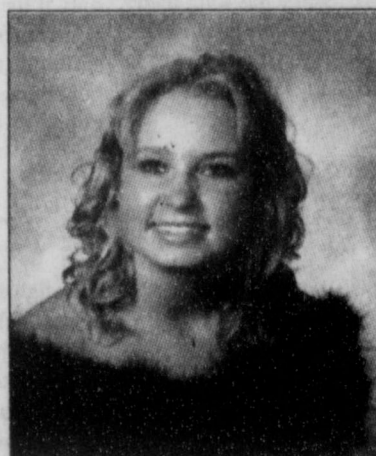
Clarendon High School has announced that Kelley Lemley, Claire Rodriguez, and Austin Sears are the top academic students for the class of 2002.

Kelley has also been very successful in extracurricular activities. She advanced to state competition

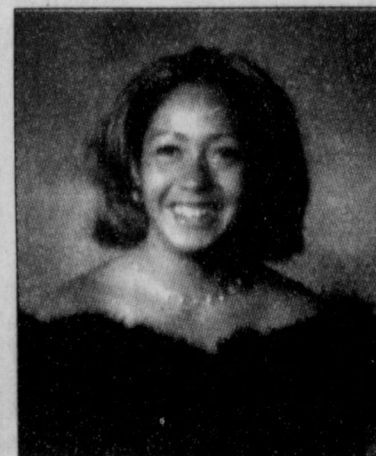

## Swinney should give up lawsuit against county

Donley County is living in an unending nightmare. Once the county thought it had awakened to birds chirping and the sun shining, but it now realizes the bad dream goes on. That nightmare is Jimmy Swinney's lawsuit.

Following the lead of other constable controversies in the Panhandle, Swinney ran as a write-in candidate for the Precinct 1&2 constable's office - a position that was so important it had been vacant for more than 30 years. Thanks to the foolishness of 52 citizens of this county, he was elected in November of 2000.

Being the good sports (and probably hoping to avoid a lawsuit), the Donley County Commissioners took testimony from the sheriff's department and the Justice of the Peace of Precincts 1&2 and then accordingly set a reasonable salary and budget based on what they thought Swinney's workload would be. That salary was set at \$3,170 for the year.

Swinney and his attorneys didn't think his salary was good enough, and the constable filed suit against the county judge, the county commissioners, and Donley County itself. (Two of the commissioners he sued weren't even in office at the time his salary was set.) A few months later, Swinney had to resign his office after he failed the exam to become a certified peace officer. In January of this year, the district court issued a summary judgment in the county's favor, and now Swinney is appealing.

Hasn't this gone on long enough? Swinney's continued lawsuit serves to no useful purpose other to waste the taxpayer's money. He was overpaid to start with, and going back to reimburse him for his nine months in office on a level commensurate with the Precinct 3&4 constable would be a further slap in the face to local citizens.

At the time he filed to run for office, Swinney said he wanted to fill a need in local law enforcement.

There never was any such need. Precincts 1&2 are and have been aptly served by the Donley County Sheriff's Department. A constable is not needed in that part of the county, unlike in Precincts 3&4 where the constable serves as a first response to situations in Hedley.

Swinney knew there was nothing budgeted for his office when he signed up. If he truly had the county's best interest at heart, he would have worked for the salary that was set for him, done the best job that he could, gotten certified, and then stood on a record of accomplishment and sought an increased budget in the following fiscal year. He did none of those things.

Nothing good can come from this lawsuit. Even if the county wins again, it will be out time and resources to fight the battle. And God knows, the county could certainly use those resources elsewhere.

It is time to put personal pride aside. Jimmy Swinney should drop his lawsuit for the good of the county and for the sake of the taxpayers.

## Aldermen must keep pushing projects ahead

Saturday's municipal election shook up the Clarendon Board of Aldermen by removing two members who had served for a long time. Apparently, city residents believed they needed a change, and they got one. The challenge now for the new Board of Aldermen is to move forward - to take the good works already underway and build on them.

One of those areas is the codification of the city ordinances. Since last fall the board has worked with its consultant, Colby Waters of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, to update the body of municipal laws passed by the city in its 100-year history since incorporation. This is a job that will help improve enforcement of city ordinances, which is an area that has been sorely lacking.

The other project - which is still in its infancy - is a street improvement plan. More than anything else, our city needs to begin repairing and, indeed, rebuilding our streets. The goal should be to eventually have every street in this town paved, curbed, and well maintained.

The present goal is not that ambitious, but it is a start. City aldermen must continue to push this project forward expeditiously but thoughtfully. It needs to begin soon, but it must be done right.

At the last city meeting, the aldermen received proposals from engineering firms who hope to plan and help guide the city's paving project. In about an hour, the aldermen ranked the proposals and came up with their top four candidates.

That process may have been rushed. It is impossible to read and give careful consideration to nine engineering proposals within that short timeframe. The aldermen should have tabled that item in order to give themselves time to make a good decision. Now, with the field narrowed hastily to four, the new board must do its homework. The proposals should be reviewed carefully, and references should be thoroughly checked out to insure that this street program is successful and long lasting.

The city fathers have seen what happens when they choose an engineer too quickly. They very nearly lost the permit for the solid waste transfer station because the engineer reportedly didn't file certain paperwork with the state. The city cannot tolerate mistakes like that one on this project. This time it must contract with an engineering firm who will make Clarendon's best interest its first priority.

## Ship carries on spirit of San Jacinto battle

Each year Texans commemorate the Battle of San Jacinto - an 18-minute battle fought on April 21, 1836, that secured Texas' independence from Mexico and changed the course of American history.

We Texans love to reflect on our rich heritage, and San Jacinto Day is no exception. The official state of Texas celebration takes place at the San Jacinto Battleground State Historical Park. This year, thousands of Texans attended the festivities, which included a reenactment of the battle and a reading of General Sam Houston's account of the events by his great-grandson, Sam Houston IV. Visitors from around the state and country gathered for the celebration, but some of the most special guests did not travel by land - they came by sea on the *USS San Jacinto*.

I was pleased that the United States Navy accepted my invitation to take part in this year's San Jacinto Day celebration. In April, the *USS San Jacinto* docked in the Houston Ship Channel in honor of the 166th anniversary of the battle.

The Navy christens its battleships with the names of important historical figures, heroes, and key American battles. The

*USS San Jacinto*, the third ship in the Navy to bear the name of this important battle, pays homage to the rich legacy of Texas while serving as a beacon of American military might.

The first ship to carry the name of the battle was an early experimental, propeller-driven warship, commissioned in 1851. The second was a light aircraft carrier that saw extensive combat in the Pacific during World War II. The current *USS San Jacinto*, an Aegis cruiser, was commissioned on January 23, 1988, in Houston by Vice President Bush. The ship's motto, "Victory is Certain," is a quotation from General Sam Houston's speech to his outnumbered men before the battle.

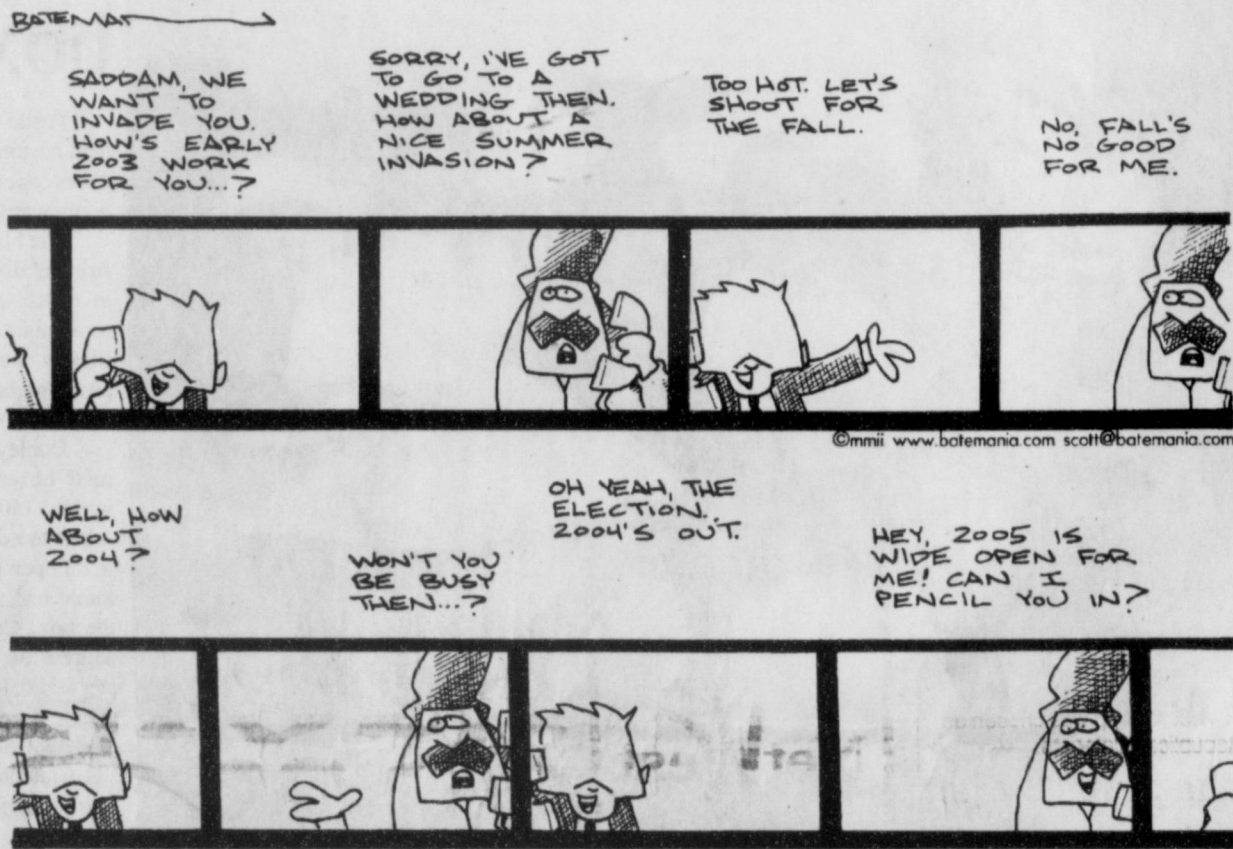
The ship has docked at the Port of Houston four times previously, but this year's arrival marked the first time the visit has coincided with the annual San Jacinto

Day festivities. The highlight of the program was a re-enlistment ceremony for 10 crewmembers conducted by Captain John MacKercher, Jr., on the steps of the San Jacinto Monument.

Since its commissioning, the *USS San Jacinto* has served our country with distinction - the ship is equipped with the most advanced naval weapons system in the world. Aegis, a computerized, quick reaction air defense system, provides extraordinary capabilities against attacking aircraft and missiles.

Texans are justifiably proud of the heritage of the *USS San Jacinto*, her strong ties to the state, and the dedication of the crewmembers who serve daily in harm's way. As our nation is once again at war to defend freedom and democracy, we share an even deeper appreciation for the men and women of the *USS San Jacinto* and the entire United States Military.

Texans will forever celebrate the great struggles for independence that mark our state's history. Those battles paved the way for the freedoms we enjoy today, and the *USS San Jacinto* and her crew help keep that rich history alive.



## US Constitution has been turned on its head

Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia is a smart man and an excellent writer. He is also a living example of how bad political and philosophical premises can put great talent in the service of an evil cause.

In November, while speaking at the University of Missouri, Scalia was asked what he thought about proposals to impose a national ID card on the American people. Scalia said he personally opposes the idea and would vote against it if it were put to a vote. But when a student asked him whether a national ID would violate the Constitution's Fourth Amendment, which protects individuals "in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures," Scalia pointed out that the Amendment says nothing about an ID card.

Then he went on to say (I quote from an Associated Press report), "If you think it's a bad idea to have an identity card, persuade your fellow citizens" through the amendment process, rather than asking courts to make policy."

Scalia here is saying that the government may require everyone to carry an ID unless the people amend the Constitution to prohibit Congress from enacting such a measure. He implies that the government can do virtually anything unless the Constitution expressly forbids it.

No surprise here. Scalia has long held his views known. But his views are based on an incorrect - indeed, a pernicious - notion of what the U.S. Constitution was and is supposed to be. In fact, he stands

the Constitution on its head. Instead of a document that protects individual liberty by reining in government power, Scalia would make it one that protects government power by reining in individual liberty. James Madison, the acknowledged father of the Constitution, said that the central government was delegated powers that were "few and defined." This is backed up by the Constitution itself. Article I, Section 8 contains a short list of powers given to the Congress.

To reinforce this point, the Tenth Amendment in the Bill of Rights, which was adopted at the urging of those who thought the Constitution would allow the government to grow too powerful, says, "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people."

The upshot is that the national government was not given a general grant of power to do whatever it thinks is right. It was given specific powers and only those. Any others belong to the states or the people. Or to put it more bluntly, if it's not expressly in the Constitution, the national government can't do it. This is not only clear from the constitutional text, it is the only scheme consistent with the idea of a constitutional republic.

A constitution such as ours is needed only if the intent is to limit the powers of government in behalf of liberty. A "constitution" that limits liberty in behalf of government power is a contradiction. The Founding Fathers wanted to safeguard

individual freedom. So they made the task of amending the Constitution difficult. But Scalia's way of thinking, which first seized politicians and judges long ago, reverses the Founder's basic intention. If government can do anything except that which is expressly prohibited by the Constitution, then the onerous burden of amending the Constitution, instead of falling on those who favor expanded power, is now on those who favor preserving freedom.

The Founders must be spinning in their graves.

Scalia's remark shows clearly how America's political system has been turned against liberty. It is thus a perfect illustration for a new book, *Dependent on D.C.*, by Professor Charlotte Twight of Boise State University (Palgrave/St. Martin's Press). In this important book, Professor Twight demonstrates how government leaders have inverted the American system, first, to keep the people from knowing what the politicians are doing and, then, to make it costly for the people to object. She calls it "manipulating the political transactions costs." Twight demonstrates her thesis with several case studies, including the passage of Social Security and Medicare.

If we are to restore our liberties and get government under control again, it behooves all Americans to understand what Charlotte Twight has to say.

## Thorough handwashing may help prevent illness

How many times have you or your children had the flu? Sometimes what we think is flu actually is food borne illness—food poisoning.

It is estimated that each year, at least 76 million Americans suffer from foodborne illness, according to the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Some people, especially children, seniors, and those with weakened immune systems, can experience more severe symptoms, or even die as a result of food poisoning.

Fortunately, we can do a lot to reduce our risk of foodborne illnesses. Many of these steps are simple, such as handwashing. Bacteria and other microbes cause foodborne illness. Handwashing can significantly cut down on bacteria. Washing your hands should be the first step before preparing food. It also is very important to wash your hands again after handling raw meat, fish, poultry, or eggs.

Some diseases are spread when disease-causing organisms on some-

one's hands get into food that they touch. Thorough hand washing is the best way to prevent this.

Wet hands with warm, running water. Move hands away from the water, add soap, and rub them together to make a lather. Thoroughly scrub hands, wrists, fingernails and between fingers for at least 15 seconds. Rinse and dry hands with a clean towel. Durable, disposable paper towels are also a good idea because the germs can be thrown away.

For travel and picnic situations where water isn't available, disposable wipes or a hand gel sanitizer are good alternatives. The alcohol in the gel kills germs on the hands. Both wipes and gels are available in most supermarkets or drugstores and are a good addition to the picnic basket and the car's glove compartment.

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## Schools win appeals on state funding

After a successful appeal to the state for funding, Clarendon and Hedley schools will receive all of the funding for the 2002-2003 school year they had expected.

In March, the schools stood to lose almost half a million dollars because of discrepancies in valuations in the two districts by the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts' and the Donley County Appraisal District.

"Because our local valuation was within 5% of the state's valuation," CISD Superintendent Monty Hysinger said, "the Comptroller's office accepted our numbers."

According to Paula Lowrie of the Appraisal District, this problem has occurred more than once, but each time, the appeal has been successful.

"When all is said and done, they accept our numbers," Lowrie said. "We work hard all year long to do things right, and there is no need for us to change the way we do things."

The state system may be flawed, but Hysinger does not see any changes in the future.

"There has to be some give and take," Hysinger said. "The state was not correct in many of their valuations, but the local office may need some adjustment as well."

The schools will not be receiving new monies, but they will get all the funds they had planned for.

"Both the Donley County Appraisal District and the firm that represented us should be commended," Hysinger said. "We are just relieved that even though this doesn't end our financial worries, we won't lose any aid we counted on."

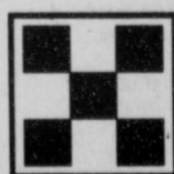

## Bass club to hold tournament at Greenbelt May 11

The spring turkey season will be ending this coming weekend. The season started April 6 and runs through May 12, 2002. So, hunters you have a few more days to get that long bearded gobbler that may have eluded you so far.

Early in the season was best because there were hens that still needed some tender loving care. But now as the season nears its end, 90% of all hens are nesting, and the gobblers are having a hard time trying to impress and find a hen. This makes turkey calling a little tough. The seasoned veteran turkey caller may be able to finesse a gobbler this time of year, but most will be blowing in the wind.

The Donley County Bass Club will be having a bass tournament here at Lake Greenbelt on Saturday, May 11, 2002.

The fishing is very good at Lake

Greenbelt. All fish are biting good to excellent. The water temperatures are in the low 60's. The best places to find your fish of choice is main lake points in 5' to 15' of water or back in the coves and even open water flats in 2' to 10' of water.

The crappies are in shallow, brushy water and can be caught easily using crappie jigs and minnows. The bass are shallow and nesting right now. This is a good time of the year if you're a good sight fisherman. You can find these nests and possibly find that trophy bass of a lifetime.

The catfish are biting very good at night in shallow water. This time of the year, I look for stained or muddy water for cats. These catfish will eat anything this time of the year.

The walleye and sand bass can be in water as shallow as 2' or as deep as 30'. This is a great time for the boaters who like to drift fish or troll.

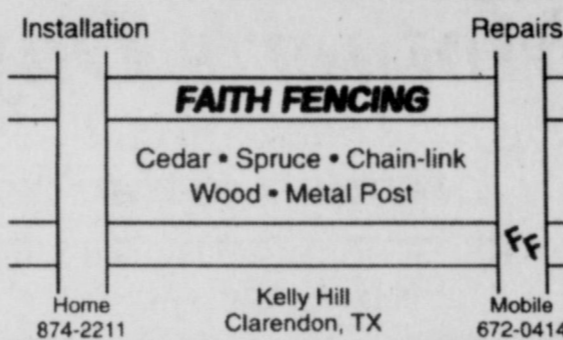

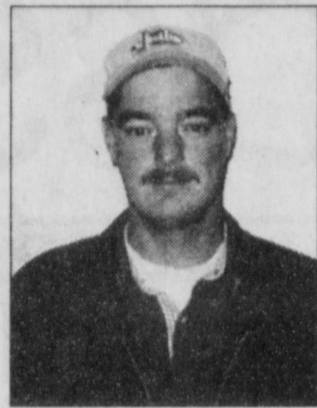

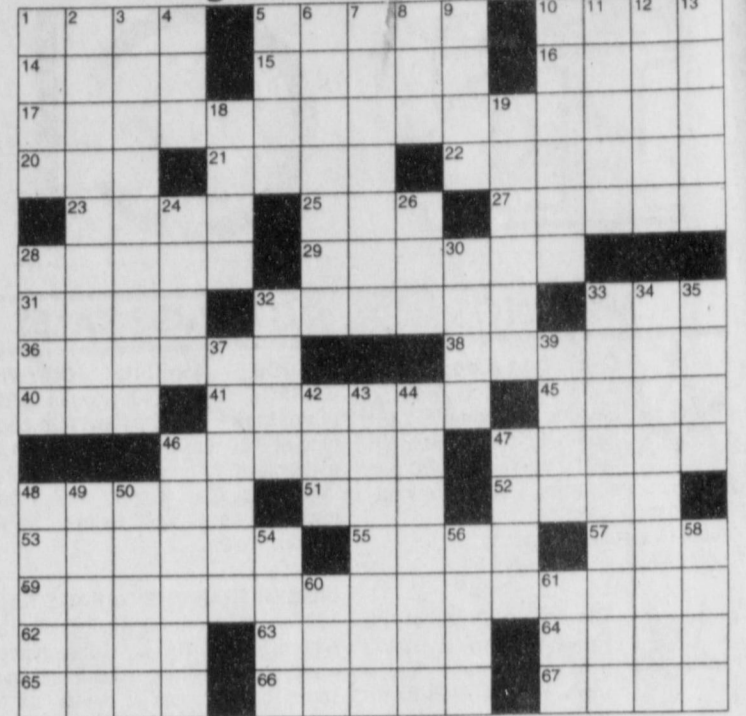
