Six Scouts Get Awards

Donley County Welcomed Into Water District

The Board of Directors of Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3 canvassed the returns of the annexation election held Saturday, January 19, 1991. Following the canvassing, the Board welcomed all of Donley County into the District as a result of the election.

Voters passed both propo-

sitions on the ballot by a 121 to 13 vote for Proposition 1 and a 119 to 14 vote for Proposition 2.

Some of the rules that producers need to be aware of, now that you are a part of the District include:

1. The requirement of a permit for any well that produces 17.5 g.p.m. or larger;
2. Minimum spacing of wells per tract of land. This rule considers the size of well and spaces it accordingly;
3. That a newly completed well meet the completion requirements;
4. That all non-producing wells

need to be properly capped or plugged;

5. Any exploratory hole drilled must be registered in the District Office;

6. District rule prohibiting the use of unlined salt water pits;

7. Transportation of water from the District to a use point outside of the District.

New Half-Ounce Letter Rate Available To Mexico

The United States Postal Service has announced a new 35-cent Half-ounce rate for letters going to Mexico. The rate for one ounce, previously the smallest increment to Mexico, is now 70 cents, up from 25 cents. The new rate will take effect on February 3, 1991.

We decided implement the half-ounce increment, which will cover letters up to two pages, Bob McCombs said. In doing so, we significantly lessen the total impact on our customers in Clarendon.

The half-ounce increment may be confusing at first, so McCombs encourages postal customers to weigh their letters to Mexico at the Clarendon post office or on an accurate letter scale before mailing them. Any letter on which postage has not been fully paid will be returned to the sender, since there is no procedure for collecting postage due on international mail.

An overall increase in international letter rate today is the result of action taken in 1989 by Universal Postal Union (UPU), a specialized United Nations Agency governing international postal policy.

"Under the old UPU compensation structure for letters, postal Administrations received only about one-third of the actual cost of delivering mail originating in another country," says McCombs. "Effective in 1991, a revised compensation system provides a higher rate per kilogram of letters to more closely match actual delivery costs. The result is higher rates for international mail, not just in the United States but all over the world, for example, will cost about 68 cents," McCombs said.

Rates To Go Up

West Texas Utilities Company will file a request early this week with the Public Utility Commission to reconcile historical fuel costs and increase our fixed fuel factors to reflect expected increases in the cost of fuel.

The new factors are not expected to affect customers' bills until later this year of early in 1992. The actual date will be determined

by the time it takes to complete the regulatory process.

Jerry Chambliss, WTU local manager, said the new factors will increase the average residential customers' bill by \$1.44 a month, of 2.5 percent, based on consumption of 660 kilowatt-hours per month.

"Our cost to residential customers is essentially divided into two major parts, the base rate and the fuel factor," said Chambliss. Fuel factors make up about forty percent of the total cost to customers.

The company is requesting the increase now primarily for three reasons. First, it has under-recovered retail fuel and purchased power costs through December 1990 by \$3,050,015.

Second, the PUC has recently expressed the opinion that fuel costs should be reconciled at least every three years through either a rate case or a fuel reconciliation case such as we are filing. WTU's fuel costs were last reconciled in a rate case which covered a period ending with March 31, 1987, almost four years ago.

Third, while WTU may be over-recovering during some of this year (partly as a result of renegotiated terms in a major gas contract), they expect that will change to some extent during 1992.

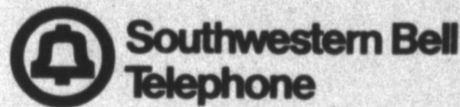
ComCall™ is an optional service that provides single-line customers the ability to set up internal intercom communications among multiple telephone extensions. A distinctive ring is heard to alert all extension users of an intercom call. Customers must subscribe to the optional service Three-way Calling for ComCall™ to function. (The monthly rate for Three-way Calling is \$2.10 for residence customers and \$2.65 for business customers.)

Personalized Ring™ and ComCall™ are intended for use by both residence and business customers. Personalized Ring™ is expected to generate first-year revenues of \$1.8 million. ComCall™ projects first-year revenues of \$53,000.
