## Beware Of Wet Areas

Agricultural producers, beware of "wet areas" in your fields and pastures. Changes in the wetland conservation, or Swampbuster, provision of the 1990 Farm Bill could cause you to lose eligibility for USDA farm program benefits.

The 1985 Farm Bill started making wet areas "sticky" for agricultural producers. If a wet area was determined a wetland by USDA's Soil Conservation Service, and a farmer "converted" the wetland and produced an agricultural commodity, the producer lost eligibility for USDA farm program benefits.

The 1990 Farm Bill makes wet areas even "stickier". Converting a wetland will result in loss of benefits regardless of whether an agricultural commodity is produced on the conversion. Benefits will be lost until the wetland is restored.

USDA has recently published rules to implement the 1990 Farm Bill. If agricultural producers certify an intent to use converted wetlands for nonagricultural uses, an exemption can be granted.

"Agricultural producers, who have wet areas suspected of being wetlands, should go to their Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office and ask for a wetland determination," says Pat Henson, Assistant State Conservationist, USDA-Soil Conservation Service, at state headquarters in Temple.

The request will be referred to Soil Conservation Service, who will make the wetland determination. In many instances, wet areas will not be sufficiently wet to be called wetlands.

Where wetlands are found, the producer will be advised if the intended activity can be exempted. If the conversion cannot be exempted, the wetland will be outlined on a map, and the producer advised not to make the conversion.

To avoid unnecessary expense and headaches, agricultural producers should request wetland determinations on "wet areas" before making any "conversions". USDA personnel will make determinations of wetlands, conversions, and exemptions. Foremost, they will work with agricultural producers to maintain their eligibility for farm program benefits.

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**Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers, approximately 155,000 business customers, approximately 500 private pay telephone owners and all customers who make Directory Assistance calls from public pay telephones.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. 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**Heartburn: Inflammation of the Esophagus**

Despite the name, heartburn is not a burning sensation of the heart. In fact, heartburn does not have anything to do with the heart. The medical name for heartburn is reflux esophagitis. The pain of heartburn occurs at a spot just behind the lower part of the breastbone. This pain is caused by the movement of gastrointestinal tract contents (digestive juices and partially digested food) into the esophagus. Irritation of tissues of the esophagus occurs.

Some individuals who have heartburn experience a burning sensation 10 to 15 minutes after eating a normal meal. The pain also may occur with overeating, smoking, drinking alcohol, eating highly seasoned or spicy foods, or lying down after eating a large meal.

Heartburn may be relieved merely by standing or sitting up. Dietary changes that may be beneficial include avoiding irritants such as fruit juices and alcohol. Nonprescription antacid medicines neutralize stomach acid and may lower pressure on the lower esophagus. Liquid antacids are commonly used for heartburn and often are recommended to be taken after meals and at bedtime.

Dear Editor

Hey, who is trying to "kick out Pantex?" Not those of us who live around the Pantex Plant. Those people who are so paranoid when questions about safety of Pantex and contamination of our agricultural production seem to be as uninformed about Pantex as they are about our area agricultural industry.

According to Texas Agriculture Extension Service in cooperation with the city of Amarillo, Amarillo Economic Development Corp. and Southwestern Public Service Co., area agriculture is an industry worth more than \$3 billion. Cash receipts from crop production totaled \$591 million, and value-added livestock sales brought \$1.848 billion to our area. Seventy-six percent of fed beef in Texas comes from this area. More than one million irrigated acres grow more than 20 different crops commercially. These figures would be greater if wheat were \$3.45 per bushel as a letter writer in the June 10th *Globe News* stated instead of the present \$2.52 per bushel.

Farmers and ranchers are the largest consumers of the trade area. They buy tractors, trucks, fuel, and insurance, as well as groceries, clothing, automobiles, houses, and much more. They pay utilities, property taxes to support schools and city governments, and income taxes that pay the salaries and build facilities at Pantex. They even pay one-half percent sales tax to the city of Amarillo that used the tax to pay \$50,000 from the Amarillo Economic Development Corp. and the \$80,000 from the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce for the Panhandle 2000 proposal. The also

pay a one percent sales tax the city used in producing the proposal to expand Pantex.

Pantex's annual pay roll of \$115.6 million, even if trippled as Mr. Madden says could happen (notice the could. Advocates of the proposal use lots of could's, it's, etc.; but few facts.), pales in comparison to the annual \$3 billion that agriculture adds to the area economy. If the turn over of wealth is four times, those so quickly to sign on to the expansion of Pantex should be very cautious with the possibility of severe damage to the agricultural industry which employs one out of every four workers. Think about it!

late May and early June opened the door to disease problems in young cotton. Much of the cotton in the county has been replanted because of the disease problems which killed or reduced many stands.

Two diseases, Wet Weather Blight and Seedling Disease Complex, caused most of the cotton problems. Many fields had a combination of the two diseases while others showed one or the other. Wet Weather Blight was the more predominant problem to most fields.

Two out of the last three years cotton farmers are faced again with late plantings of cotton which could lead to increased insect problems, late season insect control, and possible lower yields if early frost is received. Already, many fields are showing heavy infestations of thrips which can delay cotton growth even more.

Hopefully open hot weather will help the cotton get started and growing. Hot weather, timely rains, minimal insect problems and a normal to long growing season will be the key to a cotton crop for farmers in Donley County this year.

**Fruit Drop**

Twice a year fruit growers become concerned with small to medium sized fruit dropping from many species of fruit trees. While there is a natural tendency to want every flower to turn into a fruit, this really is not desirable or realistic.

Most plants produce far more flowers than needed. If they all made fruit, size and quality would be inferior. Depending on the crop, there are two major periods of drop. The first, just after bloom, generally results in weak, unpollinated fruit. Enough fruit usually remains at this time for a crop. If all or most fruit drops at this time, it is either an unadapted crop such as apricots in much of the state, or lack of pollination on crops like the Bruce plum and most apple varieties.

During late May and early June, a second drop occurs among many fruits like citrus and persimmons. This phenomena is called June drop because farther north, where it was named, June is when most of this drop happens. Fruit that drops at this time is usually seedless, weak fruit that the plant is naturally dropping. Very few things will slow June drop, but mulching and adequate water management will help some.

Both Mr. Smith and Mr. Gilliland will discuss gopher control techniques and give demonstrations on properly baiting tunnels and using other mechanical control devices.

Those having other predator control problems are also welcome to come visit with Ron and Rick about possible solutions to the problem. Contact the Donley County Extension Service for more information.

**Cancer Screening Clinic Set**

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method know to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are: 1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month; 2. Have a physical examination every year; 3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age.

Age - 35 to 40 - One baseline mammogram; 40 to 50 - A mammogram every 1 to 2 years; over 50 - Yearly mammogram.

A clinic will be held on Friday, July 5, 1991, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., at the Clarendon Medical Center Clinic. Exams are done by appointment only. **Cotton Crop Off To A Bad Start**

## New Protection Against Misleading Ads

“A new law to combat mail scams is expected to provide much needed protection to Social Security beneficiaries besieged by various solicitations under the cover of official looking envelopes,” announced Jim Talbot, manager of the Amarillo Social Security office. Called the Deceptive Mailings Prevention Act, the new law gives the United States Postal Service specific power to stop delivery of mail that gives the impression it is connected with the government.

The law says that any envelope (or the face of any postcard) that includes a name, seal, insignia, term, or symbol that could reasonably cause it to be mistaken for a mailing from the government will not be delivered unless there is also a prominent “disclaimer.” The

disclaimer must appear on the envelope (or face of a postcard), and must clearly state that the mailing is not made or endorsed by the government.

Talbot pointed out that many companies use “Social Security” or “Medicare” as a come on to get people to read their advertisements. Even Worse, some of these ads appear to deliberately try to mislead people into thinking they have to respond or they might lose Social Security or Medicare benefits.

Here are the steps you should take if you receive mail you think violates this law. First, you go to your local postoffice, explain why you're concerned about the mailing, and ask the people there to forward the mailing to the Postal Inspector's

Office. Second, if you prefer, you can send in a complaint directly to the Chief Postal Inspector, at this address: Chief Postal Inspector, United States Postal Service, 475 L'Enfant Plaza, S.W. Washington, D.C. 20260-2100.

“Be sure to give the post office everything you received, including and envelope or wrapper,” Talbot advised. Also, be sure to include your name and address, the nature of your concern, and the date you got it in the mail. All that information will help the Postal Inspector take any necessary action.

## Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by high winds and range fires which occurred March 5, 1991 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Clarendon, FmHA County Supervisor, David Grussendorf said today.

Gray County is one of eight in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans of cover part of actual production losses resulting from the high winds and range fire.

Grussendorf said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in Business or \$500.00, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

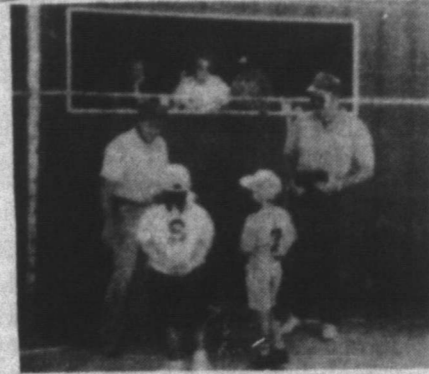
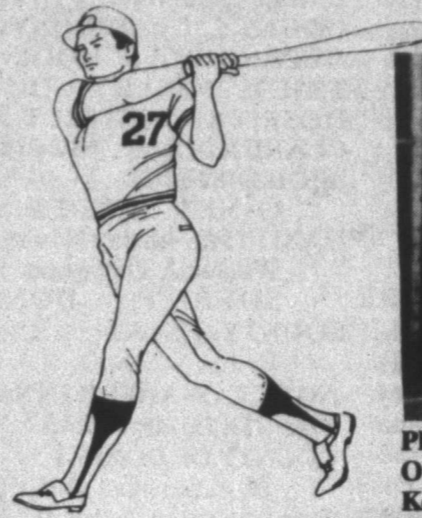
“As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan,” Grussendorf said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceed from those programs in determining their loss.

“Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until January 22, 1992 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possible over into the new farming season,” Grussendorf said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Clarendon is open from 8:00 to 5:00 Monday through Friday.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION AUGUST 10, 1991

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**  
Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**  
Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:  
"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

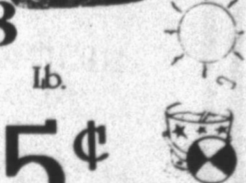
