Absentee Voting Opened

The extended absentee balloting period opened on Wednesday, Oct. 17 for those registered to vote in the Tuesday, Nov. 6 general election, Texas Secretary of State George Bayoud said.

During the extended absentee voting period, which runs through Friday, Nov. 2, registered voters can appear at county courthouses and other absentee polling places across Texas to cast ballots for the Nov. 6 election, said Bayoud, the state's chief elections officer. The deadline to register to vote in the Nov. 6 election was Oct. 9.

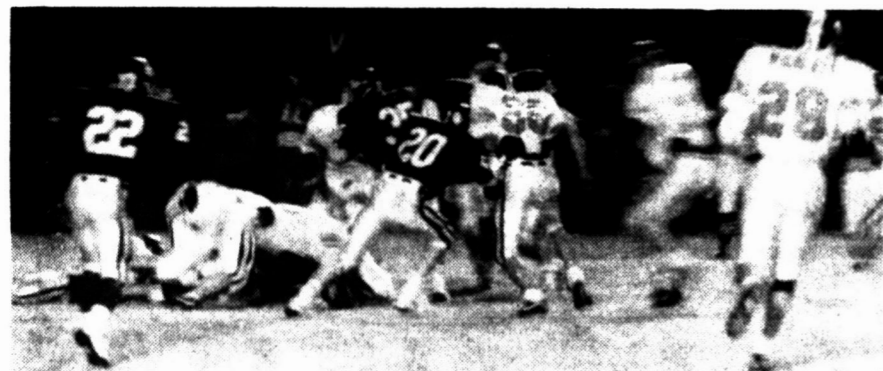
"What this absentee voting period does is provide Texans with an additional 17 days to vote, instead of just on election day," Bayoud said. "If you are registered to vote, there simply is no excuse to stay away from the polls."

Under a 1987 state law that relaxed absentee voting requirements, registered voters need not give a specific reason for casting in-person, ballots during the extended voting period, Bayoud explained.

"If you have made up your mind who you are going to vote for, consider taking advantage of the extended period," Bayoud said. "It's real convenient and you can avoid the lines on election day."

This year Texans will elect a U.S. senator, governor, lieutenant governor and scores of other statewide and local officeholders.

Broncos Surprise Canadian

Canadian scored a touchdown midway through the fourth quarter to score a come from behind victory over the Clarendon Broncos 21-19. Clarendon led 19-7 in the 3rd quarter, but could not hold off the hard running Canadian offense.

Clarendon kicked off to Canadian to start the game. On second down Canadian fumbled and Desmond Johnson recovered for the Broncos on the Clarendon 47 yd line. A pass to Nathan Lowrie took the ball to the 32 yd line. After a 5 yd penalty to the 37 yd line, Dusty Allen ran to the 30 yd line. On 4th down, a pass to Jason Ward drew an interference penalty to the Canadian 18 yd line. Randy Allen ran to the 10 yd line and Dusty Allen took the ball over from the 7 yd line for the touchdown. Jonathan Stewart kicked the extra point and Clarendon led 7-0.

The first quarter ended with Clarendon leading 7-0, with Canadian on the Clarendon 44 yd line. In 9 plays, Canadian was at the Clarendon 1 yd line where the Bronco defense held and took over on their 2 yd line. The Broncos couldn't move the ball and punted to the 30 yd line. Four plays later Canadian scored on a 6 yd run by QB Shad Jergenson, Ep was good and the score was tied 7-7.

The Broncos started the next series on their own 20 yd line. QB Stewart completed a pass to Michael Shadle who took the ball to the 49 yd line. Nathan Lowrie caught a pass and moved to the 30 yd line. Another pass to Lowrie moved the ball to the 24 yd line. The next play QB Stewart dropped back to pass but instead handed the ball to Randy Allen who ran around left end, broke a couple of tackles and went in for the Touchdown. The EP kick was no good. Clarendon led 13-7 with 1:52 seconds left in the half. After the kickoff, Canadian moved the ball to the Bronco 28 yd line. The 1st half ended with the Clarendon Broncos leading 13-7.

Range Tour and Stocker Cattle Seminar Scheduled

The Armstrong, Donley, and Randall County Extension Live stock and Range Improvement Committees are sponsoring a Range Tour and Stocker Cattle Seminar for beef producers in the area on Thursday, November 1, 1990. It will start at 9:00 a.m. on November 1, with a range tour, looking at aerial and low volume basal treatments of mesquite. The first stop on the tour will be seven miles west of Wayside on FM 285, then two miles north at the Jim Pat Lankford Ranch. The second stop will be on FM 207 at the Hedgecote Ranch.

The seminar will be open to anyone interested and will cover a wide range of topics. Dr. Robert Sprowls, of Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory, will be on the program to discuss general lab services and stocker health, as well as other health related cattle problems in the area.

Dr. Wayne Koski, Grand Laboratories, will be on hand to discuss getting the most out of your vaccines. Dr. Dave Hutchin son, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, will discuss pasture supplemental. He will also cover the megacalorie system for figuring animal feed requirements. Jack Moreman, Ranch Operations, Clarendon College, will be on the program to discuss using pelvic measurements for heifer selection. Participants will get two Continuing Education Units toward their Private Applicator License requirements for attending the tour and seminar.

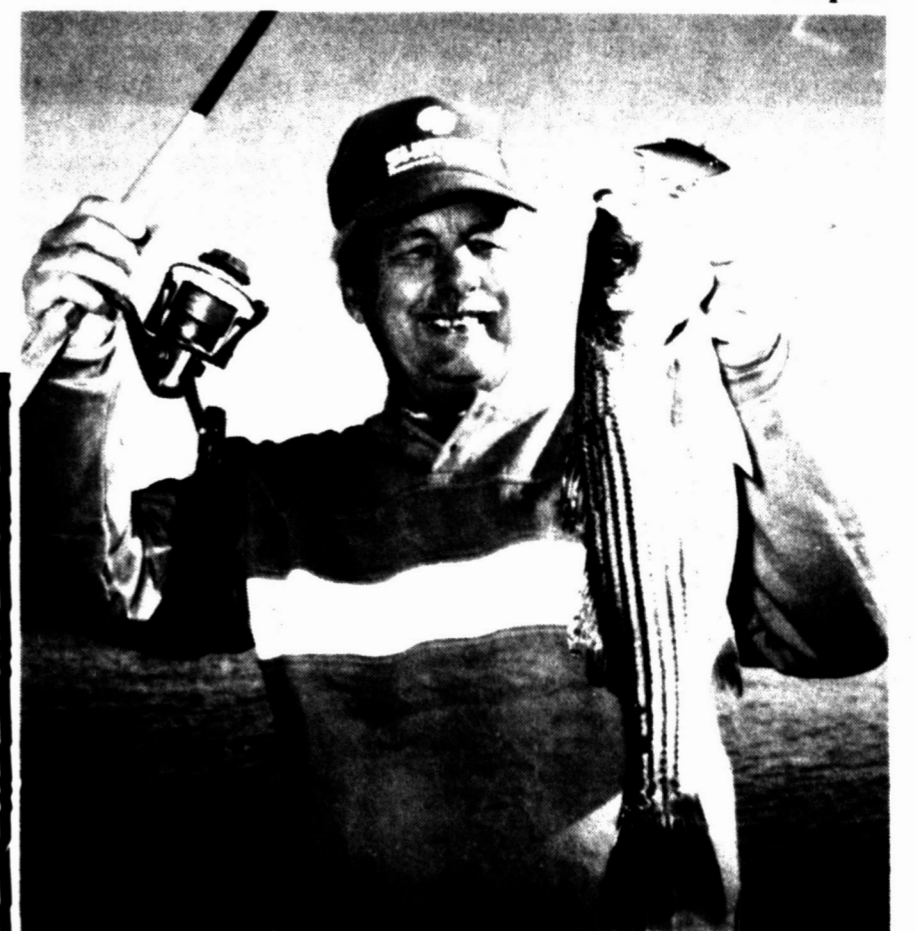
There will be several animal health industry representatives present with booths at the seminar showing their latest products. A catered meal will also be provided for producers at noon. The meal will be sponsored by the animal health industry representatives and others. Those wishing to participate in the seminar must contact the Armstrong County Extension Office (806/226-3021), the Donley County Extension Office (806/874-2141), or the Randall County Extension Office (806/655-7001), by October 31, 1990, in order to get a head count for the meal. The meal should be served around 12:00 noon.

FISHING REPORT: The Texas Parks & Wildlife reports that the fishing at Greenbelt Lake is fairly good. The water is clear, 76 degrees, normal level and rising; black bass are good to 6 1/2 pounds on Rat-L-Traps and other topwaters; crappie are picking up to 2 pounds on minnows, nightcrawlers; white bass are fair to 12 fish per string on minnows; catfish are fairly good to 115 1/2 pounds on liver and minnows; walleye are beginning to move into shallow water, several in the 4-5 pound range caught on nightcrawlers. Midweek the temperature was 59 degrees.

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Medicines Relieve Glaucoma Pressure

A colorless fluid inside of our eyes bathes internal eye structures. This fluid is produced by the eye and then drains through a small canal in each eye. In glaucoma, normal drainage does not occur. The result is increased fluid pressure that squeezes the blood vessels serving the retina and optic nerve. It is thought that when the blood supply to this area is significantly reduced, nerve cells and fibers die, and permanent loss of vision may result. Glaucoma is considered one of our leading causes of blindness.

Eye specialists and many physicians routinely check their patients for increased eye pressure. If glaucoma is found, treatment with medicines can help reduce internal eye pressure and help prevent or limit loss of vision.

Some of the medicines used to treat glaucoma work by constricting the pupil of the eye. It is thought that this constriction or narrowing of the pupil relieves some blockage of the canal which takes fluid from the eye. Medicines which work in this manner include *pilocarpine*, *carbachol*, and *echothiophate*. *Timolol* is a different type of glaucoma medicine. Research suggests that the primary action of timolol is to reduce the formation of fluid within the eye, thus reducing eye pressure indirectly.

Cancer Society Holds Meeting

The Donley County Unit of the American Cancer Society met October 8, 1990, in the Hospitality Room of the First Bank and Trust of Clarendon.

President Genevieve Caldwell called the meeting to order, and Helen Estlack read the minutes.

Mrs. Caldwell announced that the Donley Unit had received the Award of Merit for raising 834 or more per capita in helping the Texas Division raise \$14,890,705 for 1989-90.

Results of the Donley County Cancer Crusade were reported as follows: \$362 in memorials; \$796 from the business district; \$2,578 from the residential areas of Clarendon, Hedley, Howardwick and Lelia Lake; and \$514 from the Bike-a-thon.

Amy Marshall, District Field Representative, commented on the value of the services provided by the

Donley County Unit. She reported the following values: \$11,154 for Public Education, \$1,600 for Patient Services; and \$1,275 for Research, making a total of \$14,029.

Ms. Marshall discussed the Cancer Survivor's Day held October 6, 1990, at the Harrington Cancer Center. She also announced that Kay Hayes, Education Chairman, had won the P.A.C.E. Award


again this year for reaching 40% of the youth and 10% of the adults in Donley County.

Mrs. Caldwell announced that Carol Grady will be the chairman of the Great American Smokeout which will be November 15.


R.L. Gilkey, M.D. presented a very informative program on the cases of cancer in Donley County. He reported seven deaths attributed to cancer and twenty cases which are being treated and/or monitored.

Water Quality and Conservation of Utmost Importance
 Every time we take a drink of water in our homes, or perform any other function where water is used, we pretty much take it for granted that there is a sufficient supply and that the quality is good.

But the conservation and preservation of our groundwater is up to each individual. The local citizens are the most affected when the water becomes contaminated or in short supply; and are best suited to protect it. We are all aware of the importance of water, but we seldom do much to insure it.

Some concerned citizens from Donley County have petitioned Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District 3, wishing to become a part of the District. These persons realize their responsibility to protect the groundwater for themselves, as well as future generations.

The Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3 has many functions. Some of them include making yearly inventories of the amount of decline in the aquifer and testing water quality to make sure that pollutants from a variety of sources are not contaminating our water. The staff is also very active in tracking and responding to legislation and regulations that affect groundwater as well as working diligently to keep such rights as private ownership of water and private usage of our land as we see fit.

Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District 3 currently covers all of Gray county as well as parts of Carson, Potter, Armstrong and Roberts Counties. Although it was set up by the State Legislature, the District is a local agency. It is run by a Board of Directors who are elected by, and responsible to, the voters who reside in the District. It supports itself by an ad valorem tax, which amounts to \$.0063 per \$100 valuation. This means that if a person owned \$50,000 home, the taxes he would pay would amount to \$3.15 per year.

According to Mr. C.E. Williams, District Manager, "Some local farmers and ranchers have expressed concern about the rural water supply. A recent study showed that this area could be considered a critical ground water area. That is, based on projections, it has been determined that by the year 2020, we could face critical shortages of water. The state is

looking at this problem and will probably, eventually, mandate that the county either join a water district, create a district of their own, or come under state control. I believe it is better for area residents to join a district of their choice, which is also under their local control, rather than to wait for the state to mandate their future in which they may have little control." Participation in the Panhandle Water Conservation District can only occur after an extended process which culminates in a vote in which the majority of voters in the County would decide whether or not to join.

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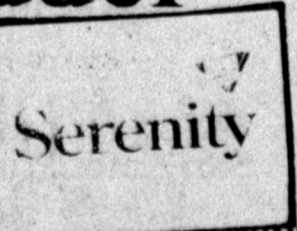

The Foolishness of Preaching

In I Corinthians 1, Paul wrote that God chose to save the world through "the foolishness of preaching". He went on to explain that the Gospel was "a stumbling block to the Jews and foolishness to the Gentiles." Yet, wrote the apostle, to those who believe that message--the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus--is the power of God for salvation.

The gospel, that central message of what Jesus has done to reclaim sinners, is still an effective power to those who become aware of their spiritual poverty. And it is still foolish to those who believe that they are self-sufficient. But the whole idea of preaching seems to have been perverted over the years.

A politician who speaks passionately for some issue is accused of preaching. When a mother corrects her teen-ager, the youngster is likely to say, "Stop preaching at me!" A consumer who has become fanatical about some product he likes is accused of "preaching" the merits of Comet or whatever.

In fact the latter instance may actually come closer to true preaching than the traditional sermon on Sunday morning.

The man who is crazy about Comet is telling good news to those whom he assumes are unaware of it. The "preacher" who rehashes some pious platitudes to a congregation of people who have been Christians for twenty years is not preaching, not in the Biblical meaning of the term.

In New Testament usage, a preacher is one who proclaims Good News to those who have not heard it. One who instructs and counsels those who already believe is called a teacher. Throughout the New Testament there is a consistent distinction between the two activities. Teaching and preaching are not confused in the Scripture.

Could it be that the current failure to distinguish between preaching and teaching is one cause of the weakness of current Christianity? Churches pay someone they call a "preacher", then expect him to spend his time baby-sitting the members, rather than evangelizing the lost. And the members need a babysitter because they are still infants, not ready for solid food. Perhaps it is time to review again the teaching of Hebrews 5:11-6:2.

Without question it is time to carry the Good News to those who have not heard and to graduate "ordinary" Christians from observers into lives of work and service.


Obituary


