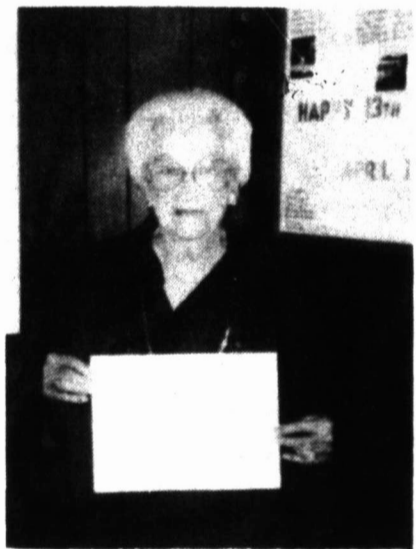

The kitchen staff were thrilled with the nice aprons donated by Ilene Davidson. On Friday, May 10th, during lunch time, we honored Alta Adkins for



Avoid Alcohol-Aspirin Combination

Beverage alcohol should be avoided when certain prescription and nonprescription medicines are being used. If alcohol is consumed while a person is taking narcotic pain relievers, tranquilizers, antihistamines, anti-anxiety agents, or sedative-type sleep medicines, the following may occur: headaches, rapid heart beat, confusion, and impaired mental judgment.

According to a recent study reported in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*, the use of alcohol and aspirin at the same time can lead to unexpected increases in blood alcohol concentrations. Individuals in the study were given identical breakfasts and alcohol in orange juice. Some were given two 500 milligram aspirin tablets. Those who took the aspirin had blood alcohol concentrations that were 26 percent higher than those who did not take aspirin.

Researchers indicate that although the level of blood alcohol increase is not dramatic, the increase is enough to "alter a person's response time and make the person too impaired to drive or operate machinery." Researchers consider the findings important because food in the stomach usually keeps blood alcohol levels low. Apparently, when aspirin is present, blood levels are enhanced.

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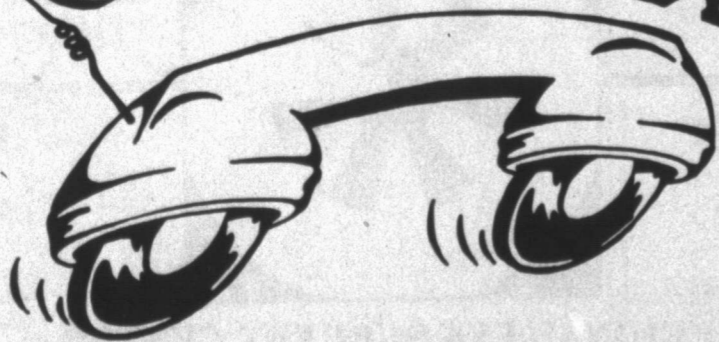

Monster Tentatively Identified

The monster that terrorized the ladies at *The Clarendon News* has been tentatively identified by Game Warden Gary Hunt. Hunt was kind enough to bring a specimen by the office for Maggie Stewart to confirm the identity. He also allowed the staff to photograph the reptile.

According to Warden Hunt, the animal is a Texas Stick Lizard, *Hoxanas frigidus v. latexis*, a native of Donley County.

The stick lizard is known for its ingenious method of dealing with the summer heat in the sandy areas of the county that it prefers. Reportedly the animal carries a stick in its mouth in hot weather as it scurries across the dunes. When its feet become unbearably hot, the animal pushes the stick into the ground and climbs up to the top of it. There the soothing, gentle West Texas breezes cool the lizard's feet until it is ready to proceed on its journey.

Maggie Stewart, Chief Phenominologist at *The Clarendon News* was unable to confirm that what she saw was undoubtedly a West Texas Stick Lizard.
