Ginners Set Seminar

Questions facing Texas cotton farmers in the '90s, and answered which can add up to better yields, quality and profit, will be examined in a seminar April 11 during the annual trade show and convention of the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association.

The convention annually draws more than 6,000 ginners, producers, officials and others in the industry.

The seminar will be conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service from 1:20 to 4:45 p.m. in the banquet hall of the Memorial Civic Center, site of the convention. It will conclude the 34th annual meeting of the Plains Cotton Growers, being held in conjunction with the gin show.

Private, commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators attending the seminar can obtain two of the continuing education units required annually by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

How the new federal farm bill will change the farmer's marketing strategy is one of the key questions the seminar will address. Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension economist and cotton marketing specialist from College Station, will discuss this.

Steps to prevent nematodes from robbing the farmer of yields and hazard to children and elderly profi: will be outlined by Dr. Jim Starr, associate professor of nematology at To as A & M University.

Seedling diseases and ways to control them will be the topic of Dr. Harold Kaufman, Extension Service plant pathologist. Dr. Jim Leser, Extension Service cotton entomologist, will examine the latest control methods for thrips, aphids and bollworms.

The possible role of genetically engineered cotton plants in pest management will be examined by Dr. Norma Trolinder, plant physiologist

with the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Agriculture Research Service. Dr. James Supak, Extension Service cotton agronomist, will summarize the discussions to conclude the seminar.




Snake Alert!

The weather seems too cool for there to be a snake hazard. But a surprised resident killed a four-foot rattlesnake last Tuesday, just outside his back door in Lelia Lake. Other county residents have reported seeing poison snakes recently, also.

Rattlesnakes are a special folks. Children are likely to be careless when they are preoccupied with play, while many older citizens cannot see or hear as well as they once did. In addition, a given amount of venom does more damage in a small body than in a larger adult. In the case of older victims, a snakebite can complicate existing health problems.

The best snake bite treatment is prevention. Be careful!



The Scholarships were announced at a dinner hosted by Oklahoma Christian President J. Terry Johnson on March 8.

presidential Scholarships range from \$4,000 to \$10,000 over four years for students meeting the qualifying criteria. Recipients must have a composite score of 25 or above on the ACT examination or 1020 or above on the SAT examination and a grade point average of 3.65 or above.

Oklahoma Christian is a private liberal Art University in its 41st year of operation. The school offers more than 70 degree options and several professional programs such as pre-law and Pre-med. Current students represent 47 states, one territory and 24 foreign countries.

Consultant Gives Report

Thunder Junction, the Western heritage park planned by Yesterday's Children, can be profitable in its new location near Clarendon, according to Don Stewart, recreational consultant who conducted the original feasibility study for the group.

Although the size of the park

will be smaller initially, it is expected to draw 190,000 visitors and realize a profit of \$1.37 million the first year of operation, said Stewart, principal with Economic Consulting Services of Santa Monica, California, in his report to Yesterday's Children, which was released today.

Attendance projections were based on population totals of the surrounding 120-mile area, traffic counts on nearby highways 287, 70 and Interstate 40, and the number of annual visitors to Greenbelt Lake. Conservative estimates of the capture rate of each segment, based on the experience of similar facilities in other parts of the country, went into the projections, said Pat Kaiser, Yesterday's Children president.

Thunder Junction, which will benefit senior citizen services throughout the Panhandle, is expected to cost only \$8.5 million to build rather than the \$15.4 million originally estimated when a larger attraction was planned in Amarillo, said Kaiser.

Stewart, who has worked on such large projects as Disney World in Florida, Circus Circus in Las Vegas and Worlds of Fun in Kansas City, looked at several possible sites for the park January 29-30, when he visited Clarendon. He identified two near Greenbelt Lake with frontage on Highway 70 as

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
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

scape, consider your region's hardiness zone. Hardiness zone refers to the lowest possible temperature span at which a given plant can thrive. Your zone is important because plants suitable for Utah, split into zones four, five and six (-30° to 0°) certainly won't thrive in Louisiana, divided into zones eight and nine (10° to 30°).

The United States falls into eight plant hardiness zones, which vary greatly. Zone three is the coldest region. Bordering on central Canada, its average annual minimum temperatures range between 40° to -30°. Zone ten is the warmest region. Comprising the southern portion of Florida and California, the minimum temperatures fall between 30° to 40°. Ninety-five percent of America falls between these two extremes in zones four through nine.

If you don't know your hardiness zone, call the local representative of the USDA's Cooperative Extensive Service for your area. Or, check with your local garden supply retailer.

Plant Selection

Home gardeners can now choose from a growing number of plants that are drought-tolerant. To be absolutely safe, check with a garden center, landscape architect, or grower before making any final plant selections.







There are drought-tolerant ground covers, shrubs, and trees suitable for every area. Many members of the juniper family of evergreens are especially unthirsty and make ideal borders or groundcovers for zones three to six. Rosemary, verbena rigida, and coyote brush make good groundcovers in more temperate areas.

Barberry, boxwood, quince, and elderberry make fine shrubs for zones four through six. Eucalyptuses come in both shrub and tree sizes, and are suitable evergreens for zones seven through nine; they are especially appropriate for coastal

Deciduous trees to consider are mimosa and modesto ash (zone six), autumn gold maidenhair (zone five), crape Myrtle (zone seven), and goldenrain tree, which is not only drought tolerant, but heat and cold resistant as well, making it suitable for every zone. Unthirsty evergreen trees are olive (zone eight), aleppo pine (zone seven), pin oak (zone four) and incense cedar (zone six).

A Water-Efficient Landscape 1. The most efficient landscape begins with properly conditioned soil. Canadian Sphagnum Peat Moss is the best allaround soil amendment. One hundred percent natural, safe, and organic Canadian Peat adds body to sandy soil and aerates heavy clay soil. It absorbs up to 20 times its weight in water, like a sponge, then releases it to thirsty roots, slowly. So, plants need less frequent watering, since

they get what they need, as they need it. 2. Plan your design so that plants with similar water needs - low, medium, high are grouped together. That way, water won't be wasted on plants that don't

3. Limit turf grass since it's a waterguzzler. Or, better yet, replace it with less water-demanding ground covers.

4. Select drought-tolerant plants endemic to your area. Native plants demand less water than transplanted exotics.

5. Utilize a drip or trickle irrigation system, which is much more efficient than the traditional sprinkler, with which a lot of water evaporates before it ever reaches thirsty roots. Also, when you water, water fewer times per week, but deeply each

6. Mulch to retain moisture. Covering the surface of the soil saves water by reducing evaporation. A two to four inch layer of organic material, such as bark or compost, placed around plants does the

7. Landscape maintenance is critical to saving water. Pruning, fertilizing, and proper mowing are key. Well maintained plants use water more efficiently and less frequently than an overgrown landscape.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has filed two separate applications with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to introduce two new optional directory services. One service is Directory Assistance Call Completion (DACC) and the other service is Multiple List Directory Assistance (MLDA).

DACC is an optional service that provides customers the option of having their Directory Assistance call completed to the requested number (when they call Directory Assistance for a number) by either the Directory Assistance operator or a mechanized audio response system.


The proposed rates* for fully-automated DACC calls are: \$.30 if the call is sent paid or billed to a calling card, \$1.00 if the call is collect or billed to a third number and \$.25 from a coin

The proposed rates* for semi-automated (operator assisted) DACC calls are: \$.85 for calls that are sent paid or billed to a calling card, \$1.20 if the call is collect or billed to a third number and \$2.60 for a person-to-person call.

Multiple List Directory Assistance (MLDA) allows the customer to request more than two listing requests per call to Directory Assistance. Customers can either call on "demand" and receive up to 10 listings, or schedule an "appointment" and receive the assistance of a Directory Assistance operator for as long as required. The rates for "demand" MLDA are \$.30 per listing request (after applicable allowances), with a maximum of 10 listing requests per call. The rates for "appointment" MLDA are \$1.00 per minute, with a 15-minute minimum.

The optional services DACC and MLDA are intended for use by both residence and business customers. Those persons who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps will be able to use DACC and "demand" MLDA free of charge. If approved by the commission, DACC and MLDA will be available beginning May 13, 1991. Firstyear projected revenues for DACC are approximately \$9.6 million. First-year projected revenues for MLDA are approximately \$1.7 million.




