Farmers Test New Cotton Loan Center

USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service recently opened a Regional Cotton Loan Center in Lubbock, as part of a pilot project to improve loan services to cotton producers. To speed up the loan, making progress, the Regional Cotton Loan Center will provide services for evading warehouse receipts and ASCA office. The Center will be responsible for the storage and retrieval of warehouse receipts and class cards. "We will continue to administer the cotton price support program", Drew Thornberry, County Executive Director, said. Services to producers from our office will not change, except that producers now have a choice other than the county office, to transact loan activities, he said.

"We also hope that faster redemptions and a handy data base will make the producers' cotton under loan readily available to potential buyers." The Center increase the commercial potential of producer's cotton by providing a centralized loan collateral data base to cotton buyers.

The ASCS official said the success of the center and the benefit to cotton producers hinge on the rapid transmission and exchange of loan information between the Center and the county office.

Donley County Livestock Show Scheduled

The Donley County Junior Livestock Show is set for January 12, 1991. Of course, this is less than one month away and 4-H and FFA members are working very hard for preparation of the show.

Youths from ages 6 to 18 in 4-H and FFA are feeding, training and caring for steers, lambs, pigs and turkeys for the Donley County Stock Show, as well as major shows in Ft. Worth, San Antonio and Houston. These youngsters have been managing some of these projects a month, while others have been for approximately seven months. Livestock projects are a major responsibility for 4-H and FFA members, giving them an opportunity to learn about proper nutrition, health and management of their animal (s). They also develop skills of caring for these animals, showmanship skills, and sportsmanship skills that can be used by many of them for a lifetime. 4-H'ers and FFA'ers also learn to handle responsibility and increase self-esteem by becoming knowledgeable and skilled in their project area.

The highlight of the year for 4-H and FFA members with livestock projects is participation in the county and major livestock shows. This is where the efforts, time spent and money invested in these projects is rewarded, but there are no guarantees that the rewards will always pay for the investments. Nevertheless, many youngsters have started college savings, opened bank accounts, developed herds or flocks by participating in the livestock program.

The Donley County Junior Livestock Show will start on Friday, January 11, 1991, with all animals having to be at the Community Building by 4:00 p.m. Superintendents of each division will start weighing pigs, steers and lambs after 4:00 p.m. that Friday. The show will begin on Saturday morning, January 12, 1991, at 9:00 a.m., with lambs, followed by turkeys, steers, and then swine. The Buyers and Exhibitors Appreciation Supper will be at 6:00 p.m., followed by the Premium Sale at 7:00 p.m. The meal is free for Buyers and Exhibitors, and a donation is requested from others attending. This years judge for the show will be Robert Harris, County Extension Agent in Armstrong County.

Everyone is invited to the show, and encouraged to support the local 4-H and FFA programs by participating in the Premium Sale on Saturday evening.

House Plants Can Be Deadly Decor

Nothing brightens up a home more than a collection of colorful houseplants. The deep, rich colors of the Dieffenbachia, the sweet fragrance of the Hyacinth and Crocus, and the subtle shading of Ivy bring some of the beauty of nature indoors for your family to enjoy. But though lovely, these familiar houseplants can also prove quite deadly to your children.

Many plants are poisonous if consumed by humans. Some merely cause mild diarrhea or a rash; eating others can result in sudden

Toddlers are the most frequent victims of plant poisoning. Motivated by the urge to explore and to relieve the sensations of teething, they end up putting everything within reach into their mouths. And the bright colors, nice smells, and interesting shapes of plants make them most inviting.

How can you protect your child and still bring nature into your home? Before you buy a new plant, check with a florist to see if it is poisonous. If you're buying the plant in a department store or supermarket, don't rely on a salesperson or clerk for information; It's

better to call a Botanical Society or The Poison Hotline listed in your local telephone directory. It is worth the effort to check first and put off acquiring a potentially dangerous plant until your child is

Take an inventory of your current collection of houseplants to se if any are poisonous. A favorite but deadly plant could be left with a friend or neighbor to "Pot-Sit" for a few years until your toddler is of school age.

You needn't be left plantless; There are a number of beautiful plants that are totally harmless, even if the entire plant is consumed (The worst results may be a slightly green bowel movement). Choosing from these plants while your child is young can ensure your toddler's safety and your peace of mind.

Danger Signs:

Some of the symptoms of plant poisoning include nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, digestive upset, including severe stomach ache, burning and irritation of the mouth, tongue, or throat, difficulty in breathing, n rvous excitement, depression, mental confusion, including hallucinations, stupor, irregular heartbeat and pulse, convulsions, coma, and even, though rarely, death.

Unfortunately, some of the symptoms of poisoning are also symptoms of other common childhood problems. How can a

parent distinquish a case of diarrhea caused by plants from diarrhea caused by a cold or any number of other minor illnesses?

To borrow a phrase from Watergate, look for a "Smoking Gun." Check your houseplants for telltale signs of a toddler at work. If your child has been playing unsupervised in your own or a neighbor's yard, check the grounds for signs of your childs handiwork.

If you suspect your child might be suffering from plant poisoning, call for help immediately. It's absolutely essential to keep the telephone number of your nearest poison control center close at hand. In most cases, first-aid manuals recommend inducing vomiting as quickly as possible. Be sure to save a specimen from the suspected plant for identification and testing

The Hazardous Ones.

The following list, though not complete, includes many of the more common dangerous household plants. In some cases, the expected symptom of poisoning is also, listed, as well as the part of the plant that is dangerous when

Bulbs: Amaryllis Crocus -Vomiting and Nervous Excitement. Daffodil - Nausca, Diarrhea, Vomiting; May be fatal. Hyacinth -Nausea, vomiting, diarrhea; may be fatal; Iris (underground stem) -Severe digestive upset; usually not Cont'd on p. 2

serious; Narcissus - Nausea, vomiting, diarrhea; may be fatal; Tiger Lily; Tulips; Plant leave; Flowers, Stems, and Berries.

Bitterseet Berries: Bleeding Heart - Foliage and roots may be poisonous in large amounts. Caladium - All parts; Cherry Laurel - All parts are very dangerous; contains Hydrocyanic Acid; Christmas Rose - All parts contain a poison that violently affects the heart.

Cyclamen: Daphne Berries - A few berries can kill a child; Dieffenbachia (also called "dumb cane") -All parts; intense burning and irritation of mouth and ton ue; Elephont Ears - leaves; Holl, leaves and berries; Ivy (most common houseplant) - All parts; Jasmine - Flower and Berries; Jerusalem Cherries; Lily of the Valley - Leaves and flowers; causes digestive upset and irregular heartbeat or pulse; Mistletoe - Berries may be fatal if eaten; Poinsettia - Leaves can be fatal; Rosary Pea or Rosary Bean - A single pea or bean may be fatal; Sweet Pea - Stems are poisonous; Wisteria - Seeds and pods are dangerous.

Cactus: Cactus plants with spines or thorns will cause irritation to the skin. Ulceration is possible if the spine remains under the skin to long. If eaten, the prickly cactus can cause internal irritation and bleeding of the stomach and digestive tract. However, children are unlikely to try to eat a plant that is so painful to their little fingers.




As a small boy, I watched a pile-driving machine at work. The operator pulled a huge weight to the top and turned it loose to come crashing down on the column. Even though the impact shook the ground under my bare feet, the steel piling hardly moved at all. I soon tired of watching the machine make noise but seemingly accomplish lit-

It was not until some years later that I began to understand and appreciate the pile-driving process. Its results are cumulative. The piledriver must keep pounding away, even if it isn't making any visible progress. Persistence really does

For small businesses, persistence is one of the basic ingredients for success. It is steadfastness of purpose that drives the business to prosperity. Persistence is the continual striving toward a goal that ultimately guarantees success. At times, you may feel that you aren't getting anywhere. When you feel this way, just remember the piledriver. 
Fight One More Round



Pointers For Parents

Teach Your Child To Learn Through Better Reading Skills

As a new school year begins, families across the country are wondering what they can do to help their child have a successful year.

An essential ingredient to achieve success in school this year-and throughout a lifetime of continual learning-is reading, the fundamental skill influencing how well the student performs in all subject areas.

Whether your child has been an outstanding student, an average student or is exhibiting problems in school, reading comprehension is the key to giving your child a good start and to maintaining the motivation to learn and do well in

school. In today's complex world, reading well requires more than being able to decipher written material or read information. Students must comprehend and analyze information in order to utilize that information. This is the ultimate goal in

Comprehension is a fundamental skill and requires an adequate vocabulary to develop the inventory of sub-skills educators recognize as essential to good reading. They include: recall, sequencing of information, analysis, synthesis and evaluation.

These skills, commonly known as "critical thinking" skills, are acquired through courses of study designed to improve literal comprehension (knowing the content of what has been read) and inferential comprehension (being able to make judgments about what has been read). Parents can help by engaging their children in reading

and vocabulary exercises. Here are tips parents can use this school year to improve their child's reading comprehension:

For Preschoolers:

• Read to your child daily. · Talk about the pictures in the book; use a variety of words to elaborate on the text and pictures.

·When you are outside or in the car with your child, point out objects, animals, and people you see. Relate them to what the child has

read with you in books.

For School-age Children: · Continue to read to your child. Perhaps twice a week, sit together as you read a longer story or novel that contains subject matter appropriate to your child's age but is written beyond their reading ability. An example might be a children's classic such as Little Women by Louisa May Alcott.

 Check out library books written on your child's reading level. Make reading a habit. Set a good example—be a reader.

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
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
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
