Grant funds will help repair streets

Several blocks of streets in Clarendon will be repaired thanks to a \$350,000 disaster grant from the Texas Office of Rural Community Affairs (ORCA).

In an announcement last week, ORCA officials awarded the Texas Community Development Program (TCDP) Disaster Relief grant to the city for damages caused by flooding on May 3 and 4, 2001.

"The Office of Rural Community Affairs is pleased to be able to assist the citizens of Clarendon," said ORCA Director Robert J. "Sam" Tessen. "It is just an example of

Texans helping Texans."

The new grant complements and provides matching funds for another one awarded to the city earlier this year by the federal government's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) program.

"We were fortunate to get these grants," said City Superintendent Jim Roberts. "They came along about the same time, and we were able to tie the two together."

Under the TCDP grant, portions of four city streets will be improved. Those areas include two blocks of

McClelland Street between Fifth and Montgomery, three blocks of Hawley Street from Fourth to Barcus, and three blocks of Wood Avenue from McClelland to Jackson.

The grant also will pave and improve 1,300 feet of Thurman Avenue. That thoroughfare is a major drainage way for the eastern edge of the city. The EWP funds will address the first 150 feet south of US 287, and the TCDP grant will extend that work.

The EWP program funds will also be used for silt removal, slope protection, channel clearing, and

debris removal. The remainder of the TCDP grant will be used to address mitigation measures needed to protect the low-lying areas within the city that flood each time a storm occurs.

Bids for the local projects should be let later this month, and Roberts says the work will be completed this summer.

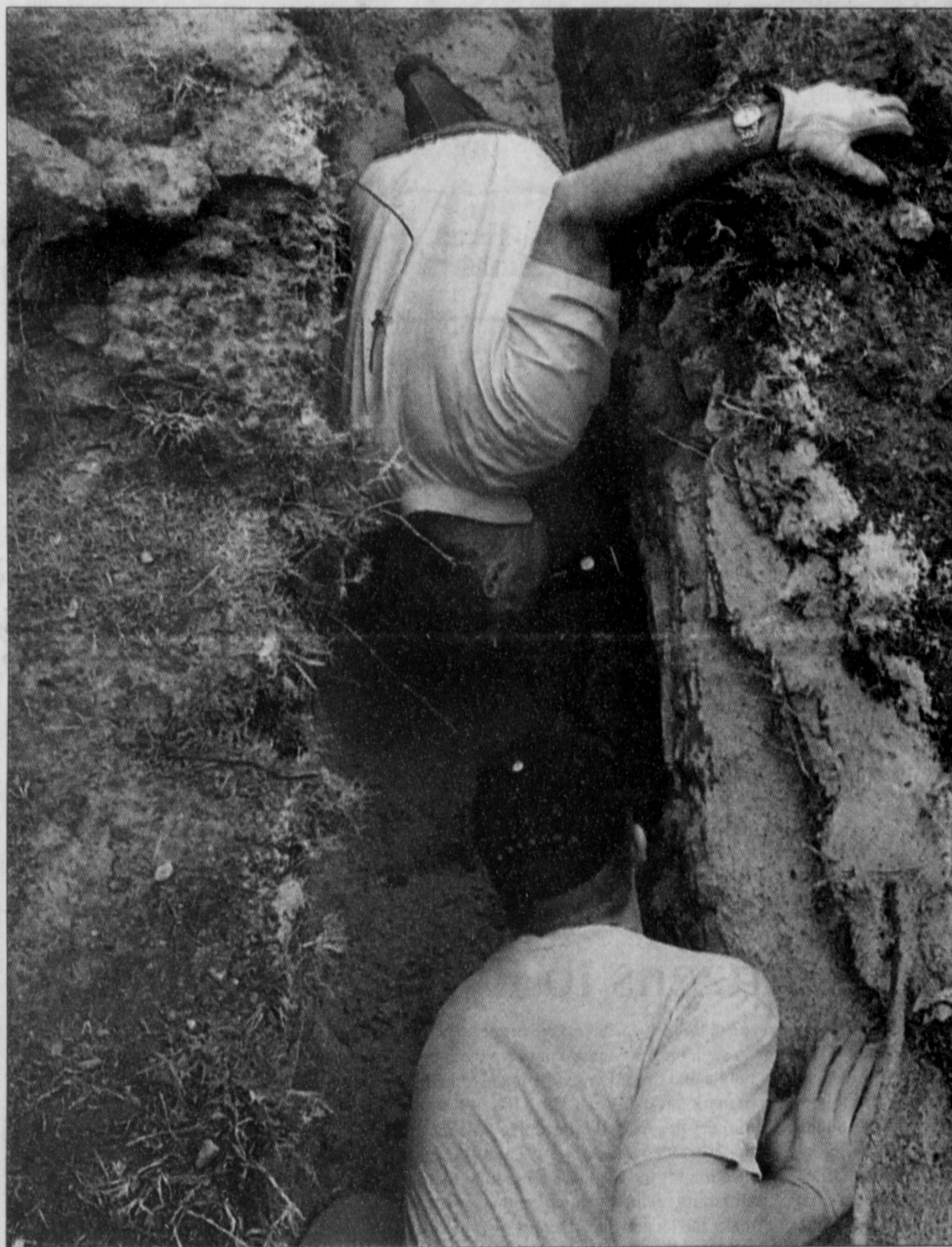
"Small cities like Clarendon are particularly hard-hit by disasters, such as the 2001 flood, which stretch their resources and leave lingering economic consequences," Sen. Craig Estes said. "These funds will help

prevent flooding in the future."

"The new Office of Rural Community Affairs (ORCA) was designed specifically to look after the interests of small communities who need assistance, such as Clarendon," said Rep. Warren Chisum. "It's good to see our government stepping in to give them the help they need."

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) is the funding source for this program.

Donley County Judge Jack Hall and Deputy Clerk Jason Bailey probe the depths of a large brick structure found west of the courthouse last week as workers were digging a trench for a new gas line. Thornberry calls for government reorganization

WASHINGTON, D.C. - For the fourth time in fourteen months,

Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) testified Tuesday in support of reorganizing our government so it is better prepared to prevent and respond to homeland attacks.

This time, though, he had a powerful ally on his side - the President of the United States.

"The President's support of reorganizing our homeland security apparatus clearly changes the whole dynamic of the debate," stated Thornberry, who first introduced a bill to establish a Homeland Security Department in March 2001.

"I am gratified he has taken this important step in the drive for real reform. Still, we can't take anything for granted. Just as the President ran into roadblocks in the Executive Branch as he put this plan together, so too will we run into roadblocks on Capitol Hill as we try to get this plan

through. We can't let that happen - there's too much at stake.

"If Congress lets turf battles and jurisdictional disputes get in the way of reorganizing our government, it will have failed the American people and put our country at a greater risk of attack."

Thornberry delivered his testimony this morning at a hearing of the National Security Subcommittee of the House Government Reform Committee. The hearing was the first in Congress to look at the reorganization plan the President announced last week.

Thornberry was a lead witness at the hearing. His appearance this morning follows up on an appearance he made before the National Security Subcommittee on April 24, 2001. The purpose of that hearing, as with Tuesday's, was homeland security reorganization.

Similar hearings on this issue

were also held late last year and early this year before the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee. Thornberry testified at both of these as well.

"It's hard to talk about the stakes of this proposal without appearing melodramatic," Thornberry said. "But, then again, all we have to do is to look at today's headlines. What we are talking about is doing everything we can to keep a nuclear weapon from going off in an American city, or keep a terrible disease from spreading before we can figure out what it is, or keep suicide bombers from our shopping malls.

"Delaying this plan helps no one but the terrorists, because delaying it means that we will not be as prepared as we could be on the day when they strike again. I believe we should pass this plan in time for the President to sign it into law by September 11, 2002."

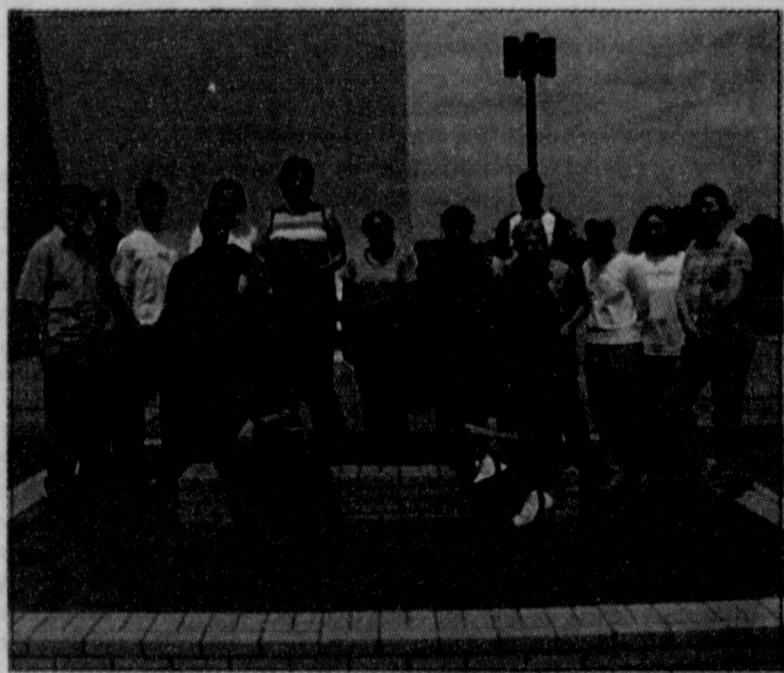
The annual Calf Scramble and Wild Mare Race will also be held each night of the rodeo. Prizes will be awarded in the calf scramble for kids ages 12 and under.

New department won't solve US security woes

A good liberal friend of mine said to me this past weekend: "So, I want to hear how you're going to justify your Republican president creating a new federal department."

My short answer: "I'm not." President Bush's proposal of creating a Department of Homeland Security last week was a major disappointment for those of us who embrace the idea of a small, limited government. The federal behemoth has grown in both size and power since September 11, and we're told it's all for our own safety.

Bush says he doesn't like the idea of having to contact 100 different agencies regarding homeland security. Apparently, he'd rather call one person and have them call 100 different agencies. Sounds to me like President Bush just needs a good personal secretary with a speed dial instead of a new department.

The president's cabinet currently is made up of 21 people, according to the White House website. Fourteen of those are there by law, and the remainder are officials who have been accorded cabinet "status." The top 14 each carry their own huge bureaucracies which - with their accomplices in Congress - make it their business to suck the green right out of your wallet and flush down some \$900 federal potty.

Just once in my life I'd like to see one federal agency, administration, or department completely shut down before we decide to make new one. I don't mean merged or renamed; I mean ended.

The new department will absorb 169,000 employees and the budgets of various agencies totaling approximately \$37.4 billion. Do you really think that the funding for the departments those agencies are leaving will be decreased by a corresponding amount? Hell, no.

In fact, government officials told the Associated Press the new department will have its own federal building and will have a budget nearly the size of the Education Department for next year, \$50 billion. I suppose it just takes the extra \$12.6 billion for all that new stationery and re-doing the business cards of 169,000 employees.

And here's the kicker. The two agencies whose incompetence and inefficiency failed to prevent the attacks of September 11 - the FBI and the CIA - aren't included in this grand reshuffling.

We small government types must accept that a new department is on its way. Democrats love big government, so they're for it. And Republicans run for elections preaching about reducing the size of the federal government, but they have shown no restraint in enlarging the bureaucracy.

All of this is nothing new, of course. Earlier this year, it was determined that the Immigration & Naturalization Service had fumbled the ball big time before and after September 11. The solution Congress came up with was to split the agency into two different entities. Rep. Melvin Watt (D-North Carolina) was one of seven Democrats to vote against that bill.

"You've got one inefficient, unproductive INS now; it seems to me what you're going to end up with is two inefficient agencies," Watt said.

The lessons we have learned from September 11 are two-fold. First, there are people in the world who hate America and everything it stands for, and the only way to be protected from them is to kill them before they kill us. And second, our government is so bloated, so overgrown, so gargantuan that it has become a bureaucratic morass which cannot effectively communicate with itself except in the most dire emergencies.

What is needed is a slimmed down federal government. One that can respond to information when it is presented, and one that can provide services efficiently. That objective will not be met by the new Homeland Security Department.

You still have the same 100 different federal agencies with all their petty squabbling, and all of them are more concerned with protecting their budgets and their fiefdoms than in serving the taxpayers.

I seriously doubt a new department will have any real impact on the operation of the federal government or the state of our national security. It will just make people feel like their government is doing something.

Meanwhile...

The racial divide has gone to the dogs... literally. In McKees Rocks, Penn., a police drug canine named Dolpho apparently got confused and bit the leg of a young black boy during a drug bust last week. The boy was not a suspect, just a bystander.

Now, the dog is accused of being a racist, and one member of McKees Rocks City Council is calling for the dog to be killed for his mistake.

"I had received complaints from African-Americans saying they believe the dog only attacks African-Americans," city councilwoman Wanda Jones Dixon said Monday. "I think the dog makes the distinction."

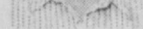
The dog's fate has not yet been determined. Perhaps some canine sensitivity training classes are in order.

CEDC plans hearing on possible projects

The Clarendon Economic Development Board met on Tuesday, June 4, 2002. Several items were discussed, and it was decided to set a public hearing on July 16, 2002, at 5 p.m. in the CEDC office at 318 S. Kearney St.

The following projects for 2002-2003 will be considered at the hearing: 1) Street Paving - According to several people, when the CEDC was formed, street paving was the main reason it was voted in. 2) Motel - We are working with a person who is willing to build a new three-story motel if he can find land. A meeting is being set up with his three top choices. 3) Fast Food Restaurants - There has been some interest from fast food chains in locating in Clarendon. 4) Aircraft Repair Hanger - The City, TxDOT, and the FAA have approved a new hanger at the airport for repair of small airplanes. 5) Parking Areas for Downtown - We are working on obtaining the railroad property near Kearney Street and paving across from the Post Office to allow motorhomes and travel trailers to park while shopping downtown. 6) Kearney Street Revitalization - We would like to work with the merchants to make downtown more presentable to our visitors and shoppers. 7) City Parks - We would like to develop our parks. 8) Mulkey Theater - We are working on obtaining the Mulkey and hope that this will be done shortly. 9) TIF Grant - This grant is in conjunction

with Clarendon College. It would provide a community network to help bring our rural community into the 21st century with computers and Internet access for public use. Due to time and space constraints, I will discuss this grant in more detail in another column.

We know that we do not have the funds for these projects; however, we may be able to find grants to help.

The CEDC operates on a half-cent sales tax, and the City gets the Hotel Bed Tax that can be used by the city for only limited projects. I will discuss these usages in another column.

Highway 287 is a goldmine, and it runs through Clarendon and Donley County. Let's look at the two cities on the north and south ends of US 287 at it passes through the Panhandle. A few years ago, both of these cities were drying up. They were in the same shape we are in now. A major effort to attract businesses that would get most of their customers off 287 has given them a tremendous boost.

Dalhart's EDC tax generated \$270,000

in 2001. They recently gave \$100,000 to build a skate park, and they are planning to build a community center. They have about \$600,000 in CDs. Their Hotel Bed Tax for 2001 brought in \$133,000.

Childress' EDC tax generated \$200,000 in 2001, and they have several improvement projects going. The Childress Hotel Bed Tax brought in \$215,000 in 2001. The Childress EDC advises that the prison has helped a little, but that most of the tax income is from US 287.

Clarendon's EDC tax brought in \$55,680 in 2001, and we have \$115,000 in CDs. The Hotel Bed Tax for 2001 generated \$7,610. We are severely limited on funds. With the addition of a motel, other businesses will come, and we could be getting a benefit from US 287. This would give us funds to improve our city without raising taxes.

Remember the Town Hall meeting - "Hogs, Dairies, or Tourism" - to be on Tuesday, June 18, at the Harned Sisters Fine Arts Auditorium on the Clarendon College campus. I have received several calls from people who think dairies would be okay. They feel the money coming into the county would more than offset the negative points. No one has spoke in favor of hogs. I feel that we can get more money from tourists and from US 287 than we can with hogs or dairies.

VFW seeks assistance to mark veterans graves

We are writing this letter in an effort to make a plea to the public with regard to the Citizens Cemetery. This past Memorial Day weekend, the members of the VFW and its Ladies Auxiliary placed American flags on all veterans buried at Citizens, Odd Fellows, and St. Mary's cemeteries. Because the ground was so hard and dry, we were unable to place many of the flags. It has been a chore to place the flags this year and years past without breaking the sticks on the flags. With 470+ veterans buried, it has become a difficult task just to place the flags to honor them during this holiday.

Although many of the veterans' graves already have been marked to signify a veteran's grave, numerous graves are not marked, and no provisions are in place to install flags on those graves. In an effort to

make this job easier, and to properly honor those heroes, we are asking help from the public and those family members to help to mark those graves. The VFW and other military groups sell bronze flag holders that mark the veteran's grave and allow a location for the flag. We are asking that all family members purchase this device to make the locating of veterans' graves easier to find to place a flag and honor those during the holiday.

In an effort to supply the public with necessary grave markers, the VFW will be offering the bronze grave marker/flag holder for sale to the public. These flag holders range in price from \$29 to \$38.90. We urge all living family members to purchase these flag holders for their deceased relatives. The VFW supplies at no charge a marker for its current deceased members. Markers signifying World War I, World War II, Korea, Vietnam, U.S. veteran, American Legion, and Gold Star mothers are available for purchase.

We are making this plea to the families of veterans because more than 300 grave markers are needed in Citizens cemetery

alone. It will cost approximately \$8,700 to complete the task of marking and honoring each and every veteran grave in the cemetery.

We are asking the public and family members to donate all or part of the \$8,700 needed to mark every veteran's grave. The VFW and its Ladies' Auxiliary will place the markers on the graves for those family members that are unable to do so or if requested. Please donate as much as you can to this worthy cause. The VFW is not going to make a single penny on the purchase of these grave markers. We are dedicated to the remembrance of our departed comrades and want to see them honored always.

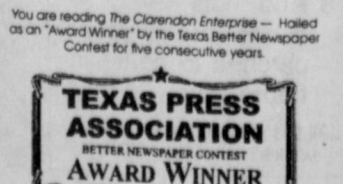

their medical missions efforts.

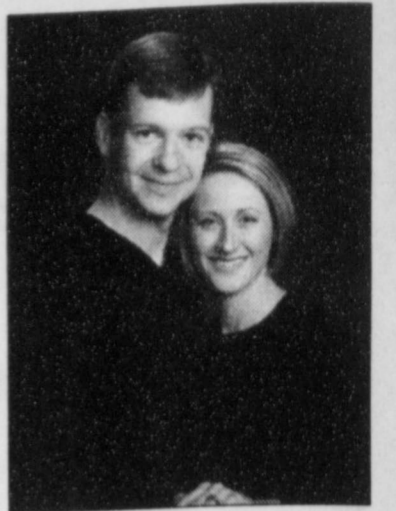

Are you prepared for the Texas summer heat?

Even though we have experienced a few cool, damp days lately, the Texas sun will bring long, hot days. Prolonged heat and humidity can cause dehydration and heat stroke.

To prevent heat-related health problems:

- slow down and avoid strenuous activity
- wear lightweight, loose-fitting, light-colored clothing

- drink plenty of water, even if you do not feel thirsty
- avoid alcohol and caffeine
- stay indoors as much as possible.

Dehydration and heat stroke are serious illnesses. The symptoms of dehydration include: thirst, less frequent urination, fatigue, and dizziness. Mild dehydration can be treated by drinking fluids. Moderate dehydration may require intravenous fluids.

Heat stroke is an emergency. Call 9-1-1. While waiting for help to arrive, move the person to a cooler place. Also, apply cool water to the skin and fan and keep the person lying down.

Remember sunscreen helps prevent skin damage and skin cancer, but will not prevent heat-related illnesses.

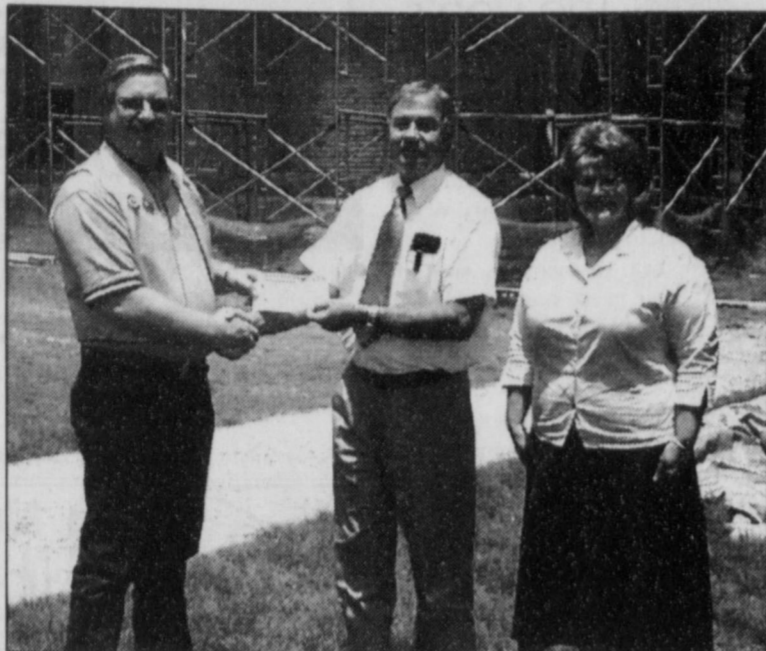

USDA makes June 'Homeownership Month'

The US Department of Agriculture announced June as National Homeownership Month, a time to note our accomplishments as a nation in achieving the American dream.

According to recently released Census figures, the rate of homeownership by Americans - at 68 percent for the First Quarter of 2002 - continues at a record level. This is true in every region of the country, among all races and ethnic groups, for all age categories, and among all levels of income.

The picture is even brighter in America's rural areas. For more than 35 years, the homeownership rate outside metropolitan areas has exceeded 70 percent. At the end of 2001, it was an even 75 percent, according to Census reports.

Part of the success among these diverse groups and in rural areas can be attributed to a long-time federal program. For more than 50 years, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has been making loans directly to low-income families to purchase their own homes.

Administered by USDA Rural Development's Rural Housing Service, the Section 502 Direct Loan program was established by the

Housing Act of 1949. The first loan was made available to non-farmers, beginning in 1961.

More than \$55 billion and millions of homeowners later, the basics of this successful program remain the same. It provides an opportunity for those shut out by other lenders to own their own home. It works by making loans available to low-income families with no down payment and installments reduced to a one-percent interest rate level. As the household becomes established - increasing income and building equity in the property - the loan, including part or all of the assistance received, is repaid. This allows low-income, rural families to share in the American dream of homeownership, along with all its benefits. It has clearly contributed to the high overall rate of homeownership.

In Fiscal Year 2001, Section 502 Direct Loans totaling \$1.064 billion were provided to more than 15,600 families to buy their own homes. In addition, the Rural Housing Service guaranteed more than 30,000 loans of \$2.3 billion from other lenders (through a program begun in 1990), allowing slightly higher income

households to buy homes without down payment at competitive rates and terms. Another \$61 million was provided in low-interest loans and grants for repairs and improvements to nearly 12,000 of the poorest rural households, especially the elderly.

Texas led the nation in Fiscal Year 2001 as 1,019 families in the state obtained Section 502 Direct Loans totaling \$71,785,570. Lenders obtained guarantees of \$29,230,340 allowing another 380 households to buy their own homes. One-percent interest loans totaling \$1,740,760 were provided to 278 very-low income homeowners for repairs and improvements. Another 376 elderly households received \$2,217,560 in grants for essential repairs to their homes - also tops in the nation.

So far in Fiscal Year 2002, 8,000 households have obtained direct loans to purchase their own homes, 16,500 have received loan guarantees and more than 7,200 have benefited from low interest loans and grants to make necessary repairs or improvements to their existing homes.

TxDOT to replace six bridges in Donley, Collingsworth Counties

Construction will begin soon to replace six bridges in Collingsworth and Donley counties.

The bridges to be replaced in Donley County are Carroll Creek on Country Road I and Buck Creek on County Road K.

Four of the bridges are located in Collingsworth County. They are: Sand Creek Bridge on Farm to Market 338, Crow Creek Bridge and Elm Creek Bridge on County Road 210 and Draw Creek Bridge on County Road K.

The Texas Department of Transportation hosted a pre-construction meeting on May 22, 2002, to discuss construction efforts to replace these six bridges with the contractors, Austin Bridge and Road, Inc. of Dallas.

Construction on the \$2.3 million project started June 3, 2002, and has an estimated August 2003 completion date. The first phase will begin at the Sand Creek Bridge location on FM 338 in Collingsworth County. An advisory speed of 40 miles per hour will be in effect on this first project with a detour around the construction area for local traffic. After completion, construction efforts will then move to Crow and Elm Creek on County Road 210, and then continue to the other bridge locations when completed. Detours will be built around each bridge for access to the local traffic.

Junior Historians travel to Texas Tech to see exhibit

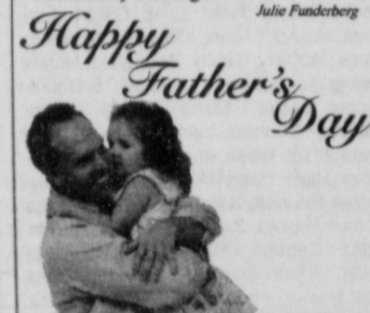
The Junior Historians traveled to Lubbock June 3 to attend the exhibit "Traditions and Renewal: Medieval Frescoes from the Vatican Museums" at the Museum of Texas Tech. The exhibit of 31 medieval frescoes were discovered in 1528 and kept in storage until 1995. The have never been displayed for the public. Frescoe painting finds paint applied to wet plaster. The water soluble pigments combine with the plaster as it dries. As the plaster

dries, the pigments become part of the hardened plaster. This is not a touring exhibit. It was transported from Rome to Lubbock, where it will be on display until September 15 and then returned directly to the Vatican Museum. Frescoes headed to Lubbock originally were donated to the Vatican by the church of St. Nicoli and the basilica of St. Agnes, both in Rome. The art works were painted in the 13th and 14th centuries.

Frescoes from St. Agnes include "Stories of St. Catherine," "Stories of St. Benedict," "Holy Princess," "St. Peter," "Six Saints," "Two Saints," "Story of a Saint," and "Marriage of the Virgin." Those form the Church of St. Nicoli include decorative fragments of birds, a winged dragon, a peacock, a mask and two dolphins, a heron, and "The Prophet Amos," "The Prophet Jeremiah," and "The Prophet Aggeus."

Lots of little fish mean bigger fish in future

Well, folks, I am sorry about being out of action this past month. I have not been fishing or doing any outdoor activities, only working. I can tell you from reliable sources that the fishing here at Lake Greenbelt and our other local lakes is still fair to good. Here at Lake Greenbelt, the crappie and walleye are beginning to slow up with the water temperatures rising while the catfish and sand bass are starting to heat up in the last couple of weeks. The largemouth bass fishing is good in the mornings.

I had some friends come down from Canyon this past weekend, and they said the sand bass drove them crazy. They couldn't keep bait in the water longer than 10 minutes before little sand bass gobbled it up. The sand bass were 6" to 8" long. Between three fishermen, who I know

fish hard, they went through 8 dozen minnows, 2 dozen night crawlers, 4 boxes of shrimp, and 6 waterdogs and took home about 10 keeper sand bass, 3 crappie, and 13 channel cats, with two of the cats over 8 pounds. My buddy, David, said that the little sand bass were biting on everything. If they could have kept the baits on a little longer, they probably would have caught more catfish. They figured they spent about \$50 on bait and the sand bass gobbled up about \$30 of it. But they were happy because at least they were catching something.

Some people just raise hell because the little fish are stealing the bait. Well, "waahh!" If you stop and think for a moment, then maybe common sense will enter your brain cells to figure out that the fish have to reproduce and grow up, or there

would be no fishing. The fish just don't hatch into legal size limits. The way I see it, if there are a bunch of little fish this year, in two or three years there will be a lot of big fish. So stop complaining and enjoy fishing whether you are catching small fish or big fish.

Here's a thought: Try carp fishing. They seem to be a pretty big fish and let the little game fish grow up. I am a patient man, and I can wait for the next generation of trophy game fish to grow. And also, catch and release makes a lot of sense to me. Until next week, all you com-

plainers of small fish please leave now! Because you are the weakest link... Goodbye!

USDA removes Texas' cattle TB free status

Texas ranchers will need more than a truck and trailer to move breeding cattle and bison out of state for the foreseeable future.

On June 6, the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) published its "interim rule" that officially downgraded Texas' cattle tuberculosis (TB) status from Accredited-Free to Modified Accredited-Advanced.

Now, unless they are moving directly to slaughter, Texas breeding cattle and bison must be officially identified and be tested for cattle TB within 60 days prior to being transported across state lines (interstate movement).

Untested Texas cattle and bison still can move freely within the state. "Stock covered by the breeding cattle testing and identification requirement include weaned heifers, bred heifers, cows and bulls intended for breeding purposes," explained Dr. Max Coats, assistant executive director for the Texas Animal Health Commission, the state's livestock health regulatory agency.

"The USDA has delayed until January 1, 2003, additional restrictions on moving feeder cattle out of the state. Feeder animals include steers, bull calves, and heifers des-

igned for grazing and feeding for slaughter."

"We've worked to prepare Texas cattle producers for the impact of this regulation change for several months and have conferred frequently with related industry associations. Brochures outlining the changes in the testing requirements can be obtained from the TAHC at no charge," said Dr. Coats.

"This new federal regulation will require ranchers to plan ahead before selling or moving their breeding cattle out of state," he said. "Ranchers may find their breeding cattle to be more marketable if the animals are tested prior to arrival at the livestock market. Untested breeding cattle and bison will be restricted to movement only within the state or directly to a slaughter plant, unless a buyer makes arrangement to have the animals held and tested after the sale. Ranchers will be responsible for paying their USDA accredited, private veterinary practitioners for testing."

To conduct a TB skin test, an accredited veterinarian injects a tiny amount of tuberculin into the animal's skin near its tail, in an area called the "caudal fold." After a 72-hour waiting period, Dr. Coats said the veterinarian examines the site for swelling that might indicate the animal has been exposed to cattle TB. If there is

no response, the accredited veterinarian can issue a document as proof of testing, recording on it the test results and the animal's official identification - either a brucellosis ear tag, or for purebred cattle, a firebrand or tattoo registered with the breed.

"About one percent of the 'caudal fold' tests will be positive, and this is expected, as there can be false-positive test results," noted Dr. Coats. "If this occurs, a state or federal veterinarian must run a second test within 10 days. This 'comparative cervical' test, run on the animal's neck, also requires a 72-hour waiting period, and if it is negative, the animal can move freely."

"A positive test, however, is strong indication the animal may have cattle TB, and it must be slaughtered and carefully examined for internal TB lesions. Tissue samples will be collected and forwarded to the National Veterinary Services Laboratory in Ames, Iowa, for laboratory confirmation."

"There are three exceptions to the TB testing requirements for breeding cattle moving across state lines," said Dr. Coats, who heads up TAHC's field operations and animal health programs. "Nursing calves can move without a test, if they accompany their TB-tested dam. Cattle going directly to a slaughter

plant from a farm or livestock market don't need a test. Ranchers also can move animals freely from a TB accredited-free herd, a status gained through annual herd testing." (Dr. Coats advised producers to call the TAHC at 1-800-550-8242 for information about the TB accreditation program.)

"We are working with the USDA, states that receive our cattle, and the livestock industry to develop a plan for adequately identifying feeder steers and spayed heifers moving out of Texas on or after January 1, 2003," said Dr. Coats. Dr. Coats explained that Texas initially earned Accredited-Free status for cattle TB in November 2000, with the exception of El Paso and Hudspeth Counties, which were "zoned out" by the USDA, due to low levels of infection that occurred in several large dairies in the area. For purposes of cattle movement and cattle TB eradication, he said Texas will remain "split," as El Paso and Hudspeth Counties cannot apply for Accredited-Free status until at least three years after its dairies are depopulated and no additional infection is detected. On the other hand, he noted, the state's other 252 counties may reapply to the USDA for TB Accredited-Free status in two years if no more infected herds are found.

Texas to celebrate Juneteenth next week

AUSTIN- Juneteenth is the oldest known African American Celebration commemorating the end of slavery in Texas.

Slaves in the Confederate states were declared free on January 1, 1863, under the Emancipation Proclamation. Confederate leaders, however, did not recognize U.S. government proclamations made during the Civil War. As a result, the ruling did not immediately affect Texas slaves.

On June 19, 1865, General Gordon Granger, the commander of U.S. troops in Texas, arrived in

Galveston and read General Order 3, making emancipation a reality in Texas.

Celebrated for more than 100 years, Juneteenth became an official state holiday in 1979 through legislation authored by State Representative Al Edwards (D-Houston). Events are planned throughout the month and across the state, including the Al Edwards Juneteenth Holiday Tennis Classic in Houston June 28-29.

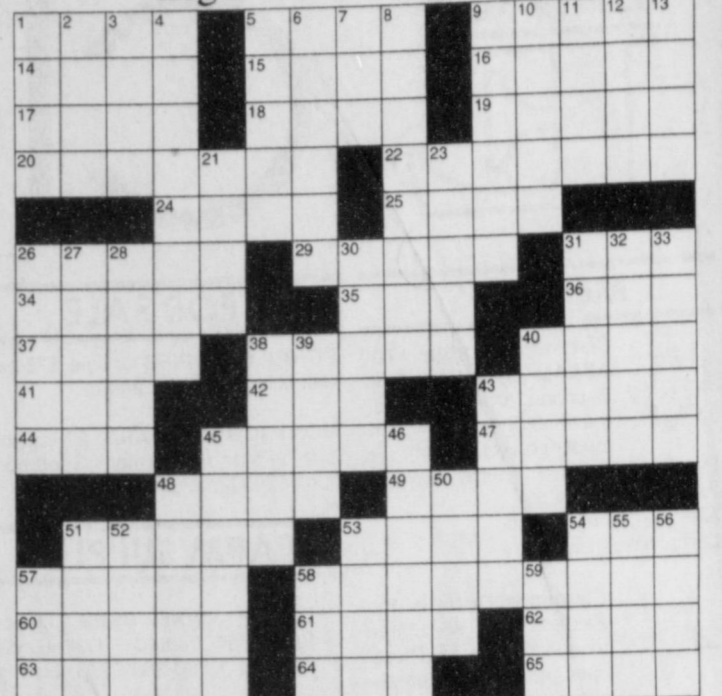
